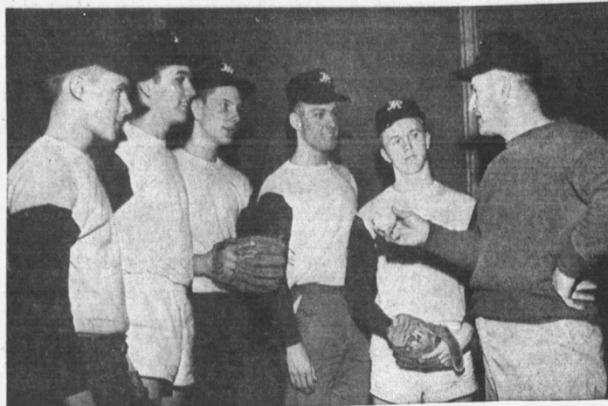

By 3-0 Count:

Peddicord Turns Back Grandview

LIMA — Ned Peddicord worked his way out of several jams here Friday while pitching a four hit shutout as Fremont Ross defeated Columbus Grandview 3-0 in the opening round of the Class 'AA' regional baseball tournament.

Ross plays Lima Senior today at 2 o'clock at Industry Park for the regional title and the right to make the state trip. Lima defeated Toledo DeVilbiss, 5-1.

Lima Senior is seeking its sixth straight state berth and Ross is eyeing its first trip to Columbus since 1958.

Peddicord was tough in the clutch and left the bases loaded in the first inning after suffering a wild streak. In all, Grandview stranded nine runners on the bases. Fremont left only four. Peddicord struck out 13 batters and walked seven, while Barry Shrode, considered one of the best hurlers in the central district, fanned seven and walked three. He also allowed only four hits.

Fremont scored two unearned runs in the third inning and added an insurance tally in the fifth.

Peddicord and Russ Hagerty walked in the third inning and after two were out Verne Erchenbrecher grounded to the third baseman who threw wildly to first, allowing Peddicord to score and sending Hagerty to third. Hagerty then scored on another overthrow to give Ross its second run.

In the fifth Fremont scored an untainted tally when Hagerty doubled and rode home on Jerry Binder's single. Grandview had a threat in the sixth when Catcher Tom Reines tripled and tried to score on a short passed ball. He was cutdown at the plate, however.

Coach Don Purvis indicated he would start little righthander Mike Frantz in today's crucial test. Frantz stands 4-0 on the season. Peddicord is now 5-0 and the Little Giants have won 13 without a loss.

Lima used Gary LeAue, its best pitcher, for four innings against DeVilbiss and finished with Bob Allen. DeVilbiss ace Geof Zahn took the loss after fanning five of the first six batters. However, he fell victim to some poor fielding support. Also hitting safely for Fremont were Rick Gabel and Dave George.

Purvis credited Peddicord for doing an outstanding job of pitching in the clutch. On three occasions he struck out a key batter with a runner perched on third base.

Marshman One To Beat In '500' Race Trial Test

INDIANAPOLIS (AP) — Twenty-eight glittering cars were lined up today for assaults in the Indianapolis Motor Speedway qualifying records in eliminations for the 48th 500-mile race May 30.

With temperatures expected to be in the low 80s and no rain in sight, the question was not whether records would be set but how high they would go.

The trial record, set last year by race winner Parnelli Jones, 51 miles an hour, had been broken by at least 18 cars in practice.

Jones himself had done 157.6 in the same front-engine Offenhauser but was tied for only second-best practice speed. He had been matched late Friday by Jimmy Clark of Scotland, defending world road racing champion, in a rear-engine Lotus-Ford.

The man to beat, in another Lotus-Ford, was Bobby Marsh-

man of Pottstown, Pa., who had a 153.7 lap Friday.

A. J. Foyt of Houston, Tex., former 500 winner and defending U.S. Auto Club big car champion, got up to 157.6 Friday in a conventional front-engine Offenhauser.

Clark chased Jones across the finish line last year.

The fastest car in today's trials will hold the pole position,

the inside spot on the three-car front row, in spite of later speeds. All cars qualified today will hold their positions, with those qualifying Sunday and the following weekend falling in behind.

A qualified car can be eliminated, however, if it is not one of the 33 fastest. If it is bumped from the field, the cars below it each move up one place.

