#### Woodville Boosters Map Sports Project To Aid 'Lights' Plan

WOODVILLE — At a recent meeting of the Woodville Athletic Boosters association it was decided to start work on securing Little League baseball play this summer. Initial fund raising project is a basketball doubleheader Saturday.

Three major changes on the Fremont Ross varsity football coaching staff were announced today by Mal Mackey, head mentor.

Al Ziemke, former head basketball coach and freshman football coach the past few years, will take over as coach of the ends on the varsity staff.

Jim Gruden, sophomore coach last year, will be the new varsity backfield pilot.

A new coach yet to be hired will serve as varsity coach of the centers and guards, a post held the past several years by Paul Raines. Raines recently retired. Mackey will be the overall coach of the Little Giants and Jim Janosek will continue as varsity coach of the tackles.

"I'm also thinking of certain specific assignments for the varsity staff such as Ziemke handling defense," Mackey said.

Pete Michaels, varsity backfield coach last season, will take over as coach of the freshman team with John Ihnat his co-coach. Michaels will be in charge.

Bob Auble, varsity end coach last year, will probably be assigned as coach of the sophomore eleven.

Hank Miesle will continue as coach of the eighth graders and Dick Veit as coach of the seventh graders.

"I feel the changes were neces-

sary in view of our losing seasons the past two years," Mackey commented. "Ziemke will add considerable experience to the varsity staff and will strengthen the discipline. Gruden showed capabilities as a backfield coach, especially offensively, while in charge of the sophomores."

Mackey, Ziemke, Janosek, Gruden and Michaels left today to attend the Purdue university coaching clinic. They'll return Saturday night.

## *Giants Tally Four Touchdowns*

Coach Mal Mackey, head pilot of the Fremont Ross Little Giants, was satisfied with the way his team performed in its scrimmage with Toledo Macomber Saturday on the Senior high practice field.

"We might have been a little overconfident going into the scrimmage," Mackey said. "Macomber proved to be a really tough ball club and I think the kids learned that all teams we meet this season will have to be regarded highly."

"They had an excellent set of running backs that caused our defense to lapse at times," Mackey commented. "But, I thought we did a good job overall in holding them to two touchdowns."

Ross outscored Macomber four touchdowns to two. The teams were about on a par when first string units were employed.

The Giant second unit completely outplayed the Macmen's second stringers.

Macomber started the series, ran well, but was checked by penalties.

Ross high's running and passing game was held fairly well on its first series until Quarterback Denny Stine found Halfback John Nighswander open in the right flat about 15 yards down. Nighswander, aided by key blocks, went all the way.

Macomber ripped the right side of Ross high's defense on its second try, its halfbacks, especially chunky and speedy Jordan outrunning the Ross corner backs. Ross defensive end on the right side also was being shoved in. Macomber finally scored on a wide left sweep.

Macomber gained on inside reverses its third series. A short jump pass over the middle brought a second six-pointer.

Maury Gnepper, Jim Ohms, Nighswander and Stine moved the ball well in the third Ross series. Stine, on a fade to the right for a pass or run, took off for a 10-yard TD romp.

## Ross Cuts Down To One-A-Day Drill; Halfback Frontz Hurt

Ross high school football team went to one-a-day instead of the former two-a-day drills Wednesday on the practice field next to Stamm school.

"We've been getting some injuries lately and also it's just too hot to continue the double drills," Head Coach Mal Mackey commented. Practice starts at 3 in the afternoon.

Injuries include three breaks (broken bones, etc) . . . to John Zirkle, 160-pound junior end; Dick Ickes, promising looking 170-pound sophomore back; and to Steve Frontz Wednesday.

"Frontz' injury hurts us quite a bit," Mackey said. "He was com-

ing along well in practice and was giving us that necessary depth at halfback. He's fast too which is something we need in the backfield."

Frontz has a broken bone in the foot. He is a 150-pound junior halfback. Injury may sideline him three weeks.

Jim Ohms, veteran senior halfback, was back in running shape yesterday after being confined to limited work due to a sprain.

"We're coming along pretty good now both on offense and defense," Mackey said.

Ross opens the season a week from Saturday against Louisville Flaget high school, Louisville, Ky.

# Ross, Central In Scrimmage Deadlock, 1-1

Ross high and Toledo Central battled to a 1-1 tie in a scrimmage at Harmon Stadium Saturday.

Central scored another touchdown as second units of both teams collided after first units departed.

