ROSS CAGERS BOOK 18 GAMES

Open Here With Hamilton On Dec. 6; Drills Will Start Next Week

The Ross high basketball team will play an 18-game schedule, exclusive of tournaments, the coming season, Faculty Manager Roy Ballenger announced Saturday. Twelve of the games, including five Buckeye league contests, will be played on the home court.

One new foe appears on the Little Giant schedule, with Hamilton coming here for the opening contest on December 6. All games have been definitely booked except the St. Joseph's and Elyria tilts, tentatively scheduled for December 30 and January 6.

Eddie Gabel, head cage coach, said that practice would get under way the week following the Thanksgiving football game, although some of the aspirants for the squad will start drilling a bit earlier.

The Ross schedule, with Buckeye league games denoted by an asterisk, is as follows:

The district Class A tournament will be March 6, 7, 13 and 14, with the state tournament tentatively set for March 19, 20, 21.

ROSS COURT DRILLS START

Coach Eddie Gabel To Meet Hopefuls Monday; Two Lettermen Return

With the first basketball game of the season, a brush with Hamilton, O., but two weeks in the offing, Coach Eddie Gabel will hold his first drill for the Little Giant court hopefuls Monday.

The Ross mentor expects about 20 varsity candidates and must virtually build from the bottom up. Only two lettermen, Co-Captains Bob Hall and Snooks Jenkins, are returning from the team that won 18 of 22 games, including tournament jousts, last year and advanced to the finals of district Class A play in Sandusky.

Missing this year will be Jack Carroll, forward, who was high scorer; Dale Bowlus, center; Carl Hufford and Dick Frantz, guards; although Ed Fox and Frank Wernig, members of the first squad last year, are returning for another season.

Reserves Back

The one bright spot in the entire outlook is that the 1941 Reserve team, which hung up a record of 22 victories and no losses, will be back almost intact.

Returning to make a bid for starting honors will be Dave Brocksieker, Wernig and Russ Overmyer, forwards; Dick Myers, center; Glen Bingman and Pete Michaels, guards; Don Dickman, another member of that stellar outfit, has withdrawn from school.

Apparently Coach Gabel's biggest problems will be to uncover another consistent scorer to plug the gap left by Carroll's departure and to team with Jenkins, and dig up a good center and another guard. Whether members of last year's Reserves can fill the bill remains to be seen.

Expect Large Squads

The game with Hamilton here December 6 opens an 18-game schedule, plus any other tilts the Little Giants may play in tournament competition.

Coach Legs Binkley, who will again have charge of the Reserves, doesn't expect to get started much before the end of the week and will probably have between 60 and 70 boys out at the start. The squad will undoubtedly be pared a great deal early in the season.

Similarly, Coach Gordon Hart will get started on the Junior high program in another week or so and judging from the response to Junior high football, will also probably have around 60 or 70 youngsters show up for the initial drills. He will probably keep 20 or 30 on the squad throughout the season.

MEET NEW FOE IN HAMILTON, OHIO, QUINTET

Hall And Jenkins Only Veterans On Gabel-Coached Club

A Ross high school basketball team which Coach Eddie Gabel claims isn't all that he would like it to be—yet—will swing into action Saturday night against as powerful a foe as any quintet could ask for an opener.

The initial foe is Hamilton, O. high school, champions of the state three years ago and always a power. The down-staters have already seen considerable action and last night dropped a close 39 to 30 tilt to a strong Defiance quintet.

The Little Giant team that will pry the lid off the new season in the Ross gym is two-fifths experienced and three-fifths 'green' as far as front line basketball is concerned.

Coach Gabel will have a pair of experienced forwards in Co-Captains Snooks Jenkins and Bob Hall, but from the offensive foul circle back to the home basket the players will be fresh from last year's Reserves.

Jenkins Hitting

Jenkins was runner-up to Jack Carroll for high-point honors last season and in practice sessions has shown the same aptitude at hitting the bucket. Last year he drilled in almost 200 points, which isn't bad. His running mate, Hall, ranked third in scoring.

But from there back, it's all guess work. The pivot post will be held down by Dick Myers who showed flashes of brilliance with a Reserve team that won 22 straight last year but must be placed, definitely, in the erratic class until he has proved himself under the pressure of varsity competition.

Dave Brocksieker, a steady player, and Glenn Bingman, who looked good last season except for his seeming inability to go the full four quarters, will start at the guard positions. Thus far both are distinctly good prospects but at the same time uncertain quantities.

Coach Gabel, starting his fifth campaign as court mentor, hasn't been waxing too enthusiastic over the prospects for a winning season. His embryo varsity outclassed Toledo Waite in a practice game and played on about even terms with Woodward.

Will Use All

According to Gabel, who should know, they are a bit inclined to sloppy ball-handling and have shown little aptitude at the foul line. Other than that, they have shown marked signs of developing into a pretty fair quintet. Their marksmanship from the floor has been good.

