1927 TRACK

Hopes for a good track team were exceedingly high when Coach "Bunk" Ross surveyed the material that reported at the first call for track candidates. "Bunk" had a number of veteran stars around which to form the nucleus of the team. They included Althoff and Meincer, pole vaulters and high jumpers; McCarthy and Hasselbach in the weights; Bowers, who will throw the javelin; and Tucker, in the relay and 440. Besides these, there are several new men, the most promising of whom are J. W. "Butch" Miller, in the half mile and sprints, and Russell Colvin, in the weights.

Prior to the Little Big Seven meet at Sandusky and the Northwestern Ohio meet at Tiffin, several dual meets with schools of surrounding towns will be held. A very successful season is predicted for the Little Giants.

CINDER SQUAD TO OPEN CAMPAIGN AT FREMONT HI TODAY

The first real workout of the track squad at Fremont high school will be held following the dismissal of the afternoon school sessions today, when it was expected 25 or more candidates would report at Harmon Field where Coach Ross has planned an extensive course of training which will place the squad in condition for the meets which they are to participate in this spring.

During the Easter vacation period which will start with Friday of this week, it is expected that the candidates for places on the track team will meet daily in order to attain the highest form possible before being called upon to enter their first meet. This will be voluntary with the boys, most of whom have signified their intention of doing this.

TWENTY-FIVE BOYS TRYING FOR JOBS ON F. H. S. TEAMS

Twenty-five candidates will attempt to gain places on the Fremont high track team, that number having signed up for the workouts which were started at Harmon field under the direction of Coach Ross Thursday afternoon. A majority of the number were present for the first workout which was more or less a preliminary step for strenuous training which will be gotten under way Monday of next week.

Ross hopes to develop a number of men for the various events and expects J. W. (Butch) Miller to develop into a star runner, the former Townsend star having shown considerable ability in the mile.

CINDER STARS AT F. H. S. GET KNOCKS

Prospects for a winning track team at Fremont high are anything but bright according to the latest dope from the school, although it is thought that one or two consistent point winners will be developed. The team suffered a real blow during the week when Johnny Meincer, who was doing well in the pole vault, suffered an injury to an ankle which will probably keep him on the side lines during the season. Meincer cleared the bar on a trial trip only to strike the ground in such a manner as to double the leg under him, causing a severe sprain.

The running events will be where the purple and white will have their best chance, J. W. Miller showing nicely in the mile, with Johnny McCarthy and Binkley going along in good shape in the 220. Hetrick looks like a winner in the 440.

Rinehart and J. W. Miller will probably be the entrants in the hurdles along with Caborn, who has shown a marked tendency to take the jumps like a veteran. Hasselbach and Colvin are each working steadily in the weight events and either or both of them may develop enough to be the real surprise of the year. Lerch has been showing good form in the discus throwing and will probably be able to bring home a point or two.

The first meet of the season will be held at Port Clinton on Friday afternoon of next week with the dual meet at Sandusky being scheduled for the following week. May 14 is the date for the Little Big Seven meet at Sandusky and the local chances at this time will depend to a great extent upon what can be accomplished with the material at hand before that date.

The district meet at Toledo follows the L. B. S. affair and the Croghan street lads will have to step if they are to make any kind of a showing at that time.

SQUAD NAMED BY COACH ROSS THIS MORNING

First Meet of the Season for Purple and White; Hope to Win

Arrangements have been completed by Coach Bunk Ross to take his high school track team to Port Clinton Friday afternoon, for the meet to be held at the Ottawa county seat in which the local school has been entered. This will be the first meet of the year for the purple and white and Ross is expectant of a victory that will be decisive.

McCarthy, Binkley and Miller will be depended upon to carry the team to victory in the dashes, with Hetrick and Mielke being set to bring home the bacon in the mile. The 880 should be taken care of by Brown, Karlovetz and Miller, with the latter and Tucker, Brown, Siegenthaler, Wonderly and Anderson to register in the relay.

Shot put, pole vault, high jump, hurdles, broad jump and javelin will have entries who are thought to be of sufficient class to take the measure of the opposition which will be furnished at the meet.

SHREFFLER HERO OF SCHOOL GAME

Fremont High Defeats Clyde in County School League

With the exception of the seventh inning, when he walked three men and hit three batters, "Puggy" Shreffler, Fremont high pitching ace, had the Clyde high squad eating out of his good right hand as he served up an assortment of benders that baffled the hitters of the Clyde team. In addition to performing in a stellar manner on the mound, Shreffler kept up the record of the team, of making at least one home run in each game played, when he socked the pellet for a four-base blow in the fourth, while Cliff Wonderly was resting on the sacks waiting for a drive that would send him the balance of the way around the circuit. The drive was one that was misjudged by the Clyde left fielder and bounded away to the far stretches of the field.

The first report of the game gave the score as 6 and 5, with Fremont on the long end, but a checkup of the scorebook shows that the locals scored seven runs. The error was due evidently to the failure of the scorer to remember that Wonderly was on the cushions when "Puggy" dropped his homer, the book showing that Wonderly was on the sacks, but he was not credited with the score.

The winning of the game keeps the slate of the locals clean for the period starting with the opening game of the 1926 season, to date, the team having won every contest in which it has taken part.

ROSSMEN TAKE PORT CLINTON TRACK HONORS

t Good Work of McCarthy and Althoff Features Meet

Led by the brilliant work of Althoff and McCarthy, Fremont high school defeated Port Clinton in a track meet Friday afternoon, 52 1-2 to 42 1-2.

