Ross Advances, Streaks Bow Out In Tournament

Fremont Ross clubbed out a 9-1 victory Saturday over Huron and St. Joe fell 2-1 to Eastwood in the quarter finals of the Class 'AA' baseball sectional tournament at Anderson field.

The Little Giants meet Eastwood and Clyde takes on Tiffin Calvert Tuesday here in the semi-finals. Winners meet for the right to advance to the district.

Ross held on to a 2-0 first inning lead until the fifth frame when the Little Giants added an insurance run. A big four-run rally in the sixth wrapped up for Fremont.

Mike Frantz hurled a one-hit shutout for six innings before giving way to Bob Shetenhelm who yielded the only Huron tally. The victory was Frantz' third this season.

Russ Hagerty's triple was the decisive blow in Fremont's two-run first. Singles by Jerry Binder, John Prosser and a double by Rick Gabel started Ross on its four-run seventh.

Hagerty and Prosser collected three hits each as Fremont rapped out 11 safeties against Huron's Seder. Binder had two hits.

Prosser tripled in two runners in the seventh to close Fremont's run-making.

Each team collected two hits in the St. Joe-Eastwood battle that saw Ty Wonderly of the Streaks matched against tricky Hamen of Eastwood. Robinson had a double and single for Eastwood's only hits and Wonderly's double and Russ Gabel's single were the only St. Joe hits.

Errors played a big part in the scoring. Buchman reached on an error in Eastwood's second inning. He stole second. When Kahlenberg was safe on an error, Buchman came around to score the game's first run.

St. Joe tied the score in the fifth as Ron Kerr walked, stole second and scored when Chuck Lenhart was safe on an error. Eastwood won the game in the sixth. Hess was safe at second on an error and moved to third on Robinson's infield hit. Robinson was trapped off first base and while the Streaks were running him down Hess broke for the plate and slid in under the tag.

Hamen fanned 17 St. Joe batters. Wonderly picked up seven strike outs.

Fremont, Tiffin Calvert Meet Today In Tournament Finals

Fremont Ross pushed across the winning run in the bottom of the seventh to edge Eastwood 2-1 Thursday and Tiffin Calvert scored on a theft of home in the ninth inning to nip Clyde 3-2 in semi-final games of the Class "AA" baseball sectional tournament here.

Ross and Calvert play today at 4 for the right to represent this

area in next week's district tournament at North Robinson.

John Prosser, Ross catcher who has 14 hits in 25 at-bats this season, opened Fremont's seventh with a base on balls. With one out, Ken Pasch reached first on an error, Prosser going to second. Jerry Slatter then lined a clean single down the right field line to score Prosser with the winning run.

Prosser drove in Fremont's first

run in the fourth after Eastwood tallied in the top of the frame.

Fremont's pitcher Mike Frantz, a curve-balling artist, bested Glen Hamen of Eastwood, a lad who throws hard and has a good curve. Frantz struck out five and gave up just two hits. Hamen allowed four hits and fanned nine.

Clyde took a 2-0 lead in the fourth but Calvert came back to tie in the sixth. Neither team scored until the bottom of the ninth.

Dave Ritzler led off for Calvert with a walk. He moved to third base as Pitcher Bill Welty was safe on an error. Clyde hurler Dan Daugherty then struck out two batters and worked the count down to 2-2 on Rick Scheiber when Ritzler dashed home from third with the winning run.

Clyde made seven hits and Calvert picked up six.

Now Ford acknowledges that he, too, visited a hypnotist during the off-season. Whitey wanted to kick a habit, one that may or may not have affected his pitching.

Ross Nips Tiffin Calvert 2-1, Plays In District Tournament

Fremont Ross' Little Giants won their second consecutive tournament game by the score of 2-1 Friday afternoon at Anderson field and by doing so captured the Class "AA" baseball sectional.

Tiffin Calvert was Ross' latest victim.

Fremont now moves to North Robinson for the first half of the district tourney. Ross' opponent has not been established at this time. Should Fremont win Tuesday at North Robinson, then the finals of the district will be played here next Friday afternoon. Winner of the district journeys to Lima for regional play.

Joe Houck, Tiffin Calvert pitcher, and Hurler Alex Hyzer were locked in a scoreless duel for four innings before the Senecas broke loose for their only run. First baseman George Zirger led off Calvert's top of the fifth with a

sharp single to center field. He was moved to second base on a sacrifice bunt by Houck. With two outs, Joe Ritzler, third sacker, singled home Zirger. Rick Scheiber then beat out a slow roller down the third base line to put two Calvert runners aboard. Hyzer ended the inning by getting Catcher Frank Pusey on strikes.

Fremont broke the ice in the bottom of the sixth when Vern Erchenbrecher led off with a triple to right-centerfield. Rick Gabel came in to run for Erchenbrecher. Russ Hagerty popped out to the right-fielder, with Gabel holding third. John Prosser then slammed a long triple over the center-fielder's head to score Gabel with the tying run. Prosser came home on a ground single over the first base bag by Jerry Binder.

Except for the fifth inning when Calvert collected three of its six hits, Hyzer was in complete control of the situation. Ross also made three hits, two by Binder. Ritzler knocked out two safeties for Tiffin Calvert.

Hyzer struck out five and walked none. Houck fanned one and passed one batter.

Ross nipped Eastwood 2-1 Thursday in the semi-finals here.