For the opening game the team will use, chiefly, a man-to-man defense but is apt to shift to a zone at any time. The Ross mentor plans a bit of diversified action. He has also stated that, win or lose, he expects to use every player on his 10-man varsity in this opening game.

A preliminary between a freshman and a sophomore team from the local school will usher in basketball activities at 7 p. m. and the varsity boys will take the floor an hour later. Probably starting line-ups follow:

CAGERS LOOK BIT RAGGED IN INITIAL GAME

**Bow Before Hamilton's
Last Period Spurt
As Offensive Fails**

Revealing plenty of ragged edges that must be polished off, but at the same time plenty of potential power, Ross high's Little Giants opened the winter basketball campaign with a loss Saturday night. The touring Hamilton high school club handed them a 37 to 33 defeat as a bid-lifter.

The game was a rather listless affair until the visitors put on the closing spurt that erased a slim Fremont lead and gave them the four-point edge. It was played before a surprisingly small crowd, too.

Inability to do two things consistently cost the Gabel-men their first start of the 18-game campaign. Those two things were hitting the basket and stop Bill Smith, the invader's fast-moving center.

The Little Giants connected on but 14 of 54 heaves from the court and five of 16 from the foul line while Smith accounted for 23 points all by his lonesome, nine of them in the stretch drive that decided the game.

Cagers Off Form

That Coach Eddie Gabel has a lot of things to do, and his squad plenty of work ahead, before it develops into a smooth-working, fast-passing and accurate-shooting quintet, was discernible early in the game. The defense was ragged, with the Hamilton cagers continually eluding Dick Myers, Bob Hall and Ed Fox, and the offense wasn't clicking on even one of its five cylinders.

Lack of practice was probably responsible in the main for the losing start. Only Snooks Jenkins appeared at home on the court and he was away off form in his shooting. He was also the only one of the starting team that appeared at ease on the hardwood.

Fox Looks Good

The game proved something else, besides that more practice is needed. It was that Ed Fox is going to give somebody a mighty nussle for a starting assignment. He replaced Dick Myers after the latter was tagged with three personals early in the game, scored seven points and gave the Little Giants the only lead they ever had.

The game started slowly and nearly three minutes had elapsed before Smith gave Hamilton a three point lead. The period ended 11 to 8, and the second stanza was even closer the score at half-time being 20 to 19 as all the Ross players except Dave Brocksieker had a hand in the scoring.

Fox tied the count at the start of the third with a follow shot off the backboard and, after Bob Hall had sank a two-pointer, he boosted in another short one to make it 27 to 23. Arent trimmed the score to 27 to 25 as the period ended with a toss from center court.

Bog Down

Jenkins missed both ends of a double charity throw to start the final period and then Bill Smith swung into action with two short shots that put the visitors in front again, this time 29-27, and after Minnick had scored Smith again hit the hoop. He also counted another fielder and two fouls before the period ended.

The only points the Little Giants made in the last frame were field goals by Jenkins, Brocksieker and Hall.

The game was really won and lost at the foul line as the winners were outscored, 14 to 12, from the court. They counted 13 free throws, however.

Rossmen Play Pt. Clinton; Streaks Meet St. Wendelin's

Fans Must Choose Between Two Home Attractions As Schoolboy Quintets Seek Revenge For Setbacks In First Games

Allegiance of the city's basketball fans will be divided tonight as two games, both in Fremont, claim their attention.

In one game the St. Joseph's Streaks will be making their first home stand of the infantile season, having underwent their baptism in Toledo last Tuesday night, bowing before a powerful Central Catholic five, 47 to 25. In the other the Ross high Little Giants, also playing their second game, will meet Port Clinton.

Both varsity games, the one in Educational hall and the other in Ross gym, will be preceded by preliminary games featuring the Reserve teams, at 7 p. m.

Ross vs Pt. Clinton

Coach Eddie Gabel's Purple basketballers, making their second appearance before the home fans, will be out to redeem themselves for a 37 to 33 defeat suffered last Saturday at the hands of the touring Hamilton quintet.

In their first start the Rossmen, with but two veterans in the lineup, played a spotty game. They started slowly, seemed to find themselves and then slumped in the final period to lose a slim lead and finish on the short end of the score.

Throughout the game their shooting was off and they never seemed wholly at ease on the court. Their pass work also left something to be desired. Coach Gabel hopes that he has corrected some of these early season weaknesses in the past week and the shooting has been better.

More Seasoned

In Port Clinton the Little Giants meet a team that has been playing a bit longer and has a record of three victories and one defeat already. The Porters have verdicts over Lakeside, Gibsonburg and Oak Harbor, while they fell before Tiffin Columbian, apparently a powerful club, 46 to 19, last Tuesday.

