The old adage of "ladies first" also prevailed Friday night, when the Fremont girls sailed into an aggregation representing the Clyde high school and cleaned up on them to the tune of 57 to 0. WITH FRENCH BRIDES

Four Thousand American Soldiers
Will Return Home.

Paris, Jan. 11.—American soldiers are marrying French girls at the rate of more than 400 each month. It is estimated that 4,000 soldiers of the United States army of occupation will return home with French brides. However, the ratio is but one in 500, allowing for 2,000,000 eligible American boys in France.

Charles G. Loeb, one of the chief American attorneys in Paris, has this to say: "The marriages of our soldiers and the French girls are marriages of pure romance. There's never a question of dowry. Heretofore French parents have always expected to turn over a certain sum of money as a dowry to the man who would marry one of their daughters."

In most cases the girl knows little English and the soldier little French. The brides are working girls—typists, shop girls and the like. Seldom does an officer marry.