The Toledo team is rated about the best in the city by many observers and recently held powerful Massillon to a 1-1 scrimmage tie.

Scrimmage was held under game - like conditions and witnessed by a large turnout of fans.

Both teams were held in check until midway through the scrimmage when Central put on a long touchdown drive. Quarterback, looking for a receiver, decided to run and made a long run to the Ross 13. A pass play into the left Ross secondary clicked and Toledo held a 1-0 TD edge.

The Little Giants bounced right back to knot the score. Criss-cross running plays picked up much yardage, Jim Ohms going to the right side and John Nighswander, other starting halfback, to the left.

Nighswander ran particularly well and picked up several sizable gains. Fullback Maury Gnepper picked up yardage on "draw" plays and Quarterback Dennis Stine on "sneaks."

The Ross drive seemed halted with a fourth down on the Toledo 9 and only one play in its series remaining. But Jerry Fought, 230-pound transfer from Gibsonburg, was inserted into the fullback slot and rammed the nine yards and more for the touchdown, dragging three Central would-be tacklers over the goalline.

Ross defensive play was outstanding on Toledo running plays through the line. Also, the Giants contained Toledo fairly well on sweeps. Pass defense slipped once in a while.

# Ross Has Veterans At Every Position; Lack Of Depth, Speed Main Drawbacks

Ross football team, with lettermen at every position, takes off in quest of its first winning season since 1957 when the Little Giants open an 11-game 1960 schedule at Louisville, Ky., against Louisville Flaget high Saturday night.

The Giants have 15 returning veterans plus one other letterman if he is declared eligible (Jerry Fought, 230-pound senior from Gibsonburg, is enrolled at Ross high and attending classes . . . he lettered as a regular tackle as a sophomore and as an offensive fullback and defensive lineman as a junior at Gibsonburg . . . state athletic board must rule on his use in football by Ross high).

## Deepest Spot

Deepest position for Ross is at guard where four senior lettermen are available. They are George Deichert, 205 pounds; Dick Dundore, 200; Phil Dellasantina, 185; and Earl McCord, 185. Deichert and Dundore will handle first string offensive assignments with McCord and juniors Ken Smith, 165 and Bill Thraves, 150, in reserve. Dellasantina is an inside linebacker on defense and Dundore a defensive end.

Tackle position is manned by four big boys, three of them lettermen. Dave Baylis, 215, and Ken Fry, 225, will be the of-

fensive starters. Bill McCann, 220, is expected to fill a tackle slot defensively. Gary Brauchla, 205, probably will work in both on offense and defense. Fry is the middle guard, on defense and Baylis will probably pair with McCann at tackle on defense. Baylis, Fry and McCann are senior letter-winners, Brauchla a junior non-letterman.

Offensive ends include senior lettermen Tom Geer, 170 and Dan Moran, 170. Behind them are Dave Pankratz, 195, senior and two promising sophomores, Russ Sale, 165 and Felix Palomo, 175. Pankratz has been working at starting defensive end. Palomo is reserve at that spot and Sale as outside linebacker.

Center position has two lettermen, 185-pound senior Scott Decker and 185-pound junior Jay Mackey. Decker is first string on offense and Mackey pairs with Dellasantina as inside linebacker on defense.

Eleven lettermen are linemen and four or possibly five backs are letter-winners.

## Backfield Veterans

Backfield veterans include seniors Dennis Stine, Jim Ohms, John Nighswander, Maurice (Maury) Gnepper and possibly Fought.

Stine will handle starting quar-

terback chores. He is a 180-pounder, strong on "sneaks" up the middle and capable passer. In relief is Guy Nufer, 155, junior. Stine may also play a corner back on defense and Nufer a defensive halfback.

Ohms, 175, and Nighswander, 180, are the "bread-and-butter" ball carriers for Ross. Nighswander is more explosive and also more prone to injury. Ohms is a hard driver from his left halfback post. Behind the two veterans are a host of underclassmen, speedy Steve Frontz, 150, junior, currently out with an injury; Tom Pratt, 155, junior; Dick Ickes, 170, sophomore, also laid up with an injury; Harry Quackenbush, small 130-pound junior but a "gutty" performer; Larry Kelly, 125, sophomore; and Ken Svanoe, 140, sophomore.

Ohms plays defensive deep back and Nighswander sometimes a defensive halfback.