The Ottawa county five has always proved a troublesome one for Fremont teams and it is unlikely that Bob Hall, co-captain with Snooks Jenkins, will see much service tonight. He has been resting a bad shoulder and a football leg all week. Ed Fox will probably start in his place.

Except for this change the Giants will undoubtedly line-up as they did against Hamilton with Jenkins at a forward, Dick Myers at center, Dave Brocksieker and Glenn Bingman at guards.

Meet St. Wendelin's

St. Joseph's apparently has its work cut out ahead of time as well, and must be at their best to hold off a fast Fostoria St. Wendelin's quintet.

The visiting Saints opened in auspicious style earlier in the week, soundly thrashing Gibsonburg, 50 to 27, on the latter's floor. In that game the Fostorians started fast and finished fast, having but one period in which they netted less than 12 points.

Coach Gene Gfell is experiencing the same difficulties this season as his down-street contemporary—lack of experienced material. He, too, has but two players from last year's varsity and must rely heavily on performers up from the reserves.

Must Watch Trio

Although they absorbed a pretty sound whipping in Toledo, the Streaks didn't play a bad game. They were simply outclassed by a taller, more experienced quintet that used a fast break on a bigger floor and had the benefit of three previous games.

Against the Mohawks, the Streaks should fare much better but it will mean keeping a constant eye and a hard rein on Forward Smith and Center Stoner, who caged 30 points between them against Gibsonburg, and also Capt. Magers who accounted for 11.

Coach Gfell will start the same lineup he did against Central with Hank Dorobek and Joe Durnwald at guards; Babe Kupka at center; Paul Ackerman and Junior Ochs at forwards.

PAIR OF FINE BOUTS TONIGHT

JENKINS NETS 23 POINTS IN 41 TO 14 ROUT

Porters Give Little Giants Good Workout And Little More

The Little Giant cagers had their first victory of the season today and what a victory it was—a 41 to 14 rout of Port Clinton, staged on the Fremont court Friday night.

Taken by and large it wasn't much of a ball game. After the first two minutes of play, when Snooks Jenkins started to hit the hoop, the visitors were never in it. It was good practice for Coach Eddie Gabel's crew, however, and the entire varsity squad of 10 saw action.

Fremont's fast break and rapid passing game, which was clicking much better than against Hamilton last week, had them completely bewildered. They seldom had possession of the ball until the final period and when they did have it, couldn't find the basket.

Aside from setting some kind of a record for missing free throws, 15 in succession, the Ottawa county lads scored but two points the first period, four the second, none the third and then finished with an eight-point splurge.

Jenkins Hot

Paced by Jenkins, who accounted for 23 points on nine action shots and five three throws in less than three quarters of play, the Little Giants went to town almost from the opening whistle.

Jenkins caged the first eight points before Thompson sank one for Port Clinton and then Glenn Blingman and Bob Hall sank action shots to make it 12 to 2 at the quarter.

The brief intermission didn't cool off the little Fremont forward and he accounted for seven more points before Coach Gabel took him out in the second stanza. Pete Michaels scored the other two points for the Rossmen to make it 21 to 6 at halftime.

Can't Be Stopped

The starting lineup took the floor for the Little Giants again at the start of the second half, with the exception of Ed Fox, who was replaced by Myers. The latter scored twice in quick succession and Hall added a free throw before Jenkins swung into action again with a pair of two-pointers and then cashed in on both ends of a double free throw. Myers dropped in another action shot and so did Jenkins before he was sent to the showers and a rest. Pete Michaels sank three straight free throws to make the count 38 to 6 at the three-quarter mark.

Coach Gabel wasn't out to run up a score and aside from substituting in the second period, did the same thing in the third and virtually an entire second team finished the game.

It was little more than practice for the Little Giants and made them look on a par—on paper at least—with Tiffin Columbian, next Friday's foe in the first Buckeye league tilt of the season. The Columbians polished off Port Clinton, 46 to 19, last Tuesday night.

Ross Meets First League Foe As Streaks Play County Rivals

**Little Giants' Task Made More Difficult By
Ineligibility Of Ed Fox; Streaks Should Crack
Victory Column Against Weak Foe**

This city's two court representatives, Ross and St. Joseph's highs, will both be gunning for "firsts" Friday night when they divide the home assignment for the second consecutive week.

The Little Giants, with an even break in two games thus far, will be after their first Buckeye League victory of the new season when they square off against Tiffin Columbian. The Crimson Streaks will be in quest of their initial 1941 win, after losing two games, and hope to score it at the expense of Gibsonburg.

Both games will be preceded by tilts between Reserve teams, scheduled for 7 p. m.

Tiffin Formidable

Coach Eddie Gabel's Purple hoopsters face a mighty tough assignment in the Columbians who, at the present time, loom as the class of the Buckeye loop.

