

1953 Season review...

Ohio State Champs!

The Ross swimmers started their season off with a meet with the B. G. Frash whom they defeated 50-25 at the Ross pool on December 15. Ross tied a pool record in the 200-yard free style relay with Rose, Frantz, Lucas, and Hirschberger. Hirschberger, Faunce, Schwartz, and Hunt took first in the other events of the meet.

Ross downed Sandusky 47-28 at Sandusky on January 15. The Little Giant Tankers took six out of nine events. George Hirschberger won the 40-yard free style by a hair over Jim Lanker of Sandusky. Lanker later beat Jack Rose in the 100-yard free-style. Gary Schwartz won in the 100-yard backstroke with Merlin Eversole of Ross a close second. Bill Faunce came in first in the 100-yard breast stroke with McBane of Sandusky, second. Larry Hunt won in fancy diving with a pointage of 115.5. Jack Rose, Ned Frantz, and George Hirschberger placed first in the 160-yard relay.

The Ross Swimming Squad met a strong Toledo Y aggregation in the Y pool to win 48-27, January 20.



Ross won five of nine first and six second places to completely out-shine the Y-men. Lemke of the Y won two events, the 50 and 100 yd. free style. Jack Rose, Ned Frantz, George Hirschberger and Bob Lucas broke the old 200 yard free style record of 1:42.5. The new record established was 1:42. (Faunce, Schwartz, Lorenzen), (Sherer, Schwartz, Faunce), and (Rose, Lucas, Frantz, Hirschberger) won firsts in the 100 yard breaststroke, 100 yard backstroke, 150 yard individual medley, 150 yard medley relay, and 200 yard free style, respectively.

The Ross High Mermen handed Western Reserve Academy a 56-19 defeat, on January 24 at Ross. Ross won first in every event except the 150-yard individual medley. Harris was the only winner for Reserve. Winners for Fremont were Ned Frantz, Bill Faunce, Gary Schwartz, Larry Hunt, George Hirschberger and 150-yard medley and 200-yard free style relays. Hirschberger won first in the 50 yard free style, Rose first in the 100 yard free style, Faunce in the 100 yard breast stroke, Frantz in the 200 yard free style, Schwartz in the 100 yard backstroke and Hunt first in diving.

The Little Giant Swimmers drowned Sandusky 45 to 30 at Ross on January 27. Outstanding event of the night was the setting of a new pool and Ross school record by the 200 yard free-style relay team. They bettered their own time for the distance making 1:41, only six-tenths of a second from the state record, and a second faster than their previous record. Firsts for Ross were by Hirschberger in the 50 yard free style; Frantz in the 200 yard free style, Eversole in the 100 yard backstroke, and Larry Hunt in the diving.

The Little Giant Tankmen defeated Bexley 56-19 at Ross on January 31. Wallace, state champ in the 100 yard free style in 1951, was the only winner for Bexley. He nosed out George Hirschberger in the 50-yard free style. Louis Lorenzen broke the school record by swimming the 150-yard individual medley in 1:53.4 minutes. Bruce Sherer, Ned Frantz, Gary Schwartz, Jack Rose, Louis Lorenzen, Larry Hunt, (Schwartz, Faunce, Sherer), and (Rose, Frantz, Lucas,

Hirschberger), placed first in all events except in the 50 yard free-style race, won by Bexley.

Canton McKinley won first in the B.G. relays held on February 7. Ross was second.

The Ross tankers pushed on to capture victory seven by scoring a triumph over Toledo Y 49 to 26 on February 10. Jack Rose broke the 150-yard individual medley record established by Lorenzen in a previous meet by swimming the distance in 1:46.3.

