Flores, Mendoza win at Rogers

TOLEDO — Despite competing in successive weight classes, Fremont Ross wrestlers Derek Flores and Jaime Mendoza rarely square off in the practice room.

Instead, they find alternative means of competition.

"When we run laps it's either I'm done first or he's done first," said Mendoza, a senior. "It's always that constant competition between us."

On Saturday, though, the duo certainly didn't have any qualms sharing the top spot. There was plenty of room for No. 1 and No. 1-A.

Flores and Mendoza won the 103-pound and 112-pound classes at the 33rd Annual Holiday Wrestling Tournament at Toledo Rogers and the Little Giants finished third overall.

Ross, which had 11 of its 13 wrestlers place in the top six, earned 188 points, well ahead of fourth place Rossford's 119.5. Lakewood St. Edward's "B" team won the team title with 288 points, followed by Toledo St. Francis with 204.

At last weekend's Ashland Bookmaster Tournament, the Little Giants finished sixth — placing just four wrestlers — much to coach Mike Mezinger's disapproval.

"Everyone's really done a nice job this week," said Mezinger, now in his second year at the helm. "We looked a heck of a lot better this week than we looked last week."

Zach Brunner (125), Matt Vasser (140) and Robert Zucker (275) captured third place for the Little Giants, while Mezinger's son, Devon, was fourth at 119.

Ross's Jorge Perez was pinned at the 2:40 mark by Bowling Green's Adam McGiffin in the 215-pound championship bout.

Josh Howey and Brad Biehler were fifth at 160 and 171, respectively, and Yohe Rojas (130) and Kyle Whitright

(189) each took sixth.

Flores, who won at Ashland, used a five-point move in the second period to break a 2-2 tie in an 11-3 rout over Aaron Cook of St. Francis.

"I gave up a reversal with about 10 seconds left (in the first period), so I was kind of mad about that," said Flores, a sophomore. "After those five points I felt a lot better."

Flores added a pair of takedowns in the final period to pick up a major decision.

Coach Mezinger noticed a flaw in Flores' neutral stance following the semifinal round and ordered him to watch the video of his match. Flores addressed the imperfection and the end result was him extending his record to a perfect 8-0.

"He's a tough kid," Mendoza said of his primary competition in practice conditioning drills. "He's really good."

Mezinger describes Flores as being very coachable and relentless despite never wrestling until the seventh grade.

"He's just aggressive, he goes after people," Mezinger said about Flores. "I just like his attitude, he's not scared of anyone."

The center mat remained successful for Ross as Mendoza followed Flores with a 7-4 victory over Swanton's Jacob Pezzin, a state qualifier in Division III last year. Mendoza escaped early in the third period to take a 5-4 lead and followed shortly after with a decisive takedown and cruised the remainder of the way.

"I started off kind of light and then I started seeing I could set up that ankle with the single leg," Mendoza said. "I started working that and kept on taking him down."

Mendoza failed to qualify for the district tournament last year despite being the third seed at sectionals. This year, his only loss is a 16-14 setback in the finals at Ashland.

"Jaime's really picking it up," Mezinger said. "He's at the same weight class from last year, and he's really working hard."

Mezinger helps Ross to fifth place

TIFFIN — Devon Mezinger should distance himself from the results of last year's state wrestling tournament.

Ignorance has proven bliss for the Fremont Ross sophomore.

Mezinger beat Sandusky Perkins' Michael Baxter, 7-6, in a 119-pound quarterfinal match Wednesday at Tiffin Columbian's Wendy's Classic.

It wasn't until after the match that Mezinger was informed that his opponent is a returning state qualifier.

"I can't believe I did it," Mezinger said. "I bet if I would have known he was a state qualifier, I wouldn't have wrestled that good at all."

Ross sits in fifth place with 61.5 points, just a half point behind Elida. Whitmer leads the two-day, 20-team tournament with 92.5 points. Wrestling will resume at 10 a.m. today with finals tentatively scheduled for 5:30 p.m.

