# FREMONT HI TRACKERS OUT FOR TRAINING

The Fremont high track candidates donned track suits and made for the county fair grounds for the first workout of the season Monday afternoon and a likely bunch of candidates reported for the first official out door practice of the track squad. It is on the unknown material among the candidates that Fremont hig's hopes for the coming season are based.

Of the sure winners there are Ken Hawk, Russel, Wingard, Druckenmiller and Wallace, all except the first veterans of the 1924 track team. Due to unavoidable accidents and inclement weather, the Purple and White had a very unsuccessful season during 1924, but with a few experienced men and a good number of willing candidates. It is the hope of Coaches Taylor and Smith, to develop a team which will be a deciding factor in the L. B. S. League meet to be held June 6 at Oberlin.

Faculty Manager Clarke is endeavoring to secure meets with Tiffin, Fostoria, Bellevue, Norwalk and other schools. The class meet, which has come to be an annual event, will be held early in May, the dual meets following.

Towner Smith, 440 phenom, will have direct charge of the dash men and hurdles. Coach Taylor in addition directing the activities of the entire squad, will train the candidates for the field events and the distance runners.

Individual work has been done for the past two weeks by some of the candidates, who are conditioning themselves for the season. Hawk and Wingard will probably carry the Purple and White colors in the pole vault, both being experienced men in this event. Druckenmiller, Russell and Wallace are certain winners in the dashes, and Bowius, Hawk and Wallace are the probable candidates for the hurdles. Little experienced material is left from last year for the distance events. Schwochow being a likely candidate for the half mile and Fuller for the mile. With the exception of McCarthy, little material for the weights is had, but men will be developed for these places.

Eight weeks still remain for the development of a championship team to represent the Purple and White at Oberlin, which is the only meet of any consequence which will be participated in by Fremont Hi trackers this season. The preliminary meets are all preparatory for the one and only meet of note held in Northern Ohio.

## OUTLOOK FOR TRACK TEAM IS BRILLIANT

The outlook for Fremont high's track season is very bright, according to Towner Smith, coach of the purple and white tracksters. Though Fremont is not looked upon to have a championship team, it is expected to have one that will be a deciding factor in the L. B. S. meet to be held at Oberlin. A number of the candidates for the squad are making a good showing, though it is still too early to anticipate their later possibilities.

Prospects in the dashes are exceedingly bright, and the development of some good material for the half-mile run, is also probable. But one candidate has attempted to try for the mile, leaving a good opening for boys who have plenty of endurance.

Prospects for the field events are similar to those for the track, since a well balanced field squad is not looked for. The prospects in some of the events, however, are exceedingly bright.

But three meets have been arranged for the high school trackmen to date. The first will be a class meet to be held soon at the fair grounds, and the others are the L. B. S. meet and a dual meet with Norwalk. The Norwalk meet will be held here May 23 and will be the first inter-city track meet to be held here since the spring of 1922.

## HIGH SCHOOL TRACKERS IN GREAT FORM

The timing of Fremont high tracksters which was to have taken place last Friday, but which was postponed because of the illness of some of the track team members and others participating in the baseball game with Clyde, will be held at the fair grounds this afternoon. Coaches Taylor and Smith will officiate at the first speed test tryouts.

The Fremont tracksters were about three weeks late in getting started for their training season than the other schools of the Little Big Seven league, consequently they will have to develop more rapidly than their brother leaguers. Also Fremont high has but one meet scheduled to take place prior to the league meet at Oberlin, while the other schools have as many as six.

It behooves the local speeders to keep busy and strictly observe training rules. None of the team members of this year have ever participated in a L. B. S. meet, due to Fremont's failure to enter the championship contests last spring. These are three major handicaps that the locals will have to overcome if they are to upset the dope June 6th.

## Fremont High Invited to Big Track Session

Pittsburgh, Pa., May 5.—Fremont High is included among the 400 high schools in Pennsylvania, Ohio, West Virginia and Maryland, which will take part in the Ninth Annual Interscholastic Track Meet at the Carnegie Institute of Technology on Saturday, May 9.—The response to the invitations already indicates, according to a report from Graduate Manager Clarence Overend and Student Manager Edwin C. Frazier, that this year's meet in number of athletes entered, will be a record breaker.