Ross High Swimmers won over Canton McKinley 42 ½ to 32 ½ at Canton on February 13 to make the first win over McKinley by Ross in 10 years. Bob Lucas snatched the 50 yard free style while George Hirschberger came in second. Bob swam the length in 0:19.9 Gary Schwartz swam the 100 yards back stroke in 1:09. Jack Rose was first in the 100 yard free style with a time of 0:58.0 Larry Hunt was first in the diving event, and Ross tallied first in the 150 yard medley relay, composed of Schwartz, Faunce, and Lucas.

Ross won their first dual meet of the season by downing the B.G.U. Freshmen 45-30 at the Falcon's pool on February 17. Gary Schwartz, Bill Faunce and Bob Lucas won the 150-yard medley relay, and Jack Rose, Lucas, Ned Frantz, and Hirschberger took the 200-yard relay. Jack Rose entered the 50 yard free style for the first time to tie with Hamilton of the Falcon's for first. George Hirschberger came in third. Bill Faunce won the breast stroke for Fremont's only first in individual events.

The Ross Little Giant Swimmers rang up an alltime high of 106 points with Sandusky second with 74 Toledo Waite, third with 17 and Toledo Scott, fourth with two points at the District Meet on February 21 at Bowling Green. Jack Rose, Ned Frantz, Bob Lucas, and George Hirschberger set a new district record by swimming the 200-yard free style relay in 1:41.1.

The old record was 1:42.7 which was established by the Little Giants in 1950. Hirschberger placed first in the 50-yard free style; Eversole, first in the 100-yard back stroke; Rose took first in the 100 yard free style; Larry Hunt, first in diving; and the 200



yard free-style relay team composed of Rose, Frantz, Lucas, and Hirschberger were winners with the making of the new record.

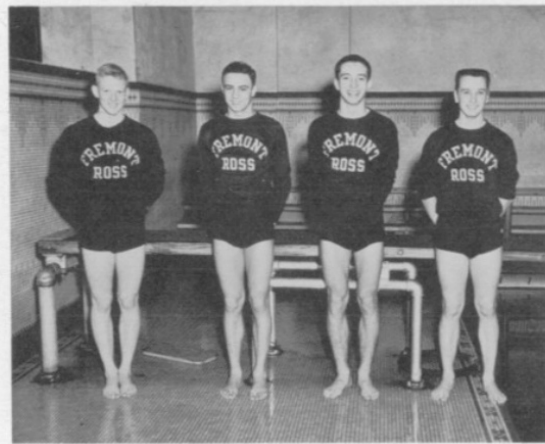
The Little Giant Mermen traveled to the Ohio State University Natatorium to place first in the state swimming meet on February 28 with a narrow margin of 34 over Sandusky's 29, Lakewood's 28, Cincinnati Walnut Hill's 27, Cleveland Heights' 21, Canton's 21, Akron Buchtel's 18, Shaker Heights' 15, Grandview's 11, Toledo Waite's 6, Cleveland East Tech's 5, Upper Arlington's 5, Columbus North's 3, and Cincinnati St. Xavier's 2. Little by little the Little Giants picked up points; going into the last event Ross had only 20 points while Lakewood and Sandusky were ahead with 26 and 23 points, respectively.

In the preliminaries held on February 27, George Hirschberger came in third in the 50-yard free style with the time of 0:25.2 while the winner's time was 0:24.9. George was fourth in the finals. Bill Faunce was fourth in the 100 yard breast stroke with a time 1:10.9 and he came in fifth in the finals. Gary Schwartz was sixth in the preliminaries and also sixth in the finals. Jack Rose was fourth in the 100-yard free style in the preliminaries and also fourth in the finals. Larry Hunt placed highest of any Ross boys in any individual event in the finals and was also third in the preliminaries. Although the Ross 150-yard medley relay team, composed of Schwartz, Faunce, and Lucas was first in the preliminaries, they came out third in the finals.

The event that wrapped the meet up for Ross was the 200-yard free style relay team composed of Hirschberger, Rose, Frantz, and Lucas who finished 1:41.3. This same group broke the state record the previous day in the preliminaries by swimming the length in 1:40.0. The old record was 1:40.4.