Although small, Gnepper at 135

pounds is the fullback. A sure

tackler as a defensive corner

back, Gnepper also will be used

on offense this season as a "quick-

hitting" fullback through the line.

Jack Ziemke, 170, sophomore, is

Gnepper's relief at offensive full-

back and also is being counted on

as a defensive inside linebacker.

That leaves big Fought, a line-smasher at fullback capable of picking up valuable three or four yards at a clip. Fought is also an excellent blocker. The Gibsonburg transfer, if eligible, would lend needed depth in the backfield.

Head Coach Mai Mackey will employ the wing-T and split-T offense and possibly later the single wing. Ross uses a multiple defense, usually varying from a 5-2.

## Coaching Array

Mackey's varsity assistants are Jim Janosik, returnee as tackle coach; Jim Gruden, moved up from sophomore coach to varsity coach of the backs; Al Ziemke, offensive end coach and in charge of the defensive line; and newcomer to the Ross high system, Dick Fryman, guards and centers pilot.

Main assets of the team are experience, size and winning attitude. Desire has been evident in scrimmages and in practice sessions.

Biggest drawbacks are lack of

depth beyond the lettermen and

lack of speed.

Much will depend on the de-

fense. With not too much speed,

team will not be too explosive;

therefore, may not score heavily.

Defense will have to contain the opposition.

First home game for Ross will be against Akron South, 8 p.m. Friday, September 16 at Harmon Stadium.



All in the starting array on offense are seniors.



All of the defensive platoon are seniors except Brauchla, Mackey and Nuhfer, juniors and Sale and Palomo, sophomores.


Nuhfer saw his first varsity offensive action as quarterback relief for Stine last week and may be called on at times tonight to give the regular senior a "breather."

# Initial Buckeye Win Since 1957 Goal Of Ross At Findlay Friday

Fremont Ross, about this time two years ago at Findlay, went into the dressing room at half-time leading 12-0 after completely outplaying the Trojans the first two periods.

A complete reversal of form took place in the second half, Findlay coming on to score a 14-12 victory.

That was the beginning of a long drought in the Buckeye Conference victory column for the Little Giants. In fact, Ross has not picked up a win in league play since the 1957 campaign.

Four more conference defeats were tacked on after the setback at Findlay and five more followed in 1959—total of 10 straight losses in B. C. competition.

Previously, Ross had amassed a record of 18 victories and only one defeat in the league which began operations in 1954. The Giants won their first two league

starts in 1954, lost 13-0 to Sandusky, then defeated Marion Harding to finish with a 3-1 conference leg. Sandusky was the champion of the B. C. in its first year, 1954, with a 4-0 record.

Ross won the B. C. in 1955, 1956 and 1957 with unblemished 5-0 showing all three years.

## Ross 18-11 In B. C.

Thus, the Giants went from 16 straight B. C. triumphs to 10 losses in a row. In six years of conference activity, Ross still shows a 18-11 won-loss mark.

Marion won the league title in 1958 and Marion, Elyria and Lorain shared honors in 1959.

Only Findlay has yet to win or share a conference football crown.

Over the year, Ross and Findlay have collided 35 times. Fremont winning 22, Findlay 11 and two games ended in ties.

Recently, the Trojans won in

1949 and 1950 with Ross taking command seven straight years, 1951 through 1957.

Findlay defeated Ross 14-12 in 1958 and 29-6 last year.

**Following the Findlay scrap,** Ross plays at Sandusky, at Elyria, Lorain at Fremont and Marion Harding at Fremont in consecutive Buckeye Conference affairs.

The Friday foes appear fairly even this year with Ross possibly rating a touchdown favorite from the statistical standpoint. Ross has scored 90 points in four games, average of 23 per game, while yielding 66 points to opponents, average of 17 per game.

Findlay hasn't scored as well as Ross in its four starts, tallying 30 points for an average of 8 per game, but has done better defensively, giving up 31 points to opponents, an average yield of about the same 8 per game.

Both teams own 2-2 records in pre-conference outings. The Giants dropped a 25-7 decision to Louisville, Ky. Flaget and a 20-8 verdict to Akron South, then bounced back to win two in a row, 43-21 over Toledo Waite and 32-0 over Fostoria.

## Up-And-Down

Findlay has been up-and-down. The Trojans were on the up side with an opening 18-12 win over Defiance, fell the next week 7-0 to Cleveland St. Joseph and the following week to Toledo Scott 12-0 before posting a 12-0 victory over Ashland last Friday.

