Woodville Boosters Map Sports Project To Aid 'Lights' Plan

WOODVILLE — At a recent meeting of the Woodville Athletic Boosters association it was decided to start work on securing Little League baseball play this summer. Initial fund raising project is a basketball doubleheader Saturday.

Three major changes on the Fremont Ross varsity football coaching staff were announced today by Mal Mackey, head mentor.

Al Ziemke, former head basketball coach and freshman football coach the past few years, will take over as coach of the ends on the varsity staff.

Jim Gruden, sophomore coach last year, will be the new varsity backfield pilot.

A new coach yet to be hired will serve as varsity coach of the centers and guards, a post held the past several years by Paul Raines. Raines recently retired. Mackey will be the overall coach of the Little Giants and Jim Janosek will continue as varsity coach of the tackles.

"I'm also thinking of certain specific assignments for the varsity staff such as Ziemke handling defense," Mackey said.

Pete Michaels, varsity backfield coach last season, will take over as coach of the freshman team with John Ihnat his co-coach. Michaels will be in charge.

Bob Auble, varsity end coach last year, will probably be assigned as coach of the sophomore eleven.

Hank Miesle will continue as coach of the eighth graders and Dick Veit as coach of the seventh graders.

"I feel the changes were neces-

sary in view of our losing seasons the past two years," Mackey commented. "Ziemke" will add considerable experience to the varsity staff and will strengthen the discipline. Gruden showed capabilities as a backfield coach, especially offensively, while in charge of the sophomores."

Mackey, Ziemke, Janosek, Gruden and Michaels left today to attend the Purdue university coaching clinic. They'll return Saturday night.

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Giants Tally Four Touchdowns

Coach Mal Mackey, head pilot of the Fremont Ross Little Giants, was satisfied with the way his team performed in its scrimmage with Toledo Macomber Saturday on the Senior high practice field.

"We might have been a little overconfident going into the scrimmage," Mackey said. "Macomber proved to be a really tough ball club and I think the kids learned that all teams we meet this season will have to be regarded highly."

"They had an excellent set of running backs that caused our defense to lapse at times," Mackey commented. "But, I thought we did a good job overall in holding them to two touchdowns."

Ross outscored Macomber four touchdowns to two. The teams were about on a par when first string units were employed.

The Giant second unit completely outplayed the Macmen's second stringers.

Macomber started the series, ran well, but was checked by penalties.

Ross high's running and passing game was held fairly well on its first series until Quarterback Denny Stine found Halfback John Nighswander open in the right flat about 15 yards down. Nighswander, aided by key blocks, went all the way.

Macomber ripped the right side of Ross high's defense on its second try, its halfbacks, especially chunky and speedy Jordan outrunning the Ross corner backs. Ross defensive end on the right side also was being shoved in. Macomber finally scored on a wide left sweep.

Macomber gained on inside reverses its third series. A short jump pass over the middle brought a second six-pointer.

Maury Gnepper, Jim Ohms, Nighswander and Stine moved the ball well in the third Ross series. Stine, on a fade to the right for a pass or run, took off for a 10-yard TD romp.

Gnepper went up the middle about 45 yards for a third Ross touchdown and Larry Kelly, of the second unit, ran for a final Ross TD.

Ross offense gained strength as the scrimmage lengthened. Giant defense, on the left side, was particularly strong all morning, especially the corner back work of Gnepper.

Teams engaged in numerous fist fights during the scrimmage, both being highly keyed up.

'TOO HOT' MAL SAYS . . .

Ross Cuts Down To One-A-Day Drill; Halfback Frontz Hurt

Ross high school football team went to one-a-day instead of the former two-a-day drills Wednesday on the practice field next to Stamm school.

"We've been getting some injuries lately and also it's just too hot to continue the double drills," Head Coach Mal Mackey commented. Practice starts at 3 in the afternoon.

Injuries include three breaks (broken bones, etc) . . . to John Zirkle, 160-pound junior end; Dick Ickes, promising looking 170-pound sophomore back; and to Steve Frontz Wednesday.

"Frontz' injury hurts us quite a bit," Mackey said. "He was com-

ing along well in practice and was giving us that necessary depth at halfback. He's fast too which is something we need in the backfield."

Frontz has a broken bone in the foot. He is a 150-pound junior halfback. Injury may sideline him three weeks.

Jim Ohms, veteran senior halfback, was back in running shape yesterday after being confined to limited work due to a sprain.

"We're coming along pretty good now both on offense and defense," Mackey said.

Ross opens the season a week from Saturday against Louisville Flaget high school, Louisville, Ky.

Ross, Central In Scrimmage Deadlock, 1-1

Ross high and Toledo Central battled to a 1-1 tie in a scrimmage at Harmon Stadium Saturday.

Central scored another touchdown as second units of both teams collided after first units departed.

The Toledo team is rated about the best in the city by many observers and recently held powerful Massillon to a 1-1 scrimmage tie.

Scrimmage was held under game-like conditions and witnessed by a large turnout of fans.

Both teams were held in check until midway through the scrimmage when Central put on a long touchdown drive. Quarterback, looking for a receiver, decided to run and made a long run to the Ross 13. A pass play into the left Ross secondary clicked and Toledo held a 1-0 TD edge.

The Little Giants bounced right back to knot the score. Criss-cross running plays picked up much yardage, Jim Ohms going to the right side and John Nighswander, other starting halfback, to the left.

Nighswander ran particularly well and picked up several sizable gains. Fullback Maury Gnepper picked up yardage on "draw" plays and Quarterback Dennis Stine on "sneaks."

The Ross drive seemed halted with a fourth down on the Toledo 9 and only one play in its series remaining. But Jerry Fought, 230-pound transfer from Gibsonburg, was inserted into the fullback slot and rammed the nine yards and more for the touchdown, dragging three Central would-be tacklers over the goalline.

Ross defensive play was outstanding on Toledo running plays through the line. Also, the Giants contained Toledo fairly well on sweeps. Pass defense slipped once in a while.

Ross Has Veterans At Every Position; Lack Of Depth, Speed Main Drawbacks

Ross football team, with lettermen at every position takes off in quest of its first winning season since 1957 when the Little Giants open an 11-game 1960 schedule at Louisville, Ky., against Louisville Faget high Saturday night.

The Giants have 15 returning veterans plus one other letterman if he is declared eligible (Jerry Fought, 230-pound senior from Gibsonburg, is enrolled at Ross high and attending classes . . . he lettered as a regular tackle as a sophomore and as an offensive fullback and defensive lineman as a junior at Gibsonburg . . . state athletic board must rule on his use in football by Ross high).

Deepest Spot
Deepest position for Ross is at guard where four senior lettermen are available. They are George Deichert, 205 pounds; Dick Dundore, 200; Phil Dellasantina, 185; and Earl McCord, 185. Deichert and Dundore will handle first string offensive assignments with McCord and juniors Ken Smith, 165 and Bill Thraves, 150 in reserve. Dellasantina is an inside linebacker on defense and Dundore a defensive end.

Tackle position is manned by four big boys, three of them lettermen, Dave Baylis, 213, and Ken Fry, 225, will be the of-

fensive starters. Bill McCann, 220, is expected to fill a tackle spot defensively. Gary Brauchla, 205, probably will work in both on offense and defense. Fry is the middle guard on defense and Baylis will probably pair with McCann at tackle on defense. Baylis, Fry and McCann are senior letter-winners, Brauchla a junior non-letterman.

Offensive ends include senior lettermen Tom Geer, 170 and Dan Moran, 170. Behind them are Dave Pankratz, 195, senior and two promising sophomores, Russ Sale, 165 and Felix Palomo, 175. Pankratz has been working at starting defensive end, Palomo as reserve at that spot and Sale as outside linebacker.

