Lucas signed a contract with the Royals recently after rejecting an offer a year ago.

The Royals will train again this year at Lockbourne Air Force base near Columbus.

Springfield Eleven Foe At Harmon

If a pre-season poll by a Dayton sportswriter is any indication, Fremont Ross will have its hands full come Friday night at 8 at Harmon field.

Invading is the Springfield South football team that has been picked by this Dayton scribe as one of the top scholastic grid powers in the state. In addition, the Wildcats have been named along with Middletown as one of the top teams in the Greater Ohio League.

On the other hand, Fremont, going by what some of the other writers of the Buckeye Conference are saying, does not figure strongly in the title picture.

Coach Mal Mackey is stacking up his inexperienced club against a veteran Wildcat outfit that its coach, Lowell Storm, said has "a good first running unit and good first defensive unit".

"We need to polish up our aerial game and work for depth from our second units. It is a matter of getting the younger players some polish and confidence," said Storm, who has been head coach at South the past five years.

Mackey commented not long ago: "You might be surprised with this team. But I look for us to start jelling along about midway in the season."

Springfield, with the exception of End Charles Burley, 171-pounds, will field two platoons—one on offense and another for defense. Burley may go both ways.

Springfield will open with Quarterback Steve Kuss, 188-pounds; Tom Bartley, 181, at fullback; Jim Clements, 180, at left half; and Aaron Marsh, 177, at right half. Halfback positions, according to Storm, are the weakest part of the team's offense. Although fast, Marsh and Clements have little or no experience.

Either Burley or Harold Daniels, 175, will start at left end. Daniels opened early season practice as a halfback. Opposite end is Tom Freeman, 200-pound veteran. Gary Roush, 175, and Mike Schultz, 180, handle the tackle positions, with Jerry Barker, a lad who weighs better than 200-pounds, manning the defensive guard spot. Bob Peters, 192, and Bob Warman, 181, are the likely guard candidates with Mike Peterson, 186, backing them. Center is Tom Sharp, a third year man, who weighs 188.

On defense, Storm will use Dave Shaffer, 167, and Burley at ends; John Ford, 227, and Joe Dill, 186, or Herb Havens, 206, at tackles; Barker at middle guard;erry Lahman, 152, and Gary Pace, 178, as linebackers; and Ken Youngblood, 186, Dick Chilton 160, Don Amicon 151, or Vince Douglas, 165, in the secondary.

Ned Peddicord is the tentative Ross starter at quarterback but Junior Russ Hagerty and Sophomore Terry Bork also may see action. Dick Thiessen has worked his way to the first string left half position and is a strong runner as well as a fine pass catcher. Bob Metheny will start his first game for Fremont at right half after moving from Lima. He is considered a quick-hitter in the line.

Ed Smith, who did well tip-toeing his way through the line for nice gains during pre-season scrimmages, will be at fullback.

Ross' line situation, however, still is muddled. Some positions are still undecided and Mackey may continue to make changes right up to game time.

Dave George and Jerry Slatter look like good bets to start on offense. Dick and Mark Smith may be at tackles, or Mackey may use Dick Nitschke; Dennis Patynko has one guard spot filled but a battle continues for the opposite post. Bill Jacobs and Jim Krelick are possibles there. John Faunaugh seems set at center.

On defense, Ross has been using the Pfefferle boys, Jack and Jim, a great deal to bolster the line. Dave Reed, Ron Hinebaugh, Patynko, Dick Smith, Gene Yeager and Don Binkley all have been tried on defense. Jim Marinis and Mike Franz have been looking sharp in the secondary.

It is interesting to note that Mackey has his offensive team outfitted in green jerseys during practice and his defense clad in red; however, boys have been switching colors as fast as a quick-change artist.

Dodgers Jump On San Francisco Again; Cardinals Lose Ground And Dick Groat

The St. Louis Cardinals, trying overhauled the front-running Los Angeles Dodgers with a late catch bid, have lost the services of batting leader Dick Groat, their star ball game in nine days and opportunity to gain ground in the National League pennant race. Groat, the league's leading hitter with a .328 average and a top candidate for Most Valuable Player honors, was lost for several weeks when he was plunked in the chest by a Don Cardwell pitch the first inning of the opener of the twelfth at Pittsburgh. Nevertheless, the Cardinals went

on to win the opener 5-1, extending their winning streak to nine games behind the five-hit pitching of Bob Gibson. Bob Veale stopped the Cardinals in the nightcap 5-0 on six hits for his first major league shutout.

The Cardinals fell 5½ games back of the Dodgers, 32 winners at San Francisco as Sandy Kousser gained his 22nd victory. Jim Gilliam paced the Los Angeles attack with a homer and two singles scoring four runs.

The game results shared the spotlight with the medical bulletins. Willie Mays made his return from an exhaustion-enforced four-day layoff and responded with a

homer and double for the Giants.

Groat was reported to have a contusion of the lower chest wall, and Cincinnati's Frank Robinson may have been lost to the Reds for the remainder of the season with a spike wound on the left arm.

Robinson's biceps was pierced as New York second baseman Ron Hunt slid into second in the sixth inning of the Mets' 5-4 decision over the Reds.

Milwaukee took over third place from San Francisco as Bob Shaw three-hit Philadelphia 5-0 and Chicago's Cubs blanked Houston 3-0 behind Glen Hobbie and Lindy McDaniel.

The American League—leading New York Yankees edged Detroit 2-1, Minnesota outslugged the Chicago White Sox 9-3, Washington belted Cleveland 7-2, the Los Angeles Angels nipped Kansas City 4-3 in 14 innings and Baltimore swept Boston 6-4 and 4-2.

Gibson brought his record to 16-8 and drove in the two runs with a single in the second inning.

