Clyde High's Fliers Lose To Little Giants At Anderson Field

Weather conditions finally turned up right Thursday afternoon as Coach Lawrence Doren's Ross high Little Giants opened the baseball season with a 6-4 victory over the Clyde High Fliers of Coach Norm Brautigam at Anderson Field.

The scoring that counted all took place in the bottom half of the first frame for the Little Giants, who netted five runs, to erase an early 3-0 Clyde lead. The locals then held the advantage throughout the seven inning contest.

Dave Martin, Jim Houghtaling and Mike Otermat all stole home in the big first to account for a trio of unearned markers that were instrumental in the victory coming the way of the Purple and White.

Bob Entenmann opened for Ross on the mound and was relieved by Doug Gallagher in the second and the sophomore southpaw went the entire route to gain credit for the win.

Mark Walters doubled in the first frame to start the Little Giants on the way. Houghtaling singled, scoring Walters. Otermat reached first on an error. Ken Adams drew a walk, then Houghtaling and Otermat stole home followed by Martin's single scoring Adams. Martin also stole home to bring the count out to 5-3.

Big hits of the game were the doubles by Walters and Otermat for Fremont Ross with Bill Dencer and Norm Noss banging out doubles for the Fliers.

For the early season opener, the squads turned in a healthy share of stolen bases, Clyde getting five, Ross 10.

Gallagher allowed four walks, Entenmann none; Weller had one and Ashton, two.

Today the Little Giants are in findlay for the first game with a Buckeye Conference rival.

Jerry Ashton, another southpaw, opened for Clyde, and was charged with the loss. He fanned six while his replacement on the mound, Bill Weller, fanned seven.

Gallagher was tagged for four hits in six and a third innings. Entenmann had three hits for three runs charged against him. Weller allowed one hit in three innings. Ashton had four hits off him for all six runs in the three innings.

MARION, O.—Pitching himself out of occasional trouble on a chilly diamond at Marion Harding high school Tuesday afternoon, Doug Gallagher, Ross high school lefty, turned in a no-hit, no-run performance as the Little Giants came through for a 6-0 victory.

The win was the second in three starts for Coach Lawrence Doren's squad in the new season of play.

Gallagher, whose no-hitter was the first in two years for a Ross high school nine, fanned six Marion batters, walked five and hit one batsman. Marion committed one error along the line while the Purple and White turned in an errorless performance.

The win give Ross a 1-1 record against Buckeye Conference opponents, having lost to Findlay in a 3-0 shutout.

Jim Houghtaling and Burt Lloyd, playing at rightfield and first base respectively for Ross, each collected two hits to pace the local batters.

Going on the hill for Marion, Messner allowed six hits for all six runs in five innings and Corbin went two innings of scoreless and hitless relief for Marion.

Ross jumped out to a 3-0 start in the first inning and held the margin of leadership the rest of the way in to victory. Single runs were added in the third, fourth and fifth frames.

Clay High Defeated; Price Gives Only Two Hits At Anderson Field

Behind the two hit pitching of Al Price, Ross high school rolled up its second successive shut-out on the Anderson field diamond Friday afternoon and the third win in four starts as Clay high school was the victim by a 3-0 margin.

The Little Giants of Coach Lawrence Doren moved out to a 1-0 first ining lead, added two insurance runs on single markers in the third and fourth frames, and staved off a seventh ining uprising by Clay to take the verdict.

Ross picked up four hits off the slants of Karl Gadus, with Mike Otermat's third ining double the only extra base blow. Otermat's hit drove in Burt Lloyd, who had walked, to net the Purple and White's second run.

Singles were collected by Mark Walters., Ken Adams and Dale Entenmann. Adams' single in the fourth brought Entenmann around home as the players effectively bunched their hits to register in the run column.