Center position has two lettermen, 185-pound senior Scott Decker and 185-pound junior Jay Mackey. Decker is first string on offense and Mackey pairs with Dellasantina as inside linebacker on defense.

Eleven lettermen are linemen and four or possibly five backs are letter-winners.

Backfield Veterans
Backfield veterans include seniors Dennis Stine, Jim Ohms, John Nighswander, Maurice (Maury) Gnepper and possibly Fought.

Stine will handle starting quar-

terback chores. He is a 180-pounder, strong on "sneaks" up the middle and capable passer. In relief is Guy Nuhfer, 155, junior. Stine may also play a corner back on defense and Nuhfer a defensive halfback.

Ohms, 175, and Nighswander, 180, are the "bread-and-butter" ball carriers for Ross. Nighswander is more explosive and also more prone to injury. Ohms is a hard driver from his left half-back post. Behind the two veterans are a host of underclassmen, speedy Steve Frontz, 150, junior, currently out with an injury; Tom Pratt, 155, junior; Dick Ickes, 170, sophomore, also laid up with an injury; Harry Quackenbush, small 130-pound junior but a "gutty" performer; Larry Kelly, 125, sophomore; and Ken Svanoe, 140, sophomore.

Ohms plays defensive deep back and Nighswander sometimes a defensive halfback.

Although small, Gnepper at 155 pounds is the fullback. A sure tackler as a defensive corner back, Gnepper also will be used on offense this season as a "quick-hitting" fullback through the line. Jack Ziemke, 170, sophomore, is Gnepper's relief at offensive fullback and also is being counted on as a defensive inside linebacker.

That leaves big Fought, a line-smasher at fullback capable of picking up valuable three or four yards at a clip. Fought is also an excellent blocker. The Gibsonburg transfer, if eligible, would lend needed depth in the backfield.

Head Coach Mal Mackey will employ the wing-T and split-T offense and possibly later the single wing. Ross uses a multiple defense, usually varying from a 5-4-2.

Coaching Array
Mackey's varsity assistants are Jim Janosek, returnee as tackle coach; Jim Gruden, moved up from sophomore coach to varsity coach of the backs; Al Ziemke, offensive end coach and in charge of the defensive line; and newcomer to the Ross high system, Dick Fryman, guards and centers pilot.

Main assets of the team are experience, size and winning attitude. Desire has been evident in scrimmages and in practice sessions.

Biggest drawbacks are lack of depth beyond the lettermen and lack of speed.

Much will depend on the defense. With not too much speed, team will not be too explosive; therefore, may not score heavily.

Defense will have to contain the opposition.

First home game for Ross will be against Akron South, 8 p.m. Friday, September 16 at Harmon Stadium.

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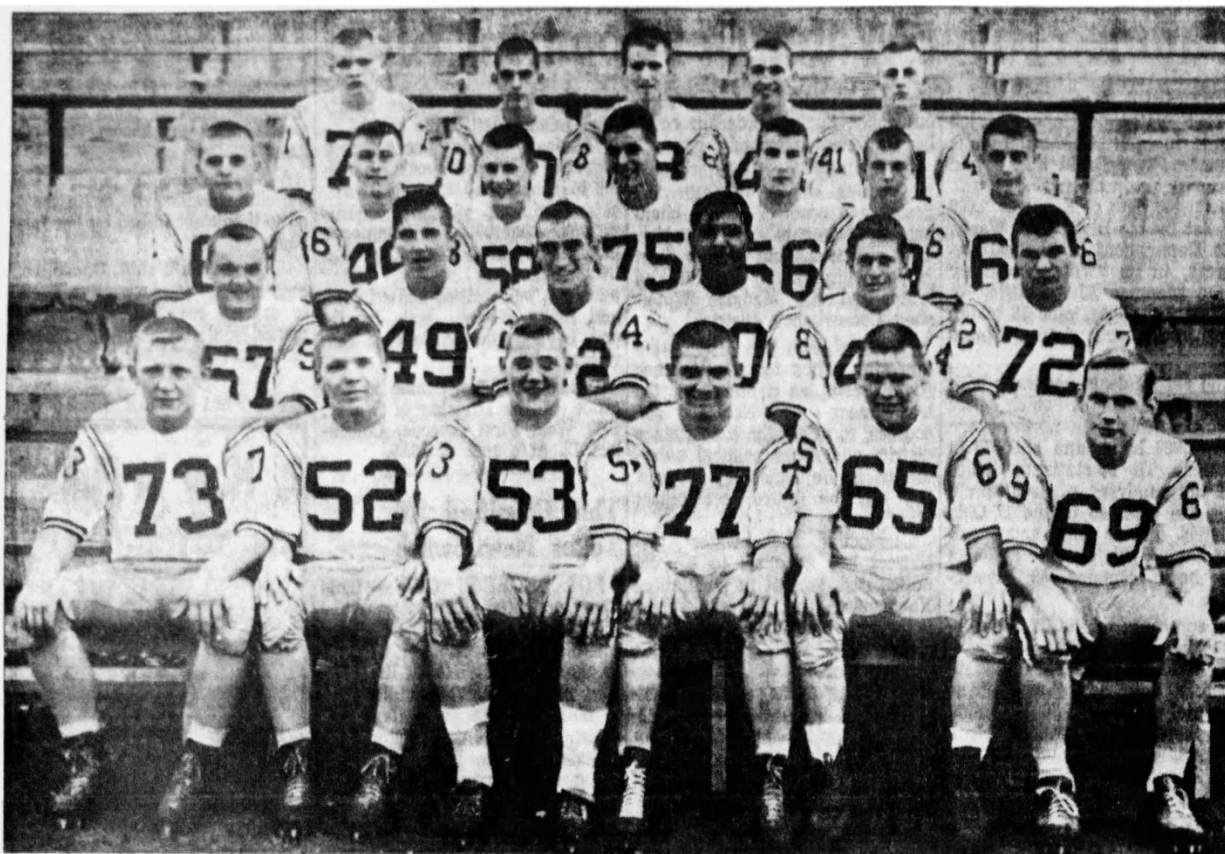

Little Giants Attempt To Gain Victory Column

Toledo Waite's Indians, foe of Fremont Ross at 8 tonight in Harmon Stadium, have practically a brand new club as compared to the one that defeated the Little Giants 24-20 at Toledo last fall.

Only starter offensively from that Waite team back this year is Roger Varraber, 160, senior end and co-captain.

Substitutes against Ross last year who are regulars in 1960 were Larry Bass, 156, senior quarterback; Ralph Kimbers, 152, senior halfback and Frank Coughlin, 145, senior halfback.

Waite Starters

Against Youngstown North in

Waite's opener last week won by the Indians 20-0, Vorraber paired with Paul Reed, 152, senior at end; tackles were Paul Gercak, 232, senior and Paul Welch, 187, senior; guards, Jeffrey Adams, 147, senior and Bob Lengel, 175, junior, and center Eddie Miller, co-captain, 195, senior.

Bass was the quarterback with Coughlin and Kimbers the halfbacks and Grover Cummings, 207, junior at fullback.

Defensively, Reed, Vorraber, Gercak, Lengel, Miller, Bass, Coughlin and Kimbers remain in the lineup.

Dan Duran, 230, junior moves

into the line on defense, John Pisula, 160, senior and Dave Schuetter, 155, junior enter the backfield on defense.

Cummings is a power runner up the middle while Kimbers and Coughlin are threats inside and outside. Bass also carries the ball from his quarterback slot.

Lengel was a demon on defense against Youngstown, blocking two punts and recovering a fumble, all leading to Waite touchdowns.

Pete Fanning is in his second year as Waite head coach. He succeeded Elmer Scallish, now at Purdue university.

Last year, Waite won over Youngstown North in its opener 20-6 before topping Ross the next week by four points.