South Tallies Touchdown In Both Halves, 14 To 0

Two slips on defense, coupled with an ineffective offense that was stymied before it could generate a solid threat proved the undoing of the Fremont Ross Little Giants Friday night at Harmon field before an estimated crowd of 4,000 fans.

Springfield South, bogged down with numerous penalties at crucial spots, hung a 14-0 non-league setback on the game but green Little Giants in the season's opener.

Springfield South opened the scoring in the first quarter on the Wildcats' first offensive try. Taking a Ned Peddicord punt that rolled dead on its 28-yard line, South started with an 11-yard burst around left end by Fullback Tom Bartley. Don Binkley, Bill Jacobs and Jim Pfeiffer rose up on defense to hold Halfback Aaron Marsh, who later turned out to be quite an elusive running back for the Cats, for no gain.

Marsh then clipped off another two yards before a 10-yard pass after a tremendous boot by Daniels that carried down to the five. Snyder and Marsh to Ross' 48-yard stripe.

Marsh swept left end for four yards and Halfback Jim Clements slipped after reaching the 42. Bartley smacked up the middle for two and came back for three more to the 37 and a South first down. Ross was giving up yards slowly at this point.

First Down

Clements, Marsh and Clements again pounded South down to a first down on the 25. On straight power plays, South sent Bartley into the line for a five-yard gain up the middle and then a seven-yarder by Bartley on a cut-back off tackle.

South was now on the Fremont 13 with a first down. End Tom Freeman of South jumped offside—the first of nine Springfield penalties of the game—and the Wildcats were faced with a first and 15-yards to go on the Giant 18. Snyder on a keeper made three yards back.

Then it happened. Marsh swept left and streaked untouched into the end zone with 0:35 remaining in the quarter to give South a 6-0 lead. End Harold Daniels attempted to boot the extra point but the ball hit the goal post. South used five first downs to carry to its strongest offensive of the evening, a 72 yard push. The quarter ended one play after Fremont put the ball into play from scrimmage.

Ross Rallies

Ross rallied a bit to start the second period as Bob Metheny, Ed Smith and Dick Thiessen picked up short yardage to midfield. Tackle Dick Smith tossed a strong block to help Ed Smith on an off-tackle dive and Mark Smith and Dave George blocked well to help Thiessen spring loose for a six yard gain. Ed Smith was stacked up at the South 47-yard marker and fumbled. Jerry Barker recovered for Springfield and the mid threat was finished.

South was able to roll back to Ross' 26-yard line after the recovered fumble but the threat died and Daniels tried a field goal from the 40-yard line. The ball landed short on the five-yard line and skipped into the end zone for a touchback.

Peddicord raised some hope on the Fremont side of the stands when he read the needle with a 20-yard aerial to George on the Giant 40-yard line. South then was called for pass interference and Ross had its fourth first down of the first half at the Fremont 46.

Center John Fausnaugh and Guards Gary Siger and Dennis Patynko opened some daylight for Smith and the Giant fullback raced to the midfield stripe. Ross' offense then faltered after two incomplete passes and South was able to run out the clock to intermission.

Second Half

South took the second half kickoff but had to punt after one series of plays. A backfield in motion penalty against Ross cost the Giants a five-yard penalty back to their 35 and a crucial fumble put the crusher to Fremont's opening night. A mix-up in the backfield caused Peddicord to bobble the ball after a hard tackle and South pounced on the loose pigskin.

Marsh circled right end for 12 yards and a first down. Clements lost to the 28 and Bartley was ganged up by the entire middle of

the Ross defensive line at the 26. Faced with a third down and long yardage play, South broke Fremont's back with a simple little pass out in the left flat.

Snyder lobbed the ball to End Daniels who raced free into the end zone. Daniels hogged in the pigskin at the 30. Marsh ran the two-point conversion and with 5:30 remaining in the third stanza, South led 14-0.

Ross took the kickoff on its 15 after a tremendous boot by Daniels that carried down to the five. Mike Frantz returned 10 yards.

Fine Play

One of the finest plays of the night unfolded seconds later as Peddicord, a smooth passer who often was on target but completions were denied when Ross receivers dropped the ball, lofted a 29-yard aerial to End Jerry Slater at the Ross 47.

Slatter did an outstanding job of pass-catching for the locals as he snared five throws for 45 yards. Ross made 72-yards passing but only 28 running.

Springfield was 133 running and 36 passing.

After the 29-yard pass to Slater, the Little Giants were forced to punt. South did nothing and booted back from its 11-yard line and Fremont was within striking range once again at the 37 of Springfield.

Peddicord was thrown for a nine-yard loss attempting to pass but rebounded with an 11-yard pass to Metheny. George couldn't hold a Peddicord bomb on the South 39 and Ross had to punt. The quarter then closed.

Playing conservative football, plus being stacked up by a determined and improved Fremont defense, South did little more on offense than kill the clock.

Fremont's final good drive came in the waning moments of the game. A personal foul against South moved Ross to the 27. Peddicord passed seven yards to Slater and the quarterback rambled two more to the 18. Russ Hagerty, now operating at quarterback, ran to the 15 and Peddicord, back again, hit Slater with a short pass on the 13. Peddicord missed Thiessen at the five and then the senior thrower was racked for an eight-yard loss and Ross gave up the ball.

Matter of Time

It was only a matter of time before South ran out the time.

Springfield Coach Lowell Storm credited Fremont with displaying a hard-hitting, scrappy ball club, but he moaned the fact that the penalty-calling was all one-sided. Fremont was assessed five yards and South 45.

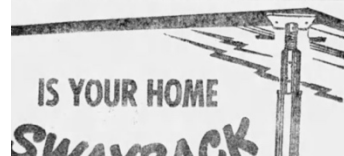
Harold J., nipped Rusty Range by a nose, neck in 1:59.2-5.

Mackey commented that he was more disappointed with his defense than his offense. Second week of the football season is significant in one major respect: it means that for many teams this is the period of adjustments. When you lose there has to be something wrong.

