Ross Tank, Wrestling Teams Open Seasons

Ross swimmers and wrestlers open their respective seasons Tuesday afternoon. The swimmers of Coach Jack Balsizer will be at home against Mansfield Malabar. Coach Mal Mackey takes his Little Giant matmen to Bowling Green for the opener. The wrestlers don't open at home until after the first of January.

Mackey has four lettermen returning around which to build. These are Jose Alejandro, 103 or 112; Bud Weiser, 165; Dick Bowersox, 175, and Brad Lawrence, Buckeye Conference champion at heavyweight.

In looking forward to his first meet, Coach Balsizer of the swimming team remarked, "Malabar is always strong, especially in these early season meets. They always have one outstanding boy and good depth and balance behind him."

The outstanding Malabar boy this year is senior Vic Kuhn, a backstroke and individual medley threat, plus a freestyle swimmer. It will be the second outing for Malabar which placed second in a triangular won by Mansfield Senior.

Balsizer is banking on strength in other events to balance off a weakness in the sprints.

With four returning lettermen all posting victories Ross wrestling team opened its season with a 31-16 conquest of Bellevue Saturday afternoon. Toiling on the Bellevue mats the Little Giant grapplers won seven of 11 matches, five of them by fall.

Setting the theme in the initial match, letterman Jose Alejandro needed only 1:51 of the first period to pin his Bellevue foe.

The other lettermen winning their first matches were Scott Decker, 138 pounds, with a fall in one minute of the second period; Dick Bowersox, 175 pounds, 6-0 decision, and heavyweight Brad Lawrence, fall in 1:20 of the first period.

Ross falls also were registered by Jim Bullinger, 133 pounds, and Mike Vargo, 120 pounds.

Bellevue's only breakthroughs were in the 127-pound class by Chuck DeLuca; 145 pounds, Jim Redd; 154 pounds, Dick Lopeman, and 165 pounds, Paul Evert.

EIGHT VICTORIES BY FALL

Ross Matmen Pin Bowling Green

BOWLING GREEN — With uncommon ease Fremont Ross wrestlers dominated Bowling Green Monday afternoon, 46-5. The Little Giants won for the second time in two matches.

Coach Mal Mackey's charges won 10 of 11 bouts and pinned eight of the Bowling Green competitors.

Four of the Ross falls were in the first period with the first and last competitors appearing to be running a race.

Jose Alejandro, Little Giant 103 pounder, needed only 15 seconds to pin Phil Tipton of Bowling Green in the first match. Not to be outdone Ross heavyweight Brad Lawrence picked up and dumped the shoulders of 280-pound Marty Berlin to the mat in only 12 seconds.

The one Ross loss was disputed when 112-pound Joe Vedow was caught in a Guillotine hold of Steve Jackson. His shoulders rolled to the mat as the buzzer sounded ending the second period. Referee Ted Federici said Beddow was held to the mat before the period ended. Beddow was leading on points at the time.

Other Ross wrestlers pinning their opponents in the first period were Rick Faussey, 154 pounds, and Dick Bowersox, 175 pounds.

Little Giants also pinning opponents were Mike Lieske, 127 pounds, Jim Bullinger, 133 pounds, Mike Dowell, 145, and Al Reiter, 165 pounds.

Mike Vargo, 120 pounds, and Scott Decker, 128 pounds, drew two of the more experienced boys on the young Bowling Green team and won the decision.

Alejandro, Vargo, Bullinger, Decker, Bowersox and Lawrence are all undefeated. Alejandro, Bullinger and Lawrence

have pinned both their opponents this season.

Ross Wrestlers In Pioneer Invitational Tourney Field

Fremont Ross will be one of eight teams competing today in the eighth annual Pioneer Invitational wrestling tournament at Elyria high school. There have been only two champions in the seven-year history of the tourney and both will share the favorite role in this year's renewal.

Elyria won its own tournament the first six years of its existence. Mentor broke this monopoly last year by a three-point margin. Mentor had 71 points a year ago to 68 by Elyria.

There are only two returning te

Individual champions among the 88 wrestlers who will compete in the tournament both returning champions are from Mentor, but neither will be around the same weight class. Tom Sterleker, the 1965 103-pound champion, will be trying to win the 112-pound division. George Handler, a champion at 121 last year, is back at 127 pounds.

Teams in the field are the Lyra, Mentor, Ross, Admiral Farragut, LaSalle, Sandusky, North Hill, and Rocky River. Rocky River is a strong contender in the Southwestern Conference.

Sandusky is the only Ross conqueror in two dual meets.

The teams will be competing for championship and runner-up team trophies, medals to the top three individuals in each weight class and an outstanding wrestler trophy.

Preliminaries began at 1 p.m. with the finals at 9 p.m.

Ross enters the tournament with a mark of two wins and one loss, in dual meet competition. Three Ross individuals remain unbeaten through the first three matches and figure as tournament contenders.

The three unbeaten teams are the Mentor, LaSalle, and Bowserow. Bowserow was the weight last year eye tournament.

LaSalle was the runner-up in the weight class in a 103 decision in a game between George McDougal and Fred Steed.

Joe Alejandro, LaSalle's founder, finished second in the 103 division last year.

For this season, Lawrence has yet to have to wrestle the heavyweight. He has three victories, by falls, with two ties. His record is 1-2 in the first period. Lawrence has the fastest pin record this year in a Ross uniform. He has 12 seconds over his winning free.

ELYRIA — Mentor successfully defended its championship and Fremont Ross finished sixth in the eighth annual Pioneer Invitational wrestling tournament here Wednesday. In a near repeat of last year the host Elyria team finished second, tied this year with Sandusky.

Leading the Ross entry were two second place medal winners, one third and three others who reached the consolation finals to finish fourth. Medals were awarded to the first three places in each weight division.

Fremont Ross won two of three events in the wrestling triple-header staged at the local gymnasium Saturday afternoon, but it was the big one that got away. The Little Giants Varsity by the measure of one-sixteenth of a pound was nipped by Huron, 22-19. In the other two matches being conducted simultaneously Ross reserves beat Huron reserves, 26-18, and Ross sophomores defeated the Elmore varsity, 36-13.

As it turned out the difference in the match was the fact Jose Alejandro, Ross 105-pounder, missed his weight by one-sixteenth of a pound. The hand on the scale touched the necessary 105, but did not cover it and Alejandro was ruled overweight. This gave Ross a five-point deficit to start. In an exhibition which did not count toward the team score Alejandro pinned his Huron foe in the first period.

With the aid of the forfeit Huron varsity moved to victories in four of the first five events and a 16-3 advantage. Ross won four of the final six events but the match was beyond reach when Huron's Dan Forbes won the 165-pound match. 





Golfing Great Lawson Little Dead At Age 57

PEBBLE BEACH, Calif. (AP)

— Lawson Little, twice winner of the U.S. Open Golf Championship, is dead of a heart ailment at 57.

Little was stricken Thursday afternoon at his home overlooking Pebble Beach golf course on the Monterey Peninsula and died a short time later at a hospital.

He had suffered from heart trouble since 1957 and in 1963 underwent brain surgery. Little had visited his doctor's office earlier Thursday.

Little won the U.S. and British Opens in 1934 as an amateur and won the Sullivan Award as the outstanding golfer in 1935. In 1936 he turned professional and won the U.S. Open again in 1940.

(Little at one time played an exhibition at Fremont Country Club.)
