

Ross Hall of Fame inductee, 2010

Chris Benson

Chris Benson specialized in pass thefts during his career with the Ross Little Giants from 1988-1991.

Chris holds the Little Giants single-season record for pass interceptions, 11, set in his senior season. This figure led the state in pass thefts. He also holds the Fremont Ross record for career pass interceptions with 16.

He was named to the Associated Press All-Ohio defensive first team as a senior. Following his final season, Chris played in the Ohio High School Coaches Association North-South Game.

Also, as a senior, Chris was named to the AP All-Northwest District first team on defense and was the Buckeye Conference defensive player of the year. As a junior, he was a second-team all-conference selection.

Chris also led the Little Giants in receiving and punt returns his senior season, and, to show his versatility, he served as the team's placekicker.

Chris also won a letter in basketball and two in baseball to go along with his three in football.

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Brad Borden

Brad was the quarterback for the Ross football team in 1972 and 1973, leading them to a 9-1 season each year.

He was named to the first-team offense on the All-Buckeye Conference team as a senior and to the second team as a junior.

Brad was the conference's player of the year in 1973 and was a second-team selection on the Associated Press All-Northwest Ohio team. He was a second-team All-Ohio selection at quarterback on the United Press International team.

As captain, he was named the team's Most Valuable Player as a senior.

He completed 39 of 74 passes his senior year, a 54 percent completion rate. He passed for 694 yards and 13 touchdowns on a team that was run-oriented.

Following his senior season, Brad quarterbacked the North team to a 21-0 victory in the Ohio High School Football Coaches Association North-South Game.

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Charles Glover

Charles won six letters for the Ross Little Giants from 1948-1950, two each in track and field, basketball, and football.

Nicknamed "Twinkle Toes," Charles was a standout running back, averaging 9.2 yards per carry while helping lead Ross to a fifth-place state ranking in 1949. He was a first-team All-Buckeye League selection in 1949 and was an honorable mention All-Ohio that year.

In track and field, he competed in the sprint events, long jump, and was a member of the 440- and 880-yard relays.

Following graduation, Charles attended the Federal Law Enforcement Academy and served in the United States Air Force from 1951 to 1972. He served in the Korean War and the Vietnam War.

Charles was a federal police officer from 1974 to 1998.

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Westley Glover

Westley played four years of football at Ross from 1953-1957. He was a first-team All-Ohio selection as a defensive tackle in 1956. He served as the team's co-captain his senior year.

He was named to the News-Messenger's All-Time Fremont Ross Football Team. The Junior Chamber of Commerce of Ohio named him to its first team in football for his play on the field and for being ranked in the top third academically in his class.

Westley earned All-Buckeye League honors for the undefeated 1956 team. He played on a defensive unit that allowed just 65 points.

After graduating from high school, he attended Bowling Green State University and played on the 1959 BGSU Small College National Championship team. After college graduation, Westley played two years for the Green Bay Packers.

After coaching and teaching briefly at Ross, he went on to become the athletic director for the Dayton, Ohio, City Schools.

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John Lozano

John Lozano was a three-sport star while wearing the Purple and White. He won seven letters along the way. Lozano was on the football, wrestling, and baseball teams and helped his teams to a 25-5-1 record between 1983 and 1986.

On the football field, Lozano had a record-setting interception return in his junior year of 90 yards against Marion Harding. As of 2026, it remains the fourth-longest return in school history.

Lozano won first-team All-Buckeye Conference honors as a defensive back in 1984 and 1985. He had five interceptions in 1984 and added three more in 1985. He was a football captain his senior season as well.

On the wrestling mat, Lozano compiled a record of 24-8 his senior year and advanced all the way to the state tournament at 145 lbs. Lozano won a championship at the Buckeye Conference tournament his senior season as well. He was the team's most valuable wrestler that year and won the captain's award.

In baseball, Lozano won the "most improved player" award as a junior.

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Jim Sherman

Jim Sherman won four letters in two sports for the Ross Little Giants from 1973-1976.

He earned two letters in track and field, where he set a school high jump record of 6 feet 4.5 inches. In his senior year, he won the district meet's 100-yard dash in a time of 10.2 seconds.

In football, Jim was named to the first-team Associated Press All-Northwest Ohio defensive team and AP the AP honorable-mention all-state defensive team in his junior and senior seasons.

Jim served as captain of the football and track teams his senior year. He also was named the recipient of the Baron-Sherman Award, which is presented to the outstanding senior athlete at Fremont Ross.

Following graduation in 1976, Jim was selected to play in the "Big 33" football classic in Hershey, PA. This All-Star game, started back in 1957, matches the best players in Ohio against the best in Pennsylvania. Jim received an athletic scholarship to Vanderbilt University, graduated in 1980, and earned three letters in football.
