## Macmen Outscore Ross 1-0 In Scrimmage; Giants Improving, Mackey Says; 3-School Drill Slated

Ross high Little Giants football team, showing improvement daily according to Head Coach Mal Mackey, is host to a three-school scrimmage Saturday on the Senior high practice gridiron.

Ross, Toledo Libbey and Lorain Admiral King will tussle in a rotating scrimmage starting at 1 p.m. Saturday. A bar of soap will be collected at the field from on-lookers.

This will be the second scrimmage of the season for the Giants who drilled against Toledo Macomber at Toledo Thursday.

The Macmen scored the lone touchdown in the game early in the scrimmage. After the Ross defense held Macomber on its own 20 for three rushing plays, the Toledoans caught the Ross secondary up close, quarterback tossing a short pass into the flat to a speedy back who ran the distance for the TD.

Macomber did not threaten the remainder of the hot afternoon.

### Ross Threatens

Ross threatened two or three times, nearing the Macomber goal the first series of plays before turning over the ball on downs. Each team ran four series of 10 plays each.

Mackey commented "We looked real good, especially on defense. Quarterback Guy Nuhfer did some beautiful passing with end Russ Sale our outstand-

ing pass receiver. Halfbacks Larry Kelly and Steve Frontz also were good in the pass catching category."

Short running game of Ross was potent but, outside of a long run by Leroy Rollins, there was no breakaway romp by a Ross back. Rollins also almost went all the way before being bounced out of bounds near the Macomber goal.

Fullback Jack Ziemke and Kelly were the best ground gainers for the Giants. A big Macomber tackle of last season, shifted to end this year, was its outstanding offensive performer. Macomber is rated one of the top teams in Toledo this year. It was the Macmen's third scrimmage thus far.

Frontz and Nuhfer also picked up some running yardage for Ross.

"Our offense hasn't begun to jell as yet," Mackey said. "We are rebuilding completely on offense since all of our returning lettermen played mainly on defense last season."

"We looked very tough on defense, holding Macomber without much yardage on the ground."

Mackey thinks Ross has better team speed both in the line and backfield on offense as compared to last year.

### Scrappy Bunch

"We're a little green but the kids sure are a bunch of scrappers," he added.

Jaderstrom, tackles; Ken Smith and Bill Thraves, guards; Jay Mackey, center; Nuhfer at quarterback, Kelly and Frontz, halfbacks, Ziemke at fullback.

## In Scrimmage; Preview Coming

## Defeats Toledo, Fairview Teams By Pair Of TDs

Ross high's football Little Giants, impressive in scoring "victories" over Preview foes Saturday night in Harmon Stadium, open the regular season Friday night at home against Cleveland West high.

The Giants, Cleveland Fairview Park and Toledo Whitmer collided in a three-school scrimmage session (under regular game rules for the most part) Saturday before between 1,000 and 1,500 fans. Ross beat Fairview 8-0 and Whitmer 6-0. In between, Whitmer, a rugged Great Lakes league team and defending champion of that circuit, topped Fairview 7-0.

Ross resorted to a devastating "grind it out" ground game on offense, throwing only two passes against both opponents, one intercepted.

The Giants were strong on defense, neither foe ever entering Fremont territory except Fairview just at the end of the first 12-minute session, recovering a Ross fumble on the Fremont 48. Short pass put the Clevelanders on the Ross 44 but that is as far as Fairview advanced.

### Recover Fumble

Ross scored against Fairview after tackle Gary Brauchla fell on a Fairview fumble on the Fairview 23.

Fullback Jack Ziemke, a junior, and senior quarterback Guy Nuhler carried to the 18. Ziemke, Larry Kelly and Nuhler advanced on runs to the Fairview six from where Nuhler went wide left on a "keeper" play to tally. He also ran wide, cut back through right tackle to score two extra points.

Whitmer got as far as its own 48-yard-line against the tough Ross defense.

The Giants took advantage of a bad pass from center to gain possession and score against the Toledoans, Bill Drake, on fourth down, fielded a pass from center on the ground and Russ Sale and Mark Jaderstrom of the Giants tackled the Whitmer back on the Whitmer 42.

