CLASSMEN FROM HI SCHOOL IN TRACK MEETING

Despite weather, condition of track and field, the inter-class meet between the track and field teams representing Fremont high school classes was held on the county fair grounds Tuesday afternoon. Only five events were carried out but the going was up and tuck between the Juniors and Sop's and the list of events will be completed next Tuesday afternoon. Vorys Collier sent some of his crack Junior high school crew into the going and Kenneth Hawk won place in the 100 yard dash.

The Junior and second year men were tied at the close of the fifth event with 17 points per. The proud Seniors were humbled and only had 9 1-3 points to their credit, the reason for this being due to the fact that most of the upper classmen are engaged in getting over the shoals and lining up to graduate in June. Who cares for ribbons and tags when a sheepskin is in sight? The Junior high school outfit got 1 1-3 points.

In the mile Jaunt C. Henne, who swings a nasty pair of gams, eased his chest into the tape ahead of Schwuchow, who got second, and Dieckert who ambled in third. The winner's time was 5 minutes and 24 seconds.

In the 100 yard cinder dash a lad named Druckenmiller, who comes from the region of the Four-Mile House and who got all his speed running after the 7:35 a. m. L. S. E. car in the morning, walked in the lead of Hershey, the Senior flash, and a lad who used to escort old John D. Pigschin in the backfield last fall. Druckenmiller broke the tape in 11 seconds. Kenneth Hawk swooped in third in this event.

In the pole vault the clever "Skunk" Wingert boosted his frame up and over the bar for a height of 9 feet, winning hands down. Longanbach, a Junior, was second in this event.

In the high jump Art (Red) Thatcher gave his educated legs a tryout and he sure can climb the ozone stairway. He did a five feet, two inch leap yesterday and thought nothing of it. "Judy" Lerch, coming Frank Merrifield of the high school, and next to Wendler and Tim McCarthy, the best athlete in the second ward, got a second. This Thatcher fellow also got a first in the 440 event which he completed in 57 seconds. He was closely pursued by a lad named McCarthy of the Sophs.

Thatcher with his two first was the star of the meet and this story will have to be continued next Thursday. A fair sized crowd of rooters and Hank Baumann and "Hotch" Fox were lined up with the mourners when the ship sank.

Coach Charles Taylor of Fremont high athletics, was in Toledo Thursday morning to purchase some new athletic equipment for his track and field men. The inter-class meet will probably have to be carried over until some evening next week, but in the meantime the varsity team is being prepped up for its session at Sandusky.
