

Little Giants lose opener at BG

BOWLING GREEN — A second-half spurt did Fremont Ross in Friday as Bowling Green defeated the Little Giants 75-67 in the season opener for both high school boys basketball teams.

The Bobcats, leading 37-35 at halftime, scored the first 10 points of the second half and Ross got no closer than eight the rest of the way.

The Little Giants hurt themselves, making 1 of 11 free throws.

Ross trailed 65-51 with 4:21 to play, but a trio of three-point baskets closed the gap.

"They beat us on the glass and in the paint," Ross coach Frank Gioffre said about his team's rebounding and defense in the lane.

Six-foot-7 Chris Toland scored 26 points from in close, and 6-3 Mike Saneholtz added 18.

That offset a 27-point night by Ross's Charles Woodson.

BG outrebounded Ross 34-28 as Saneholtz grabbed 10. He also dished out six assists.

Chad Root was the only other Ross player in double figures, scoring 13 points. Gary Rakes added nine to go with five assists, and Mike Lather also had five assists for Ross.

Bowling Green held off any Ross charge in the fourth quarter, making 8 of 15 free throws.

Ross opens its home season Tuesday against Toledo Waite. The junior varsity game begins at 6 p.m.

Rookie Mills leads Cavaliers past Trail Blazers

RICHFIELD, Ohio — Chris Mills has enough faith in himself, and enough support from his teammates, to carry him through the kind of shooting slump that afflicts many NBA rookies.

"I'm feeling more and more comfortable every night," Mills said Tuesday night after he scored a career-high 22 points on

8-of-13 shooting — including a pair of 3-pointers — as the Cleveland Cavaliers beat the Portland Trail Blazers 109-100.

Mills was shooting 39 percent from the floor and averaging 9.8 points through his first 15 games, far from the types of numbers he had grown accustomed to in college. He was a 51 percent shooter in four seasons at Arizona and

Kentucky, and he averaged 20.4 points for Arizona as a senior.

He said he doesn't feel pressured to score now, because he's on a team that includes proven NBA scorers Mark Price and Brad Daugherty, among others.

"I don't want to try to do too much," Mills said. "I just want to blend in, and everything will fall into place."

Waite tops Ross with late freebie

Tony Gilmer's free throw with one second to play gave Toledo Waite a 56-55 victory over Fremont Ross in the Little Giants home-opening boys basketball game Tuesday.

Gilmer sank the first of two shots after Charles Woodson of Ross had made two of three free throws to tie the game with six seconds left.

The last-second point kept Waite undefeated in three games and Ross winless in two.

When Woodson and Gilmer went to the line, both coaches were out of a job.

"At that point," Waite coach Joe Guerrero said, "there is no coaching involved. I'm sitting there hoping my guy misses and he's sitting there hoping my guy misses. Whoever make it, wins...it's as simple as that."

Ross coach Frank Gioffre's unemployment was painful. He watched the first Woodson toss spin in and out.

"The one Charles missed was halfway in and out and Gary (Rakes) had one halfway in and out," Gioffre winced.

"We improved a little bit at the free throw line but we still only shot a little over 50 percent (7 of 13), but I am pleased with our effort. We played four solid quarters but we still have things to work on yet."

Ross missed 10 of 11 free throws in a 75-67 loss to Bowling Green Friday.

The Little Giants never led in the first half but never fell behind by more than seven and trailed 28-24 at the intermission.

A turned up defense caught Waite by surprise and Woodson benefitted from the tight Ross press, scoring seven straight points — the last on a 3-point basket that put the Little Giants up 31-28 two minutes into the half.

"We got to where we were rushing our shots," Guerrero said. "We started the second half with three threes (attempts) and we are not a three-point shooting ball club."

"I said, 'We are not going to

shoot us out of the game,' and went a little more inside and got better shots."

Ross stretched its lead to 35-31 before the Indians got the lead back 39-38 on, ironically, Damion Washington's 3-point shot with 2:15 remaining in the third quarter.