Mezinger earned an escape with about 30 seconds remaining to defeat Baxter, who nearly earned near-fall points on more than one occasion during the third period. Mezinger opened the match with a five-point throw before Baxter stormed back to even the score at 6-6.

"He has to use that as a big stepping stone to get him through the semis," said Devon's father Mike, the Ross wrestling coach.

Mezinger, who pinned Newark's David Carrow in the opening round, will wrestle Lexington's Andrew McQuillen (10-1), a No. 3 seed, in the semifinal.

Mezinger will be joined by teammates Jaime Mendoza (112), Jorge Perez (215) and Robert Zucker (275), who each won twice to advance in the championship rounds.

Remaining in the consolation bracket for the Little Giants are Marcus Measimer (103), Zach Brunner (125), Yohe Rojas (130), Jacob Rook (140), Josh Howey (160) and Brad Biehler (171), all whom won one match. Earlier this week, Measimer topped teammate Derek Flores, who remains unbeaten on the season, for the team's varsity spot at 103.

Though the Little Giants' outlook appears optimistic heading into the second day of competition, the same cannot be said for another area team.

Margareta finished in 19th place with just 13 points. Warren Fleetwood (112), Sean Avila (125) and Kevin Bye (275) will wrestle today in the consolation bracket for the Polar Bears.

"It's been ugly, plain and simple, ugly," said Margareta coach Keith Taylor. "We're not finishing stuff, we're not shooting, we're not attacking."

Mendoza (12-1) earned a reversal in the second period to defeat Fleetwood, 2-1, in a battle of one-loss wrestlers. Mendoza, the third seed, dominated the third period from the top position, not allowing Fleetwood (10-2) a chance of escaping. He will face Perkins' Spencer Campbell (14-2) in the semifinal.

"I'm pretty sure I could have put him to his back, but I just kept riding him out," Mendoza said of Fleetwood. "Today I didn't feel 100 percent like I usually do."

Zucker, however, felt and looked 100 percent in a pair of dominating wins via fall. Zucker, who stands 6-foot, 7-inches and weighs 272 pounds, pinned Maumee's Don Brierly in 1:33 in round one and followed by decking Columbian's Doug Donna in 2:53 to advance to the semifinal.

"He had two nice matches today," Coach Mezinger said of Zucker. "We keep on working with him. He's strong, he's got the leverage, he's got the weight."

Zucker, who improved to 8-2, will face top-seeded Shane VanVoorhise of Elida in a rematch of last year's bout won in decisive fashion by VanVoorhise.

"To be faster than him," Zucker said of his game plan. "He's quite fast, I just have to hit my moves."

Moments before Zucker stuck Donna, Perez pinned Otsego's Justin Southwick in 2:54. Perez, who is now 11-2, won by fall over Toledo Central Catholic's Andre Cash in the first round. He'll face Jeremy Wright of Whitmer in the semifinal.

"If we can get three or four of them to the finals I'll be really happy," Coach Mezinger said. "Some of the other losers, we have to come back and get third."

Clyde sweeps Ross, Sandusky

Little Giants coach says meet was step back from last week

CLYDE — Fliers wrestling coach Matt Merrill got to beat his alma mater of Fremont Ross and Sandusky, a school where he used to coach wrestling.

Not a bad day, all in all.

"This was great for me," Merrill said.

Of course, he had to give some credit to his wrestlers. "I think we wrestled great," he said. "They came out and they scored all the extra points they could."

Clyde beat the Little Giants 59-24 and Sandusky 48-21. Ross was unable to come away with a win. After being announced as beating Sandusky 37-36, they were found to have lost, 36-31.

Little Giants coach Mike Mezinger could only shake his head.


"Every time I think we're coming around the corner, they step back," he said.

A week after Jorge Perez won the 215-pound title and Ross placed sixth in the Wendy's Classic in Tiffin, the team looked sluggish, Mezinger said.

"At Tiffin, they were moving," he said. "They were hustling, and tonight, they didn't."

"I've got to get it into their heads that they can wrestle with anyone."