Take Ross high for example. Coach Mal Mackey of the Little Giants was disturbed with the lack of a running attack in the squad's 14-0 setback last Friday to Springfield South. So Mackey went to work.

This week in practice Mackey is toying with several offensive changes and one shift on the defensive line.

At first, Mackey inserted three new lads into the Ross high backfield in an effort to find more punch. He had Russ Hagerty, junior, working at quarterback; Bob Kreilick, junior, at fullback; Junior Ron Roberts at right halfback and Dick Thiessen, the only holdover from last week's starting lineup, at left half.

Returns Peddicord

Mackey since has returned Peddicord to quarterback but the two other backfield changes may stick for Friday's home game

against Cleveland West. Mackey also is figuring on a change at guard where Junior Dave Reed, 190-pounds, may take over for Gary Stiger, last week's starter.

The one defensive change now in the offing may put Dennis Patynko, a linebacker, at end in place of Gene Yeager.

So you see there is more to this art of coaching than standing on the sidelines waving your arms and screaming.

Little is known about Cleveland West at this time except Ross won last season's meeting here, three touchdowns to none. West, however, was rebuilding then and the Ross coaching staff is not taking that team lightly.

St. Joe, one team not too concerned at this time over adjustments as a result of an impressive 46-0 triumph over Gibsonburg in the opener, goes to Lorain St. Mary's Sunday in the first of four Sabbath games. Lorain St. Mary's is remembered as one of the two teams able to score on the Streaks in 1962, and the Irish are fresh from a 41-20 conquest of Cleveland John

Cleveland West Opponent At Harmon:

Ross Out To Even Record Friday

Fremont Ross is bent on evening its season's record at 1-1 Friday night at 8 at Harmon field with the invasion of Cleveland West. Ross lost its opener last week, 14-0, to Springfield South. West will be opening its season.

Jim Torgler, athletic director at West, said the Clevelanders have 14 returning lettermen and all are seniors. "There is hope for a very good season," he added.

Among the 1-9 record compiled last year by West was a 21-0 drubbing by the Little Giants here. That game was not as close as the score might indicate as Ross rushed for 256 yards and held West to a net of eight yards on the ground.

However, West brings back nine starters from last year's offense that opened the game here. Missing are All-Cleveland John Farry, a 225-pound tackle, and Halfback Dave Edell. Both ends return. They are Phil Bova, 6-1, 175, and Ernie Nelson, 6-1, 165. Other linemen back are Tackle Chuck Klein, 6-1, 190; Guards Russ Chesbro, 5-8, 180, and John Koneck, 5-8, 175; and Center Eugene Costello, 6-1, 210.

Three Back

Three of the four backfield starters are coming to Harmon. They are Quarterback Ron Willoughby, 6-0, 175; Halfback Doug McMillan, 5-6, 150; and Fullback Ralph Galvin, 5-10, 210.

West will be coached by Fred

George, in his first year after serving as an assistant last year and former coach at Cleveland Cathedral Latin and Toledo Central Catholic.

Galvin rushed for one yard, McMillan four and Willoughby a minus 11 against Ross in 1962, as Edell was West's top gainer with 11 yards.

In Ross camp this week, Coach Mal Mackey continues his juggling act in an effort to find more offensive punch. He still is undecided on a definite starting line-up, but it may shape up like this:

Ends—Jerry Slatter and either Dave George, Russ Hagerty or

Bob Sanford; Tackles—Dick Smith and either Dick Nitschke or Jack Kreilick; Guards—Dennis Patynko and either Gary Stiger, Dave Reed, John Schoendorf, Russ Coleman and Dave Clapp; Center—John Fausnaugh; Quarterback—Ned Peddicord; Left Half—Dick Thiessen; Right Half—Bob Metheny or Mike Frantz; Fullback—Bob Kreilick or Ed Smith.

Roberts Hurt

Mackey earlier this week announced he may give Ron Roberts a shot at right half out the hustling junior came up with a sprained ankle in practice and may not play.

Mackey summed up the West team as one with a potentially fine passing game. "and you likely will see a lot of throwing Friday," he told the Ross Boosters Tuesday night. Ross passed 19 times last week.

"They (West) also have a big, strong fullback and we figure he'll give us some trouble," he predicted.

In addition to showing more offense—especially in the running game—Mackey said he would like to see better timing in blocking and a little harder hitting in this week's game.

"Maybe all this will come with experience," he thought.

Ross was able to pick up only 28 yards rushing against South, and Thiessen was credited with 26 of that total. Peddicord, thrown for several losses while attempting to pass, was charged with a minus 20 yards. Ed Smith had 10 yards on four tries, Hagerty four for two, Gabel seven for one and

Metheny one yard in two attempts. Peddicord completed six out of 15 passes and hit favorite receiver Slatter on five tries for 45 yards.

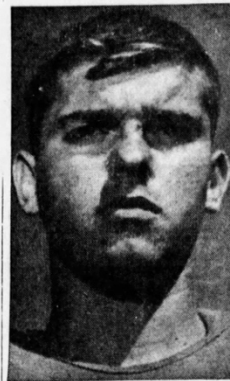
This Week's Picks

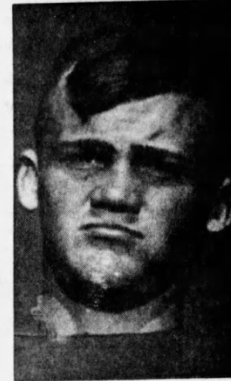

Giants Out For Initial '63 Victory

Fremont Unable To Keep Up After First 2 Periods

History did not repeat itself Saturday night in Stark county.

It was nothing like last year's wild 8-7 victory over a stunned Massillon team. Showing burning speed, crunching power and plenty of defense when they needed it, Canton McKinley's Bulldogs crushed Fremont Ross 40-14 in an independent football game at Fawcett stadium before an estimated crowd of 6,000.

