Marks Again Threatened At Ross Night Relays

Last spring, the second year for the Annual Night Relays at Harmon field, the entire record book was rewritten. Another assault will be made Friday night as six high school track teams take aim at the 13 existing marks.

Teams entered include Fremont, Ross, Bowling Green, Fostoria,

Toledo Clay, Oak Harbor and Findlay. Bowling Green, defending champion, brings another powerful squad and, according to Little Giant track mentor John Ihnat, is a heavy favorite to repeat.

Looking over the record board which hangs inside the Little Gi-

ant dressing room, Ihnat predicts that only the shot put, discus and distance medley events may be safe from the record-breaking seekers.

Friday's affair will begin at 5:30 with the pole vault, continue at 6 with other field events and receive a boost by the running events at 7:30.

Record for the one lap relay (440-yards) is 45.7 set by Bowling Green. Ross has done the time in 47.0 this year and Ihnat is hopeful that the Little Giants will snap the record.

Findlay holds the two lap relay (880-yards) with a time of 1:34. Ross' best effort to date is 1:35.

The four lap relay (mile) seems certain to fall again as Bowling Green, the record holder with a time of 3:35.7, has already gone the distance in a time of 3:34 this spring. Ross is off the pace at 3:52.

Bowling Green holds the record in the two mile event with a clocking of 8:23.7. Ross can go nine minutes flat and only Bowling Green seems to have a chance at a new mark.

Sprint medley (110-110-220-440-yards) is held by Bowling Green with a reading of 1:38.2. Both Ross and the BG Bobcats will be shooting at this record. The Little Giants are capable of moving along at a 1:40 clip.

Distance medley (880-220-440-yards) should stand at 8:07.3 by Toledo Clay.

Toledo Clay also holds the record in the shuttle hurdles with a clocking of 55.2. Ihnat said Bowling Green has the best hurdlers and could lower the time.

One of the interesting events is the obstacle relay of 400-yards. Each boy runs 100-yards and over four low hurdles. Best time is held by Clay at 47.9. Again Bowling Green is the choice to snap the record.

One of the stars of this spring's Little Giant squad is Ed Hufford, a senior, who transferred here from Clay, and Hufford was instrumental in helping Clay to some of its records.

Field events are judged on the basis of a three-man team. Findlay's best three shot putters last year heaved the ball 136½ feet. It appears this record will stand.

Oak Harbor, Ihnat feels, is the team to beat in the discus. The Rockets hold the record here with a combined toss of 384'8".

Ross, Clay and Bowling Green look to have the best chance at a new pole vault record. Old mark is held by Clay at 29'6".

In the high jump, Ihnat said a lot depends upon the strength of the third man. Clay is the record holder with a jump of 16'9". Most of the squads entered will go about 16' and the extra effort by the third boy could be the difference in the quest of another record.

Fostoria holds the broad jump record at 57'3½" but Ross could go 58' here.

Liston, Patterson Rematch Set For June 27, Las Vegas

NEW YORK (AP) — The off-and-on rematch between Sonny Liston and Floyd Patterson for the heavyweight title is on again today, in Las Vegas June 27.

Liston's advisor, Jack Nilon, has agreed to the date and site, "with reluctance," he said at his home in Chester, Pa.

"That's right, the title fight is going to be in Las Vegas June 27," a Liston sparring partner, Fondea Cox, said in Denver.

Liston, also in Denver, was not available for comment.

Nilon didn't spell out the reluctance, but the chances were that he wanted the fight held in Baltimore, where he is the leading concessions man.

However, under the contract for the first fight in which Liston took the title on a one-round knockout, Patterson has the right to pick the date and site of the rematch.

Patterson first selected Miami Beach April 4, but after a one week postponement that site was finally abandoned, officially because Liston claimed he had hurt his left knee while swinging a golf club for a photographer.

Officials of Championship Sports Inc., were reported in Las Vegas today, looking over Convention Center as a possible site.

Nilon referred all details on the fight to the promoters, none of whom were immediately available.

Under terms of the original contract, each fighter will get 30 per cent of the gate and 20 per cent of the theater television rights.

Nilon said Liston's damaged knee is "holding up all right" in training sessions in Denver, where the champion has been for two weeks. Patterson is training in the New York area.

BG Bobcats Strong Pick To Repeat

Bowling Green's Bobcats have been established heavy favorites to win their second consecutive championship Friday night as the Third Annual Night Relays unfold at Harmon field.

Bowling Green won the title last season with 53 points, shading Toledo Clay which put on a determined late bid to close with 48 counters. Other squads returning and their finishes last spring are Findlay, 31 points; Fremont, 30; Fostoria, 26½ and Oak Harbor, 19½. Findlay won the crown two years ago when Ross Coach John Ihnat started the colorful affair.