New coach Hal Paul, late of Steubenville, has had an injury problem, his best back Paul Oren missing the last two games due

to a wrenched back. He may be available against Ross.

## Giants End Conference Jinx; Brauchla Defensive Standout

FINDLAY — A 32-0 league victory over a fumbling Findlay Trojan team here last night puts Fremont Ross into the thick of the Buckeye Conference football race.

The Little Giants ran head-on into undefeated, untried Sandusky last Friday at Strobel Field. Sandusky, the league test against the fleet Blue Streaks will be Fremont's biggest challenge of the season.

Jim Ohms, 125-pound hard-running senior halfback, spearheaded the Little Giants assault on the Trojans to put Fremont in a three-way tie for first place in the conference with Sandusky and Marion Harding, all 1-0.

Ohms hammered at the Findlay line, mainly the Trojan left side, for 137 yards rushing, 100 yards carrying. That's an average of 7.1 yards per play. He scored three touchdowns and also returned a punt 44 yards.

As tough as effective, as Ohms was providing Ross potent one-two punch was scrappy Marty Gnepper, senior fullback who weighs 160 pounds soaking wet. Gnepper carried 14 times, gained 123 yards, one a 55-yard dash up the middle.

Ohms and Gnepper put in extra work. John Nighswander, 185-pound senior, sustained a knee injury early in the first period and was limited the remainder of the game.

The Giants capitalized on Trojan mistakes for three of their five TDs. Findlay bobbed the ball nine times and losing six. Ross also had fumble trouble, losing four of five.

A Findlay bobble on its first play from scrimmage was pounced on by George Deichert of the Giants. On the Findlay 10, Nighswander ran 10 yards and then taking a pitchout from Quarterback Denny Stine, traveled the remaining eight yards of the tackle. Dave Baylis and Dan Moran providing the blocks.

Ross belted away at the end of the first, throughout the entire first half, gaining the ball three more times via Trojan fumbles. A couple of opportunities presented themselves, but Deichert was not taken advantage of but one was for another six-pointer. The other half had Ross in the lead, the game strictly on their own merits. Ross driving 53-yards for the tally.

### Minus Yardage

Meanwhile, Findlay was held scoreless in the first half, but in the first two periods through its own mistakes and through jolting defensive play by Ross. The Trojans had to go to the end zone on the ground the first half.

Tackling of 205-pound junior Gary Brubaker was vicious all evening. He took down Findlay's Mike Lanning for a 25-yard loss, spilled Trojan halfback Jim Ross for a 15-yard safety in the third quarter, which a Trojan march into Ross territory and, again, in the fourth period, tackled Lanning for a 16-yard reversal to halt another Trojan threat.

Brauchla was aided defensively by rugged play of sophomore Ross Sals, corner back Gnepper, middle guard Fought, senior line-backer Paul Plasmanina plus Jay Marks and Bill Morris.

Tackle Baylis, 215-pound senior end Morris and guards Deichert and Dick Dundore in the interior line, plus the two backs for most part on Ohms' bursts of tackle and the latter part along with Ken Fink, Jr., middle Gnepper, dashes up the middle.

### Deceptive Run

Ohms ripped off gains of 4, 16, 11, 2, 10 and 2 yards in the Giants' 18-point second quarter. Nighswander carried for six on a cross buck, was injured and replaced by little 130-pound Tom Remund. The youngster gained three yards his first crack at the Findlay line. Find, 16 yards was negated and Stine, 10 yards, a final piece of deception. The Ross senior quarterback failed to Ohms crossing to his right, the ball in his right hip, and circled left end almost uncovered.

Ross quickly tallied again when junior Tom Williams fell on Findlay's 10. On the middle, Ohms carried all but once, finally operating at tailback from the single wing for a 15-yard power drive right for the third Ross TD.

Ross, 100 yards, 164.

Series of fumbles by both teams featured the early minutes of the third quarter. Ohms took a Findlay punt on his 32, appeared to be in for a 10-yard gain or three tackles picked up blocking and scouted 44 yards to the Findlay 10. Gnepper went from yard 10 to 21, then Stine, 10, and tossed a completed pass to Ohms on the Trojan three. Ohms fumbled, finding recovery.

The Trojans, 10 man in motion, finally mounted a sustained attack to enter Ross territory for the first time, driving, Chuck Remund, junior quarterback, and running of Tom Williams, junior halfback spearheaded the drive which carried into the Findlay end zone.