Ross, now 0-3, gets down to more serious business and starts play in the Buckeye Conference, beginning Friday night at Harmon field against Mansfield.

Fremont made a game of it for the first 24 minutes but McKinley's vast edge in speed, strength and manpower started to show soon after the second half kickoff.

Ross was unable to stop McKinley's power stuff up the middle and off tackle as the Bulldogs started to grind out yardage at slow, telling bites. Then an occasional bomb—the long pass, the long run—plus more sloppy tackling on the part of the Little Giants, would lurch the talented eleven of Tony Ware into paydirt.

Ross took the opening kickoff, picked up one first down and then punted down on McKinley's 30-yard line.

Big Break

Two Canton plays later Fremont had its first big break of the quarter as End Gene Yeager racked Quarterback Arnie Fontes and forced a fumble. Mike Frantz recovered for Fremont at the Canton 17. Ross missed a first down at 11-yard line but McKinley proved to be a gracious host again just four plays later by fumbling on its 34. This time both Pfeiffer boys, Jack and Jim, teamed to recover the loose ball.

A pass interference penalty on aerial from Ned Peddicord to Jerry Slater set up Ross with a first down on the 19. Frantz scooted through a hole provided by Jack Kreilick and Gary Stuger for a first down on the three.

Two plays later, Peddicord squeezed into the end zone and Ross led 6-0. The same play failed to convert.

Rocked by the turn of events, McKinley stopped playing give-away and pounded right back. Just four plays after the following kickoff, Fontes, showing way he is said to be one of the finest quarterbacks in Canton history, rolled right, cutback 18 yards past the line and sailed down the left sideline on a 42-yard keeper play that got the Bulldogs on the scoreboard with 10:05 remaining. Henry Valides missed the placement and the count was knotted.

Fremont did nothing except draw two straight fourth down penalties with the following series and punted back.

On the first play from scrimmage, speedy Halfback John McElroy broke off right tackle and raced 76-yards for the second Canton touchdown. End Dwayne Lipkins, who later was to figure in for more heroics, tossed a key block on this run. Run for extra points was short.

That was about the story of the first half.

Canton received to open the third quarter and had to punt. Three downs netted Fremont six yards and Peddicord boomed a great 35-yard punt that was downed on Canton's one-yard line.

It looked good for Ross; the Giants need only to hold their foe and force a punt from deep in their territory.

Here McKinley's power went to work. Softening up Fremont with smashes into the line, with 215-pound Fullback Willie Hall bulging his way for three and four yards

at a crack to pick up important first downs, Canton then sneaked in a scoring pass from Fontes to Lipkins, a 34-yard bomb. Frantz and Ed Smith had a shoe at the flying end near the Ross goal but he slipped away.

Fontes ran the extra points and Canton led 20-6.

Peddicord tried to pass on the first play after the kickoff and Bill Snell intercepted for McKinley on the Giant 45 and returned to the 18. McElroy then cut off left tackle and sped down the left sideline for the fourth Bulldog tally.

Canton's fifth touchdown came on the opening play of the fourth quarter when Fontes went up the middle, wiggled free from one would-be tackler and ran easily into the end zone on a 35-yard scoring play.

The parade continued when with 3:33 remaining in the game, Fontes hit Lipkins with a three-yard scoring aerial after two long passes helped set up the TD. Second string quarterback Larry Haines connected with McElroy on a 19-yarder to Ross' 42 and then a Haines to Frank Mathews pass clicked for 35-yards to the seven.

Second TD

Fremont's second touchdown came with two minutes remaining as Peddicord threw a 78-yard strike to Frantz who caught the ball on Ross' 35 yard line between two defenders. He had no trouble running the remaining distance. Bob Kreilick ran over the conversion. The same pass play worked for 32-yards in the closing minutes but Fremont couldn't punch over the six points after getting down to the four.

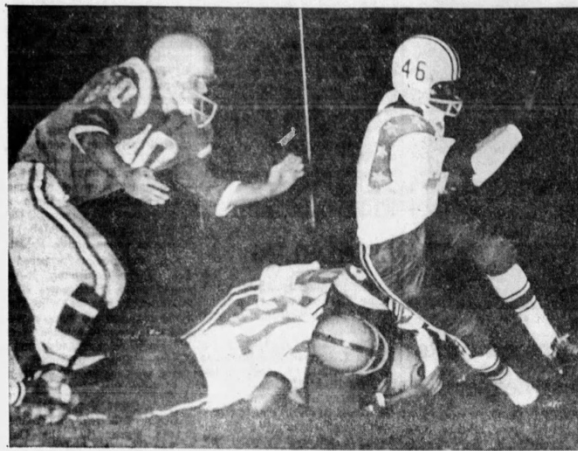

He leads what has been an impotent ground attack that has gained less than 300 yards to date.

Mansfield feels it has an excellent guard in Paul Cindrich, 5-10, 191. At the other guard is Bill Jividen, 5-9, 208-pounds. Center will be Phil Horvath, 6-1, 191.

Dougherty said Maxvillon was able to complete some long passes against his team last week and he has been working to correct that fault for Friday's game. A new boy, Tony Schuener, the fastest boy on the squad, a 155-pounder, is being inserted into the secondary to guard against the bomb.

Mansfield does not expect to lose anything new at Fremont this week but, says Dougherty, "We've got to get the boys up to playing good, solid football, and they've shown that when they put their minds to it they can move the ball as well as anyone. We feel that we can beat Fremont. Ross and we will if we can iron out our mistakes."