Kelly, fullback Steve Frontz and Nuhler carried to the Whitmer 13. Frontz and Ziemke rammed to the Whitmer 2 from where Nuhler went wide right on a "keeper" and cut back for the touchdown. Run for points failed.

### 'Keeper' Plays Potent

Nuhler, on "keeper" plays from his quarterback position, both to the right and left side, was hard to contain by both Whitmer and Fairview. And Ziemke's runs up the middle also penetrated both foes' defense.

Defensively, lineup of Bill Bingle, Jaderstrom, Joe Brookmyer and Brauchla on the four-man front, with Dennis Krellick subbing, Jay Mackey and Tracy Hetrick at inside linebacker spots, Russ Sale and Bob Hill outside linebackers, Nuhler and Frontz defensive halfbacks and Kelly safety, Ross was "stingy" in yielding yardage to Whitmer and Fairview's running games. And neither successfully passed long against Ross.

Fairview was scored on by Whitmer when Whitmer back Ed Foley went 48 yards to the Fairview 30 on a "quickie" up the middle. Three plays later, Drake went off tackle for seven yards and a TD. Foley kicked the extra point.

Ross band put on a short performance at halftime.

Coach Mal Mackey of Ross was pleased with the Giants' showing, especially the defensive crew. "We were like Ohio State on offense, grinding it out on the ground, but it looked good," he concluded.

## Clyde Scores SBC Success By 20-0 Over Sandusky SM

Clyde opened the 1961 football season and also its Sandusky Bay Conference schedule with a 20-0 victory over Sandusky St. Mary at Sandusky Saturday night. The Flyers raced to a 14-0 half-time lead on a first quarter 18-yard TD sprint by fullback Larry Baker and a second stanza 15-yard pass play for a six-pointer from quarterback Frank Slessman to end John Burdett. Kick

occurred before nearly 58,000 stadium fans and a vast television audience.

# Ross Depth Uncovered In 46-0 Opening Game

## Seven Giants Score Against Outmanned Cleveland West 11

Little Giant football players, from the youngest sophomore to the oldest senior, were paraded before the home folks last night in Harmon Stadium with pleasing results.

Seven different Fremont Ross backs scored as the Giants turned back game but outmanned Cleveland West high 46-0 before some 3,500 opening night spectators.

The Giants marched for an initial touchdown on a 17-play, 83-yard sustained drive after receiving the opening kickoff, held off the visiting Cowboys who threatened to knot the score, then took advantage of West mistakes to leave the field at halftime with a 20-0 margin.

West had nothing left the second half, the first two hard-fought periods taking their toll of the slim-rostered Cowboys (total of 24 boys).

Head Coach Mal Mackey of Ross showed second and third units into the game the second half, Giant depth proving too much of an obstacle for the tired Clevelanders.

Ross had its freshman backfield of last year on offense the entire final stanza and the now brand new sophomores more than held their own.

Mackey opined in pre-season speculation that his 1961 squad probably had more depth than any team of the past several years. He hoped to uncork that depth early. Opportunity knocked last night and was seized as several units were exchanged on both offense and defense.

A completely rebuilt Ross offense functioned well. Of the seven Ross TDs, five were scored by underclassmen. Senior halfback Steve Frontz, injured before the first game last year and sidelined for the season tallied the first one on a one-yard run. Senior quarterback Guy Nuhfer went over for the third score on a 14-yard scamper.

Other starting backs, little but scrappy junior halfback Larry Kelly ran beautifully for a 34-yard TD in between the Frontz and Nuhfer tallies and rugged junior fullback Jack Ziemke rammed over from the one.

Junior halfback John Prosser exploded over the middle and raced to his right for 54 yards and a fifth six-pointer, junior quarterback Gary Bailey slanted around end for a seven-yard romp into the end zone and finally sophomore fullback Bob Hill cracked the middle for a one-yard touchdown.

**Pass Picked Off**  
Hill's TD was set up when Ziemke intercepted a Ron Wiloughby pass on the West 37 and he returned to the West 8 before being shoved out of bounds. Mackey inserted his all-sophomore backfield of Ned Peddicord at quarterback, Dave George and Mike Frantz at the halves and Hill at fullback. George lost two yards but Frantz picked up five and four to the West one from where Hill barreled over.