Woodson's steal and slam put Ross up 40-39 but Washington's lay-in gave Waite a 41-40 lead after three quarters.

Chad Root's two free throws and David Gibb's bucket gave Ross a 45-41 lead before Waite, with Michael LaCourse and Gilmer scoring four points apiece, regained the lead 52-49 on Gilmer's three-point play with 2:54 to play.

The Indians followed that by nearly shooting themselves in the foot.

On a turnover, Rakes was intentionally fouled by Jamal Grant. But the Ross foul line bugaboo bit Rakes on his first shot with the second shot cutting the Waite lead to 52-50.

Ross failed to capitalize on the possession after the intentional foul and Washington hit one of two free throws for a 54-50 Waite lead with 2:30 remaining.

Root's 3-pointer brought Ross within one, 54-53, with 43 seconds left and after Grant missed a free throw, Woodson grabbed the rebound, giving the Little Giants the ball with 35 seconds remaining. Washington, however, swiped the ball from Gibbs and was fouled as he broke toward the basket.

Washington missed the first shot of the one-and-one but Ross was called for a lane violation. Washington made the substitute throw but missed the second with 17 seconds to play.

Woodson was fouled on the trip down court by Washington, putting both coaches temporarily out of a job but not out of hope.

Woodson finished with 21 points, Root 14 and Gibbs 11. Gilmer had 17, Washington 15 and LaCourse 14.

The Little Giants open Great Lakes League play Friday at Sylvania Northview.

Hot-shooting Northview hands Ross third loss

SYLVANIA — Northview outscored Fremont Ross 45-32 in the second half to hand the Little Giants a 76-65 Great Lakes League boys basketball loss Friday night.

The loss in the GLL opener for both teams was the third straight against no wins for Ross. Northview is 2-1.

After falling behind 20-13 after one quarter, Ross took a 33-31 lead at halftime.

"Then, we came out flat in the third quarter," Ross coach Frank Gioffre said.

Northview led 48-45 heading into the final quarter, but held off the Little Giants as Tom Raker canned a pair of 3-pointers and Ryan Jones one.

"They hit some big threes down the stretch," Gioffre said, "and we could not trade baskets with them."

Ross nets first victory

The Little Giants limited Bedford to 25 percent shooting.

Fremont Ross used an aggressive defense to survive the long bombing attack of Bedford and defeat the Kicking Mules 69-51 Tuesday night in the Purple Pit.

It was the first win in four games for Ross and leveled its Great Lakes League mark to 1-1.

Jason Matney, who came off the bench to score a career-high 17 points, scored eight in the Little Giants' breakaway third quarter. The 6-foot-5 senior's previous high game was six last season.

Ross, leading 35-27 at halftime, outscored Bedford 20-8 in the third period and took a comfortable 55-35 edge into the final eight minutes.

"Jason did a fantastic job down low for us," Ross coach Frank Gioffre said. "Our kids did a nice job of looking inside instead of just shooting the outside jump shot."

Jon Minnich, one of five juniors started by Gioffre, also turned in his varsity high game, 11. Charles Woodson added 15 and Gary Rakes 10 as eight Little Giants scored.

The 28 points by Matney and Minnich made up for an "off" night by Woodson, who was averaging 23 points going into the game.


"It was a night where Charles was getting the shots but they were not falling," Gioffre said, "but he was getting some rebounds for us."

Woodson finished with 12 rebounds and Matney had nine. Minnich grabbed six with five of those off the offensive board. Both teams finished with 39 rebounds.

While liking the offensive outburst of Matney and Minnich, Gioffre pointed out his team's defense.

"We knew that they were going to shoot a lot of threes," Gioffre said, "and our kids did a nice job of maybe pushing them out a little further than they wanted to go. That was the key to the game."