The visitors have scored four impressive victories with Bob Pearce, the lanky all-league center, setting the pace and are going to be extremely hard to stop. In his team's last two games, Port Clinton and Bellevue, Pearce accounted for an even 40 points, outscoring the opposition single-handedly. Port Clinton was taken, 46 to 19, with Pearce netting 21 points, while Bellevue was stopped, 38 to 15, with the pivot star accounting for 19 points.

The Little Giants looked good in beating Port Clinton last week but the fact that the opposition offered little has effectively curbed any over-confidence. Coach Gabel still lacks a high-scoring running mate for Snooks Jenkins and isn't at all satisfied with the ball-handling of his club.

Fox Ineligible

It would appear that the chief worry of the Ross mentor is to find a player who can effectively hold down Pearce and the task wasn't made any easier Thursday when Ed Fox was declared ineligible because of scholastic difficulties.

With Fox out of the game, Gabel must depend on Dick Myers with Pete Michaels and Jim Wisbon as his No. 1 substitutes. Myers looked fair in a substitute's role against Port Clinton, but against such a player as Pearce may find himself banished with four personal fouls before the game really gets underway.

It will probably be up to one or the other of these two boys to put the curb on Pearce and much of the Little Giants' chances depend on how effectively they do it.

Tiffin advices stated that Pearce is being treated for cracked ribs while Harry Miller, veteran guard, is nursing an ankle injury, but that both expect to start here Friday night.

Streaks Should Win

The Crimson Streaks' task looks a bit easier than that of their city contemporaries, but there is hardly a sport any more uncertain than basketball.

The invading Gibsonburg Bears have been generally booted around this season and Coach Al Welter has yet to hit upon a five-man combination that really clicks. The Bears have played six games and dropped five of them by margins of from 13 to 30 points.

Their lone victory came last week, a 25 to 17 win over Bradner, but since then they have been beaten by Woodville, 45 to 29.

Coach Gene Gfell's team, losers to Toledo Central and Fostoria St. Wendelin's, have been showing week-to-week improvement and this should be the night they chalk up their initial victory.

Feud For Center

Their margin of defeat at the hands of the Fostoria Saints was but six points, due to a late start, while the same club shellacked the Bears by 23 points, 50 to 27.

Rivalry between Babe Kupka and Gerber for the starting assignment at center is helping the team along no little and their personal feud should put fight in the entire squad. Both have started one game to date and given way to the other before the contest ended.

Inability to get started fast and hit the hoop with regularity has been the Streaks' chief trouble to date and in both previous contests they have been held to 25 points. And 25 points is seldom enough to win a game the way basketball is played today.

Capt. Hank Dorobek gave evidence, late in the game with Fostoria, of having found the basket range and wound up with 10 points. If he can stay on the beam and get a bit of help from his mates, the Streaks should win.

BOBCATS FEEL COURT LOSSES

ROSMEN TAKE FIRST LEAGUE DECISION, 28-26

Top Tiffin Columbian In Rough Game; Myers And Jenkins Sparkle

Ross high's Little Giants overcame what may easily prove to be their toughest Buckeye League opponent during the entire first round last night when they edged out Tiffin Columbian, defending champions, 28 to 26, in a knock-down, drag-out game.

A pair of buckets, by Snooks Jenkins, co-captain and as slippery as a handful of mercury, both in the last four minutes of the game brought the victory after the Rosmen had trailed most of the way. The game was studied by brilliant individual performances and yet was marked by excellent team play. While several players stood out, it was only because of the general play of the entire sextet as Coach Eddie Gabel used but one extra player.

While Jenkins paced both clubs with 12 points and sank the winning and tying buckets, he must share the evening's honors with Dick Myers who played the best game of his career to date.

Game Was Rough
To the hot-headed and unpredictable junior went the unrelenting job of holding down Bob Pearce, lanky Columbian center who, in his team's last two games, single-handedly outscored the opposition. Myers did his work so effectively that Pearce netted but eight points and was held to a lone action toss in each of the four periods.

The game was about as rough an affair as you'll see until the two teams come together again despite the fact only 19 personals were called. Given a club spiece, the Tiffin aggregation would make a good crew to repel any Japanese landing party.

Bob Hall, who started the game at a forward, "got the treatment" in the second period and had to leave the game with a twisted ankle which required medical attention. Pete Michaels replaced him and played a workmanlike game as well as contributing the two points that gave the Little Giants their only lead until the last minute of play.

Visitors Lead
Hall and Jenkins drew first blood with a foul and a fielder at the start of the game only to have Tiffin move ahead, 4 to 3. And that was the way the game was most of the way. The score was tied three times and the period ended at nine all.

Tiffin moved ahead at the start of the second, but Myers tied it up at 12-12 with his first of three baskets and did the same thing at 14-14 only to have Miller dribble in for a bucket and a 16 to 14 lead at the half.