Steve Frontz cutting to the left side, Kelly right, Ziemke up the middle and Nuhfer on option plays to both sides moved Ross on its first series to the West 20. Nuhfer hit Frontz with a pass, his line completion in seven attempts, to the West 4. Kelly slithered through to the one and Frontz went in. Ross led 6-0.

West had its best opportunity to score immediately after when halfback Jerome Petrick took Jerome Brudzinski's kickoff on his own 18 and dashed 50 yards to the Ross 12 before Kelly forced him out of bounds.

## Waite Whips Giants 28-12; Mackey Hurt

TOLEDO — Ross was caught with its defenses down here in Waite Stadium Friday, the big city Indians applying a 28-12 setback.

Rated its strong suit in pre-season estimates and after a 46-0 whitewash of Cleveland West in the Little Giants opener last week, the defense crumbled before a wave of Waite front line chargers and hustling backs.

Ross offense, a new unit meeting its first big test, came through in promising fashion despite a pair of first half bobbles.

One of the few Ross defenders playing well the first quarter was Co-Captain Jay Mackey, 185-pound senior linebacker. Without Mackey, the Waite offense rambled in high gear to a second touchdown in the first half and added a third in the third quarter.

### Ziemke Tallies Two

Ross came back in the final period to score twice to Waite's once, junior fullback Jack Ziemke ramming over from the one both times.

Waite had the ball three times in the first half, going all the way twice and running two plays just before intermission after halting a second Ross drive.

The Indians, led by senior quarterback Bill Nopper, speedy senior halfback Ray Logan and 185-pound junior fullback Walt Shaw, took the opening kickoff and marched 60 yards in 13 plays, all on the ground except for the payoff pitch, a fourth down, seven-yard aerial from Nopper to end Chuck Hurst. The Ross quarterback gained three more on an option play but his handoff to Ziemke on the next play went astray, alert junior halfback Marion Bryan of the Indians recovering on his own 15.

Waite moved 85 yards in 18 plays, ripping apart the Ross front line by outthumping and outchugging the Giant forward wall, especially the right side, to a second TD scored by Tucker from the eight.

There were no runs of more than eight yards in the drive but Nopper did complete an 11-yard pass to Logan. Nopper passed to Tipton for extra points, Waite leading 14-0.

Again Ross stormed back, moving from its own 27 to the Waite 15 where the advance stalled with 1:02 remaining in the half. Nuhfer, with short accurate passes, clicked on throws to junior end Russ Sale, net of 14 yards, and to Frontz for 17 but another one right in Frontz' arms on the Waite 10 was dropped on a third down situation. Nuhfer was then tossed for a two-yard loss by the pesky Bryan, Nopper assisting.

Waite finally was halted on the ground early in the third quarter but Ross couldn't get any drive going, the Indians taking over again after recovering a fourth down fumble on the Giant 47. 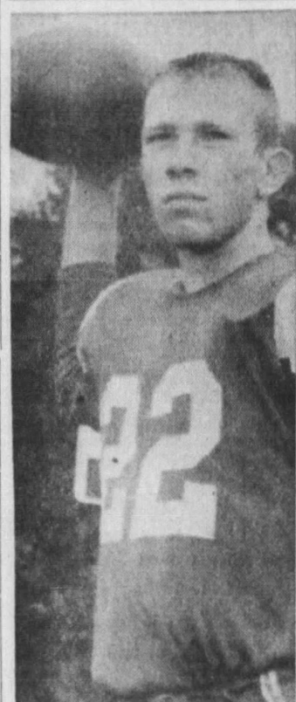

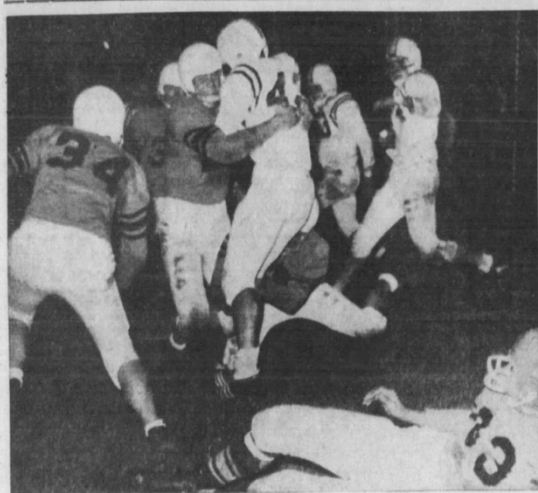

A rallying, gambling, injury-riddled Ross high football team gained a tie for the Buckeye Conference lead with a 20-8 victory over Findlay before some 5,000 fans in Harmon Stadium last night.