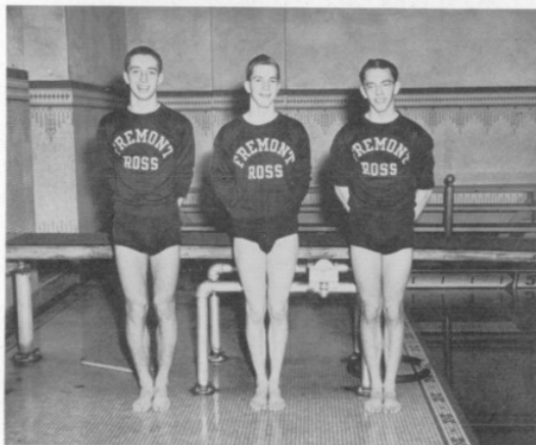

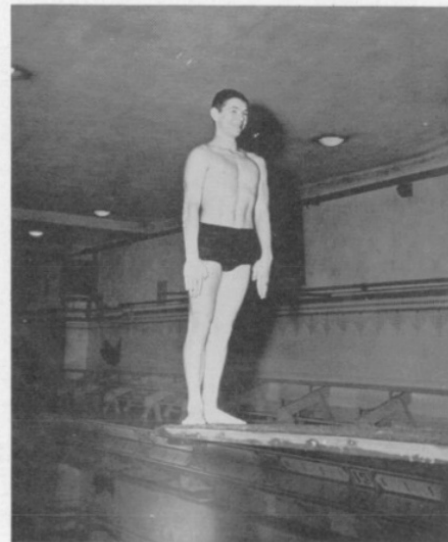

Free-Style Relay Record Tied As Ross Swimmers Trim B.G. Frosh In Opener

Visitor Breaks Mark In Medley

Bowling Green University's freshmen failed to test the state championship-hungry Fremont swimming team last night in the 1952-53 season "unwilling" in the Ross pool.

When the final results were in, Ross held a 50-25 advantage over the Falcon yearlings, with the meet ending in excellent style as the Giants' 200-yard free-style relay team tied a pool record.

Paul Atkinson of Bowling Green broke a record in the 150-yard individual medley swim when he was clocked in 1:51, two-tenths of a second faster than the previous mark, set in 1950 by Toledo's Bill Delen.

The free-style group, Ned Frantz, Bob Lucas, George Hirschberger and Jack Rose, covered the 200 yards in 1:42.5, the identical time of the 1950 quartet, Bud Nord, Dick Burkett, Chuck Miller and Jim Sherer.

Hirschberger Wins Thriller
State champion George Hirschberger had a close call in the 50-yard free-style. He won the event by a hair's-width over Dave Hamilton in the time of 25.5 seconds, four-tenths of a second slower than his initial effort in 1951.

Bill Faunce had a big role in the top-side meet. He did the 100-yard breast-stroke in 1:11.3 seconds, a creditable performance, and helped the 150-yard medley relayers to an easy win.

Other firsts were nabbed by Gary Schwartz, backstroke who also got the relay team off to a fast start, and Larry Hunt, veteran diver.

Hamilton Nips Rose
Jack Rose was nosed out by Hamilton in the 100-yard free-style after leading until the last 15 yards. Rose was off to a fast start, leading by a couple of yards at the first turn. Rose came back to anchor the 200-yard free-style relay unit in its record-setting performance.

Gene Smith, a junior, was runner-up to Hunt in diving, while Ned Frantz was second to the speedy Atkinson in the 200-yard free-style and Bruce Sherer got a second in the breast-stroke.

Oklahoma Coach Likes New Free Throw Rule

Reduces Fouling, Stymies Fixers, Declares Drake

NORMAN, Okla. (AP) — The controversial new free throw rule which has been under heavy fire in early season basketball games found an ardent advocate today in Bruce Drake, Oklahoma coach. He urged critics to look at the

advantages of the rule which allows two chances to make a foul shot and eliminates the out-of-bounds option during the final three minutes, forcing a player to take both shots.

