Ross Track Team Has Balance But No Outdoor Drill -- As Yet

Having seen his 1946 team in nothing but indoor workouts, Coach Harold Althoff of the Ross high track team, is hoping for an early re-opening of school in order that he may take his scantily-clad out into the daylight at Harmon field and learn their true capabilities. Time, Althoff figures, may be all too short for proper schooling and conditioning of his team before its opening dual meet of the regular season here against Lima Central the afternoon of April 12.

"We really don't know what we have," said Coach Althoff. "We know that we have quite a few boys out for track, which is very gratifying. We like to see boys interested in track. But what they can do when there is competition, no one knows, not even they."

A total of 45 boys have been taking indoor workouts—or were until the scarlet fever ban was enforced. But of these, not more than two dozen as yet have assignments which are any where near being definite. It will be a matter of turning most of them loose and watching to see if they develop into dash men or pole vaulters. Juniors predominate on the squad with 17 third-year men out. There are seven seniors, nine sophomores and 12 freshmen on the squad.

Five Men Lost

Not only will Althoff and Assistant Coach John Titsworth have a task developing many newcomers into potential point-winners, but they must groom some of the "regulars" on the squad to take the places of at least five valuable men lost from last year's team. Two weight men, Bill Miller and Warren Inks, must be replaced in the weights. Both did the discus and shot. Dean Rogers must be supplanted in the broad jump and Carl Cronin in the distance runs. Cronin ran both the mile and half-mile. Gone, too, is Dick Robbins, a dash man, who was taken by the army.

All these thoughts continue to plague the mind of Althoff as he chews his fingernails to the quick hoping he can to work on his gigantic task before too long.

"The best I can say about this 1946 team is that it appears to have balance," Harold said. "There is no standout on it, obviously. It is not top-heavy with strength in any spot, dash, nor distance, jumps nor weights, hurdles nor vault. Many of these boys who are out have never been out for track before and they may, of course, turn into stars. As much as we hope this is the case, we won't count on that until it occurs."

John Erchenbrecher, Bob Sampsel and Art McCloy top a dash staff which also includes Bernie Kellogg and Johnny Auxter. From these five must come the speed of the 100- and 220-yard dashes. They also may be called upon for relays together with Wally Whitcomb. The distance runs appear well fortified in numbers, at least, with Jerry Larkins, Dick Schell and LaMar Hoffman available for the half-mile and the same group ready to try the mile with Bill Hefflinger and John Fought added. The middle distance, however, that tough quarter-mile spot, can stand much fortification. So far only Larkins is listed as a quarter-miler. This is one of the positions which Althoff and Titsworth will keep close in mind as they scan the ranks of the untried and untested.

Dick Mohler, Myron Robertson, John Ballenger and Dick Shaffer are available for the hurdles and the first two named also will compete in the high jump. Mohler, Robertson, Ballenger, McCloy, Sampsel and LaMar Petonke will provide a sizeable broad jump entry.

Glenn Pocock, Don Sheeley and Bob Bowersox are the leading pole vault candidates. Al Johnson, Dick Baron, Walter Weinhardt and Ken Kardatzke are all that are listed for the weights thus far, each participating in both the shot put and discus.

Thus 23 of the 45 boys out for the squad are more or less known quantities. What develops from the

Harmon field laboratory after outdoor practice begins is a matter of the wildest speculation.

"And don't ask me about times, distances and records," pleaded Althoff. "We're going to have to start from almost scratch. What performance a boy turned in last year won't win any points for us this season. It may be an indication, but I'd rather wait until I have seen them outside a short while before I give figures."

League Meet Here

The remaining 22 boys on the squad include Elwood Miller, Jack Barlow, Herb Wright, John Minier, Lyle Hirt, Phil Walden, and Fred Sting, all juniors; Dick Connally, Jerry Shannon and Jerry Anderson, all sophomores; and Bob Smith, Dick Chestnutwood, Bob Beck, Ed Nighswander, Jack Howard, Jack Lombard, Ronald Sting, Donald Sting, Jim Clark, Bob Graham, Frank Kwiatkowski and Dave Swartzlander, all freshmen.

Although Ross has a practice meet with Oak Harbor next Friday afternoon, the actual schedule will not open until the 12th when Lima Central comes here. On the 16th Ross will visit Bowling Green. May 3 will find Sandusky at Harmon field and on May 7 the Little Giants will be host to Toledo Waite. May 11 the Purple will be host to the Buckeye league meet in Harmon field. May 18 they will go to Bowling Green for the district meet and May 24 and 25 to Columbus for the state meet.

An effort is still being made to schedule Findlay and Fostoria for dual meets on two open dates—April 23 and 26.

LIMA CENTRAL FOE FOR BOTH GIANT SQUADS

Cindermen Also
Face Bowling Green
There Tuesday

The members of Ross high's track and tennis teams receive their baptismal competition of 1946 Friday afternoon with Lima Central supplying the opposition for both local units. The track meet takes place at Harmon field, the tennis on the courts of Rodger Young park.

