

Shawnee blanks Ross in debut

LIMA — A lack of offensive punch and a ragged first inning cost the Ross baseball team in its season opener at Lima Shawnee Friday night.

Shawnee scored three runs in the first inning without the benefit of a hit and went on to defeat Ross 4-0. Winning pitcher Greg Placie and Tom Emert of Shawnee combined for a two-hitter in holding Ross to singles by Mike Pena and Tom Oberst.

The disastrous first inning started with losing pitcher Chuck Binkley walking the first two batters. A sacrifice and a subsequent errant throw to left field scored the first run. The second run scored on a balk and third came across on a passed ball against Ross catcher Scott Carmack.

Shawnee capped its scoring in the fifth inning when Tom Smalley homered off of Ross reliever Tim Belch. Smalley also singled in going two for two:

"It was definitely the first game jitters," Ross Coach Ed Platzer said of the first inning.

Placie and Emert combined for 12 strikeouts with both walking two and fanning six. Binkley and Belch both walked four and struck out five.

Ross will try to get on the winning track in an 11 a.m. game today at St. Marys Memorial before heading back home.

Seven lettermen on Ross team

Ross will have seven returning lettermen to go along with a new look when the Little Giants baseball team debuts at home Saturday, April 15, against Lima Senior.

The Little Giants have shed the antique pinstripes of several years for the stretch outfits of the present in a wholesale uniform change. The new

duds feature gray pants with purple shirts. The pants have purple and gold striping with the numerals and letters on the shirt also etched in purple and gold.

Coach Ed Platzer is back for his fourth season as the coach of the diamond corps and it has been a rough start for the former Bowling Green State University outfielder. The

Little Giants opened a week ago in Lima and came out on the short ends of a 4-0 game with Shawnee and a 10-3 count against St. Marys Memorial.

"I think our pitching will prove to be stronger than it was last year," Platzer claimed. "Defensively, we should be stronger up the middle."

The Little Giants squad is made up of 11 juniors, three seniors, and a single sophomore.

Leading the mound corps are seniors Chuck Binkley and Tim Belch with junior T.J. Brudzinski. All are lettermen.

The other lettermen are Doug Stull, a senior, and juniors Joel Krout, Jeff Eicher, and Mike Pena. Krout and Pena are the team's best hitters at the moment, Platzer said.

"That (hitting) will come along as the season goes," the Ross coach said. "It's still awfully early yet for the hitters."

Assistant Coach Hank Miesle is serving as the hitting coach while also working with the catchers this season. Tim Pettorini, who coached the Ross junior varsity last season will share that post with

Platzer and Miesle this season, has been working with the outfielders and pitchers.

Platzer has been working with what is hoped to be a strong infield. Eicher will likely be at third during the home debut with Steve McGilton, a junior, at the first base spot. Tom Woleslagel, the lone sophomore, will be at shortstop with Krout at the keystone sack.

Pena is the leftfielder with junior John LeJeune in center. Tim Oberst is the Ross rightfielder.

"We are still young as far as experience goes," Platzer pointed out, "but we hope to become more competitive as the season progresses."

Today's doubleheader at Admiral King High School has been postponed with no reschedule date set as of yet.

Ross turned in a Jekyll and Hyde act Saturday in a high school baseball doubleheader at Anderson Field.

The Little Giants could do little wrong in the first game of the twinbill, winning 7-0 on T.J. Brudzinski's three-hitter. In the second game, there was very little that the Little Giants could do right while dropping a 16-0 game to Lima Senior.

Brudzinski fanned six batters and walked two in picking up Ross's first win of the season. Ross, now 1-4 after the split, scored a pair of runs in the second inning of the first game and iced the contest with five more in the fifth.

Tim Belch's single, an error, a wild pitch, and two fielder's choices gave Ross the two runs in the second.

In the fifth, five straight hits keyed the five-run outburst. Steve McGilton, Joel Krout, Scott Carmack, and Belch singled and Tim Oberst doubled in the inning. Oberst was out at third trying to stretch his hit into a triple.

In the second game, Lima scored in every inning except the seventh while pounding Ross pitching for 11 hits. The Little Giants committed six errors but two glaring misjudged fly balls that fell for hits keyed a five-run fifth inning. The Little Giants trailed 13-0 at the end of that frame.

Ross managed just four hits off the slants of John Broghan. Dave Dallweg homered, doubled, and singled to drive in three runs for Lima. Dallweg also scored four runs in the runaway.

The Little Giants will host Sandusky Perkins this afternoon at Anderson Field and will travel to Tiffin for a game against Columbian Tuesday.