Drake, president of the board of

the National Basketball Coaches Association, said immediate results have been to:

1. Lengthen games.
2. Make wholesale fouling more expensive—a major purpose of the rule.
3. Benefit a clean-playing team.
4. Make it more difficult for fixers to shave points.

Acknowledging the oft-repeated criticism that games are longer—in Oklahoma's case five to six minutes—Drake said that was not argument against the rule. Actually the spectators will enjoy the game more, he contended.

As for the charge it is more difficult for a trailing team to regain the lead in the final three minutes, he said the game had gotten out of hand and needed curbing badly.

Faunce Upsets Streaks' Lauber To Highlight Smashing Triumph

Sandusky high did nothing to dispel the Ross swimmers' notion that this is their year to bring home a state championship.

The Giants handed the Blue Streaks a 47-28 lacing Thursday night in the Sandusky pool, winning six of nine events.

Highlight of the meet was Bill Faunce's performance in the breast-stroke. Faunce defeated Sandusky's Tom McBane, who was runner-up in the state meet last year.

Faunce's surprising victory is a tremendous boost to the Ross championship hopes. The Giants were fairly certain that George Hirschberger, two-time 50-yard free-style champ, and the free-style relay team would bring home firsts at Columbus. With Faunce's latest victory and Larry Hunt's diving form calculated to add heavily to point totals in all future meets, it appears that George Gruse's squad is well stacked.

Sandusky entered the meet with a 1-1 record against Cleveland schools. The Streaks blasted Shaker Heights and were nosed out by only one point by Lakewood.

The size of the Sandusky pool necessitated a revision in the length of some races. The 50-yard free-style, won by Hirschberger over Jim Lanker in a close one, was shortened to 40 yards. Instead of 150 yards, the medley relay was 180 and a distance of 160 yards was substituted for the 200-yard free-style relay.

Schwartz Wins

Scott of Sandusky won the 200-yard free-style, with Fremont's Ned Frantz second. Gary Schwartz bounced back to capture the back-stroke, another event in which Ross may be surprisingly strong before the season is over. Lanker, after almost beating Hirschberger in 40 yards, barely nipped Jack Rose in the 100-yard free-style. Sandusky's other first place finish came in the 120-yard individual medley, won by Lauber.

Hunt easily had the upper hand in diving, an event which for a number of years has failed to bring Ross many points in the state finals.

Both relay teams turned in good times for the revised distances.

The swimmers' next meet is next Tuesday at the Toledo Y.M.C.A. Their next home meet is Saturday at 2:30 p. m. against Western Reserve Academy.

Free-Styler Goes 50 Yards In Relay In 23.9 Seconds

Jack Rose emphasized Saturday what Coach George Gruse has been saying all along.

The senior free-styler turned in two brilliant performances as the Ross high school swimming team chalked up its fourth straight dual meet victory over inexperienced Western Reserve Academy of Hudson, O., 56-19.

He darted through the waters of the local pool in 56.8 seconds in the 100-yard race, then came back to swim a 50-yard heat for the free-style relay team in the startling time of 23.9 seconds. Had he done that in the regular 50-yard free-style race he would have smashed all school and pool records.

His time in the relay surprised even Gruse slightly. The coach has been heard to declare several times that potentially, the lanky Rose is one of the best prospects he has ever coached. Although he has been a good swimmer he has not attained the stardom that Gruse thinks he could reach. The 56.8 is Rose's best time for 100 yards.

But Saturday's showing may be only the beginning, and if it is, that state championship the local boys want so bad they can taste will be a lot less harder to attain.