Price, who fanned eight and walked four, gave up his first hit in the fourth ining, a single to Len Wolf. At the top of the steventh, Gadus tried to start a rally to win his own ball game, but the spurt was short-lived. Don Metzker got to first when hit in the leg in that ining and then Gadus rapped out a double to deep left, sending Metzker to third, with one out. Price fanned the next batter and the final Clay player at bat fouled out along the third base line.

Defensive play of the game was the deep left field running catch by Walters on Neal Kontak's long drive to retire the side in the last of the sixth. Walters covered a lot of ground before reaching up to spear the well-tagged hit, robbing Kontak of extra bases.

Gadus fanned four and walked six for Clay.

The loss was the second in two starts for Coach Harold Potter's Clay team which dropped the opener 4-2 to Toledo Waite high.

Opening Day At Cleveland

CLEVELAND (P) — Baseball opens its 1956 season in Municipal Stadium at 3 p. m. today, and somewhere around 40,000 fans are expected to brave temperatures in the 40s to watch the Cleveland Indians play the Detroit Tigers.

Early Wynn, whose 17-11 record last year included a 2-2 showing against the Tigers, will pitch for Cleveland against Ned Garver, who was 12-16 in 1955 and lost three times to the Tribe.

The weatherman said it would be partly cloudy, and the high temperature would be about 48. "I don't think it will rain," he added.

Both Ross runs were unearned, though a couple RBIs were collected in the scoring process. Bob Entehmann drew walk in the bottom of the first and was promptly brought around by Jim Houghtaling's sizzling triple that got past the St. Joe left fielder.

Second inning Burt Lloyd drew a walk, stole second and scored when Ken Adams laced out his first single of two for the afternoon.

Gallagher had the handcuffs on the St. Joe hitters in the first five innings, fanning nine along the line. In the sixth, after Kunkle's single, the Streaks went down in 1-2-3 order on strikeouts.

Over the distance Gallagher fanned 14, walked six, and hit two batsmen. Mike Foos, who went the full six innings for St. Joseph's fanned seven and walked four.

Gallagher, Larkins
Hurl The Victories

Both city high school baseball teams saw action Wednesday afternoon as Ross defeated Toledo Macomber by a 4-1 score at Anderson field and St. Joseph's took the best of a 6-1 victory over Bettsville in a game played on the loser's diamond.

For Ross, the win was the fifth in eight starts and snapped a two game losing streak. St. Joseph's, in the meantime, was winning its third game in eight outings.

Here on the home front, Ross went to work with four hits in the second inning of a game played in a light rain to send across four runs which proved the margin of victory. Mike Otermat, Ken Adams and Burt Lloyd all singled in the big second in consecutive order, and Lane Beeker batted later in the inning and added a single to the list. Three of the four runs were earned with Lloyd, Tom Longanbach and Beeker credited for the markers.

Doug Gallagher, Ross left handed hurler, was in steady form again despite the adverse weather and shackled Macomber with just one hit, a single by Bill Flackenberg in the second. The lone run for Coach Bruce Sauter's forces which were dropping their second game in five starts.

Going the distance, Gallagher fanned 11 along the way and walked four. Two Macomber hurlers were pressed into action. Ken Chickack started and was relieved by Dale Garyczyk in the fifth, the former pitcher getting four strikeouts and the latter credited with two.

Ross' four hits in the second were the only hits collected during the game.

On the Bettsville diamond, St. Joseph's Crimson Streaks picked off two runs in each of the second, third and fifth innings in a game that was called at the end of the fifth by mutual arrangement of the coaches.

Pat Larkins hurled for St. Joseph's allowing just two hits, a pair of singles to Larry Lynch, shortstop of Bettsville, who rattled them out in the first and fifth frames. Two walks, two errors and a stolen base enable Bettsville to get its only run in the fourth inning.

Longest ball of the afternoon hit by either Fremont squads was the second inning homer of Ed Chudzinski, who patrolled left field for St. Joseph's. His long belt scored Larkins, who had walked, ahead of him and gave the leading edge to the Streaks game which held throughout.