Probables For Ross

Coach Mal Mackey of Ross high probably will start seniors Dan Moran and Tom Geer at ends; Baylis, tackles; seniors Dick Dundore and George Deichert, guards; senior Scott Decker, center; and an all-senior backfield of Dennis Stine, quarterback, Jim Ohms and John Nighswander, halfbacks and Maury Gnepper, fullback.

Defensively, senior Bill McCann and possibly sophomore Felix Palomo will join the front line with junior Jay Mackey and senior Phil Dellasantina coming in as linebackers and sophomore Russell Sale and junior Guy Nuhfer at corner backs. Nuhfer is nursing an injury but probably will be available by game time.

Ross Gets Untracked — St. Joe Bo

Plus-5,000 Crowd Views Initial
Ross Success, 43-21 Over Waite

A "must" win one to relieve the frustrations of the past two losing seasons and two reversals earlier this month, was scored emphatically at Harmon Stadium last night where Fremont Ross riddled Toledo Waite 43 to 21.

Coach Mal Mackey's charges ended a three-game losing streak extending from the final game of 1959 and made this season's record stand at 1-2. Waite is now 1-1.

Ross won only one game in 1958 (over Fostoria) after three straight undefeated seasons. Only two wins were notched last year (Fostoria again and Bedford or near Cleveland in the next to last game). Fostoria visits Ross next Friday.

The high scoring Ross-Waite attraction, viewed by well over 5,000 spectators and played in perfect football weather, was a thriller from start to finish.

Ross, unlike in losing efforts to Louisville, Ky. Flag and Akron South, jumped to a quick 14-0 advantage, held off two Toledo rallies and finished with a flourish. Taking the opening kickoff, returned by halfback Jim Ohms 25 yards to the Ross 43, the Little Giants reached the Indians goal in five plays. Ohms picked up 18 yards in two rushes, halfback John Nighwander four and fullback Maury Gnepper seven yards in solo jaunts to the Waite 26.

Caught Defense Napping
Quarterback Denny Stine, who rectified signal-calling errors and "fumbly" of the first two games, spotted Waite's defense of 19 players on front and only one secondary defender. He checked signals, sending left end Tom Geer into the unprotected right Waite secondary where he arched a short pass, Geer caught it, moved unmolested the remainder of the 26 yards for six points. Only two minutes, 17 seconds had elapsed.

Shortly after a defensive maneuver by Ohms put the Giants in command, Waite threatened but couldn't completely recover the rest of the game.

Junior Jay Mackey and sophomore Russ Sale, who played an excellent game on defense at corner back and seems headed for a brilliant gridiron career, tossed Waite halfback Ralph Kimbers for no yardage on two consecutive plays. Quarterback Bill Nopper, playing in place of regular Larry Bass, tried a third down pass which was picked off by Ohms on the Waite 41. He cut down the sidelines, received a key block from Gnepper and went over. Nighwander ran for extra points and Ross led 14-0 with 8:50 remaining in the initial period.

The early quick scoring set a game pattern. Seven more touchdowns were counted, Ross adding four more, two each by Nighwander and 200-pound senior transfer from Gibsonburg, Jerry Fought.

Important Item
An important item in the contest, outside of Ross' high scoring, was a mental block caused by a succession of almost steady defeats over a span of 22 games and a desire to "win this one," was Stine's passing.

The senior signal-caller had a great night before being ejected, along with Waite's senior co-captain end Roger Vorraber, midway in the third period due to a squabble.

Confident and poised for the first time this season, Stine completed five of five passes for 111 yards, two resulting in touchdowns. Early one to Geer gave Ross a vital lead. Second TD aerial good for 36 yards, caught nautly on the run by Nighwander, pushed Ross ahead by two touchdowns after Waite had roared back with a 2-6 halftime deficit to score early in the third quarter and cut the Giants' margin to only eight points.

Stine also hit Nighwander with an 18-yard pass, nimble John making a spectacular lunging grab to set up a yardage touchdown. White's third TD, Bailey Fought tallied that one, in the second quarter, on a four-yard plunge.

Stine also connected with end Dan Moran and Ohms on pass plays.

Nutter Gets Chance
Guy Nutter, a junior who plays regularly as defensive halfback, got his first chance in a varsity game at offensive quarterback when Stine was ejected. Although a little nervous, Nutter handled the club well and directed the final two Ross touchdowns. He also

completed a pass to Dave Pankratz which set up the final Fremont TD, a one-yard run by Fought on the final play of the game.

Nutter directed the team on an 81-yard march late in the third period and into the early part of the fourth, capped by Nighwander's quick-hitter over left guard for 26 yards and the six-point. Ohms had set up the scoring opportunity with a 35-yard run to plays earlier.

Fought, who carried twice on offense, both times for touchdowns, played a rugged game in the middle of the Ross line on defense. Ohms and Nighwander ran well, Ohms hitting his own right tackle spot with gaining holes and Nighwander going wide outside the Waite right tackle. Gnepper drew several key blocks. Gary Brauchia was in on many tackles as were inside linebackers Mackey and Phil Dellasantina, and the entire offense line for Ross blocked sharply. George Deicher and Dave Baylis especially.

Waite's first period score was set up on a 24-yard pass from Nopper to Kimbers. Ray Logan went all the way from the Ross 27 but the play was called back. Next play, Frank Coughlin tossed a pass into the end zone for Vorraber, not caught but ruled complete via pass interference on Ohms' part according to the officials. Big junior fullback, 207-pound Roger Cummings rammed over from the one (ball placed there after the pass interference ruling) in two tries.

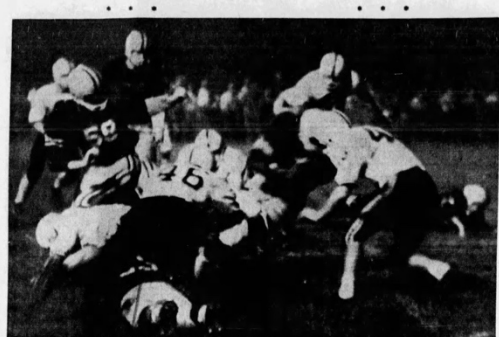

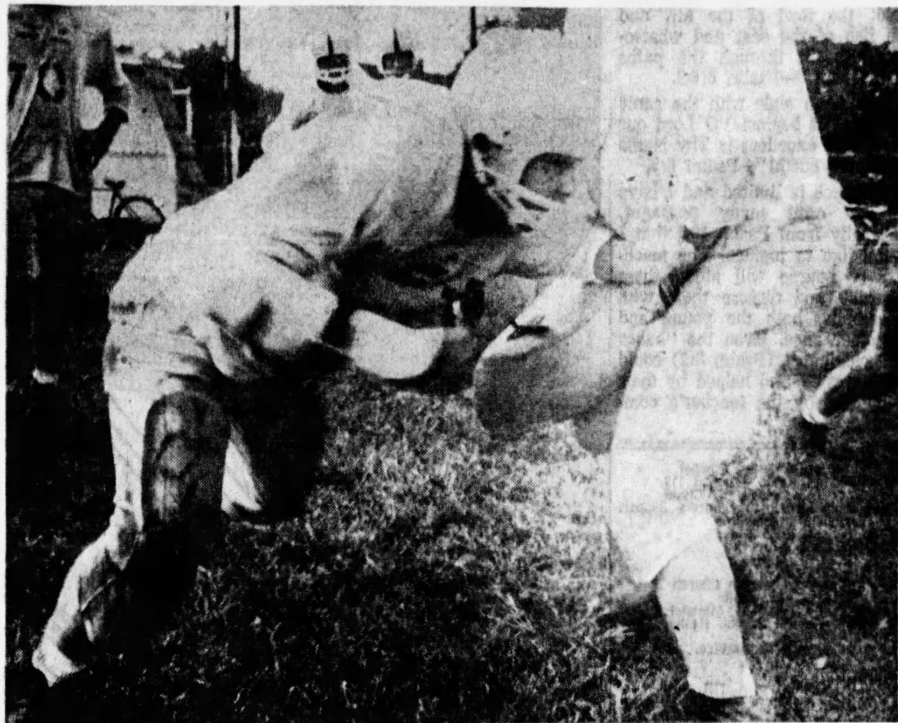

Longest winning streak since 1957 will be carried by Fremont Ross' high Little Giants into Buckeye Conference warfare beginning next week at Findlay. The Giants won their second straight last night in Hamon Stadium, a 32-0 triumph achieved mainly in the second half after Fostoria's defense held Fremont rolling through most of the first half. Victory, before no more than 4,000 spectators, was Fremont's sixth in a row over the Redmen and the 21st in 26 meetings.

