Ross Faces Strong Ashland Five

PORT CLINTON, BELLEVUE PLAY; NORWALK, COLUMBIAN TO VIE

Ross high's Little Giants will be underdogs—very distinctly underdogs—when they open their competition in the district Class A basketball tournament in Sandusky Junior high school Friday night. They will meet an Ashland team which has compiled an enviable record of 14 games won and three lost this season.

Scarlet Five Is Chosen To Play In N.C.A.A. Meet

COLUMBUS, March 1.—UP—Ohio State's Big Ten basketball champions will represent the middle west in the National Collegiate Athletic association tournament, Coach Harold G. Olsen said today.

The Buckeyes were named from the NCAA's district No. 4 for the third consecutive year. The choice was announced last night by Z. G. Clevenger of Indiana and the Ohio State athletic board immediately granted permission for the team to enter the event.

The Ohio State cagers will carry a season record of 14 victories against four defeats into the eastern division of the tournament in Madison Square Garden, New York, March 21 and 23.

Three other teams were yet to be named for the eastern semi-finals. Baylor has accepted one of the four invitations for the western semi-finals at Kansas City. Winners of the two sections will meet in New York March 28.

Ohio State played in the NCAA tourney first in 1929, going to the final game before losing to Oregon. In 1944, Dartmouth eliminated the Buckeyes, and last season New York university won out in the eastern playoff, by scoring 12 points in an overtime session.

Coach Olsen has also agreed to coach a team of western all-stars against an eastern all-star combination in the Garden March 30. The week of March 23-30 will be spring vacation at Ohio State, enabling the Buckeyes to compete without missing classes.

Little Giants' Swimmers Off To State Meet

The Ross-Ashland game, scheduled to begin at 8:30 o'clock, will be preceded by two others. Bellevue's state champions, seeking to successfully defend their title, will meet Port Clinton, whom they defeated during the regular season, in the opening contest, starting at 6 p. m. At 7:15 o'clock, undefeated Norwalk will face Tiffin Columbian and Merle McKillip, the Buckeye league's leading scorer and again a Buckeye league team will be the underdog.

Then, at 8:30 Ross and Ashland will square off.

Lost To Elyria

Ashland has included among its triumphs two victories over Mansfield, which dealt Ross a 68-48 loss at Mansfield, and two over Port Clinton, which upset Ross, 35-26 here. Ashland's three defeats came at the hands of Sandusky, which also defeated Ross, 45-25, Norwalk, which beat Ross, 57-30, and Elyria, which team provided Ross with its second victory of the season, the Purple winning, 46-44 in Ross auditorium.

Coach Eddie Gabel will use his customary lineup of Sam Sims and Dick Baron at forwards, Jim Kridler at center, and Lloyd Bischoff and Walter Weinhardt at guards. All the boys are in good condition, Gabel reported Thursday night. Should Ross lose the contest, the game will have been the last for Kridler as a Ross player, he being the only senior among the five Ross starters, although Bob Walther and Jim Boyer are other squad members who are seniors. The balance of the Little Giant starting lineup are sophomores.

After the Ross-Ashland contest, Willard and Shelby will complete the first night's play with a contest starting at 9:45.

Mansfield, Calvert Meet

Saturday night the time schedule will be the same with games carded at 6, 7:15, 8:30 and 9:45. In the first of these Mansfield will meet Tiffin Calvert in the latter's debut as a Class A tournament quintet. In the second contest Sandusky and Mansfield Madison will be paired. The third contest will match the Ashland-Ross winner; and the final contest will pit the Bellevue-Port Clinton victor against the winner of the Norwalk-Tiffin Columbian contest.


The semi-finals are scheduled for Friday, March 8 with games at 7:30 and 8:45 and the finals will be played Saturday night, March 9, starting at 8:30.

LITTLE GIANTS NEARLY EVEN FOR 1ST HALF

Port Clinton Runs
Up 51-32 Total On
Bellevue's Champs

Eddie Gabel's Ross high cagers of packed away their uniforms Friday night, marking finis to the 1945-46 cage season by bowing to a hard-driving but not too strenuous quintet. The loss came in the first round of the district class A tournament at Sandusky, the college town lads chalking up a 46 to 34 decision.

Others in Friday night were: Port Clinton 51; Bellevue 32; Norwalk 43; Tiffin Columbian 38; Shelby 38; Willard 23.

The second round of the meet starts at 7:15 tonight when Mansfield, 32; Tiffin Columbian, Sandusky meets Mansfield Madison at 8:30, and Ashland will play Shelby. The evening's big game, one which will pack the Sandusky Junior high gym, is scheduled at 9:45 when Port Clinton and Norwalk tangle.

Ashland was the top-heavy favorite to take Ross, but did not thrill many in the crowd who felt that the Little Giants, had they not slipped into a lethargic style of play on a few occasions, might have come up with the decision.

Kridler Ends Competition

The local grid iron's first point, when Jim Kridler, acting as captain, netted a push shot from in front, Ashland tied it and then Ross moved out to a 10-7 lead. The period, however, found the score knotted at 11 points.

The Little Giants looked good at times and bad at others in the second canto, tying it at 13-all once and then drifting behind 23-14, a minute before the half. The quick goals by Walter Weinhardt both after a net job of ball stealing, cut the deficit to 23-18 at the intermission.

Ashland, with Dick Messner, Joe Stine and Bobby Miller showing the way, took a commanding third period edge, moving into the final quarter with a 39-27 advantage.

Eastland tallied seven points in the final quarter.

The Little Giants used a man to man defense throughout the ball game and at times it worked to perfection. Once, however, effective Ashland blocking broke men loose under the net.

Messner was the ball game's star, getting 15 points and playing a when in a fine game of slip-ups in 14 points and Miller, rough but capable guard and pivot man in Ashland's style of offense, was a tower of strength until he bid the fray goodbye with five personal.

Kridler ended his high school court career by turning in 10 points. He left the floor on personals at the last two minutes. Dick Brown and Weinhardt each came up with eight.

Only Kridler is lost from the starting five next year, the other four boys being sophomores.

Krapp Provides Spark

The Port Clinton-Bellevue game was a classic for surprise. Bellevue, victor over the Norm Willbord-coached team on the Port Clinton floor only a few weeks ago, looked like the winner again for two periods. At the half the defending state champions held a 17-12 lead, and appeared to be moving along nicely.

Then the bottom fell out, because the Porters started to pull up, went ahead and made a rout of it.

One big difference in the Port Clinton team was the appearance of freshman Dick Krapp in the lineup. When this lad came in to scrap the Port Clinton boys took on a new appearance. Krapp entered just before the half and played the rest of the game. He was the spark.

Port Clinton's scoring was evenly split, Krapp getting 11, Dick Jannsen 12, Bobby Stevens, who played a sensational game under buckets, 11, and Conrad Buelter, 10.

Lyle Moyer and Joe DiSantis tied for Bellevue scoring honors with eight.

Tiffin threw a scare into Norwalk, trailing only 22-24 at the half, but the finesse of the Norwalk team, undefeated this year, carried it home to victory.

The night before brought Shelby a 38-23 victory over Willard, the team coached by Smokey Williams, ex-Otterbein college star, winning its third game of the year from its traditional foes.