The visitors pulled away to a six point advantage at the start of the third canto before Jenkins connected from the side and bolstered their lead back to six points before the Little Giants uncorked a mild closing spurge.

Action shots by Myers and Jenkins and a free throw by the former pared the Columbians' lead to one point and then, in the closing seconds, Michaels scored his only points from near mid-court to give the Purple a one point lead, 23 to 22.

Fast Close
That lead vanished in a hurry at the start of the final stanza when both Pearce and Joe Brancati scored. The period was half gone before Bingman was fouled by Pearce and made his throw good and then Jenkins stole the ball, dribbled the length of the floor and dropped in the points that knotted the count.

Four minutes remained when that occurred and both teams showed the strain, missing numerous shots including one of the gift variety that Pearce booted. The red light was on the last minute when Jenkins again got the ball and raced almost the entire length of the floor for his sixth, and game-winning, bucket.

The tilt ended with a jump ball after a scramble under the Columbians' basket.

The Little Giants see action again before Christmas, playing Sandusky here next Tuesday night.

Regardless of the apparent strength of the two clubs in pre-game ratings, however, most of the Ross-St. Joe games have been keenly contested affairs and a bit inclined to be on the rough side. Tomorrow night's game should be no exception.

TILT BETWEEN CITY RIVALS IS BIG LETDOWN

Both Quintets Show
Holiday Slump In Con-
test For City Cage Title

The Ross high cagers defeated the St. Joseph's high basketballers 24 to 16, on the former's court Tuesday night, but it wasn't much of a game.

Call it a Christmas letdown or a pre-New Year's hang-over or anything you will, the thrills were as slim as the crowd, composed largely of students and not too large at that.

What the tilt, only one between the two city rivals of this city, really amounted to was a game between a team that wouldn't shoot (St. Joe) and a team that shot but couldn't hit (Ross high).

Jenkins Cold

The Little Giants got away to a four point lead and were never seriously threatened. The game was rough enough with 24 fouls called and four men banished, but it still wasn't a good contest. If both—or even one—team had forgotten personal animosity and played basketball the score would have been entirely different—one way or another.

To start with, the Streaks wouldn't shoot and the Little Giants—who did plenty of shooting—couldn't hit. The result was a vagged, slow and uninspired contest that will come close to ranking as the poorest for either team when the final game has been played.

Snooks Jenkins, sparkplug of the Rossmen's attack, was as cold as the gym and missed 24 shots from the court, 22 of them in succession. He never hit the hoop, except from the foul line, after the first period and ended up with a total of seven points.

Can't Find Hoop

All told, the Little Giants let fire at the bucket 62 times and connected nine times. The Streaks went through the same motions 38 times and missed on 33 of them. That gives you an idea of the ball game.

The game was two minutes old before Glenn Bingham dribbled up the floor to score the first basket and the time had been consumed largely by the Little Giants missing shots. They clearly dominated the entire first half but all they could produce for their trouble was a 16 to 8 lead.

With the start of the second half the Streaks took the game away from their opponents and played a much better floor game but still showed a reluctance to shoot with the result that the score was 19 to 13 at the end of the period. Six minutes had elapsed before Dave Brocksieker scored the initial points for the Little Giants and, to backtrack a bit, Paul Ackerman waited until the last second of the initial period to score the Streaks' first field goal.

Four Banished

Except for the fact that Joe Durnwald, Buddy Ochs, Snooks Jenkins and Ed Fox all left the game via the four personal route, the final period produced little change.

Buddy Ochs did a fair job in holding down a sluggish Jenkins to one field goal and five free throws in the entire game but other than that if there were any high points your reporter missed them. Unless it was the sluggish, off-form play of both quintets. Of the two, the Streaks probably looked the best, in that they held down the usually high-scoring Rossmen.

However, I may yet prove fortunate that both teams got such a game out of their systems during the holidays and against each other.

Coach Art Hendricks has been gunning for this tilt as, aside from being a feather in their collective caps, they are after revenge for a two-point setback last season.

From all indications, the Flyers have a stronger combine this year than last, while Coach Gene Gfell's crew is still something of an enigma. Regulation Game Ends
30-30 As Fremonters
Drop First Loop Game

The Little Giants came to the end of the victory road last night.

Came to the end over in Tiffin, after a 18-game winning streak and after successfully combating two jinxes—the 18th game and the 18th victory—only to trip before Tiffin Columbian, 35 to 33, in two overtime periods on Friday the 18th.

The defeat was the first since the opening game against Hamilton and the initial one in Buckeye League competition and left the Rossmen needing two victories in their remaining three games to make sure of the loop pennant.

Technically, it was three foul tosses that went haywire, two from the hands of Jim Wisbon and one from the mitts of Bob Hall, all in the final period, that cost the game but there were several contributing factors. One was the ejection of Dave Brockleker on four fouls late in the second period and a lapse of memory on the part of officials.