Ross had not won two in a row since putting together 29 straight victories in the glory days of 1955-56-57.

First Score

Fremont again stopped the Fostoria attack, taking over after Grant Jackson's punt on the Ross 28. Halfback Jim Ohms, a hard runner all evening, dashed 18 yards. Nighswander almost went the distance on a 12-yard romp.

Nighswander and Gnepper carried to Fostoria 29 as the first quarter ended.

Ross drive stalled to start the second stanza, Fostoria taking command the remainder of the period and almost punching over a score.

It appeared that Ross had a let-down after an easy start.

The Redmen of Coach Doug Thompson threw a radical wide spread at Ross, quarterback and center lining up on one side of the field and the other nine players far to the other side. Quarterback Tom McClung considered a 40-yard pass to End Tim Carman from the spread. Returning to the regular formation, McClung hit end John Kohres with a short aerial.

Fostoria's line rushing him out of bounds on the Ross 11.

McClung got as far as the Ross seven but defensive plays by Phil Dellastina and Guy Nuhler stalled the Redmen.

Fostoria made one more advance, this time all the way to the Ross one. But the Giant defense, rugged against running plays all evening, managed to spill the Redmen back to the three where Fremont took over.

McClung's 15-yard pass to Carman, an 8-yard run by Jackson who was held to minus yardage during the game, 16-yard run by Fostoria's leading ground gainer Cousins and short bursts by Jackson and Cousins put Fostoria on the Ross one. Sophomore Russ Sale checked McClung for no gain and Dick Dandore, Dellastina and Nuhler spilled Cousins for a two-yard loss.

Initial Buckeye Win Since 1957 Goal Of Ross At Findlay Friday

Fremont Ross, about this time two years ago at Findlay, went into the dressing room at half-time leading 12-0 after completely outplaying the Trojans the first two periods.

A complete reversal of form took place in the second half. Findlay coming on to score a 14-12 victory.

That was the beginning of a long drought in the Buckeye Conference victory column for the Little Giants. In fact, Ross has not picked up a win in league play since the 1957 campaign.

Four more conference defeats were tacked on after the setback at Findlay and five more followed in 1959—total of 10 straight losses in B. C. competition.

Previously, Ross had amassed a record of 18 victories and only one defeat in the league which began operations in 1954. The Giants won their first two league

starts in 1954, lost 13-0 to Sandusky, then defeated Marion Harding to finish with a 3-1 conference leg. Sandusky was the champion of the B. C. in its first year, 1954, with a 4-0-1 record.

Ross won the B. C. in 1955, 1956 and 1957 with unblemished 5-0 showing all three years.

Ross 18-11 In B. C.

Thus, the Giants went from 16 straight B. C. triumphs to 10 losses in a row. In six years of conference activity, Ross still shows a 18-11 won-loss mark.

Marion won the league title in 1958 and Marion, Elyria and Lorain shared honors in 1959.

Only Findlay has yet to win or share a conference football crown.

Over the year, Ross and Findlay have collided 35 times. Fremont winning 22, Findlay 11 and two games ended in ties.

Recently, the Trojans won in

1949 and 1950 with Ross taking command seven straight years, 1951 through 1957.

Findlay defeated Ross 14-12 in 1958 and 29-6 last year.

Following the Findlay scrap, Ross plays at Sandusky, at Elyria, Lorain at Fremont and Marion Harding at Fremont in consecutive Buckeye Conference affairs.

The Friday foes appear fairly even this year with Ross possibly rating a touchdown favorite from the statistical standpoint. Ross has scored 90 points in four games, average of 23 per game, while yielding 66 points to opponents, average of 17 per game.

Findlay hasn't scored as well as Ross in its four starts, tallying 30 points for an average of 8 per game, but has done better defensively, giving up 31 points to opponents, an average yield of about the same 8 per game.

Both teams own 2-2 records in pre-conference outings. The Giants dropped a 25-7 decision to Louisville, Ky. Flaget and a 20-8 verdict to Akron South, then bounced back to win two in a row, 43-21 over Toledo Waite and 32-0 over Fostoria.

Up-And-Down

Findlay has been up-and-down. The Trojans were on the up side with an opening 18-12 win over Defiance, fell the next week 7-0 to Cleveland St. Joseph and the following week to Toledo Scott 12-0 before posting a 12-0 victory over Ashland last Friday.

New coach Hal Paul, late of Steubenville, has had an injury problem, his best back Paul Oren missing the last two games due

to a wrenched back. He may be available against Ross.

Oren is a 145-pound senior halfback and one of six returning Findlay lettermen. Others are Rex Ritter, 147, junior halfback; Jerry Sutton, 160, senior, end; Tom Williams, 145, junior, halfback; Chuck Collins, co-captain, 205, senior, guard; and Mike Lanning, co-captain, 157, senior, fullback, who also can fill in at quarterback.

Findlay, under Coach Paul, uses the 'T' formation with an unbalanced line and a lonesome end. Brad Rice, senior, is the frequent lonesome end.

Regular quarterback is Chuck Reimund, a junior. Williams and either Oren or Jim Robertson, a junior, will be at halfbacks on offense with Carl Spittler, a junior, at fullback.

Rice, Dane Shields, a senior and Paul Thomas, a junior are the ends; Bob Traupe, a junior and Doug Thorne, a senior, the tackles; Collins and Scott Renninger, a junior, the guards with Dan Brown, a senior, at center.

Defensively, Mike Shafer, a senior, Ted Brim, a senior, Ritter, Lanning, Bill Geiger, a senior and Don Faulkner enter the lineup.

Findlay's line averages 183 pounds and its backfield 148.

The Trojans' scoring has been confined to two touchdowns by Williams, one on a pass from Lanning, and one each by Oren, Robertson and Spittler.

Ross high will present a bigger in weight lineup compared to

Findlay with the forwards going close to 200 pounds and the backs 170-plus.

John Nighswander, senior halfback, is the Giant scoring leader with 30 points. Halfback Jim Ohms, a senior, has 14 points. Fullback Maury Gnepper, a senior, 12 points and Dan Moran, senior, end, 12 points. Jerry Fought, senior, Tom Geer, senior and Scott Decker, senior, also have tallied.

Defensively, most of the above will see action plus Russ Sale, 170, sophomore at corner back; Guy Nuhler, 160, junior at deep back; Fought, 230, at middle guard; Bill McCann, 220, senior, and Gary Brauchla, 205, junior at tackle; Jay Mackey, 185, junior, McCord, and Phil Dellasantina, 180, senior at inside line-backer.

Giants End Conference Jinx; Brauchla Defensive Standout

FINDLAY — A 20-0 league victory over a fumbling Findlay Trojan team here last night put Fremont Ross into the thick of the Buckeye Conference football race.

At least for one week.

The Little Giants ran head-on into undefeated, untied Sandusky next Friday at Strobel Field, Sandusky. The league test against the fleet Blue Streaks will be Fremont's biggest challenge of the season.

