

Ross Hall of Fame inductee, 2012

Fallon Bailey

Fallon Bailey starred in the sprint events while lettering four times in girls' track and field for Ross. She added two more letters in basketball.

Fallon was the team's most valuable track and field performer her junior and senior years and led the team in scoring all four years.

In 2000, Fallon placed fourth at the state meet in the 100-meter dash and was a member of the state qualifying 4x100-meter relay. She returned to the state meet in 2001, competing in the 100, 200, and 4x100 relay. Fallon placed sixth in the individual dashes and anchored the 4x100 to a fourth-place finish.

She holds the school record in the 100 (11.90) and 200-meter (24.9) dashes and was a member of the school record-setting 4x100-meter relay (48.78).

After high school, Fallon competed on the Central Michigan University track and field team. She was All-Mid-American in the indoor long jump and 60-meter dash. Outdoors, she was All-MAC in the 100- and 200-meter dashes and the 4x100-meter relay.

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Harry Liggins

Harry Liggins Sr. won five letters at Ross from 1972-1975. He lettered three times in track and field and twice in football, the sport in which he was a standout.

Harry led the Little Giants in tackles and assists in his junior and senior years. For his Ross career, he had 175 tackles and assists while racking up 21 quarterback sacks or tackles for loss from his defensive end position.

The Ross defense recorded 10 shutouts in his junior and senior seasons. The team finished 9-1 and 9-0-1 those seasons.

Harry was the team's most valuable defensive player his junior year. As a senior, he was a first-team selection on the All-Northwest Ohio and the All-Ohio defensive teams. He was also first-team All-Buckeye Conference.

Following his senior year, Harry was a member of the North team in the Ohio High School Coaches Association North-South Game, scoring the winning touchdown.

In track, he was a middle-distance runner and was a member of the 880-relay team that missed qualifying for the state meet by one spot in 1973.

After graduation from Ross, he attended Kent State University. Lettering three years as a defensive back. He led KSU in interceptions in two of those years.

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Scott Logan

Scott Logan starred in baseball and football for the Little Giants in 1980-1981. He won two letters in football and two more in baseball.

Scott was a standout in baseball, sharing a state record for hits and triples in one game. He was also an accomplished pitcher for Ross.

Scott shares the state record for hits, six, in one game, going six-for-seven at the plate. He shares that state record with eight other players. He pulled off the record-tying effort in 1981. His three triples in the 46-0 Ross sectional tournament win over Toledo Scott are also a state record.

In the victory over Scott, he teamed up with John Rios to pitch a no-hitter. Scott was undefeated in two years pitching for the Little Giants, winning 10 games to go along with three saves and an earned run average of 0.81.

In 1981, Scott had 34 hits, scored 29 runs, and drove in 34 runs to go along with seven triples and five home runs. His batting average of .498 led the team, and his total of three-base hits is a Ross single-season record.

He was the team's co-Most Valuable Player, a first-team All-Buckeye Conference, All-Northwest Ohio, and All-Ohio selection, all in 1981.

On the gridiron, Logan was a receiver earning honorable mention All-Buckeye Conference in football. In his senior season, Logan finished with 14 catches for 232 yards and a pair of touchdowns.

Logan is currently the business manager at Steinle GMC Cadillac.

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Josh Lozano

Josh Lozano was a two-sport star for the Ross Little Giants from 1997-2000. He won six Ross letters, three in both baseball and football.

A three-year starter in football, Josh was All-Ohio and All-Great Lakes League first team as a senior defensive back. He was a second-team selection in 1997 and 1998. In 1999, he was the GLL Defensive Player of the Year and was an All-Northwest Ohio District second-team selection.

Josh was the Little Giants' leading tackler and interception leader during his three years as a starter.

He played in the Ohio High School Coaches Association North-South Game in 2000.

Josh, a three-year starter, was the leading hitter for three years on the baseball team. A catcher, he batted .405, .412, and .407. He threw out 93 percent of runners attempting to steal bases.

He was an All-GLL first-team selection twice and a second-team selection once. Josh was the team's Most Valuable Player in 2000.

Josh was named the Fremont Ross Male Athlete of the Year in 2000.

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C.J. "Chuck" Miller

C.J. "Chuck" Miller was a state-champion swimmer for the Ross Little Giants. He lettered four times while competing from 1947 through 1950.

Chuck won the state championship in backstroke at the 1950 Ohio High School Swimming and Diving Championships. He was undefeated in the backstroke that season. He also won the district title that season.

Also in the 1950 state meet, Chuck swam on the state runner-up 200-yard relay.

In 1949, Chuck was fifth in the backstroke in the state meet.

He was a member of the Ross team that won four district championships. The squad in that time posted 25 victories in 31 dual meets.

After graduating from Ross, Chuck lettered as a freshman on the University of Arizona swim team. He was the only freshman to accomplish that feat.

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Earl Smith

Earl Smith was a record-setting runner for Ross from 1968-1971, earning three letters in track and field and placing at two Ohio High School State Track and Field meets.

At the Ohio High School State Track and Field meet in 1970, he was eighth in the 880-yard run and followed that up with a runner-up finish in the state meet in 1971 in that same event. The first time he ran the 880 in 1970, he set a school record and continued to break it over and over on his way to competing in the 1970 state meet. He repeated that feat throughout the 1971 season until he ran in the state meet.

Also in 1971, Earl anchored the Little Giants mile relay team of Claude Price, Bill Burkett, and Tom Pitts, which qualified for the 1971 state track meet. With Earl running the final leg, the relay team set a Buckeye Conference record. A record that stood for six years. The team won the regional title to advance to the state meet.

He set another conference record that year, winning his specialty, the 880-yard run. Earl held the school record in the 880 for over 30 years.

Later in 1971, he anchored the mile relay team that set a school record. That mark stood the test of time for six seasons.

In the 1971 Fremont Night Relays, Earl won the 440 and 880, and ran the final leg on the mile relay. The 440 and mile relay were won in meet record times.

He was the team's most valuable performer in his junior and senior seasons. He also won the "coaches award" in 1971.

While Earl remembers with great pride those record-setting days, in his view, his most significant accomplishments are those of his four sons. Andy and Wesley were multiple state track and field champions and collegiate All-Americans. Dusty and Nick were outstanding soccer players