Hirschberger Off

While Gruse was highly pleased with Rose's work, he wore a frown after the first event, the 50-yard free-style. George Hirschberger, the two-time state champion, won it, but his time of 25.8 was not impressive and below championship standards. Hirschberger, however, has won every 50-yard race he has been in this year and has the knack of finishing on top when the challenge is the greatest.

Western Reserve, a tuition school with a price of \$1,400 per year, failed to muster much opposition, but the lack of it was no surprise. The Hudson school was a definite underdog.

The only victory for the visitors came in the 150-yard individual medley, which turned out to be a mild upset, for Ted Pinkerton, the captain, was supposed to win it for Western Reserve.

He went on to win the state championship in the 440 the same year.

Owen won more laurels at Ohio State, copping the Big Ten title in the 440 while a member of Coach Larry Snyder's first conference championship squad. Owen entered military service in 1943, returning after the war to complete his education.

Swimmers Trounce Bexley; Lorenzen Sets School Record

Ross high's swimmers had too much power in the diving, breast-stroke and back-stroke events for Columbus Bexley Saturday.

The Giants had their easiest time of the season as they won their sixth straight, 56-19. In addition to their weakness in the "unorthodox" swimming styles, the visitors were weakened in the free-style races by the illness of two regulars, Dick Oelgoetz and Larry Mathews.

It could be that one of the reasons for their dour outlook is a 33-game losing streak. Here's what a recent issue had to say under the heading "Basketball Ain't What It Used To Be.":

"Hiram's Terriers lost another game last night. The score was Otterbein 92, Hiram 89. It was their ninth straight defeat this season. As a matter of fact Coach Al Pesek has watched his charges take something like 33 defeats since the last time he had the thrill of victory.

"We'd like to see the kids win a couple of games for their own sakes—it's tough to work as they do without being rewarded with an occasional triumph—but we can't get really steamed up about the situation. Basketball, as it is played today, isn't worth anybody's high blood pressure.

Rose Sets School, Pool Record In First Try In Individual Medley

Ross high's swimming team captured its seventh straight dual meet victory Tuesday in its last home appearance.

The Giants defeated the Toledo Y. M. C. A. for the second time this season, 49-26. Next on their list of challenges is the Canton McKinley team. Ross swims at Canton Friday afternoon. McKinley is defending state champion.

Jack Rose, subject of an experiment, was the hero of Tuesday's meet. The rangy senior, who has been doing only free-style events for Ross, was entered in the 150-yard medley swim by Coach George Gruse. The medley is an event in which 50 yards are done back-stroke, breast-stroke and free-style.

A Real Beginning

All Rose did in his initial venture under competition was to smash the pool and school records, an astounding feat for a first-timer. He lowered the school mark of 1:53.4 by more than seven seconds, his time being 1:46.3. The old school mark was set only 11 days ago by Louis Lorenzen.

The old pool mark was held by Sandusky's John Lauber and was 1:48.1. Lauber's record was established in January. Rose did not enter his specialty, the 100-yard free-style but led off the 200-yard relay team. Swimming rules forbid a boy to enter more than two events, otherwise Rose might be a standout in at least four races.

The visitors won three of the nine events. Mike Tschirret copied the 200-yard free-style, Tom Lemke the 100-yard free-style and Al McNeil won the diving when Fremont's Larry Hunt was forced out of competition by illness.

George Hirschberger won the 50-yard free-style by a length and Bill Faunce took the breast-stroke by the same margin. Gary Schwartz, steady winner in the back-stroke, turned on the heat in the final pool length.

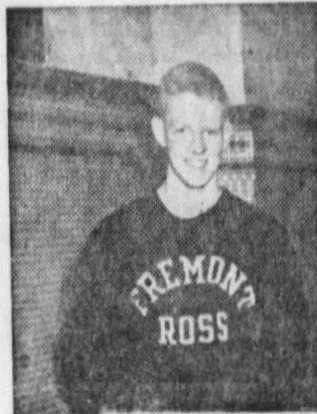