One grappler who didn't need to be told that was heavyweight Robert Zucker, who put a scare into Matt Guhn. Zucker took the first two falls, and at one point led, 4-2, before Guhn came back to tie and then go ahead by a point as the second period ended. Guhn picked up Zucker and dropped him, finally pinning him with a minute left in the match.

"He sure didn't back down from Guhn," Mezinger said of Zucker.

Mezinger said Zucker had a similar performance in Tiffin last week against Shane VanVoorhise of Elida.

Mezinger also praised Marcus Measimer, who won both of his 103-pound matches by pin. The junior said he set up shots better, and performed better since getting over the flu.

"I felt better out on the

mat than usual," he said.

For Merrill, the match was a wash. Robbie Michaels and Brent Aona returned, but Nene Garcia remains out. Garcia injured her shoulder last week in a match at Lorain Southview.

She usually wrestles 119, but Cody Andrews, who usually wrestles 112, bumped up a class. Andrews was pinned in both matches, by Devon

Mezinger of Ross and Sandusky's Cortez McLaughlin. Clyde forfeited the 112 class against both teams.

For Aona and Michaels, it was an anticipated moment.

"It felt good to be on the mat," Aona said.

Aona said it was a good time to start back with the team, and

felt it was easier to get into the swing of things in a double dual meet at home instead of the Fliers' next match, at the Ohio Duals in Hilliard this weekend.

Michaels, who punched a wall and broke his hand, said it hurt watching his teammates wrestle and not being able to join them.

"I've got to step it up," he said.

Michaels said he tried to stay in shape even though he wasn't

wrestling.

"I've been running during practice and on the bike," he said. "It kept me in better shape."

Merrill said endurance is a problem for his team.

"Some of their conditioning looked horrible," he said, adding that some wrestlers who should be in better shape appeared winded. *

Sandusky wrestling coach Dave Colatruglio said his team's conditioning was pretty good, but they needed to work on their technique.

"Opportunities presented themselves and we didn't take advantage of them," he said.

Colatruglio said five starters were out due to injuries, and heavyweight Burton Purcell got a shoulder injury and was taken

to the hospital after the meet as a precautionary measure. He said with that many injuries, it's difficult to determine the team's talent and skill level.

"It's hard to get a gauge on further down the year when it's conference time," he said.

Seniors close out home career in style

Beginning sluggishly at their own Mal Mackey Invitational, the Fremont Ross wrestlers were given a little pep talk from coach Mike Mezinger before the final round Saturday afternoon.

But a speech wasn't necessary for the five Little Giant seniors, who were motivated simply from thoughts of wrestling in their final matches ever at the Purple Pit.

Each senior placed in the top three of his respective weight class and Ross had a stellar final round, finishing fourth overall with 136 points — seven behind third-place Nordonia. Lorain Southview cruised to the team title, earning 168 points compared to 144.5 from second-place Sylvania Northview.


"Coach wanted all the seniors to end on a good note at the Fremont tournament," said 215-pound senior Jorge Perez.

Perez and senior heavyweight Robert Zucker were the Little Giants' lone champions, though their classmates also performed very well. Jaime Mendoza finished second at 112 and Zach Brunner and Josh Howey were third at 125 and 160, respectively.

"It's a lot tougher tournament this year than the past two years," Mezinger said. "I can't complain."

Perez hit a beautiful throw to pin Northview's Mat Urban at the 1:25 mark to win his third consecutive Mal Mackey crown. It was also Perez's third pin of the tournament as he wrestled a total of just 5:07.

"That was nice," Mezinger said of Perez'

throw. "That was sweet."

Perez won the Wendy's Invitational at Tiffin Columbian two weeks ago but struggled in Wednesday's tri-meet with Clyde and Sandusky, losing both matches.

"It feels really good because I guess I had a lot to prove today since I'm a senior," he said.

Zucker followed Perez's success on center mat, dominating top seed Eric

White of Southview, 4-0. The title caps off an impressive week for Zucker, who scored a pair of takedowns and led Clyde state champion Matt Guhn before losing by pin.

"The score didn't actually [reflect Zucker's dominance]," Mezinger said. "He controlled that entire match. "Really he's only a throw here or a throw there, and he could have three or four more wins

and a tournament championship."