Cups will be awarded to the winning team and to the schools winning the relays, which will be run off in three classes. In addition, gold, silver and bronze medals will be awarded to the winners of the events. The first five places to count for points in the scoring. An added feature of the meet will be a dual track meet between Carnegie and Geneva College.

This year's interscholastic will be limited to high schools, no preparatory schools having asked to enter teams. Harrisburg Tech, the winner of the meet last year when more than 600 athletes participated, is reported to be grooming its team to repeat its victory. Other strong teams which scored high last year and have accepted invitations to enter this year include South High of Akron, Alliance High, New Castle High, Johnstown High and Altoona High.

Elaborate plans for the entertainment of the high school athletes are being made by the Carnegie Tech students prior to and after the meet, it is announced. All of the fraternities have offered to entertain the athletes in their homes over Friday and Saturday nights, and a big dinner is scheduled for Saturday evening at the close of the contests, in cooperation with the Carnegie Branch of the Y. M. C. A. and the Carnegie Athletic Association.

The officials for the track meet will be:

W. S. Haddock, referee; Joseph Taylor, starter; H. G. Blum, head field judge; Capt. W. A. Palmer, head track judge. The judges, timekeepers and other minor officials will include members of the faculty and of the alumni of Carnegie Tech.

## Fremont High Athletes Set For Norwalk

Saturday morning at 11:45 o'clock, 13 Fremont high school track athletes will leave the high school building accompanied by Coach C. A. Taylor and Faculty Manager of Athletics J. R. Clarke, for Norwalk, where Fremont is entered in a dual meet with the Norwalk high school. Fremont's chances in the field events are slight, and there is no chance for a first in the mile and half-mile events, which are conceded to Clarke, former Bellevue high distance flash. The sprints, however, will produce the real contest, Fremont being more proficient in this line than any other class of the track and field.

The Fremont athletes who will make the trip are Russell, who is entered in the 100 and 440 yard dashes and the relay; Hawk, pole vault, high jump and the hurdles; Wallace, broad jump, 100 and 220 yard dashes; Fuller, half-mile and relay; Meincer, high jump and pole vault; Swedersky, mile run; Tucker, 220 yard dash, relay and javelin throw; Oxley, half-mile run; Pence, shot put, discus and javelin; Lance, shot put and discus;

Foos, 880 yard dash; Bowlus, hurdles and broad jump; Druckenmiller, 440 yard dash and relay.

Letters will be awarded at the meeting of the "90" club at the Fremont high school tonight, to the five men who represented Fremont in the Oberlin L. B. S. track meet held Saturday. Kenny Hawk, Freshman athletic flash, is to be presented with his fourth letter of the school year.

Entering the Freshman class last fall, this versatile high school student made the Purple and White grid team and was one of the star back-field men of the circuit. His runs were a sensation, and Fremont was heralded throughout the league and neighboring cities as having a Freshman back who was hard to stop.

At the close of the football season, Kenny shifted into a basketball uniform and played forward, center and guard, wherever his services appeared to be needed most. Then came the diamond sport and the star member of the Hazel street gang, which formerly included "Windy" Wendler, Tim McCarthy, Al Brokate and others of high school athletic fame, donned the gray striped uniform of the Purple and White ball players and for the greater share of the season parked behind the home plate.

In addition to his spring baseball playing, the capable brother of Stan carried track work, specializing in the

high jump and pole vault, and also trying the hurdles. Twenty-one points were added to Fremont's track scores by his prowess on the competitive field.

The only Senior listed for track honors is Harley Druckenmiller, 440 yard dasher of fame. Wallace and Russell, who operate on the short stretches of the cinder path, who are members of the class of '26, and John Meincer, complete the list of lettermen. Meincer scored the fourth point for Fremont in the L. B. S. league meet held at Oberlin.