Althoff took first in the pole vault, the high jump and the broad jump, while his versatile teammate won the 220 and shotput, took third in the century and second in the vault.

Walters and Miller were the outstanding runners for the Port Clinton school, Miller winning the 880 and the mile, and Walters taking the 100 and placing second in the 220.

The cold weather interfered with stellar performance and no county records were broken. C. Collins of Fremont, was the starter.

Supremacy in the field events paved the way for the purple victory, their good work in these events enabling them to pile up the lead that gave them the victory.

Johnny McCarthy gained his second high school captaincy when he was elected to head the team by the votes of the members of the team, previous to the day's events.

OLD TIME FOES TO COMPETE FOR GLORY OF FIELD

Sandusky to be Scene of Ex- citing Contests; Both Teams Confident

Coach Ross is prepping his track crew for the dual meet with Sandusky Saturday on the Sandusky field, in the second meet of the season for the purple and white, and expects the team under the direction of Captain Johnny McCarthy, to make a good showing.

McCarthy, Althoff, Bowers, J. W. Miller and Binkley are expected to be sure point winners and others of the team are thought to be capable of taking enough places to make the final decision close enough to give the squad a chance of coping.

Luttenton, Kreueger, Wagner, Homberger, Grathwohl, Sartor and Wise are expected to score for Sandusky, that is the dope from the resort city, but whether or not they will be capable of outstepping the locals remains to be seen. The Sandusky relay team will probably take that event, although it is possible that Ross will work out a combination that will make a better showing than was made by the team in the Port Clinton meet.

The team will leave Fremont early Saturday so that the boys will have a chance to limber up after reaching Sandusky before being called upon to take their places on the track and field. In doing this, Ross is showing excellent judgment, for it is a well known fact that for a meet of this kind, it does not pay to have the boys step from a crowded motor car or bus, right into their athletic activities.

The prospects of the locals are brighter than in several years and the best wishes of the students and supporters of the school teams about town will go with them.

FREMONT MAKES FINE SHOWING AGAINST CLASS

Captain McCarthy the High Scorer for His Team; Result Nip and Tuck

Sandusky high trackers won from Fremont high Saturday afternoon in their own home town by a score of 72 to 50, after a real hard tussle on track and field. The following account carried in the Sandusky Register in Sunday's issue, gives an idea of just how close the going was and how the winners had to plod to take down the verdict:

Sandusky high school scored its first 1927 track victory at Athletic field Saturday afternoon, defeating Fremont high 72 to 50 in a dual meet. The teams were more evenly matched than the score indicates and it was through the dazzling finishes of the blue and white track candidates that the locals piled up their convincing lead.

Cinder events were run in the teeth of a stiff east wind and time was slow throughout the afternoon. Warm rays of the sun, however, limbered the muscles of the field candidates and one Little Big Seven record was passed, several approached.

Karl Krueger, blue and white Sophomore, in four heaves of the shot, bettered the league record every time. His best distance was 42 feet, 6 inches. Biechele and Furrer of Sandusky, placed second and third in this event.

Krueger Wins Points

Krueger was high point man scoring 15 points with firsts in the broad jump, discus and shot, and a second in the high jump. Johnny McCarthy, Fremont captain, was second with 11 points.

McCarthy and Sartor staged two pretty duels in the dashes. The Fremont captain beat the local sprinter in the final spurt of the hundred, having the advantage of his stronger physique in the face of a stiff wind. Sartor barely nosed him out in the 220, McCarthy having expended some of his energy to land second in the pole vault, the event before.

Although wind murdered his time in these two dash events, Sartor clipped off a beautiful 440, turning it in 56 seconds. He was closely followed by his teammates, Wise and Bettridge.

Wise's Dash

Wise staged a nervy finish in the 880 to break the tape less than an inch ahead of D. Miller, who led clear up the last straight-way. Wise was ten yards behind the leaders at the first lap and it looked as if he

could finish no better than third. He clung to the inside of the track, however and broke the tape after a pretty spurt.

A. C. Routh won the high hurdles in 18.4 seconds, with Grathwohl coming in second. Fremont countered in the lows, with Tucker taking first and Hasselbach second. The time was 30.5 seconds.

Sandusky took an early lead and was ahead 34 to 11 at the end of the first five events. The locals piled up a steady lead until the latter part of the meet, when Fremont rallied, took three places in the javelin, the first two in the low hurdles, and first and third in the high jump. At the end of the twelfth event Sandusky was leading 61 to 47.

Locals Cinch Meet

Krueger took first in the broad jump and A. C. Routh and Sartor tied for third, which gave the meet to Sandusky. The blue and white relay team, composed of Wagner, Bettridge, Wise and Homberger, won the relay in 8 min., 53.4 sec., for an additional five points.

Wagner and Mone took first and second respectively, in the mile run in a slow race. None of the runners carried long strides after the first quarter was run and the two local boys sprinted ahead of the pack near the end of the race. Bob Homberger, who cut his stride to suit the pace, didn't have the speed to stage a sprint finish and was unable to place.

Hop Luttenton gave a nice exhibition in the pole vault, crossing the bar at 10 feet, 10 inches to win the event. Hop almost made it 11 feet in an extra try and has excellent chances of placing in the Little Big Seven meet here next Friday.