Jim Ohms, 175-pound hard-running senior halfback, spearheaded the Little Giant assault on the Trojans to put Fremont in a three-way tie for first place in the conference with Sandusky and Martin Harding, all 1-0.

Ohms hammers at the Findlay line, mainly the Trojan left side, for 137 yards rushing on 22 pigskin carries. That's an average of 7.13 per try. He scored three touchdowns and also returned a punt 44 yards.

Almost as effective as Ohms and providing Ross a potent one-two punch was scrappy Maury Gnepper, senior fullback who weighs 160 pounds soaking wet. Gnepper carried 14 times, gained 123 yards, over a 38-yard dash up the middle.

Ohms and Gnepper put in extra duty when right halfback John Nighswander, 185-pound senior, sustained a knee injury early in the second period and was sidelined the remainder of the game.

The Giants capitalized on Trojan fumbles for three of their five TD's. Findlay bobbling the ball nine times and losing six, Ross also had fumble trouble, losing four of five.

A Findlay fumble on its first play from scrimmage was pounced on by George Deichert of the Giants on the Findlay 13. Nighswander ran five yards and Ohms, taking a pitchout from Quarterback Denny Stine, traveled the remaining eight yards off right tackle, Dave Baylis and Dan Moran providing the blocks.

Ross belted away at the Findlay line throughout the entire first half, gaining the ball three more times via Trojan fumbles.

A couple of opportunities presented free grants by the obliging Findlayites were not taken advantage of but one was for another six-pointer. The other first half score by the Giants came strictly on their own merits. Ross driving 65-yards for the tally.

Minus Yardage

Meanwhile, Findlay was held practically motionless the entire first two periods, through its own misdeeds and through jolting defensive play by Ross. The Trojans were held to minus yardage on the ground the first half.

Tackling of 205-pound junior Gary Brauchla was vicious all evening. He once tossed Findlay's Mike Lanning for a 25-yard loss, spilled Trojan halfback Jim Robertson for a six-yard setback in the third quarter to quench a Trojan march into Ross territory and, again in the fourth period, tossed Lanning for a 16-yard reversal to halt another Trojan threat.

Brauchla was aided defensively by rugged play of sophomore Russ Sale, center back Gnepper, middle guard Fought, senior linebacker Phil Dellasartina plus Jay Mackey and Bill McCann.

Tackle Baylis, 215-pound senior, end Moran and guards Deichert and Dick Dundore in the interior line provided key blocks, the former pair on Ohms' bursts off tackle and the latter pair along with Ken Fry on Gnepper's dashes up the middle.

Deceptive Run

Ohms ripped off gains of 4, 18, 31, 2, 10 and 2 yards in the Giants' 65-yard march in the second quarter. Nighswander carried for six on a cross buck, was injured and replaced by little 130-pound junior Harry Quackenbush. The youngster gained three yards his first crack at the Findlay line. Final 18 yards was negotiated by Stine on a beautiful piece of deception. The Ross senior quarterback faked to Ohms crossing to his right, had the ball on his left hip and circled left end almost unobserved.

Ross quickly tallied again when junior Tom Pratt fell on a Findlay fumble on the Findlay 30. Ohms carried all but once, finally operating at tailback from the single wing for a 15-yard power drive right for the third Ross TD.

Ross led at halftime 18-0. Series of fumbles by both teams featured the early minutes of the third quarter. Ohms took a Findlay punt on his 32, apparently was trapped, shook off two or three tackles, picked up blocking and scored 44 yards to the Findlay 24. Gnepper went seven yards up the middle and Stine tossed a completed pass to Ohms on the Trojan three. Ohms fumbled, Findlay recovering.

The Trojans, sending a man in motion, finally mounted a sustained attack to enter Ross territory for the first time. Passing of Chuck Reimund, junior quarterback, and running of Tom Williams, junior halfback, spearheaded the drive which carried to the Findlay 47. However, Reimund, on a running play, was injured, Lanning taking over his quarterback post. A Lanning pass fell incomplete and Brauchla sifted through to send Robertson spinning for a six-yard loss to kill the drive. Gnepper punted the middle for 59 yards to the Findlay 25 but the Trojans stiffened, taking over on downs on their 16.

Lanning's running showed Findlay into Ross territory but his passes missed the mark. Ross taking over on its own 47. Stine passed 22 yards to Moran but Ross high's running game was halted on the Findlay 23. Lanning

ning fumbled on Findlay's first play, the ever-present Brauchla recovering. The Giants scored in three plays, Stine gaining five yards straight ahead. Gnepper mose up the middle and Fought switched to the backfield offensively, the final nine, also straight ahead.

Ross marched 77 yards for its final TD. Gnepper and Ohms picking up short yardage and picking up short yardage and Quackenbush breaking away on a 26-yard sprint. A Stine to Ohms pass put the ball on the Findlay 22 from where Ohms drove over his own right side, bowled over two Trojan defenders into the end zone.

Ohms, suffering from leg cramps, was removed from the game, both the Findlay and Fremont fans giving him a tremendous ovation.

Ross had failed on four previous extra point tries but succeeded on the last one via an unorthodox and unplanned play.

Decker was back to kick. It was to be a fake. Gnepper, taking the snap from center, supposed to draw back and fire a pass. Just before the ball was centered, Gnepper informed Decker that his finger had just been bandaged. Gnepper took the snap, lateraled to Decker who arched an aerial to Moran for two extra points.

VICTORY was the first in the Buckeye Conference for Ross since 1957. Ten straight defeats had been racked on the Little Giants in league competition through 1958 and 1959.

"We've broken the losing jinx in the conference," Coach Mal Mackey said. "Maybe this is all we need to get us back on top in league play."

Braining Contest

Game was a bruising affair, players on both teams limping off the field. Paul Oren, Findlay halfback who had missed the previous two Trojan games due to a wrenched back, was sidelined after his first carry in the first period with a possible fractured hand. Nighswander was the most serious Ross injury, others coming up with slight leg and arm bruises.

Ross now stands three wins, two losses for the season, the three victories thus far representing the total number of successes over the entire past two campaigns. Findlay is now 2-3 in all games.

Ross battering ram gained 348 yards on the ground, 96 via passing (Stine completed seven of 13) for a total yardage of 436. Findlay was held to only 55 yards rushing, picked up 66 on passes for a total of 121.

Both Ross high's and Findlay's hands performed at halftime, Ross musicians looking good on intricate formations. Findlay's band saluted Homecoming of the queen before some 4,000 fans.

Ross Underdog In Traditional Scrap With Sandusky

Traditional rivalry between Fremont, Ross and Sandusky, which has produced many surprises and usually a hard-fought contest in the past, has numerous overtones on the eve of Friday night's important clash.

The undefeated, united Blue Streaks, ranked fourth best in the state by the Associated Press and fifth best by the United Press, little with the up-and-coming Little Giants at 8 tomorrow night at Strobel Field, Sandusky.

Ross, bouncing back after two reversals to record three straight wins, is ranked about 30th in the state by both wire services.

Luffy Rating

A victory for the Streaks would

probably retain their lofty Ohio rating. Upset triumph by the Little Giants, going into the game a one-to-two underdog underdog, could vault them into or near the state's top 10.

Crowd in excess of 5,000, weatherman cooperating, is expected. Some 500 reserved seat tickets for Ross fans, put on sale at Tremper's confectionery Tuesday night, have long since been acquired. There are plenty of general admission tickets available at Sandusky, however, the bleacher section able to accommodate 5,000 persons. It would be a good bet to arrive early at Strobel Field if you don't have a ticket in advance.

What are Ross' high chances against a team that rolled over Cayahoga Falls 20-14, Cleveland John Marshall 20-12, Elyria 22-0 in a Buckeye Conference game, 44-0 over outclassed Jackson, Mich. St. John and 38-20 last week over Toledo Whitmer?