Field events start at 6, with the exception of the pole vault which goes off at 5:30. Running events will begin at 7:30.

Giving a big helping hand in staging the event are the Ross Booster Club and Booster Track Committee, Don Smith, Ken Sale, Bob Auxter and Marsh Dorr are booster officers. Committee men are John Frontz and Smith, awards; Dorr, Randall Miller and Roy Ballenger admissions; Sig Svane, concessions; Auxter, Sale and Bob Roush, marshals; Dick Chesnutwood, parking Harold Althoff, officials; Ihnat, Pat Koebel and Nancy Hill, programs.

Asked what he thought of Ross' chances in the meet, Ihnat remarked: "I'm optimistic."

Best Chance

Ihnat predicts he has possibly his best chance in the one and two lap relays — the 440-yard and 880-yard races. Going for Ross in each event will be Larry Kelly, Gary Koebel, Dick Thiessen and Ed Hufford.

The remainder of the Little Giant lineup Friday will be as follows:

Last spring on a balmy evening runners and fieldmen broke every existing record.

Boys To Watch

Some of the outstanding thin-clads to watch will be Ed Hufford, Ross sprinter; Danford, Ross hurdler; Ziemke, Little Giant weighman; Dick Hufford, Fremont distance runner; Mike Wegler, all-around star of Bowling Green who took four first places in a meet against Ross earlier this season; Bill Rothe and John Frobose, BG high jumpers; and Gerald Denny and Denny Torow, Oak Harbor discus throwers.

Weger, who can race, jump and throw the weights about as well as any schoolboy in the area, already has broken the Bowling Green record in the shot put at 48'9½."

Backbone

Tornow and Denay form what Ihnat feels will be the backbone of an awfully strong Rocket entry in the three-man discus event. Ed Hufford has been the mainstay of the Fremont squad, often taking three firsts and anchoring the 880-yard relay team. Dick Hufford has been consistent in the long yardage runs. Ziemke is improving his weight tosses each time out, while Rothe and Frobose also can run well on Bowling Green's relay teams. Danford has been almost unbeatable in the hurdles thus far. Ross has defeated Oak Harbor but has lost to Bowling Green in dual meets this spring. A dual with Fostoria had to be postponed because of rain.

Never Bend Now In Peak Derby Form

LOUISVILLE, Ky. (AP) — There's not a happier man in Louisville today than Woody Stephens, trainer of Cain Hoy Stable's Kentucky Derby hopeful Never Bend.

Never Bend, second choice to Rex Ellsworth's Candy Spots for next Saturday's Derby, erased any doubt about his condition Friday when he scored an impressive eighth-length victory in the \$7,500 Stopping Stone at Churchill Downs.

The colt, who two weeks ago caused Stephens to revamp his training schedule drastically, because of a poor performance in the Fore-runner at Keeneland looked every part a champion in winning the 7-furlong race in near track record time.

Changes Mind
Stephens originally had planned to start the son of Nasrullah-Lulu in the Derby Trial at one mile next Tuesday, but changed his mind after Never Bend ran so badly in the Fore-runner.

Stephens felt if Never Bend ran poorly Friday he still would have a chance to give him a hard workout before the Derby. He waited until the trial, there would not have been time.

Never Bend, turning in fractions of 23 seconds, 45.25, 1:10.45, hit the finish 1 minute 22.3 seconds, just two-fifths off the track record.

Finished Second
Rex Ellsworth's Candy Spots finished second, 3/4 lengths in front of Harry M. Reed's Bob Full. Bold Invader, who ran as an entry with Space Skates, finished fourth and last.

In another Derby development Friday, Greenlee Stable's Outing Class was declared out of the May 4 classic because of a temperature. Trainer John Gaver said he will be shipped to New York as soon as he is able.

Derby hopeful Rajah, No. 10, owned by Mrs. Leslie Fenton, worked 6 furlongs in an unimpressive 1:15, but Trainer R. L. Wheeler Jr., still planned to start him in the Derby Trial.

Fremont Ross Fourth; Seven Marks Topples

Seven records toppled Friday night as about 800 spectators at Harmon field watched Bowling Green high school capture the Third Annual Fremont Night Relays with a team total of 49 points.

It was the second consecutive year that the six-team event went to the Bobcats.

Fostoria was second with 44 points, Findlay had 37, Fremont 35, Oak Harbor 23 and Toledo Clay 21.

The Little Giants had two firsts, one in the 440-yard relay and another in the 880-yard relay.

Fremont exhibited the fastest foursome of Larry Kelly, Gary Kober, Dick Thiessen and Ed Hufford. This group had a rather easy time of it in both events and broke two records.