Villanova Distancemen Set Two-Mile Relay Record

LOS ANGELES (AP)—A Villanova four-man team equaled a world record. Grambling college's crack teams won the 440 and 880-yard relays and world record holder Dallas Long remained supreme in the field of shot-putting.

Such were some of the results of the annual Los Angeles Coliseum Relays Friday night before 26,713 chilled fans.

Sprinter Richard Stebbins of

Grambling edged out Henry Carr in the 100-meter dash, each with times of 10.2, and Carr came back to defeat Bob Hayes in the 200 meters in 20.6, avenging a defeat Hayes scored in the same event here last year. Hayes' time was 20.8.

Villanova's Jim Orr, Al Adams, Tom Sullivan and Noel Carroll reeled off the two-mile relay in 7:19.0, equaling the world mark registered by an Oregon State team at Modesto, Calif., May 25, 1963.

While no records were broken, Long's shot-put "duel" with freshman Randy Matson of Texas A & M was a crowd-pleaser.

Long won with 65-5½, shy of his listed world standard of 65-10½ and his pending mark of 65-11½. Matson, who fouled out on three puts, was second at 63-6¾.

Grambling's 440 relay team of Don Meadows, Stebbins, Vernus Ragsdale and Don Owens clicked off a 40.2. And the same four-some won the 880 in 1:23.8. New Mexico was second in both relays in 40.3 and 1:24.0.

Spartans Make Sixth Trip To Finals:

Lima Cuts Ross State Bid

LIMA — Now Fremont Ross and some of the other finalists in the Class 'AA' Regional baseball tournament in these here parts know what American League teams feel under the domination of the New York Yankees.

For the sixth consecutive spring Lima Senior high will journey to Columbus to present its case in the Ohio 'AA' baseball tournament finals. Lima earned another trek Saturday over the Ross Little Giants on Spartan dust.

Lima led all the way, scoring solo runs in the first, third and fourth innings and putting the game out of reach in the fifth with a three-run rally. The Spartans made sure of its regional title with two more runs in the sixth. Fremont scored an unearned run in the fifth.

Ross, which was seeking its first trip to the state since 1958 when lefty Doug Gallagher hurled here, made only two base hits off two Lima pitchers, Gary

LaRue, who went the first three innings, and lanky Bob Allen, who finished.

Ross bowed out of tourney play with a 13-1 record and Lima upped its season record to 15-0.

Lima showed its speed on the base paths, stealing nine bases including two thefts of home. The Spartans had a comfortable 6-1 lead in the sixth when they pulled off four stolen bases, two of home.

Ken Pasch opened Fremont's first inning with a sharp single to center and the blow raised the hopes of a good Fremont following. Russ Hagerty forced Pasch at second and later was picked off first base. Fremont's only other hit came in the third when with two out starting pitcher Mike Frantz drilled a single to right centerfield. Pasch hit a line drive to left to end the inning.

Ross got its run in the fifth when with one down Bob Sanford walked and was forced at second by Dave George. Jerry Slatter was hit by a pitch and both runners moved along on a wild pitch by Allen. Bob Shet-

enhelm, who replaced Frantz on the mound in the fourth inning, dribbled a grounder between short and third and the third baseman couldn't handle it and the ruling was an error. George scored.

Lima scored in the first on a triple by fleet Dave Reynolds and a ground ball.

The Spartans added a second run in the third on a walk to Jerry McDonald, a single by LaRue, a walk to Reynolds and a sacrifice fly off the bat of Darrell Hollar. The Lima third sacker drilled a fly to deep right and the wind carried it out to the fence. Pasch ran back and made a spectacular one-handed grab to rob Hollar of a home run. Lima scored again in the fourth on two singles and two bases on balls. Shetenhelm came on with runners on second and third and one out and inherited a two-ball count on McDonald. He walked that batter and passed LaRue to force in run No. 3. The Ross junior then settled down, found his control and retired the side.

Lima broke it open in the

fifth. Mike Poling reached second on an error. Roger Waben walked and both pulled off a double steal. Allen singled in Poling and Waben stopped at third. Allen stole second and followed Waben across the plate on McDonald's single.

Reynolds blopped a double to right to start the sixth, stole third and home. Hollar walked, stole second, went to third when Reynolds raced home and scored while he, too, swiped the plate.

Ross was retired in order in five of the seven innings. Lima went down 1-2-3 only in the second.

Lima pitchers did not walk a batter and struck out three. Ross moundsmen fanned one and walked five.