Coach Mal Mackey again is pondering line-up changes in Ross's camp. His newest idea is to shift End Dave George to halfback, Fullback Ed Smith to halfback and insert Bob Sanford at end. 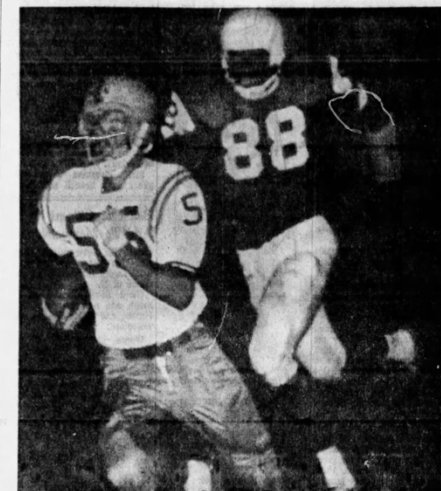

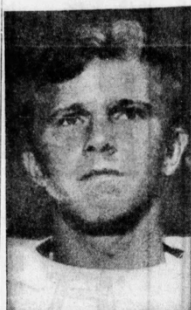

Little Giants Lose Three Bobbles In 14 To 6 Defeat

Fumbles, fumbles, fumbles, all part of the game but still a crippling disease, cut the heart out of Fremont Ross' offensive drives Friday night and the Little Giants fell 14-6 to a beefy Lorain Steeler squad on enemy territory.

The setback was the fifth in six tries thus far and Ross' second in two Buckeye Conference starts.

Proving that this was just not Fremont's night, consider these untimely developments:

1. Ross had a first down and goal to go on Lorain's one yard line in the first few moments of the opening quarter. The Giants didn't score and fumbled on fourth down.

2. Ross forced Lorain to punt from the Steeler nine-yard line but an offside penalty gave Lorain a first down instead, allowing the Steelmen, now 3-3 overall and 1-2 in the league, to move 69 and one-half yards to Fremont's inch line.

Jones Trapped

3. Ross had Quarterback Jimmy Jones trapped on Fremont's 26-yard line in the second quarter but let him slip away on a broken pass play to the Giant 6.

4. Ross fumbled on its first drive of the second half after moving 43 yards to Lorain's 18.

5. Lorain gambled when it needed a foot for a first down on its own 28-yard line. And made it.

6. Ross lost the ball for the third time on a fumble late in the third quarter after moving 44 yards to the Steeler's 40.

7. In the fourth quarter, Jones again almost was tackled but managed to complete a short pass instead of eating a long loss.

8. On one of Lorain's long drives, Jones was allowed to pick up 17 yards on a run when an official got in Dave George's way as the Fremont defender was moving up near the line up scrimmage to make a tackle.

Clipping Hurts

9. Ross was called for clipping that erased a neat 28-yard pass and run from Russ Hagerty to Dave George that would have given Fremont a first down on the Lorain 24 late in the game.

All these unhappy situations happened to Ross last night, and all Coach Mal Mackey would say after the game was—"No Comment!"

"I don't want to put my foot in my mouth so I'd better not say anything," said Mackey.

More than any one break, however, the crushing blow felt by the Little Giants was the brilliant running of Quarterback Jones, who piled up 152 yards rushing on 25 carries, most of which came off the quarterback keeper play. He ran left and he ran right, and he was the main cog in the Steeler attack that netted 291 yards rushing. Halfback Warren Lance, a speedy lad who cut well in broken field, picked up 101 yards on 17 carries.

Ross kicked off to Lorain and on the second Steeler play they fumbled and Tackle Dick Smith recovered on the Lorain 25.

Blocking Good

Blocking by Center John Faunough and Guards Dave Clapp and Gary Stiger helped Fremont move to a first down on the one-yard line. On three straight full-back plunges, Jack Kreilick found no running room. Ross was still a yard away but now it was fourth down.

Hagerty faked a handoff to George and tried to sneak off right tackle. He was stopped and fumbled and Lorain recovered.

The Steelers, with the aid of that offside penalty on fourth down, moved the ball all the way down to Fremont's inch line, mainly on the running of Jones and Lance.

Ross' goal line defense held. Turning in a great effort were Dick Smith, Jack and Jim Pfeiffer, Dave Reed, Gene Yeager, John Faunough, Rick Gabel, George Branco, Dave George, Mike Frantz and Jerry Slater. The latter being helped on every other play by Jim Marins, who later in the game crashed through to make a jarring tackle of Jones that resulted in a 15-yard loss.

Fremont had to punt out to its 34.

Right Back

The Steelers then pounded right back with Jones running almost every play and getting in mates down to the six-yard line before running out of down.

Again Ross punted out. This time Lorain took over on the Fremont 48. Lance and Jones worked the ball to a first down on the Fremont 10. Then Bill Kishman, who on several occasions moved into the quarterback's spot with Jones taking over at halfback, found End Dave Keyes alone in the end zone for Lorain's first touchdown at 4:12 of the first half. Run for points failed.

Relying on short passes, Fremont worked the ball to Lorain's 14 before time ran out.

Ross took the second half kick

off and drove to the Steeler 18 where Kreilick, seemingly on his way to a touchdown after a good block by Dick Smith, fumbled and Lorain recovered.

Here Lorain gambled on that one-foot play and got the first down on its 29. But Fremont was to get the ball back after a punt.

Frantz fumbled on his 40 and Lorain was on the spot and had possession.

Jones ran two straight keepers to the Giant 13 but Marins came in to make his big play. Jones went back to work and finally picked up a first down on the five. Lance made it to the three and Jones ran his favorite keeper left play for the touchdown at 11:05 of the fourth quarter. Jones converted to make the score 14-0.

Hard Running

Some hard running by Frantz and Kreilick, plus short passes by Hagerty and Ned Peddicord moved Fremont from its 36 to the Steeler 10.

On third down and with Lorain looking for another pass, Kreilick squeezed through the line and burst into the end zone with 3:35 remaining. Kreilick failed to convert.