Tied Nine Times

The lapse gave the Columbians the ball out-of-bounds, in the first overtime with Fremont leading by a single point, when one of the Tiffin players had knocked it out.

But it was such a close, hard-fought game, one of the best the Buckeye has produced this season, that slight oversights can be forgotten—by all save the Fremont fans who witnessed the tussle.

One simple statement will give an idea of just how close the game was. It is: at no time did either team have more than a three point lead, the score was knotted nine times and the lead changed hands eight times.

HEIGHT TELLS AS LOFTY B-G QUINTET WINS

Control Tip-Off And Rebounds As Rossmen Take Good Spanking

The chips will be down and the Little Giants will be battling for the Buckeye League pennant next Friday night when they meet Findlay on the Ross court in the final game of the season.

The Bobcats of Bowling Green saw to that last night when they handed the Fremonters a very thorough 31 to 25 defeat, second in loop circles for the Label-men this season.

The score just about tells the story. There was little doubt, when it was all over, but that the best team won and it was perhaps fortunate that the margin between the two quintets wasn't greater. The superior height of the Bee-Gees, personified chiefly in Red Maas and Ron Waugh, was the deciding and predominate feature of the game.

The whistle-blowers didn't help the cause any, either, although it is doubtful if they had much effect on the final outcome. Rabbit Starrett might just as well have worked the game alone as Chuck Wertz had an exceedingly sour evening. He contented himself with loafing in the back court in a game that was much rougher than the number of fouls called—25 all told—would indicate.

Control Ball

At that, it might have been better had Starrett worked alone. Some of Wertz' interpretations of basketball rules were slightly on the weird side. Inasmuch as it seemed that a lot depended on who committed the infractions. He did one thing, however. He took good care that Coach Colburn's "little boys," Maas and Waugh, didn't get hurt.

One thing decided the game and it told early in the contest. That one thing was the superior height. The Bobcats not only controlled the tip-off but monopolized the rebounds and without the ball you can't score. It is all quite elemental.

The Little Giants were in the ball game the first quarter and again the last. The rest of the time the Fremont fans present merely sat still and hoped—that the Bee-Gees wouldn't ring up too many points.

Lead At Quarter

Perhaps the narrow floor also had something to do with it. Certainly, it had Snook Jenkins at a disadvantage and he was lucky to account for nine points. Every time he tried to break in, the Bobcats simply forced him to the sidelines.

The Little Giants forged into an early lead and had a 6 to 2 advantage late in the first period. Baskets by Dunn and Nelson, however, cut it down and they were ahead by a lone point, 7 to 6, at the quarter.

It was the second stanza that really cost the Purple crew the game. The only point they chalked up was a free throw by Glenn Ringman, while the Bobcats were tallying nine to lead, 15 to 8, at halftime. The Little Giants scored but two field goals the entire half and they were by Jenkins early in the initial period.

Lead Too Much

Fighting desperately after the intermission, the team found the task just too much and despite their efforts slumped behind 20 points, 26 to 16, as the stretch drive started.

In the final canto they managed to outscore the foe but not enough to make much difference. Dick Myers led the assault, with a pair of action shots and a charity toss, but Jenkins was the only other player able to score from the court and that simply wasn't enough.

As stated before, height and control of the ball was the big factor in the game. Some idea of how the Bobcats monopolized the pellet can be had from second period figures. In this stanza the winners captured 13 rebounds and the Little Giants but six.

Cash In Fouls

Outscored 13 to 8 from the court, the Little Giants kept as close as they did by turning in an almost perfect record from the foul line, converting nine of 10 chances.

Bob Hall was lost with five minutes remaining to play and Bowling Green also lost the services of Bob Ingraham, who had done a swell job of guarding Jenkins, with two minutes to go.

Waugh notched 11 points to set the scoring pace but he was worth twice that many because of his play under the basket, while Jenkins nine was high for Fremont.

Also drawing first round byes were Columbian, Junior Home, and Willard.