Neither Coach Harold Althoff of the track team nor Bill McConnell of the tennis squad has had much opportunity to work with his team, and both have had to select their lineups on the basis of what a few days of drill can accomplish.

Althoff has arranged a temporary starting squad which, he points out, can be changed at any time. The dashes find John Erchenbrecher, Art McCloy, Bob Sampsel and Johnny Auxter ready to perform in the 100 and McCloy, Auxter and Bob Smith in the 220. However, Whitey has a set of reserve runners for the century which include Smith, Dick Chestnutwood, Ed Nighswander, Jerry Anderson, Dick Connelly, Jack Barlow and Fred Sting. His reserves for the 220 include Barlow, Sting, Connelly, Anderson and Chestnutwood.

Sampsel and Wally Whitcomb are available for the 440 or quarter mile; Dave Swartzlander, Fred Stetzel and John Minier for the 880 or half-mile; and Dick Schell, LeMar Hoffman, Jim Sevitts, Bill Heflinger, Johnny Fought, Jack Howard and Ronald and Donald Sting are set to do the mile run.

Robertson, Dick Mohler and Dick Shaffer do the 120 high and 220 low hurdles. Bernie Kellogg, McCloy and Erchenbrecher run the 880 relay and choose for the mile relay comes from among Schell, Kellogg, Stetzel, Erchenbrecher, Heflinger, Minier, Hoffman and Sevitts.

Al Johnson, Walter Weinhardt and Ken Kardetzke, Herb Wright and Wally Whitcomb take over the shot put; Weinhardt, Johnson and Kardetzke handle the discuss; Bob Bowersox, Glenn Pocock, Jerry Shannon and Don Sheely do the pole vaulting; Mohler, Robertson, Minier and Nighswander do the high jump and Sampsel, Mohler, Robertson, Ballinger, McCloy and Nighswander broad jump.

After the meet with Lima Central today, the Little Giants must train their sights on Bowling Green, who will be met Tuesday afternoon at Bowling Green.

Coach McConnell has named Ted Hilti his No. 1 man on the tennis squad. He has designated Bob Gilberg his No. 2 man. Dick Baron and Lloyd (Butter) Bischoff are in the No. 3 and 4 slots, respectively. Hilti and Gilberg, both back from last year's team, are the No. 1 doubles with the chance that, for this afternoon's match, at least, McConnell is employing Frank Barr and Bob Bodenlos as his No. 2 doubles, to give them a chance to see what they can do. Others on the squad include Henry Wood, Richard Joseph, Bob Ferguson, Jim Jennings, Gene Slaymaker, Harold Engel, Dale Fought and Charles Schultz.

Jim Kridler, who was on the team last year, will not report to the team until after the school play has been presented.

ROBERTSON HAS 4 FIRSTS IN 76-42 VICTORY

Little Giants
Run Up Big Lead;
Take Nine Events

With just three days of actual practice under their belts, Coach Harold Althoff's Ross high track team stepped onto the cinder track and turf of Harmon field Friday afternoon and administered a decisive 76 to 42 victory over previously undefeated Lima Central.

Ross won nine first places in the 14 events, took eight of the 12 second places and seven of the dozen third places, sweeping three events, the 120-yard high hurdles, the 220-yard and quarter-mile dashes. The Ross girls showed fine balance of strength, being outclassed only in the relay events.

Outstanding performer of the meet was Myron Robertson, Ross speedster, who captured first place in each of the four events which he participated in, the 120-yard high hurdles, the 220-yard low hurdles, the high and broad jumps. Bob Sampsel of Ross won two firsts in the 100-yard and quarter-mile dashes. Thus, Robertson accounted for 20 Ross points and Sampsel for 10.

Ross started the meet impressively by sweeping the opening event, the 120-yard high hurdles with Dick Mohler and Dick Shaffer finishing second and third behind Robertson, leading 9 to 0 at the end of the event on the basis of 5-3-2 points for the three places. Sampsel then won the century with Ed Ulrich of Lima second ahead of Johnny Erchenbrecher, to give Ross a 15-3 advantage.

Johnson Wins Shot

Al Johnson, with a first and Wally Whitcomb with a third, the two Ross girls ran the Ross edge to 21-6 and Lima then captured its initial first place as Frank Stewart stepped off the mile in a not bad 5:05.6. Dick Schell of Ross was second and Jim Mullenhour for Lima third to effect a 24-12 score.

Ross then had the distinction of taking its second first, clearing the high jump bar at five feet, two inches. Bob Baer of Lima was second ahead of Mohler. Lima then won the 880-yard relay before Sampsel grabbed his second triumph, running the tough quarter-mile in 57.5, and Ross led, 39 to 28.