Peddicord, who is sharp with the inside kick, booted the kick-off 11 yards and Dennis Patynko recovered for Fremont. Then the big pass and run play by Hagerty and George was for naught because of the clipping penalty.

Lorain was able to run out the clock and the only excitement exhibited in the final moments was when tempers flared and both benches emptied and engaged in a melee. Ross was judged the guilty party here and was handed a 15-yard personal foul penalty. Tackle Don Binkley of Fremont was asked to leave the game for his part in the affair.

Fremont hosts Findlay next Friday.

Coach Paul said his team must put that impressive showing against Sandusky in the background and concentrate on this week's opponent.

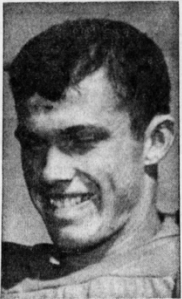
"We have to be up for Fremont," said Paul. "It is important that you are up for everybody in this league. There are no soft touches and past records mean nothing."

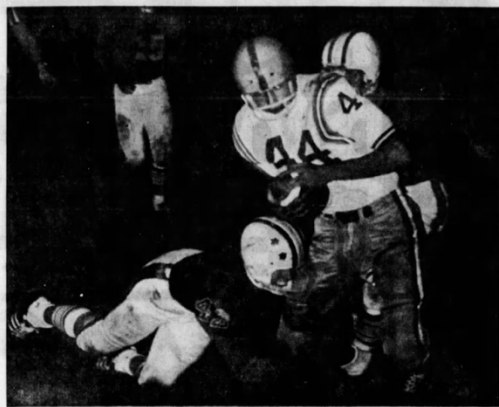

Giants Superb On Offense, Defense In League Contest

Fremont Ross, a superb machine on offense and defense, completely outplayed a bigger and more heralded Findlay Trojan band at Harmon Field Friday night and plucked a plum off the Buckeye Conference tree, 12 to 6.

Most appropriate words of the night came from a dejected but honest Coach Hal Paul of Findlay when he uttered in the Trojan dressing room amid a quiet, forlorn bunch of boys: "They (Ross) were just too tough for us tonight. I never thought I would see the night when a team would play ball control on us like they did. They just knocked us on our backsides. That quarterback (Russ Hagerty) did a great job."

Fremont proved one thing to about 4,000 fans last night: When the Giants want to play ball they can. Here is a victory over a team that held Sandusky last week to a 12-12 tie, and the Blue Streaks went into that fray atop the Associated Press poll for high school teams.

This was no fluke victory. Look at the statistics and one will note the wide edge Ross held in yardage gained.

Fremont smashed for 258 yards rushing and 39 passing, clicking on four of five aerial attempts. Findlay, a team that was able to control the ball well against Sandusky, was held to 115 yards on the ground and 40 upstarts.

The Ross offense was superb; the defense tremendous.

Good Blocking

Along the line and doing an outstanding job of blocking were the likes of Bob Sanford, Jack Kreilick, Gary Stiger, John Fausnaugh, Dave Clapp, Dick Smith, Jerry Slater, Dick Nitschke, Pete Vaffis and Mark Smith.

The running of Backs Bob Kreilick, Dave George and Mike Frantz was strong and steady, and the quarterbacking of Russ Hagerty was something to see. Ned Peddicord, one of the finest passers in the Buckeye Conference, also came in to do his share and help fire up the offense.

Refusing to budge on defense and consistently checking the Trojan key third down plays were such defenders as Fausnaugh, Rick Gabel, the Pfeiffer boys, Gene Yeager, George Branco, Don Binkley, Hagerty, Frantz, Dave Reed, George and Jack Kreilick.

And we can't forget some of the big plays turned in by Ron Roberts, who broke up a pass play late in the game, and by Tim Tucker, who looked good on kickoff coverage, and by Ed Smith, Lew Mackey, Wally Pankratz, Terry Bork, Dennis Patynko, Clayton Williams, Dick Thissen, who all did their assignments well.

Breaks played a key part in this game, too.

Clipping

There was that clipping penalty that took away a Findlay touchdown early in the first quarter when Halfback John Brumley ran all over the field on a 65-yard scamper, going into the end zone after the Trojan's third play from scrimmage. The clip was called on the 39-yard line and the official moved the ball back 29 yards to the 50.

"The clipping penalty happened right in front of our bench," moaned Coach Paul, "and I still like to see that one again. We'll look at the movies and see if it was a clip. And then they gave us a 20-yard penalty and apologized to us at halftime."

Officials for the game, and they did a clean job considering the rivalry between the two teams, were Hal Block, Bob Scholtz, Jim Langhurst and Boo McIlvaine.

Another big break Fremont used enroute to its second triumph—both in the conference—occurred early in the fourth quarter when Ross was forced to punt on fourth down, needing two feet for a first down on its 25-yard line. Findlay was off-side on Fremont's shift and Ross later drove in for the winning tally, keeping possession all the way.

This brought to mind a similar fourth down penalty call last week against Fremont when the Little Giants lost to Lorain.

Bruising Club

Fremont was a bruising club in the second half. Trailing 6-0 at intermission, the Giants dug in and just swept the Trojans off their feet. Findlay was allowed only four yards rushing in the fourth quarter and 43 in the third quarter — but 33 of those yards came on one play.

Findlay's great kicking game proved the difference in the first half. A sophomore punter, Joe Reimund, kept toting Fremont

deeper and deeper into its own territory with booting punts. Finally, Ross was set back to its own two. Reimund averaged 43 yards per kick for the night, an excellent average for any high school lad.

Findlay used two interceptions, the punting by Neilmund and a short punt by Ross to strike for its only touchdown in the second stanza.