Tiffin Teams Meet

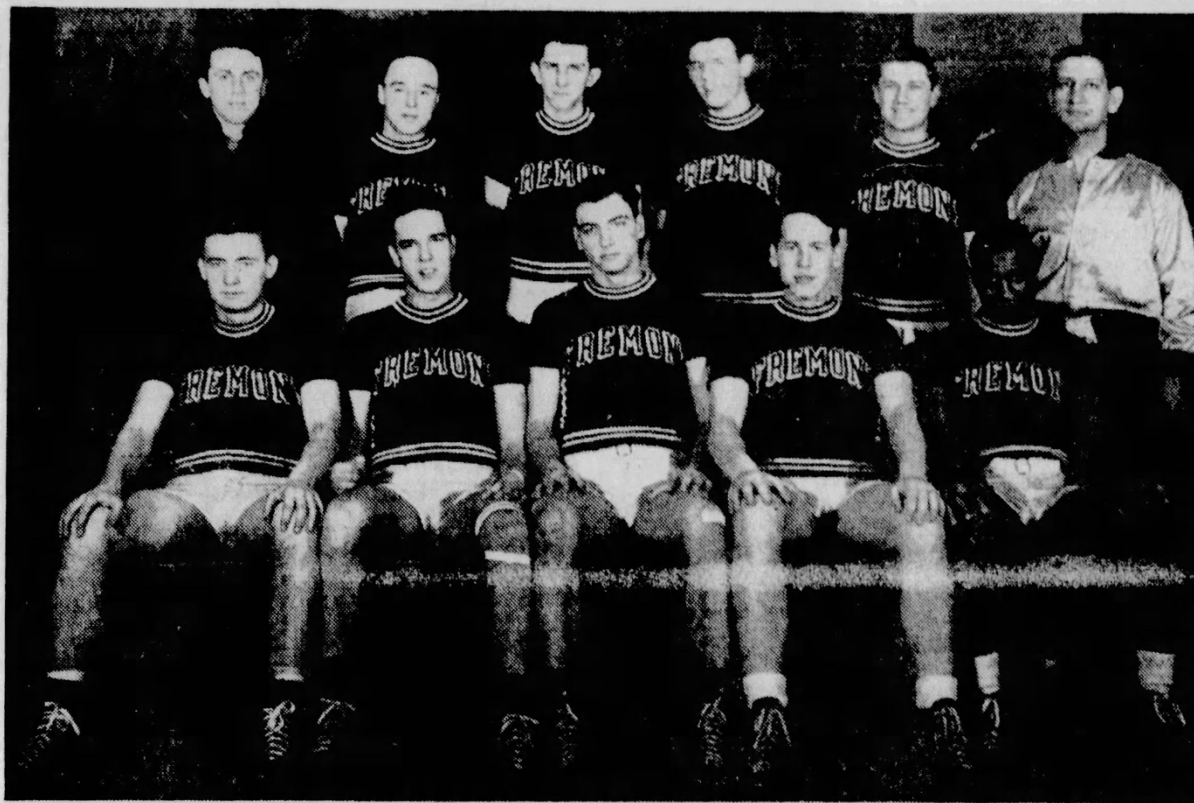

LEAGUE CROWN GOES WITH 42 TO 25 VICTORY

Close Season With 15 And 3 Record And New Scoring Mark

The Little Giants regained the Buckeye League basketball title, lost last year to Tiffin Columbian, by handing the Findlay Trojans a sound 42 to 25 trouncing in Ross gym Friday night.

The victory was the 15th in 18 starts for Coach Eddie Gabel's 1941-'42 combine and their eighth in 10 league games. It gave them undisputed possession of the loop laurels with a lead of a full game over Bowling Green which chalked up an expected victory over Junior Order in another finale.

The Little Giants played perhaps their best game of the season, at least for the first two quarters, in repelling the attack of the last club that could threaten their circuit aspirations.

Jenkins, Hall Through

Inspired by the fact that it was the last game, with the exception of tournament play, for co-Captains Snooks Jenkins and Bob Hall, the entire team clicked like a well-oiled piece of basketball machinery and there wasn't a thing they didn't do and do well in those first two periods.

Dave Brocksieker and Glenn Bingman played an outstanding defensive game, controlling the majority of rebounds and completely shackling the Trojans when they were within scoring territory.

While these two guards were sparkling defensively, and adding plenty of zing to the offensive department, Jenkins and Hall carried the scoring load and did it with brilliant passing and shooting. Hall, especially, was deadly accurate, taking but 10 shots at the bucket and sinking four of them.

Never Behind

Dick Myers, nursing a cold, was off form the first half but more than made up for it in the third period, sinking three baskets and a foul toss. Those were his last points and broke the Trojans' spirit.

The game started a bit slowly with Glenn Bingman's free throw and Jenkins' first basket giving the Purple a lead they never relinquished. Jenkins accounted for eight points, Bingman three and Hall two to give the Rossmen a 13 to 7 lead in the opening frame and that was the tip-off. The second period saw them stretch the lead to 23 to 11 with Jenkins and Hall collaborating for all the points save one.

Just how good the Little Giants were defensively is best told by simply saying that the Trojans made exactly one action shot in each of the first two stanzas.

Both teams were deadly from the foul line the first half, Findlay dropping in seven straight chances and Fremont five for an 100 per cent performance.

Set New Records

The third period saw the Little Giants draw further ahead. With the score 26 to 15, Myers swung into action. Held scoreless the entire first half chiefly because he was missing easy shots, he tallied a free throw and three baskets in quick succession to erase any doubt as to the game's outcome.