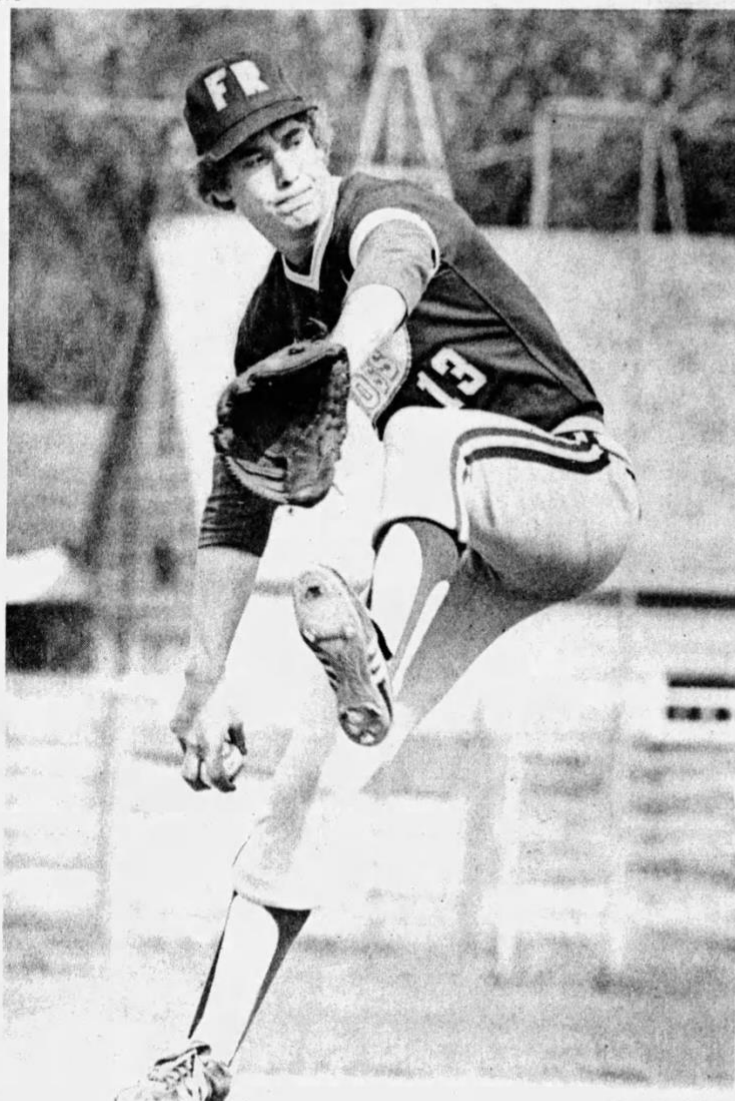

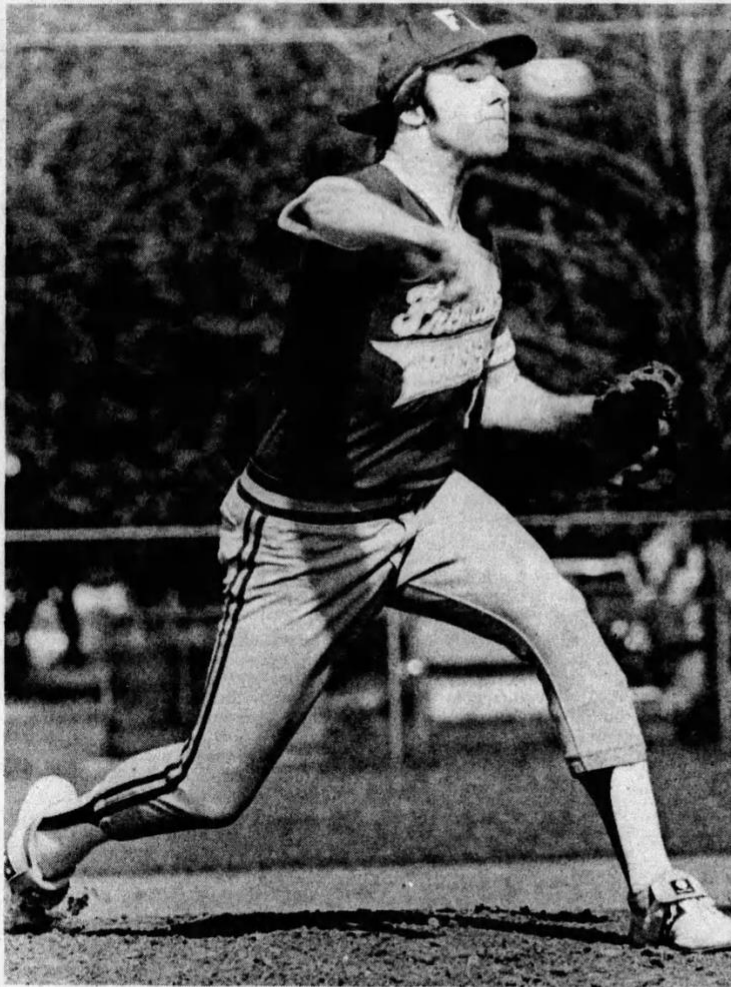