Taking over at the Ross 40-yard line, the Trojans mixed their plays well and moved in for the tally 10 plays later as Ross gave up ground grudgingly. Halfback Jim Eisel, who, by the way, was stopped behind the line of scrimmage for the first time this season on a vicious tackle by Dick Smith, carried the brunt of the rushing and one pass play from Quarterback Steve Wise to Brumley noted Findlay a 10-yard gain to the five. Steve Lanning then slipped off left tackle the remaining distance as Fremont was braced for another rush by Eisel.

Pass for short points failed as Findlay muffed the ball.

Moves Well

Fremont moved well from deep in its own territory to the 50 before Mike Slough intercepted a pass. Findlay knocked on paydirt door again with time running out in the half and a field goal attempt by Doug Rhodus, a strong kicker, was wide from the 24-yard line.

This helped as it would have meant a two-touchdown difference, in all reality.

Ross then made its comeback. Taking a punt on the 20, Ross drove 30-yards on 14 plays — their longest march of the season — with Frantz, Hagerty and Kreilick following excellent blocking by the offensive line, moving the distance. Hagerty finally scored from the one-foot line with 2:35 to play in the period. Hagerty was short on the conversion try but the count was now tied and Fremont held that important momentum.

The winning touchdown came on an 82-yard drive in 14 plays — helped greatly by that fourth down offense penalty.

Mixes Passes

Hagerty and Peddicord mixed up the passing attack, and George, Frantz and Kreilick did the rushing. First down after first down were piled up as Fremont, not to be denied, drove goalward.

Then with 5:18 remaining in the game, Kreilick followed blocking by Dick Smith and Clapp into the end zone and the Ross high fans went wild.

The conversion attempt by Kreilick missed but Ross didn't need it.

Findlay tried to pass its way back into the game but a key interception by Frantz snuffed out that threat. Ross had the ball deep in Findlay territory (Continued on Page 11.)

Giants Eye Big Upset Of Streaks

"We are not going to Sandusky Friday night just to hold the score down. We are going there with the idea of winning," spoke Ray Kwiatkowski, Ross assistant football coach, to the Fremont Ross Booster Club Tuesday night as he gave a rundown on the strong Blue Streaks.

Game time is 8 o'clock at Strobel field.

'Ski', as he is often called by the coaching staff here, also said Sandusky is a fine ball club, one that will be different in many ways on offense than the conservative Findlay team.

Ross fans saw here last week. "Sandusky may be better than its ranking (fourth in the state —AP) or maybe not as good. We will find out," he added.

From their record, at least, one must consider the Blue Streaks as good as their rating. They have not been defeated in their last 19 games, dating back to late October, 1961. Included in that string, however, are three ties, 20-20 with Elyria, 22-22 with Parma and 12-12 with Findlay.

Additionally, Ross' foe Friday has chewed up rushing yardage at an awesome clip—380 yards per game. Sandusky, which did not pass against Findlay in a 12-12 tie, has been averaging only 12 yards per game by throwing. It should be pointed out, though, that Sandusky was not regarded as a passing team last season but opened the Ross game with a long touchdown bomb to End Don Rather.

Ross lost last year, 20-6, and the Little Giants have not defeated Sandusky on Strobel field grass since 1959.

"We think we are just as good as they," said Coach Mal Mackey, who is not saying much for public consumption this week, but instead is going quietly about his business of getting his team ready for Friday's fireworks.

Mackey indicated only one lineup change for this game, that being Tackle Dick Nitschke, 200-pounder, in place of Jack Kreilick on the left side. Nitschke played his finest game of the season against Findlay and Mackey, noting a brilliant effort by Kreilick at defensive right end in his first try there, wants to keep the redhead fresh for defense.

Ross' offensive ends will be Jerry Slatter and Bob Sanford, Tackles Nitschke and Dick Smith, Guards Dave Clapp and Gary Stiger and Center John Fausnaugh. Russ Hagerty again will handle the offense at quarterback, with Dave George and Mike Frantz at halfback and the improved Bob Kreilick at fullback.

Clapp and Stiger did an effective job of trap blocking on the Findlay linemen and Smith and Fausnaugh did strong work on both offense and defense. Smith had to contend with 240-pound Doug Rhodus.

The backs ran hard and well in piling up 258 yards rushing—Ross' biggest total of the season.

Coach Earl Bruce has been with the Streaks for four years now and his record since departing Mount Vernon for the bay city is 31-33.

"We expected Ross to defeat Findlay last week," surprised Bruce. "We knew that the Ross-Findlay game is a rivalry and you were playing at home, and it figured Findlay would have a letdown."

"No," continued Bruce, "we are not taking Fremont lightly this week. This is the Buckeye Conference, you know, and they block and tackle just like we do. This is a traditional battle and all past records can be thrown out the window."

Bruce's pepped up backfield features speed merchants Tim Stokes, who can run the 100 yards in less than 10 seconds; George Williams, the leading ground-gainer with a 10-yard average every time he carries the ball; two fullbacks, Bill Yeager, 165-pounds, who has scored 12 touchdowns to date, and Dave Klinger, a 200-pound battering ram; and Quarterback Gary Miller, 141.

By comparison, Ross defeated Findlay 12-6 and Marion 26-8, and lost to Mansfield 24-0 and Sandusky 34-0.

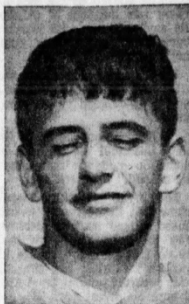

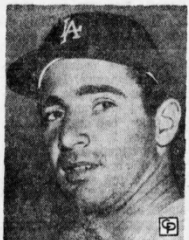

Racing Board Appeals Cases, Asks Advice

COLUMBUS, Ohio (AP)—Ohio's reorganized Racing Commission, meeting for the first time, has decided to appeal in two court cases and ask some advice from Atty. Gen. William B. Saxbe.

A bill reorganizing the commission, passed earlier this year by the legislature, went into effect three weeks ago. As a result, a new chairman—Columbus attorney Lawrence A. Ramsey—presided at Wednesday's meeting.