Bedford, which had made 15 3-point baskets last Friday in an

83-82 loss to Napoleon, hit 6 of 22 against the Little Giants. For the game, the Mules were 17-of-69.

"I thought it was worse than that," Bedford coach Mark German said after his team's third loss in as many games and second in GLL play. "That is the best anyone has done on our 3-point shooters this year."

"We made a lot of mental errors throughout the game and dug ourselves a hole. And in the third quarter, we completely collapsed."

The Little Giants led most of the game, trailing only when Dan Williams' 3-point bucket three minutes into the game put the Mules on top 7-4.

Baskets by Rakes, Minnich and Woodson's slam dunk off a turnover gave the Little Giants the lead 10-7.

The Mules never kicked back as Ross steadily pulled away.

Napoleon defeats Ross

Wildcats scored the last six points of the GLL game.

Napoleon scored the last six points of the game to defeat Fremont Ross 66-61 Friday night in a Great Lakes League boys basketball game.

"That was a great one to win and a tough one to lose," Napoleon coach Walt Behrman summed up after this team remained undefeated in three GLL games and leveled its season record at 3-3.

Ross is 1-4 and 1-2 in league play.

Ross coach Frank Gioffre was downcast but still liked the way his team played while battling sickness which struck starters Charles Woodson, Gary Rakes and Jon Minnich and others during the week.

"That's no excuse," Gioffre said, "but we practiced with seven yesterday and that hurt. I am not disappointed with the our kids' effort...it's just that we have to find ways to win."

Behrman was glad to escape the Purple Pit.

"Frank's teams always seem to take us down to the wire," he said.

This game was no exception. In the end, a strong performance from the Wildcats' bench helped Napoleon survive a final quarter Ross blitz.

Napoleon's six-point run followed a 13-point Ross scoring streak that wiped out a 60-48 Napoleon lead and gave the Little Giants a 61-60 advantage with 61 seconds left.

The Napoleon pressure defense had held Ross scoreless for more than five minutes in the third and fourth quarters as the Wildcats broke a 48-48 tie with 12 unanswered points. Shane Moran's 3-point basket — his fifth of the game — with 4:10 to play broke the Ross scoring famine and launched the Little Giants toward the lead.

Chad Root followed with a basket and Minnich's short jumper made it 60-55 with 2:50 to play. A pair of free throws by Mike Lather and another Root bucket cut the Napoleon lead to 60-59.

The Little Giants took the lead when Minnich stole the ball from Wildcat guard Jason Meyer at midcourt and passed to Root for a layup.

After a Napoleon timeout, the Wildcats sandwiched the final six points around a pair of futile Ross possessions in which the Little Giants missed five shots, three from 3-point range.

Mike Germann drove the baseline for a layup to start the final Napoleon run. Ryan Hines tossed

in a pair of free throws with 24 seconds left and Germann's two foul shots with eight seconds to play iced the game.

Both teams were hampered by fouls with three of the Napoleon starters on the bench when the Wildcats took the 12-point lead.

"That was the highlight for

me," Behrman said, "how my bench played. That was the high point. I hope this game can pay dividends."

Germann, who had been averaging close to 30 points a game, and Ross leading scorer Woodson were both hampered by fouls. Germann finished with 13

points and Woodson seven, nearly 13 below his average. Woodson fouled out with 2:25 to play.

Moran led Ross with 17 points and Root added 16. Lather came off the bench to score 10.

Germann, despite the foul trouble, still led the Wildcats in scoring and grabbed 13 rebounds.






Mohawk greeted the Crimson Streaks with a torrid first quarter and a 75-62 victory.



Frank Gioffre would rather watch Huron play than play against them.

The Fremont Ross boys basketball coach did not have his druthers Saturday, but the Little Giants provided him with a 57-52 victory. It was the second win in two nights for Ross after it opened the season with 10 losses in 11 games.

"We just missed too many layups...we just did not shoot well," Ross coach Frank Gioffre said succinctly.