An all-out effort, stimulated by the idea of "knocking off" an undefeated team, of remaining at least tied for first in the conference and of beating a traditional foe, could result in a Ross victory.

Sandusky, Marion Harding and Fremont are currently tied for the Buckeye lead with 1-0 records. Marion should get by winless and scoreless Elyria at Elyria Friday

to remain tied with the SHS-Fremont winner.

Other conference game involves two teams with 6-1 league slates, Findlay and Lorain who clash Friday at Lorain.

Ross probably has played a tougher schedule to date in losing to Louisville, Ky. Flaget 25-7, to state ranked and still undefeated Akron South (a speedy team like Sandusky) 28-8, and in winning over Toledo Waite (3-2), Fostoria 33-0 and Findlay 32-0.

Sandusky will have better line speed and certainly a much speedier backfield in the likes of track star Ben Eap, a 18.1 runner in the 100-yard dash, and chunkier Stine, the quarterback, has

who was second in the state track pole vault last spring.

Sandusky plays ball control and has depended for its touchdown production on lengthy runs, most of them by Eap, 185-pound senior right halfback (13 TD's), and Scruggs, 170-pound senior left halfback (six TD's).

A grind-out policy characterizes the Ross high attack. There is no real "break-away" threat but in hard-driving senior Jim Ohms, 175-pounds, senior Maury Gnepper, 180, senior John Nighswander, 180 and senior Dennis Stine, 180, the Giants have a potent yardage producer on the ground.

Sine, the quarterback, has

clicked a little more effectively in the passing department the past three games.

Sandusky has used the aerial game sparingly, senior quarterback Tom Rudolph the main threat.

Defense Key

Probably the key to Ross' high chances is in its defense. Interior linemen Jerry Fought, 230, Bill McCann, 220, Ken Fry, 225, and Gary Brauchle, 260 have been hard to move. Sandusky, with its speed, probably will go outside or inside via trap plays.

Job of containing Eap and Scruggs may be up to Ross in side linebackers Phil Dellasantina, 185, Jay Mackey, 185 and Earl

McCard, 190, ends Dick Dundore, 200 and either Tom Geer, 170 or Felix Palomo, 177, corner backs Russ Sale, 178 and Gnepper, and deep backs Ohms, Guy Nuhler, 168, and possibly Tom Pratt, 155 or Sine.

Ross offense could be at less than full strength due to injuries. Nighswander has a damaged knee that might prevent him from playing or at least slow him up. Gnepper tested his injured ankle last night and was able to go at about top speed. McCord, defensive also has a slight leg injury as has Sale.

In case Nighswander isn't available or can't play full time on

offense, Gnepper may be shifted from fullback to halfback and the fullback spot taken over by Fought, a senior, or Jack Ziemke, 168, a sophomore.

Offensive line probably will see Dan Moran, 170 and Geer at the ends; Fry and Dave Baylis, 215, at tackles; Dundore and George Deichert, 185, at guards; and Scott Decker, 185, at center.

Of the Ross performers named above, all are seniors except Nuhler, Brauchle, Mackey, and Sale. Palomo and Ziemke, sophomores, Little Harry Quackenbush, 135-pound junior, who took over Nighswander's right half slot when the regular was injured in the Findlay game, also is a possible backfield starter on offense.

Third Sandusky TD came with

20 seconds remaining in the third stanza, Smith climaxing a 72-yard drive in seven plays with a one-yard burst.

Quarterback Tom Rudolph had a hand in the third six-pointer, his third down pass to end Ed Bryant for 10 yards resulting in a first down and another third down pass to Espy, who made a fine catch on the Ross 13 to complete a 27-yard play, keeping the march moving.

Scruggs picked off one of Stine's passes in the fourth period on the SHS 30 and returned to his own 41. Espy paired with Williams on 10 of 11 running plays. Williams finally cracking over from the two to complete a 50-yard drive.

Stine combined with Ohms on passes of nine, 24 and 15 yards and Gnepper galloped 15 yards on a run as Ross reached the Sandusky 11 as time ran out.

Ohms caught six of Stine's passes in the game.

Ross defense, led by linebacker Phil Dellasantina, corner back Gnepper and halfbacks Ohms and Nuhfer, held Espy to 41 yards on 12 running plays in the first half and Scruggs to 36 yards on nine rushes.

Espy, doing better the second half, gained 124 yards in the game in 25 attempts, Smith 85 in eight and Scruggs 57 in 14. Ohms was the only effective gainer for Ross, picking up 47 yards in nine rushes. Most of his yardage was amassed in the first half.

Victory gives Sandusky a 6-0 season record and 2-0 Buckeye Conference log. The Giants are 3-3 for the year and 1-1 in the league.

Ross plays at Elyria next Friday, 7 p.m. Fremont time. The Elyrians are winless and scoreless in six games.

Coach Mal Mackey of Ross said the almost negative use of Nighswander on offense due to his knee injury killed any offensive punch. "All they had to do was bottle up Ohms," he explained.

TV Foes, Irish-Cats Hurting

A great many television viewers will watch Notre Dame and Northwestern play football this Saturday, not to mention the 35,000 who will fill the Wildcats' Dyche Stadium, and wonder why these two clubs are having their miseries.

Each has won only once in four outings. Notre Dame 21-7 over California in the season opener and Northwestern battered down Oklahoma 19-3. The Irish then were swamped 51-19 by Purdue, upset 12-7 by North Carolina and shutout 21-0 last week by Michigan State. Northwestern fell 42-0 to Iowa, 7-0 to Minnesota and 14-7 to Michigan.

Both coaches knew the good and

bad of the situation before the beginning of the season, and it centered on one thing, injuries.

Notre Dame had a rash of knee operations during the off season and each was a question mark. Northwestern Coach Ara Parseghian feared for the health of his team.

Though we have more depth this season, we'll have to stay healthy to be a winner," he said.

That hasn't happened. Quarterback Dick Thornton, the offensive spark of the team, tore a thigh muscle in the Oklahoma game. The Wildcats' big end, El Kimbrough, was hampered by injuries in the Minnesota game then another end, Paul Yanke missed last week's game against Michigan, and will not play Saturday. Neither will halfback Ray Purdin, fastest man in the backfield, or tackle Jack Cvercko.

Notre Dame's weak knees, and an even bigger weakness at quarterback, foretold possible doom for the Irish. The Ramblers already have lost their best halfback, Red Mack, and end John Powers for the year from injuries after the second game. Guard Myron Pottos has seen limited service because of his knee injury.

Yanks To Name Houk New Pilot

NEW YORK (AP)—Today the Yankees will name a new manager. He will be 41-year-old Ralph Houk.

But never to be forgotten will be the old Yankee manager, Casey Stengel, the old man the Yankees dismissed to make room for the younger man in line with the club's new policy — the youth movement.

"The youth movement of America is for kids," blared old man Stengel in an acceptance speech Wednesday night climaxing an emotional evening during which he was given a farewell dinner party by the New York Baseball Writers.

"Sure I'm old," 70-year-old Stengel challenged an audience that included Yankee owner Dan Topping, 48, the man who fired him; George Weiss, 65, the general manager who will be the next man to be forfeited under the new "youth program" policy of the owners; and Roy Hamey, 58, who is slated to succeed Weiss, and Branch Rickey, 79, president of the dormant Continental League.

"But I thought I could build a young team. I thought I could advance skill and youth without waiting years. Don't forget it was I who started the Yankee youth program which saved the club three-four years by instructional schools in the winter. I got the youths to play baseball instead of ice skating in the winter."

All this, of course, was a pointed reference to the reason given by the Yankee ownership for his dismissal Tuesday — that Casey was too old to continue as manager.

Giant Coaches Hopeful Pioneers Don't Find Point Touch Friday

A team that has gone through six frustrating games without scoring a point should be regarded as "easy pickings." But Ross high's coaching staff doesn't regard Friday for Elyria in such a light.