Ramsey was appointed Oct. 14, with Hamilton dentist R. H. Wetzel and London veterinarian William Hackett. Two members of the former commission, Toledo auto dealer James White and Cleveland attorney John E. Elder, were reappointed.

Five-Hour Session

In Wednesday's five-hour session, the commission decided to seek clarification of the rules—through an attorney general's advisory memorandum—as to what constitutes "an Ohio horse," and the source of the rules. The matter stems from a challenging of the eligibility of the winning horse in an August race for Ohio owned and/or bred horses during the Cincinnati Turf Club meet at River Downs.

Commissioners also instructed Asst. Atty. Gen. Clark G. Redick, assigned to the commission, to file notice of appeal in a Shelby County Common Pleas Court decision setting aside a 1959 commission order suspending a trainer, and decisions in Cuyahoga County courts allowing Painesville Raceway (using Northfield Park, Cleveland) to have Tuesday-through-Saturday racing. The commission had said it must be Monday-through-Saturday.

Pioneers Give Giants Only 16 Plays In First Half, Roll To 28-6 Victory

Elyria, long considered a 'basketball town,' has come up with a representative football team this season, one that blends power running, a touch of speed and a timely passing attack.

The Pioneers utilized all these qualities Friday night at home in defeating Fremont Ross 28-6 for their seventh conquest in nine starts. Ross went down to its seventh defeat in nine games—and fourth loss in the Buckeye Conference. Fremont has won twice in the league.

Fremont could do nothing the first half against a stout Pioneer defense. Ross made only 28 yards rushing and no first downs the first two periods.

By contrast, Elyria ran 32 offensive plays (Ross had 16), gained 202 yards on the ground and netted nine firsts and 10.

The Little Giants mounted only one offensive all night—that coming the final portion of the third quarter as Fremont drove 72 yards on 14 plays with sophomore quarterback Terry Bork at the controls. Ross made four of its five game first downs on this sustained march.

Halfback Dave George, who gained 51 of Ross' 70 yards rushing, was Fremont's big threat in the third quarter with 32 yards on the ground. His running and a 17-yard pass interference penalty were the prime factors in the touchdown drive.

Ross took over after a kick-off marked Elyria's third touchdown. Fremont started from its 28.

Bork ran two yards on a keeper to the 30 and George, on the biggest Fremont gain of the night, ran 17 yards to the 47. Ed Smith, George and Bork picked up Fremont's second first down at the Elyria 42.

George then slammed to the 40, then the pass interference call on Elyria's Harris Jackson moved Ross to the 23.

On second down, Bork ran to the 20 and then he fired a short pass over the line to End Bob Sanford which got Fremont to the 8-yard line. Using George on power plays off the left side, Fremont scored at 11:14 remaining when the senior halfback clicked on his third straight attempt behind the blocking of Dick Smith and Dave Clapp. Bob Kreilick's conversion attempt failed and Ross trailed 22-6.

Elyria controlled the ball for all but nine plays the first quarter. Still the Pioneers could get nothing started until a Ross fumble gave Elyria possession on the Fremont 30.

After a six-yard rollout play by Quarterback Roger Stevenson, Halfback Houston Love tore through Fremont's right side, sped past the secondary untouched and raced 33 yards to paydirt. Love also counted the extra points on a slant off tackle and Elyria led 8-0.

Ross ran three plays after the kickoff and Ned Peddicord boomed a 60-yard punt to Elyria's five. The runback was good to the 17, from where the Pioneers drove 83 yards on 15 plays. One of the big plays of this drive occurred when Elyria had

a third down on Fremont's 46-yard line. Stevenson faded to pass. He found his receivers covered, so he retreated farther to escape the charging Ross defensive line. Stevenson finally eluded would-be tacklers at the Elyria 35 before returning back up field. He streaked to the Ross 33-yard line before being tossed out of bounds.

Later Stevenson passed 10 yards to Halfback Al Campbell for the second Pioneer touchdown. The score came at 1:31 of the second period, and when Nate Hagins ran over the conversion, Elyria led 16-0.

Hagins was not due to play this season after a leg operation last August sent him to the sidelines.

Elyria picked up its third touchdown on a Ross gift in the third quarter. Peddicord was back to punt on his eight yard line. The snap was dropped and Peddicord tried to pick it up and run. He slipped, however, and the official blew the play dead at the eight. Elyria gained possession at that point.

Peddicord said after the game that the pass from center was perfect but he let it slip through his hands.

Elyria cashed in on the first play after the break. Stevenson faked a play to the right and kept the ball and ran all alone around the left side for a touchdown.

Elyria scored again with 3:15 to play in the game after a pass interception on the Fremont 17. Stevenson ran and passed his team to the 10-yard line, where End Al Fields caught a touchdown pass from Stevenson, who entered the game with a com-

pletion record of 32 of 58 for 637 yards and five touchdowns.

Ross plays its final game of the season at Harmon field next Friday as Lorain Admiral King invades.

Tonight Ross' Reserves meet Mohawk high school at Harmon in an 8 o'clock game.

The outcome actually was decided on the first play of the game. Halback Jerry Williams ran the opening kickoff back 10 yards to the King 40.

On the first play from scrimmage, Halback Joe Payne ran right end, slipped through a host of players and cut back down the left side and raced 60 yards for a touchdown. Emmett Ross ran over the conversion and with about 30 seconds gone Admiral King led 6-0.

Winiarz carried three more times and got King to the four. Ross made it to the two and the same boy punched it over. Williams ran the extra points. 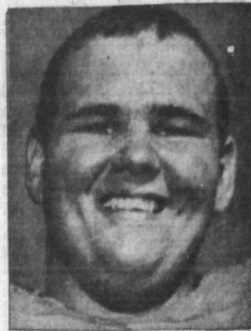