Remund had a running play, was injured. Lanning taking over his quarterback post. A 10-yard gain was made and Brauchla sifted through to send Robertson spinning for a 10-yard run to kill the drive.

Gnepper passed the middle for 59 yards to the Findlay 25 but the Trojans stiffened, taking over on downs, then the ball.

Lanning's running showed Findlay into Ross territory but his passes missed the mark. Ross taking over on his own 47.

Stine passed 22 yards to Moran, but Ross high's running game was halted on the Findlay 23. Lan-

ning fumbled on Findlay's first play, the ever-present Brauchla recovering. The Giants scored in three plays. Stine gaining five early in the second period and 10 in the third, plus a 10-yard sweep up the middle and Fought, swishing the backfield offensively in the final nine, also eight ahead.

Ross marched 77 yards for its final TD, Gnepper and Ohms picking up short yardage and Quackenbush breaking away on a 26-yard sprint. A Stine to Ohms pass put the ball on the Findlay 10. Gnepper, 10 yards, drove over his own right side, batted over two Trojan defenders into the end zone.

Ohms, suffering from leg cramps, was removed from the game, both the Findlay and Fremont fans giving him a tremendous ovation.

Ross had three four previous extra point tries but succeeded on the last one via an unorthodox, unplanned play. Gnepper was the holder. It was to be a fake, Gnepper, taking the snap from center, supposed to drop back and fire a pass. Just before the ball was snapped, Gnepper informed Deichert that his finger had just been banged. Gnepper took the snap, referred to Deichert who arched an arrow to Meier for two extra points.

**VICTORY** was the first in the Buckeye Conference for Ross since 1957. Ten straight defeats had been taken by the Little Giants in the league competition through 1958 and 1959.

"We've broken the losing jinx in the conference," Coach Mal Moran said. "Maybe this is all we need to get us back on top in league play."

**Running Game**

Findlay was a bousing affair, players on both teams limping off the field. Paul Ohms, Findlay halfback who had missed the first half, was the star. Due to a wrenched back, was sidelined after his first carry in the first period with a possible fracture. (Star) Nighswander was the most serious Ross injury, others coming up with slight leg and arm bruising.

Ross now stands three wins, two losses for the season, the three victories thus far representing the total number of successes for the entire past two campaigns. Findlay is now 2-3 in all games.

# Sandusky Rolls Over Ross In Second Half; Wins 32-0

SANDUSKY—Powerhouse Sandusky, held in check the first half by Fremont Ross, controlled play most of the second half to rip the Little Giants 32-0 here Friday.

Performing before one of the largest crowds in Strobel Field history, an estimated 10,200 onlookers, Coach Earle Bruce's "Gallopin' Gooses" plus a couple of other backs named Smith and Williams broke through the stubborn Ross defense for three touchdowns in the final two periods. Sandusky offense was augmented by tough defensive play of the Streak forwards all evening.

The "Gooses," halfbacks Ben Espy and Judge Scruggs, were stopped the first time this season on long gainers but picked up considerable short yardage in the third and fourth quarters. Espy, a 13-touchdown producer going into the game, was held without

a TD the first time this year. His four extra points runs his season total to 88.

Espy's longest run from scrimmage was 15 yards and Scruggs' 21.

Scruggs scored twice, on runs of seven and 21 yards and also ran for two extra points to run his season total to 58.

Smith is McRay Smith, 172-pound senior fullback and Williams is Stewart Williams, 206-pound sophomore, also a fullback. Smith tallied on a one-yard plunge and Williams on a two-yard burst. Williams followed his own TD with a run for extra points that closed out the scoring in the fourth chapter.

## Longest Gain

It was Smith's belly series dash up the middle for 36 yards, longest rushing gain of the game, in the second period that started the Blue Streak express on its way.

First period resulted in a standstill, the punting of Fremont's Guy Nuhfer, a junior, and Sandusky's Gary Butler, sharing billing with rugged defensive performances by both squads.

Nuhfer boomed one punt way over the head of Espy, the ball rolling out of bounds 57 yards away from the line of scrimmage. Nuhfer had another 38-yard kick and Butler one of 43 and another of 45 yards.

Following Butler's punt, which rolled dead on the Ross 29, first period ended.