Frontz scored the first two Ross touchdowns on two and four-yard runs and Ziemke the final one on a one-yard plunge. Nuhfer ran for two extra points following the second TD.

Findlay took the opening kickoff and moved 70 yards in eight plays for a touchdown with only 2½ minutes elapsed. Big gains were a 32-yard run by halfback Tom Williams and a 24-yard pass to Williams from quarterback Chuck Reimund, the payoff play.

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# Steelers Steal Thunder From Ross, 20-14 Winner

## Giants Survive On Ziemke Runs

LORAIN—A scrappy band of Lorain Steelers, shooting for an upset of mighty Fremont Ross, almost toppled the Little Giants here in George Daniel Stadium last night but couldn't overcome an early deficit.

Ross survived 20-14 before an estimated 4,000 onlookers.

The Giants, by winning, moved into temporary possession of first place in the Buckeye Conference with a 4-0 record and have Marion Harding to beat next Friday at Marion to annex their first league football crown since 1957. The Prexies are 3-0 in the loop and still must meet Sandusky, 2-1, following the Fremont encounter.

### Looking Ahead

"We might have been looking ahead to the Marion game," Coach Mal Mackey of Ross said in explaining the narrow victory over the Steelers. "Our kids were dead that second half and Lorain shot the works. I'm just glad we got out of here without a loss. Their boys put up a great fight."

"Ross, propelled by the driving power of 180-pound junior fullback Jack Ziemke and the picture running and neat faking of senior quarterback Guy Nuh-

fer on option plays, jumped to a 20-8 halftime margin and seemed well on their way to an easy victory.

But the Steelers came back strong in the third quarter to take command. Ross high's defense, a little loose the first half, saved the day in the fourth period by turning back all Steeler threats.

Giant offense, in high gear the first two chapters, was almost nil until late in the game the second half. Lorain changed its defense following intermission, checking the fullback power play of Ross most of the two quarters. Lack of blocking on the Giants' part and a "shooting the gap" type of defense by Lorain quieted the Fremont attack in the final phases.

### Ziemke Gains 191

Ziemke, built low to the ground, ripped the Steelers apart the first half. He gained 150 yards in 11 carries and finished with 191 yards picked up in 19 tries for the game.

Included was a first period 53-yard run that set up the first Ross TD in the initial period. Ziemke burst up the middle from the Ross 26 into the open and was hauled down from behind by Dave Van Tresca of the Steelers on the Lorain 21. Six plays later, Ziemke went in on a ride series from the four. Nuhfer, cleverly faking to Ziemke, carried himself

around end for extra points. Ross led 8-0 with 4:01 left.

The Steelers struck back, driving deep into Fremont territory on a 50-yard pass play from senior quarterback Chick Breeden to Van Tresca to the Ross 18. But Jay Mackey of Ross fell on a Steeler fumble on the Ross 12 to halt the threat.

A Fremont drive of 88 yards continuing into the second period and highlighted by a 15-yard pass from Nuhfer to junior end Russ Sale and a 42-yard touchdown run by Ziemke put the Giants ahead 14-0.

### Long Kickoff Return

Lorain quickly rebounded, Breeden, a great player all evening on offense and defense, returning Jerome Brudinski's kickoff 81 yards for a TD. Van Tresca ran the PAT to put Lorain behind only 14-8.

The Giants put on their best sustained drive of the game following Breeden's electrifying run, moving 70 yards in 15 plays for what proved to be the clinching touchdown. Larry Kelly went over from the four. Big gainers in the drive were a 15-yard run by Ziemke, an 8-yard run by Kelly and a pretty pass of eight yards from Nuhfer to Sale.