"They'll be tough," is the consensus of Head Coach Mal Mackey and varsity assistants Jim Janosek, Al Ziemke, Jim Gruden and Dick Fryman of the Ross staff.

Biggest worry for Ross is it Elyria happens to score first, or early.

It might just be the spark the Pioneers need to take their scoring vengeance out on someone.

The Little Giants, 3-3 record for the season and 1-1 in the league, should rate the nod over Elyria, no wins, four defeats and two scoreless ties overall and 0-2 in the conference.

Elyria, as said before, hasn't

scored a single point. The Pioneers have dropped decisions to Alliance, Cleveland West Tech, Sandusky (22-0) and Marion Harding and played 0-0 deadlocks with Lakewood and Cuyahoga Falls.

Ross was topped by Sandusky 22-0, or a defeat by 10 points more than the one SHS tagged on the Elyrians.

Elyria has given up 80 points.

The Little Giants have tallied 122 points while yielding 98.

Ross has failed to score only against Sandusky, with the offense crippled by the almost nil use of regular right half back John Nighswander as a runner.

Nighswander still is not getting along well with his injured knee this week. Coach Mackey has been using the combination of Denny Stine as quarterback, Jim Ohms and Harry Quackenbush at halfbacks and Maury Gnepper at fullback. Quackenbush is a 130-pound junior.

Gnepper may be shifted to right halfback and sophomore Jack Ziemke inserted at fullback. It has almost been decided not to use big but slow Jerry Fought on offense at fullback.

Rest of the Ross offensive performers appears set with Dan Moran and Tom Geer at the ends, Ken Fry and Dave Baylis at tackles, George Deichert and Dick Dundore at the guards and Scott Decker at center.

Defensively, lineup probably will be Dundore and Gary Brauchla, ends; Bill McCann and Fought, guards; Russ Sale, sophomore, and Gnepper, outside linebackers; Phil Dellasantina and Jay Mackey with Earl McCord in relief at inside linebacker posts; Guy Nuhfer and Ohms, halfbacks, and either Stine or junior Tom Pratt at deep back.

Ohms In Scoring Race

Ohms, by the way, is still in contention in league scoring.

Larry Sims, Marion quarterback, is the leader at present with 24 points; then Judge Scruggs, Sandusky, 22; Ohms 18. Ben Espy of SHS 16.

Elyria's leading ground gainer, fullback Dick Dumke has a bruised thigh but probably will be ready by game time. He has carried 62 times for 273 yards.

Harrison Hildreth, who returned a kickoff 80 yards for a touchdown in Elyria's 28-16 victory over Ross last year at Fremont, is next with 29 carries, 128 yards gained. Hildreth was bothered with injuries early in the season and has played mainly on defense of late.

The Pioneers operated with a sophomore quarterback last week against Marion, Bob VanValkenberg. Steve Hays, previous quarterback, has been moved to a halfback post.

Elyria's defense is anchored by two fine linebackers, Ed Buttle, 183 pounds, and Tom Zaffer, 174. Out of action recently, Elyria's defense may be strengthened by the return of injured Norm Tiberg, defensive tackle and end.

Others on defense are Dick Goppelt, 212, junior and Mike Monk, 190, senior, at ends; either Bill Naegele, 197, or Tiberg and Tom Madden, 230, junior at tackles; Bob Adams, 170, junior, middle guard; Tom Burnett, 150, junior, corner backs and Hildreth, 164, and Hays, 165, deep backs.

VanValkenberg is a 157-pounder at quarterback with Hays and Ted Sabo, 146, at right half and Dumke, 170, at fullback.

Elyria's offensive ends are senior Dan Davies, 190, and junior Kenny Dick, 175, tackles are Ed Zak, 195 senior, and Goppelt, guards are Buttle and senior Dean Poling, 180, with Zaffer at center.

"Our only major injury is Jay," Mackey said, referring to his own son, junior linebacker Jay Mackey. (Jay is home now from the hospital but his knee, a broken bone at the top, will be in a cast several weeks.)

"I'll replace him with McCord (senior Earl McCord)," Mackey announced.

The Ross coach said Scott Decker, who suffered a back bruise against Elyria, and Bill McCann, who sustained a leg injury against Sandusky and had it binged around more against Elyria, both are ready to go.

"I'm planning to use Dave Pankratz (220-pound senior) at offensive end in place of Geer (senior Tom Geer) tonight," Mackey added. "And Pankratz will also see considerable duty at defensive end as well."

"We'll miss Jay in the lineup," Assistant Coach Al Ziemke, in charge of defense, said. "He not only played a hard, steady game every game but he called our defensive signals as defensive captain."

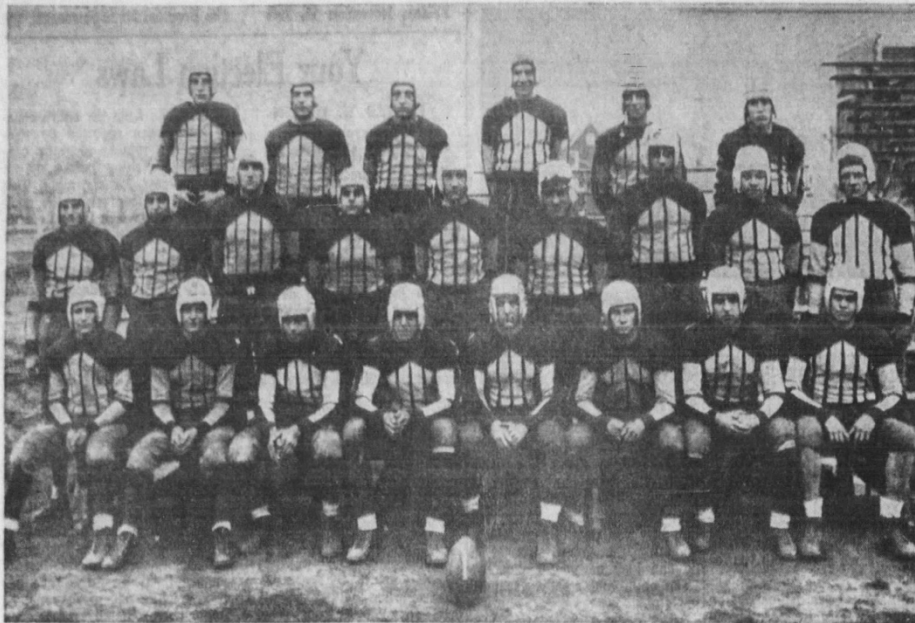

A crushing ground and aerial attack by Fremont Ross high's rejuvenated Little Giants produced a one-sided 44-0 victory over outclassed Cleveland Heights Friday in Harmon Stadium.

Fremont Letterman of past years viewed the whitewash from a special section in front of the permanent seats.

Crowd probably did not exceed 2,000.

Senior veterans Jim Ohms, John Nighswander, and Maury Gnepper scored two touchdowns apiece in the runways. Quarterback Denny Stine, another senior, tossed for two TDs.

Ross dominated play from the opening kickoff. After scoring eight points in the first period, the Giants came back with 22 in the second stanza for a 30-0 halftime edge.

Win brought Fremont's record to an even 500 for the season, five victories and five defeats. The Giants can gain the plus side of .500 with a triumph over Toledo Scott in Harmon Stadium next Friday, final game of an 11-contest slate for Coach Maj Mackey's charges.

Heights concluded the season with a 3-7 record.

Ross marched 91 yards in 10 plays to tally in the first period after Ohms returned the kickoff from the goal line to the Ross 9. With the ball on the Ross 47, Stine pitched to Ohms who circled right end, still-armed a lone Heights defender and went 53 yards for a six-point drive.

Heights punted after failing to move the ball. Ross driving 74 yards in 16 plays to score early in the second quarter on a 12-yard pass from Stine to Nighswander. Gnepper ran the points.