## Ross Threatens

Ross made its most serious threat in the game at the beginning of the second quarter (except for a flurry in the closing seconds of the contest). John Nighswander, playing with a damaged knee, ran his only play of the game, a sweep of four yards. From the single wing, Jim Ohms and Maury Gnepper pushed to the SHS 44. Sophomore fullback Jack Ziemke, replacing the injured Nighswander, quarterback Denny Stine and Ohms ran for short yardage to give Ross a first down on the Sandusky 29.

Ziemke, playing in his first Varsity encounter on offense, gained a few yards up the middle but fumbled. Jim Stierhoff of SHS recovering on his own 23. That was the last Ross offensive spurt until late in the game.

Smith, on the first play from scrimmage, zoomed up the middle 36 yards to the Ross 41 before Ohms hauled him down.

SHS moved 77 yards in nine plays, including Smith's long gainer, to score, Scruggs carrying the final seven. Espy ran the points after. First half ended 2 1/2 minutes later.

It was all Sandusky in the third quarter which ended with the Streaks on top 24-0.

Scruggs took a Nuhfer punt on his 40, returned to the Ross 47. Espy, Smith and Scruggs carried the ball in five running plays for a second TD. Scruggs tallying from the 21. Espy ran for two added points.

Third Sandusky TD came with

20 seconds remaining in the third stanza, Smith climaxing a 72-yard drive in seven plays with a one-yard burst.

Quarterback Tom Rudolph had a hand in the third six-pointer, his third down pass to end Ed Bryant for 10 yards resulting in a first down and another third down pass to Espy, who made a fine catch on the Ross 13 to complete a 27-yard play, keeping the march moving.

Scruggs picked off one of Stine's passes in the fourth period on the SHS 30 and returned to his own 41. Espy paired with Williams on 10 of 11 running plays. Williams finally cracking over from the two to complete a 59-yard drive.

Stine combined with Ohms on passes of nine, 24 and 15 yards and Gnepper galloped 15 yards on a run as Ross reached the Sandusky 11 as time ran out.

Ohms caught six of Stine's passes in the game.

Ross defense, led by linebacker Phil Dellasantina, corner back Gnepper and halfbacks Ohms and Nuhfer, held Espy to 41 yards on 12 running plays in the first half and Scruggs to 36 yards on nine rushes.

Espy, doing better the second half, gained 124 yards in the game in 25 attempts. Smith 85 in eight and Scruggs 57 in 14. Ohms was the only effective gainer for Ross, picking up 47 yards in nine rushes. Most of his yardage was amassed in the first half.

Victory gives Sandusky a 6-0 season record and 2-0 Buckeye Conference log. The Giants are 3-3 for the year and 1-1 in the league.

Ross plays at Elyria next Friday, 7 p.m. Fremont time. The Elyrians are winless and scoreless in six games.

Coach Mal Mackey of Ross said the almost negative use of Nighswander on offense due to his knee injury killed any offensive punch. "All they had to do was bottle up Ohms," he explained.

Mackey also said the Giants were a "dead club" in the second half although trailing only 8-0 at intermission.

Coach Bruce termed the victory

"our best team effort of the season and our best game." He also said his boys played their finest defensive ball of the year (the Streaks held Ross high's offense to only 107 yards rushing and 87 passing).

### Brown Expects Tough Contest With Steelers

CLEVELAND (AP) — The Cleveland Browns are looking for a tough battle against the Steelers in Pittsburgh Sunday afternoon despite the difference in the record of the two teams that will meet.

Cleveland has 21 points — a total second only to that of the Baltimore Colts in the National Football League—and has permitted only 130, the third best performance in the league.

The Browns are a bit behind the Steelers with a 5-2 record, but are a game behind the Philadelphia Eagles in the NFL's Eastern Conference race.

The Steelers are out of the race with a 5-1 record. They have scored only 170 points and permitted 210.

But the Browns remember what happened last season. Pittsburgh beat them twice, 17-7 and 21-20. That second defeat was the beginning of the end for the Browns, who finished the year with a five-game winning streak.

The Browns are expecting a rough time with quarterback Bob Layne, who has always provided a rugged opposition for them, this time with the Detroit Lions or with Pittsburgh.

In their first meeting with the Steelers this season, the Browns beat the Lions in a 21-10 lead, but Layne then came into them in the fourth quarter and hung on to win, 28-20.

Layne has missed one game this year and has been handicapped by a sore shoulder. He has been throwing his shoulder, but he still ranks fourth among NFL passers. He has completed 68 of 136 passes for 1,228 yards and 11 touchowns.