Mezinger's son Devon finished second at 119 in a round-robin format in which he won three matches after losing in the first round to the eventual champion. Ross' Marcus Measimer (103) and Brad Biehler (160) each took third after losing in the semifinals, and Jacob Rook (140) finished fourth in a round-robin.

Brunner secured a takedown with just one second remaining to top Northview's Ryan Milner, 5-4, in the consolation finals. He nearly advanced to the championship, falling 8-5 in the semifinals to Nordonia's Justin Chesney despite leading 4-0.

"It was important to win my final match — especially my final one at home,"

Brunner said. [The seniors] have been wrestling together for a while and it's pretty good to see them succeed.

And his classmate, Howey, certainly succeeded, picking up a tech fall and two major decisions, including a 12-3 rout over Anthony Wayne's Mark Phillips for third place.

"I feel pretty good about it," Howey

said. "It's my last year wrestling here at Fremont, so I had to do whatever I had to do."

And now Mezinger will do whatever he can to keep the Little Giants on the upward movement. Following a pair of losses Wednesday, Mezinger believed his team showed signs of regression.

"Well, I think we just took a couple more steps forward," he said. "Now I just can't let them take another step back next week."

Little Giant Zucker develops killer instinct

Robert Zucker of Fremont Ross was coming off back surgery and lacked a little bit of the killer instinct last season.

But that is no longer the case for the heavyweight, relatively fresh off a second knee surgery. Zucker is currently 27-4, with each of his last 17 wins has come via a pin. Little Giant coach Mike Mezinger said Zucker has a legitimate shot of advancing to the state tournament.

Zucker pinned Jeremy Striker of Norwalk in 57 seconds as the Little Giants fell to the Truckers and Ben Brady of Port Clinton in 30 seconds as they topped the Redskins, and also defeated Adam Grieshop of Coldwater with a pin at 4:45 to take the heavyweight title at the Celina Invitational and earn News-Messenger athlete of the week honors.

"He's 6-foot-7, 275 pounds — he's such a big guy that he's intimidating just to look at,"

Mezinger said. "Last year we couldn't get him to get mean.

This year I don't know what's gotten into him but he puts his game face on and he's a little meaner. He's getting things done. Last year he didn't wrestle with intensity and fire in his eyes and this year he's doing that. I think that's the key.

"He's being very aggressive. He's throwing these kids. Last year he was a little timid. He didn't have enough confidence in his throwing ability. Confidence builds confidence. He's not a flashy wrestler but he's been overpowering people."

Zucker has 20 wins by pin this season.

"Norwalk's heavyweight is a senior with over 20 wins this season," Mezinger said. "Robert went after him and got a first period pin. Going into the Celina tournament he just went after those boys. He's really improved over the last month and a half. He's just been getting it done. He's been working hard in practice."

tice."

Mezinger said he has noticed a heightened work ethic this year.

"He's not a captain but he's shown a lot of senior leadership," Mezinger said. "He helps with everything we need the captains to do. I put a lot of trust in my captains and he's right there helping them out."

Mezinger has been very impressed with Zucker's resiliency.

"He was out with a back problem his sophomore year," Mezinger said. "He had a back operation and he was never cleared medically until last year before wrestling. That's why he didn't play football those two years. He had his back surgery a couple years ago and hurt his knee at the end of last year and had an operation on his knee right after the season. He's come back from two major surgeries and to not favor his back or knee and go all out is impressive. He's been doing better this year than he has in the past in terms of work ethic."

Mezinger was excited about Zucker's Celina tourney win over Ayersville's Rich Cline, who also goes 6-7.

"He had a couple bigger guys in the tournament," Mezinger said. "That guy was just as big and Robert took it to him. He didn't back down and pinned him in the first period. In the finals Grieshop was a bigger guy with agility. He shot and threw throughout the day seeing some of his matches. That's something Zucker hadn't seen this season — someone as agile as this guy aside from Matt Guhn of Clyde.