The Little Giants 440-yard team finished with a clicking of 45.2. Kelly started and gave Ross the lead. He handed the baton to Kober, who held his own and who later handed off to Thiessen. The tall sprinter was about three yards ahead going into the final exchange. Ed Hufford raced home with a comfortable lead over the threat of Findlay.

After resting for about 30 minutes, Ross' same quartet came back to win the 880-yard event in record-breaking time. Time 1:32.7. Findlay held the old half-mile mark at 1:34. Bowling Green watched its own 440-yard record broken at 45.7.

Another record to topple was in the shot put as Findlay snapped its own mark of 126' 6", with a combined heave of 129' 1/2". All field events are determined by a three-man team.

A fourth record to fall was in the pole vault when Oak Harbor totaled out with 31' 6", breaking Clay's record of 28' 6". Norvin Skinner, a muscular lad, set the Rocket pace with a vault of 11' 3". Fifth mark to be broken was in the broad jump as Fostoria won with a distance of 38' 4", cutting the old record of 37' 3/4" by the same Fostoria team a year ago.

The mile relay record also was broken. Bowling Green, which held the old record at 3:32.7, slipped a tenth of a second off the mark with a foursome of Bill Robb, Royce Beaverson, Tom Terry and Ron Bachman.

Final record established was in the sprint medley. Bowling Green took this one also with a timing of 1:17.2. The old record was held by Bowling Green of 1:18.3. New record-holders are Bachman, Jim Hadd, Doug Garrett and George Canfield. All former records were set in 1962.

The mile vault, first to start at 5:30 p.m., was the final event of the night at 8:45. And it decided the meet as well. Green and Fostoria were running neck-and-neck in point standings all the way. BG's Mike Weger finished second in the event to help his team.

Another strong showing
Fremont was in the two-mile relay with Dick Hufford, Mike Terry, Bob Mitchell and Bob George running. Hufford's great finish gave Ross the push it needed for its only second place of the meet.

The Little Giants started well in the sprint medley but faltered at the close and came in third. Fostoria, with Hauser, Fant, Jackson and Cris Green running, showed excellent form in winning both hurdle events, the shuttle hurdle and obstacle hurdle. The Redmen won both handily.

Another easy victory was recorded by Bowling Green in the two-mile relay with Robb, Beaverson, Lehman and McCann doing the running.

Starter John Titworth and Referee Walt Deichert both helped in keeping the meet running at a smooth clip, avoiding much of the nagging delays of last spring. Coach John Thast, who started the relays three seasons ago to promote more track interest in Fremont, and his staff worked hard this year to put on an interesting show.

Colts' Bob Bruce Tames Cincinnati On One Hit; Angels Oust Birds, 4-3

"We're just not hitting, our pitching hasn't been too good, and our defense has been spotty."

And if those words from Cincinnati Mr. Fred Hutchinson don't accurately describe the reason the pennant hopeful Reds are in ninth place in the National League, then there haven't been 75 bails called this season.

Houston right-hander Bob Bruce made Hutch's words more prophetic once the teams took the field Friday night, allowing only a first-inning single by Vada Pinson while pitching the first out-batter in the league this season for a 20 Colts' victory.

No Run-Making
"We haven't had a run batted in from our third-base position since the 19th of March (Don Blasingame and Pete Rose)," said Hutchinson. "Vada Pinson hasn't been hitting, either."

Pinson hit against the Colts, getting the Red's first and last hit in the first inning. Bruce, 29, a former American League pitcher, hit a batter in the second, then retired 19 in a row before allowing two base runners on walks in the ninth.

The Reds have lost four in a row—two by shutouts—and have scored only three runs during the skid.

Meanwhile, at the top of the standings, St. Louis took sole possession of first place when a two-run double by Bill White and George Altman's run-producing single with two out in the ninth carried the Cards to an 8-7 victory over the Los Angeles Dodgers.

Unearned Runs
Seven unearned runs and the three-hit pitching of Lew Burdette carried Milwaukee to a 9-2 decision over San Francisco. Pittsburgh whipped the New York Mets 5-2 and Philadelphia defeated the Chicago Cubs 5-1.

In the American League, Minnesota beat Detroit 7-5, the Los Angeles Angels outlasted Baltimore 6-3 in 13 innings and Kansas City and Washington split a two-night doubleheader. The A's won 12-8 in 13 innings before the Senators took the nightcap 6-0.

Behind by six runs early in the game, the Cards went into the night still trailing the Dodgers 7-3. Single by Phil Gagliano and Curt Flood set it up for White and Ron Pagan. White was the winner, coming through against reliever Ron Perranoski, who took the loss. The Dodgers had stormed ahead on single shots by Johnny Rose.
