## Royals, Hawks Gain NBA Semis

It will be Cincinnati vs. Boston and St. Louis vs. Los Angeles in the best-of-7 divisional finals in the National Basketball Association playoffs.

Cincinnati and St. Louis qualified Tuesday night by winning the semifinals, respectively. Cincinnati beat Syracuse in overtime 131-127 and St. Louis defeated Detroit 104-100. Both broke the home court advantage that had stood up in every previous playoff game.

The Royals vs. Celtics series opens in Boston Thursday night. The Hawks-Lakers series gets under way Sunday in Los Angeles. Oscar Robertson sparked Cincinnati with 32 points as the Royals, trailing 88-83 after three quarters, came from behind to defeat Syracuse in the fifth and deciding game of their best-of-5 series.

Baskets by Bob Pettit, Zelmo Beaty and Bill Bridges at vital spots thwarted the Pistons in their efforts to beat the Hawks and even their series at 2-2.

## Leaves Kentucky For Old Ohio Home

LEXINGTON, Ky. (AP) — Don Rolfs, a part time starter for the University of Kentucky basketball team as a sophomore last season, has left school.

Rolfs, a 6-foot-6 sophomore pivotman, went home to Harrison, Ohio, Tuesday.

At Harrison, Rolfs' father, Paul, said, "I don't know why he quit. He came home today. So, I suppose he did quit."

# Ross Wins First Track Meet 60-49

Fremont Ross successfully opened its track season Friday afternoon by taking a 60-49 decision from Oak Harbor in the Rockets' cinders.

Captain Ed Hufford, a new and strong addition to the ross team this season after transferring from Toledo Clay, was the outstanding Fremont thincald Friday with three firsts. Dick Hufford gained two firsts for Fremont.

Ed Hufford's first were in the 100 - yard and 220 - yard dashes and broad jump. Dick Hufford took the 440-yard run and '880-yard run. Dan Danford had a first for Fremont in the 110-yard low hurdles and the Fremont mile relay team of Hamilton, Henderson, Roberts and Hoch won its event.

Ross was disqualified in the 880-yard relay because of an exchange zone violation. The Little Giants finished, however, with a time of 1:37.5, and Coach John Ihnat said this time was excellent.

There was no high jump activity as Oak Harbor does not have a pit.

The Rockets are black-topping runaways leading to the pole vault, discus, shot put and high jump.

Ross' first home meet will be Tuesday at Harmon field, 4 p.m.,

against Genoa.

Fremont Ross won its second consecutive track dual meet of the season on a cold, windy Tuesday afternoon at Harmon Field. Ross is now 2-0 on the season and will tangle with a good Bellevue track squad here Thursday at 4 p.m. Ross beat Genoa Tuesday, 67½ to 50½.

The Little Giants rang up nine firsts out of 14 events.

Ed Hufford, who raced to three victories last Friday against Oak Harbor, came back with two more against the Comets, flashing home first in the 100-yard and 220-yard dashes. His time for the 100-yarder was a good 10.1.

Dan Danford also showed good form in winning both the 120-yard high hurdles and 180-yard lows.

Other Fremont firsts were recorded by Rich Elder in the high jump, Jack Ziemke in the discus, Jack Goodwin in the pole vault and in the 880-yard and mile relays.

The team of Gene Yeager, Dick Thiessen, Gary Koebel and Ed Hufford won the half-mile relay and the foursome of Larry Hamilton, Dick Henderson, Ron Roberts and Greg Hoch took the mile relay.

Goodwin, Koebel, Dick Hufford, Mike Terry and Don Yohe were second place finishers for Fremont.

### Redmen Cop 68-50 Decision:

## Ed Hufford Ross Star But Bellevue Wins Meet

The outstanding sprinting of Ed Hufford and the strong work in the hurdles by Dan Danford failed to offset the all-around ability of Bellevue's track squad Thursday at Harmon field as the Ross Little Giants lost their first dual meet of the season, 68-50.

Hufford, the new lad from Toledo, showed excellent form in picking up three first and anchoring a leg in the winning 880-yard relay. Danford for the third consecutive meet won both the 120-yard high and 180-yard low hurdles.

Danford knocked down the final four hurdles in the 120-yard event but still was able to finish a winner. He had no trouble with the low barriers.

Ed Hufford duplicated his time of 10.1 in the 100-yard dash for the second straight meet. He also turned the distance in 10.1 against Genoa earlier this week. The newcomer, who transferred from Toledo Clay high, opened with a victory in the broad jump—his sec-

ond in three tries this year. His leap of 20' 4 1/2" was good enough.

After winning the 100 - yard dash, Hufford showed his speed to a fairly good crowd (many from Bellevue) by pulling Fremont through in the 880-yard relay. He took the baton five yards behind and quickly caught up. Hufford finished his outstanding afternoons work by breezing to a 23.2 victory in the 220-yard dash.

Fremont had Bellevue tied at 34 points going into the 440-yard dash but a Redmen sweep in the event was worth nine points. Fremont was unable to catch up.

High spot in the meet for the visitors, competing in their first action of the season, were the performances of Fred Franklin in the mile and half - mile runs and the pole vaulting of Tom Lopeman. Franklin had a tremendous lead at the wire of his mile jog and came home in a time of 4:52. He then defeated Dick Hufford by 15 yards in the 880-yard test.

Lopeman sailed 11'9" in the pole vault, which is a new record for Bellevue. He broke the old mark by three inches.

Bellevue picked up nine firsts to five for Fremont.

Jack Ziemke had a first for Ross in the discus and a second in the shot put. Ed Hufford's running mates in the winning 880-yard relay were Gary Koebel, Gene Yeager and Dick Thiessen.

Along with Dick Hufford and Ziemke, other Ross seconds were by Rich Elder, a tie, in the high jump and Don Yohe in the mile.

Next competition for Fremont is Tuesday against Bowling Green here.

Fremont Ross' track squad is one of 12 teams entered in Friday's Tiffin Relays to be held at Tiffin Columbia field starting at 4 p.m.

The Little Giants have not tasted competition since last Friday when they played host to their own relays. Poor weather postponed Tuesday's meet with Findlay.

Also entered in the Tiffin affair are Clyde, Bellevue, Port Clinton, Tiffin Columbian, Galion, Shelby, Upper Sandusky, Fostoria, Bryan, Bowling Green and Bucyrus.

Bowling Green, Columbian, Clyde, Port Clinton and Bellevue all have strong squads and, according to Ross Coach John Ihnat's figures, are teams to beat Friday. Bowing Green won the Third Annual Night Relays here, Port Clinton took the Upper Sandusky Relays, Clyde has been defeated only once in dual meets since 1954 and that came this spring at the hands of mighty Bellevue.

Pole vault starts the meet at 4 and the mile relay will close the program at 9:20. Starting height of the pole vault will be nine-feet and each boy will be allowed two misses. Starting height of the high jump will be 4-10. Each contest-