"This guy had some nice shots for a heavyweight. Robert went after him and they had a scramble in the first 30 seconds but after that Robert took it to the guy. He's coming on strong toward the end of the season."

Zucker actually had Guhn down in their match earlier in the season before Guhn registered a pin. Zucker also had Shane Vanzoohise of Elida in trouble for a spell.

"He's had some state placers down," Mezinger said. "Both came back and pinned Robert but he knows he can wrestle with them and that's given him a lot of confidence in the last month and a half and he's wrestling well."

Even with the injury considerations, Mezinger said Zucker's success really hasn't been a surprise.

"I wouldn't say it's a surprise," he said. "I knew he'd have quite a few wins but the fashion he's beating some of these tougher kids by just taking it to them and pinning them has been impressive. It's better than what I expected."

Zucker failed to place at sectionals last season but that has not dampened Mezinger's optimism one bit.

"If he wrestles up to his potential like he's been I think we'll see him down in Columbus," Mezinger said.

Ross wrestlers look forward to new room

Old room was small, smelly — and had a tendency to flood


When Mike Mezinger took over as Fremont Ross wrestling coach last season, Al Voggenthaler gave him some advice.

"You haven't been a Fremont Ross wrestling coach until the wrestling room floods on you," the old wrestling coach told Mezinger.

"And last year, it did," Mezinger said.

Flooding is just one of the problems in the wrestling room under the stage in the Purple Pit — Mezinger and Voggenthaler call it the dungeon. It's too small. It's not well-ventilated. It was actually condemned for a couple years, Voggenthaler said. But its days are numbered.

This season will be the last in the dungeon, as the wrestling team will move to a new complex being added on to the school. The complex will also feature a new swimming pool that's leaps and bounds better than the

pool the Little Giants have been using since the Herbert Hoover administration, in the middle school.

Voggenthaler, who's been instrumental in raising money for the project, is sorry he couldn't see it done while he was coach,

but glad to see it.

"I'm up here about four days a week checking on it," Voggenthaler said as he took measurements of the new room for wrestling mats. He sells mats now, and is getting them at cost for the new room — a sav-

ings he estimates at \$5,000. "I'm probably as excited as anybody to see this."

Voggenthaler said he tried to get a new wrestling area built twice, in the 1970s and again in the 1980s.

"It didn't pan out, so we

figure we'd have to go out and get private donations, and that's what happened," he said.

The pool and wrestling complex will cost around \$3.2 million, raised through

the Fremont Area Athletic Foundation, and both will be ready in time for next winter's season.

The wrestling room will be about 5,000 square feet, and will also feature locker rooms, showers and a laundry room as well as a coach's office. Currently, the wrestling team doesn't have its own locker rooms and laundry is hung to dry in a small room off the practice area.

The floods happened fairly regularly during Voggenthaler's tenure as coach, ending only when a couple of sump pumps were installed.

"We oftentimes had more water in the wrestling room than in the pool," Voggenthaler joked. "We lost a lot of practice time."

This week, six wrestlers are practicing in the 1,400-square-foot room in preparation for the district swim meet. But during the regular season, the Ross wrestling team has to practice in shifts.

"We can't even have a full practice with all the kids on the mat," said Mezinger, a 1985 Ross graduate and former wrestling team captain.

At one point, the team also practiced

on the stage, but after the gym got new bleachers — including on the stage — that was done away with.

The room has doors on either end, and the windows have been replaced with a metal screen, which cuts down on injuries. Mezinger said there were more injuries in practice than in competition.

"More than one kid went through the glass over the years," Voggenthaler said.

The screens also allow more air to circulate, which lessens the smell that can emerge when a bunch of sweaty teenage boys practice wrestling.

Devon Mezinger, a sophomore who wrestles at 119 pounds for the Little Giants, said it also gets hot in the room.

"It's small," said Mezinger, the coach's son. "Really small. I think it's too small to practice in here."

But Devon Mezinger is looking forward to next year and the new room.

"I can't wait to wrestle in it," he said.

His father believes it's long overdue.

"It's about time a Division I school has Division I facilities."