After Gene Reed gave Lima its third first by clearing nine feet, five inches in the pole vault, Robertson did the 220-yard low hurdles in 29.3 for victory. No. 3 to run the "Little Giants" margin of 48-12. The two Ross girls on the far side of the field Walter Weinhardt won the discus throw with a toss of 111 feet, 8 inches before Dick Chidester of Lima won the half-mile run. At this point Ross led 59-36 and with only two points needed to win the meet, then belted 118 points and the three events left to which to do it. Johnny Auxter led the Ross sweep of the 220-yard dash, finishing in front of Art McCloy and Bob Smith, in 25.2.

Robertson then won the broad jump and the final event, the mile relay, in 1:56.2. Lima was 1:57.5. Times and distances were comparatively slow and short. No records were broken, nor even approached. This was to be expected, as far as Ross was concerned, because of an acute lack of practice, the scarlet fever back having taken its grip for more than two weeks. The first real Ross drill was not held until last Tuesday. In addition, Ross' triumph would have been even greater had not Johnny Erchenbrecher stepped off too fast to take the baton from Bob Smith in the final relay. Ross led 59-36 after a five and six yard edge at that point. But Johnny, unfortunately, dropped the baton and merely stepped off the track, not choosing to take out after the flying Ed Ulrich.

Bowling Green Next

Again, in the 220-yard low hurdles, Ross took second. Ross, Dick Mohler and Robertson were running neck and neck at the seventh hurdle when Dick knocked over a hurdle, slowing up sufficiently to give the lead to his teammate. At the tenth and final hurdle, Dick moved with celerity, not only striking the hurdle, but sprawling over the track, losing a sure second place and enabling Lima to pick up four points where they otherwise would have had one. But those are the things that happen in a track and field meet.

Lima, before Friday, had beaten both Fostoria and Shawnee in dual meets. Tuesday afternoon Ross will travel to Bowling Green to meet

Ross Track Team Defeated By Bowling Green, 80½ To 37½

Ross high's track team, which showed to good, if unpracticed, advantage here last week in beating Lima Central, dropped a dual meet to Bowling Green at Bowling Green Tuesday afternoon, 80½ to 37½.

Obviously lacking the two or three weeks of drills which their opponents have had and consequently outclassed, the Little Giants, nevertheless, started the meet just as they did against Lima, winning in a shutout in the 120-yard high hurdles with Myron Robertson, Dick Mohler and Dick Shaffer finishing one-two-three. From that point on it was Bowling Green, for the most part.

All told, Ross won only five of the 14 first places with their high remunerative value of five points each. Actually, they won four and divided another, Glenn Pocock and Sautter of Bowling Green sharing first in the pole vault with nice heights of nine feet, six inches. Robertson, Ross' leading point maker with 10 markers, won the high hurdles and the high jump. Al Johnson captured the shot put and Walter Weinhardt the discus.

Don Harms, all-Buckeye league football and basketball star, was Bowling Green's high point man, winning three firsts, the 100 and 220-yard dashes and the broad jump. In the broad jump he leaped 20 feet, 8½ inches, a fine leap for high school competition.

Ross' next meet will be next Tuesday afternoon when the Little Giants will travel to Fostoria for a dual meet with the Redskins.

Little Giant Trackmen Defeat Fostoria By 68½-49½ Count

Ross high's track team won its second dual meet of the year at Fostoria Tuesday afternoon, defeating the Redmen, 68½ to 49½. Ross won eight firsts and tied for a ninth among the 14 events.

Myron Robertson was the leading scorer for Ross with nine points, taking first in the 120-yard high hurdles and tying for first in the high jump. He ran the hurdles in 16.9 seconds and cleared five feet, four inches in the jump.

After winning the opening event to take a 6-3 lead, Ross saw Fostoria take two places in the 100-yard dash to knot the count at 9-all. Schell captured the mile run in 5:08.9 for Ross and the Little Giants again led, 15-12 before Fostoria won the 880-yard relay to take the advantage, 17-15.

Al Johnson then won the shot with a heave of 42 feet, 9½ inches and Ross was in front to stay. Other first places won by Ross included Mohler in the low hurdles; Stetzel in the half-mile; Bowersox in the vault; Ballenger in the broad jump; and the team victory in the mile relay.

The track meet was productive of some mighty interesting competition. Ross' team as a whole performed well, with several instances they bettered their own records for the season and the performances of Fred Stetzel not only was something which brought the crowd to its feet twice during the afternoon, but contributed much to the peace of mind of Coach Harold Althoff.

Stetzel, who has never been a strong finisher, was placed in the 880-yard run (the half-mile) and after trailing most of the way, pulled out a sensational burst of Jerry Blair and Dick Lindaley of Sandusky. With about 150 yards to go all three began their drives to the finish, but Stetzel, behind the leaders by 30 yards, steamed around both as fast as they appeared to be standing still, to win. Again, in the mile relay, he showed he had the heart. With two events remaining and with Ross needing five points to be certain of no worse than 10th, Stetzel ran the third leg of the event. He took the baton from John Schell with about a five-yard advantage. He was opposed by speedy Elwood Clemens who quickly went around Fred like an express train and held an advantage of about 10 yards. Stetzel was to run.