Findlay made its best showing the final period, due in part to the fact that every starter was on the bench when the game was over. Jenkins left on four fouls and Coach Gabel pulled the rest.

The victory gave Ross high one of its best records in cage history and also saw the club break the school scoring record of 700 points set in 19 games last year. The team this season, in 18 games, scored 714 points. Jenkins finished the regular season with a 16-point splurge, all made in the first three periods, to wind up with 277 points, also a new individual record, 37 points better than Jack Carroll did last year.

High-Scoring Forward Only Ross Player On First Quintet

**Bowling Green Places Two Men, With Junior
Order And Columbian Getting One Each;
Bob Hall And Dick Myers Make Second Team**

Although Ross high's Little Giants won the Buckeye League basketball championship, finishing up the season with a record of eight victories and but two defeats, they must be satisfied with but one player on the mythical all-league team while Bowling Green, the runner-up, gets two places.

The one Ross player to be placed on the team was William (Snooks) Jenkins, the speedy and elusive sharp-shooter, who was an unanimous choice for a forward berth on the team selected by sports writers in the league cities.

The scribes conferred with the coaches in their home towns before making their choices, so the team can be considered that of the mentors as well. No selections were received from Findlay, so the team in reality was picked by five writers and five coaches.

Jenkins Captain

Inasmuch as Jenkins, who scored 278 points in 18 regulation contests for a new individual record here and was also high point man in the league, received every vote, he has been named captain of the first team.

Others named with Jenkins were Hugh Ferguson of Junior Home, at a forward; Ronnie Waugh of Bowling Green at center; Harry Miller of Tiffin Columbian, and Bob Ingraham of Bowling Green, at guards.

Making the second team for the second year in a row was Fremont's Bob Hall, teamed at a forward with Nelson of Bee Gee; Caughman of Findlay at center; Louis Hummer of Columbian and Dick Myers of Fremont, at guards.

Myers was placed at a guard position because of second team votes for center and one first team vote for a guard, polling enough total votes to nose out several other nominations.

Roether Honored

Ed Roether, Bowling Green guard who was killed in an automobile mishap last December, would undoubtedly have made a guard berth on the first team in the opinion of the scribes and therefore is given a posthumous honorable mention.

As mentioned before, there was no opposition to Jenkins for a forward on the first team, but from there on there was a wide divergence of opinion. Besides the players who finally made the grade, others who received first team nods were Caughman, Nelson, Maas of Bowling Green and McKillip of Columbian.

Receiving at least one vote for the second team were Dave Brock-sieker and Glenn Bingham of Fremont; Davis of Junior Order; Bristol and Jackson of Findlay; Cook of Columbian and Dunn of Bowling Green.

Look The Best

All in all, the first team would be hard to improve. Jenkins' running mate, Ferguson, was not only a dangerous player but was a sparkling defensive player and had the ability to come through with points when they were vital. Waugh, giant Bowling Green center, might have received more opposition from Caughman had the Findlay team made a better showing. The best re-bound player in the loop, Waugh scored 160 points for the Bobcats and was the team's scoring mainstay.

Ingraham rated as one of the best defensive players in the circuit. Few players tallied many points when Ingraham was assigned to him. In two games against Bee Gee, Jenkins was held to nine points each time, second lowest number the Ross ace was held to in any contest this year. Russ Loomis of Perrysburg, scored 11 points on Ingraham for the high total of the campaign. A good long shot, Ingraham tallied 60 points.

Less information is available on Miller, but he was a good shot as well as a fine defensive man and received enough votes to make the team.

FEW UPSETS IN PLAY THUS FAR

**Cage Play Always Un-
certain But 31 Champs

COLUMBUS, O., March 10.—UP—The uncertainties of tournament play in high school basketball were underscored today by the upset triumph of Kent Roosevelt over North Canton in the northeastern district class A meet at Kent.

Akron Kenmore, a co-favorite with Akron North and Akron South in the Kent playoffs, encountered trouble but managed to edge Akron Central, 32 to 29, in a first round bout.

Few Upsets

Fifteen survivors of sectional eliminations open the northeastern class B playoffs at Kent tonight to choose the district's three representatives for the state classic at Springfield next week. Unde-feated Clearview, Doylestown and Poland probably rate a slight edge but Loudonville, only defending champion in the meet; New Waterford or Waynesburg may pull a "sleeper."

So far an unusually high proportion of last year's 32 district survivors are still in the running for 1942 honors. Thirteen class A defenders are still around—Newark, Marins Ferry, Zanesville, Lakewood, Massillon, Springfield township, Canton McKinley, Toledo Libbey, Ashland, Portsmouth, Cincinnati Hughes, Xenia and Middletown. There are eight class B survivors—Smithfield, Berlin township, Loudonville, Elmore, Hicksville, Waterloo, Hanover township, Xenia O. S. S. O.