Tip-off on the Lorain turnabout came early in the second half when the Steelers halted Ross on three plays forcing Nuhfer to punt, first boot of the game. Lorain went 73 yards in 13 plays, big ones of 19-yard pass from Breeden to Dale Morgan, 11-yard pass from Breeden to Van Tresca and a 13-yard run by fullback Morgan plus two 5-yard penalties against Fremont. Ross defense stiffened to hold Lorain on three downs from the two but finally Fred Wilson nudged his way across on fourth down from the 1-inch line. Wilson's run for the PAT failed, Lorain trailing only 20-14 with 3:10 remaining in the third quarter.

Ross rolled to the Lorain 43 but had to punt starting the fourth quarter. The Steelers couldn't mount any further drive as the defensive crew of Ross, led by Ken Smith, Mackey, Joe Brookmyer, Gary Brauchla and Nuhfer, Leroy Rollins and sophomore Bob Hill in the secondary, preserved the game for the Little Giants.

## Good First Half Provides Prexies 36-8 Loop Victory

Any hopes Ross high's Little Giant grid machine may have cherished of an undisputed Buckeye Conference football title le buried in the mud of Marion Harding stadium.

For it was on the turf of the Prexies' gridiron that Coach Mackey's boys were outcharged, outplayed, and outscored to a final score of 36 to 8 last night before a crowd cut to 2,000 by a heavy rain. The downpour seemed to increase in intensity as the Harding team added up its score.

The game was lost in the first half, and after that Ross could do nothing but wait for the final buzzer. Marion scored all of its 36 first half points before Ross could count a single first down, that coming with only three minutes and 15 seconds to play in the first half.

In the final two periods the Little Giants were good as the well-balanced, hard-driving crew coached by Pete Riesen, but the harm had been done. Ross counted its eight points in the fourth canto, Junior fullback Jack Ziemke taking a handoff from limping Quarterback Guy Nuhfer, breaking over his left guard and cutting for the sideline. He outran Marion defenders to go into the end zone from 45 yards out.

Fighting hard all the way, he added the two points to provide Fremont's total of eight, going over his left tackle into the end zone.

Injuries, illness hurt That Ross high was hurt by injuries cannot be denied. Several boys who had been nursing bruises and sprains after the Lorain game were not able to go at full speed although they kept trying. Kenney Smith, sterling guard, played despite bruises. Joe Brookmeyer, 230-pound tackle, had been ill all week, getting in little or no practice. Others were banged up and unable to carry out fully their offensive or defensive assignments.

The blow that really hurt Ross, at least offensively, was the left ankle injury Quarterback Nuhfer suffered in a light signal practice Thursday evening. Nuhfer was treated with ice packs through much of the night, but his ankle was not able to stand the gaff.

The six foot one senior refused to leave the lineup, however, but he was unable to operate at full efficiency on option plays, and it was necessary to use Junior John Prosser as the punter throughout the game. Two of his boots were partially blocked by hard-driving linemen.

"Must Stop Ziemke" Coach Riesen pinpointed three factors for his team's success: a great desire for revenge after Ross clobbered his Prexies a year ago; realizing that Jack Ziemke must be stopped up the middle, and stacking his defenses to accomplish that goal; trapping the big Ross interior lineman through out the game, and making most of the long gainers as a result of the trap plays.

"We knew we had to stop Ziemke," Riesen said. "And we did." Because of the muddy field, Ross had no place to go because mud slowed Steve Prosser and Larry Kelly, and Nuhfer was unable to do his usually fine job because of his injury.

So far as the successful trapping was concerned, Riesen said: "We didn't know whether we could do it, but we tried. When we saw we could trap successfully there was no reason to change our plans." (In trapping, an offensive lineman permits a defender to come through a line hole, then a secondary blocker bumps the defensive man out of the play and a big hole is open in the defensive line.)

Marion's formation was especially devastating to the Little Giants.

Marion went to work quickly in the first period after winning the toss. It took only one exchange of the ball to get the Prexies rolling.

Ross received a big break after Marion received and was held to six yards in three tries. Jon Wilson punted, but the ball went only 11 yards, and the Little Giants took over on the Marion 37.