A few plays later, Stine intercepted a Lary Silver pass on the Ross 25, followed Gnepper who took out two players with a savage block, and returned to the Ross 46. On third down and 11, Gnepper went up the middle on a draw play through a hole "a mile wide" and galloped 53 yards to paydirt. Ohms punted to Moran for extra points.

A bad pass from center put Stine in trouble again. Al Solomon picking up the bouncing ball inside the 10. Ross blocked his attempted kick and took possession on the Heights 7. Ohms went around right end for the tally. Run for points failed.

Ross led 30-0 at intermission.

Ninety Yard Drive
Late in the third quarter, after gaining possession following a Heights punt, Ross ripped 90 yards in nine plays to score. Ohms and Nighswander picked up considerable rushing yardage and Stine fired to end Dave Pankratz on a 15-yard pass play, the 6-3 1/2 senior end gathering in his first pass of the year. Stine ran for 18 and 4 yards and Ohms for 9 to put Fremont on the Heights 17. Stine then connected with Nighswander who got behind a Heights defender in the end zone. Ohms passed to Moran for added points.

Mackey had his sophomore unit and other Varsity reserves in the game most of the fourth period. He had inserted the Sophs into the game late in the second quarter for four plays but the Varsity regulars played most of the third period.

Some of the Varsity first string played off-and-on on defense in the final 12 minutes. Gnepper was in early in the fourth period when Silver fired a pass. Gnepper picked it off on the Heights 42 and went the distance for the final touchdown.

Ohms fell on a Heights fumble after the next kickoff. Ross taking possession on the Heights 37. A 62-yard run by Jerry Hutchens, Scott halfback, moved the Bulldogs to the Ross 7 near the end of the period. Ross halted the Scott threat. Bill McCann and Oms turning in fine defensive plays. Scott turned over the ball on the Ross five.

Nighswander was tackled behind his own goal line by Scott's Steve McGee for a two-point safety for the Bulldogs, first one notched against Ross this season.

The Bulldogs weren't able to capitalize on the ensuing Ross kickoff from its own 20. Ross gained possession later on its own 30.

Oms, Gnepper and Nighswander drove for touchdowns through the Scott line for three first downs. Ross reaching the Scott 20. Nighswander was shaken up after nine-yard run and played little the remainder of the game.

Two running plays gained nothing before Stine passed into Scott's right flat, Oms making a wifty catch. The spectacular Ross halfback eluded three would-be Scott tacklers to complete a 36-yard pass play for a TD. Run for points failed. Ross leading 14-2 with 6:22 remaining in the second period.

Ross had an excellent opportunity to add comfortably to its lead in the waning minutes of the first half but a pass was dropped in the end zone.

McCann had put a rush on Scott's Ted Adams, forcing him to fumble, senior Jerry Fought recovering for the Giants on the Scott 27. On a fourth down play, Gnepper went up the middle 14 yards to the Scott five.

Stine tossed to Oms, all alone in the end zone, but the Ross halfback grabbed for the ball too surely and bobbled it. Two more pass attempts went awry and a fourth to Oms netted only one yard.

Ross had possession for 10 minutes, 24 seconds of the third period but failed to tally. Oms did most of the ground gaining with help from Stine, Gnepper and a Harry Quackenbush, in for Nighswander, as Ross pushed from its 34 to the Scott 16.

Penalties Hurt

Two 15-yard penalties, one on a personal foul and another for holding helped "kill" the drive. That plus a 15-yard loss with Stine carrying.

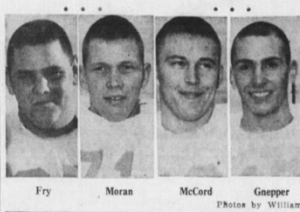
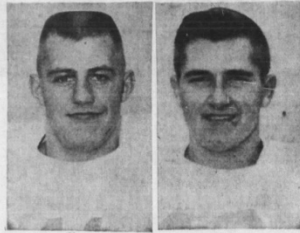

CLEVELAND (AP)—The Cleveland Browns are looking for a tough battle against the Steelers in Pittsburgh Sunday afternoon despite the difference in the records of the two teams this season.

Cleveland has scored 218 points—a total second only to that of the Baltimore Colts in the National Football League—and has permitted only 136, the third best performance among the 13 teams.

The Browns, with a 5-5 record, are only a game behind the pace-setting Philadelphia Eagles in the NFL's eastern conference race.

The Steelers are out of the race with a 2-5-1 record. They have scored only 170 points and permitted 196.

But the Browns remember what happened last season, Pittsburgh beat them twice, 17-7 and 21-20. That second defeat was the beginning of the end for the Browns, who went into the game with a five-game winning streak.

The Browns are expecting a rough time with quarterback Bob by Layne, who has always provided rugged opposition for them, whether with the Detroit Lions or with Pittsburgh.

In their first meeting with the Steelers this season, the Browns jumped out to a 21-0 lead, but Layne threw a scare into them in the second half. Cleveland hung on to win, 28-20.

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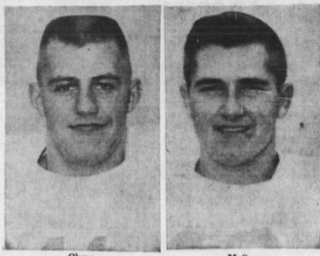

Ohms, M'Cann, Fought Win League First Team Posts

Halfback Jim Ohms, tackle Bill McCann and middle guard Jerry Fought were picked on the All-Buckeye Conference first team released today by member newspapers.

First and second offensive and defensive teams plus honorable mention at each position were selected by league coaches at a meeting in Hotel Fremont Monday.

Ohms is paired with Larry Sims of Marion Harding, and Sandusky "touchdown twins" Ben Espy and Judge Scruggs in the first team offensive halfback. Dan Moran at end and Ken Fry at tackle were Ross seniors who made the second All-Buckeye offensive unit and seniors Maury Gnepper and Earl McCord were named on the second defensive unit as linebackers.

Dick Dundore, Ross senior, was named on both second teams, as an offensive guard and a defensive end.

Fremont gained three first places and seven second places for 10 positions on the All-Buckeye team. Six other Ross boys gained honorable mention notice, seniors Dave Baylis, George Deichert, Scott Decker, Denney Sine and John Nighswander on offense and junior Gary Brauchla on defense.

Sandusky led in first team selections with eight, Marion six, Fremont and Elyria three each, Lorain and Findlay one apiece. Fremont and Marion had 10 berths on the first and second teams. Lorain nine, Sandusky eight, Elyria four and Findlay three.

Big and agile linemen, pass-throwing quarterbacks, and high-scoring ball carriers climaxed their campaigns today as the best of the Buckeye boys were named to the Class AA All-Ohio team by The Associated Press.

Hundreds of coaches, newspaper and radio-television sports editors, and game officials voted in the annual ratings.

It was a year of great quarterbacks. Phil Westfall of Springfield South, a pass-tossing wizard, nosed out the other fine signal callers to win the top spot, with Bob Wallace of Alliance making the second team and Middletown's classy Billy Truck the third. Ken Cunningham, E. A. S. Liverpool's standout, wound up on the defensive corps and such stars as Bill Gaines of Dayton Colonel White, Steve Tenti of Cincinnati Elder, and Tom Meyers of Troy were relegated to the honorable mention list.

Any of that group would be No. 1 on any college coach's list of wanted men. Westfall has one of the handiest backfields in years to pilot, with Alliance's Charley King and Troy's Tom Vaughn at halfback, and Massillon's Art Hastings at fullback.

King, an elusive 48-minute player who contributed 136 points to the Aviator cause, was named the state's No. 1 back. Vaughn led the state in scoring with 230 points, while Hastings averaged eight yards per try for the campaign and scored 134 points.
