## Ross girls to rely on speed

Short on size but long on speed — that's how Ross Coach Sue Wolf describes her girls basketball team this fall. At least that's how she hopes it will be.

"We lost everybody last year," Wolf, beginning her second year as the head coach, said. "We have only three players who lettered last season."

Those three, Roxie Price, Diane Flickinger, and Karyl Solze are all seniors, the only seniors on the squad. Price and Flickinger, however, are the players with the most experience. Solze saw just enough varsity action a year ago to earn her letter.

Wolf's first squad produced an 8-5 record but she hedges about making any predictions about this year's team and its 18-game schedule.

"People ask me how I think we will do," she said, "and it's hard to say. I cannot make any predictions whatever — I really believe that we do not have an easy schedule this year. There are no pushovers in it."

While the schedule is a wicked one, Wolf must face this season without the benefit of any real height.

The biggest Little Giant is Paula Zimmerman who is a half-inch under 5-10. From there, it drops down to Kim Myers and Debbie Link at 5-7 each.

"What we are going to have to do, or try to do, is get the ball off the boards and get it out as quick as we can," the Ross leader said. "We do have speed."

Leading the speed parade will be Price and Flickinger, both 5-1, at the guards. On the inside, Wolf will go with Myers at center, and junior Barb Bliss (5-5) and Solze (5-6) at forwards.

"You can see by our size that we are going to have to play mostly a zone defense," Wolf explained. "I'd hate to go with a man to man and end up with a mismatch on our guards."

Lori Lawrence, a 5-4 sophomore, Debbie Clark, 5-4 sophomore, and Cheryl Carter, a 5-4 junior, are the front line replacements at the

guards slots. Carter began practice just this past Monday after recovering from a 14-stitch cut in her hand suffered during volleyball season.

Lynn Kellogg, 5-4 junior, and Jenny Bowes, 5-5 junior, are the forward backups with Kellogg also being called on for guard duty at times. Zimmerman will backup at center while Link can play either center or forward.

Wolf pointed out that during the four preseason scrimmages, her team has performed well but what her team will do under actual game pressure is an unknown commodity.

The Little Giants will learn how they react to that unknown commodity Thursday when they journey to Bowling Green High School for the season opener. The junior varsity game will begin at 6:30 p.m.

The first home game for the Little Giants will bring in Clyde on Dec. 16 at the Ross High School gym.

**BOWLING GREEN** — The Ross High School girls basketball team suffered through a cold shooting night, especially in the first half, in dropping a 54-29 decision to host Bowling Green in the season opener for the girls.

Ross only scored six points in the first half and found itself trailing 19-6 going into the third quarter. The Little Giants got going in the second half, but so did the hosts. Ross more than doubled its first half scoring output in the third quarter but still found itself trailing 35-19 going into the final period.

Ross shot 18 per cent from the field to 45 per cent for Bowling Green. The Bobcats held a narrow 22-21 edge in rebounds, with Ross committing 34 turnovers to 27 for Bowling Green.

Ross will resume action Tuesday night at Toledo Whitmer.

# Cenkus' shot ruins Ross Little Giants home debut

Christy Cenkus banked in short jump shot from the foul line with just over a minute to play in the game for the winning basket in Clyde's 27-24 victory over Ross in the Little Giants home opening basketball game.

The Fliers survived a shooting night that would normally spell doom for other teams. Clyde case up 74 shots at the bucket and canned only 10 of them for a cold 14 per cent performance.

"Normally, we shoot around 35 per cent," Clyde Coach Mary Thomas grinned.

While the Fliers were super cold, Ross was not too many degrees better. The Little Giants fired 51 shots but hit only nine for 18 per cent. The number of shots brought a frown to Coach Sue Wolf, who watched her team drop its third straight game without a win.

"I cannot get them to shoot," Wolf exclaimed. "Every time they come close to the bench I yell at them to shoot the ball."

Ross trailed at the end of one quarter 10-8 and at the half 15-12. The Little Giants had taken their only lead of the game late in the second period.

With both teams having a hard time locating the basket, Ross's Diane Flickinger hit a pair of free throws to cut the Clyde margin to 11-10. Kim Myers dropped in a short shot from the right with 2:30 to go till the end of the half. The Fliers won 12-11.

Clyde, however, bounded back with a pair of charity tosses by Sharon Ritchey for the lead and a looping one-hander from the top of the circle by Sandy Smith for the lead at the half.

In that second stanza, Clyde hit only one of 22 shots from the field and Ross, one of 10.

Clyde, behind three long one-handers by Ritchey, forged a 21-14 lead, the biggest of the game, midway through the third quarter. A three-point play by Ross's Debbie Link made it 21-17 at the end of three periods for Clyde.

A bucket by Barb Bliss and a free throw by Flickinger cut Clyde's lead to 21-20 a minute into the final stanza. Cenkus hit a free throw to build the Fliers lead back to two but Bliss fired one in from the top of the circle to tie the game with five minutes to play.

The deadlock remained until Evin Nyenhuis, a 5-11 exchange student from Holland, canned a shot from 20-feet for the Fliers. Clyde held onto the 24-22 lead for three minutes but Bliss hit a jumper from the left of the foul circle to tie the game with 1:22 to play.

Then came the stars for Cenkus who put in the winning bucket 15 seconds later. Ritchey iced the game with a free throw with six seconds to play.

Wolf, despite the loss, was pleased with her team in one area.

"I thought we played good defense but we did not block out on rebounds," she said. "Sure, we had some defensive lapses and they scored on them but overall, I thought the defense was good."

Clyde outrebounded the Little Giants 46-42 but 21 of the Clyde caroms came off the Fliers' offensive board. Ritchey led in scoring with nine points.

Roxie Price and Bliss led Ross's scoring with six points apiece.

Aman in the second quarter, the Fliers lost Kathy Aman when she suffered an injury to her ankle. In the Fliers' 53-34 win Tuesday over Port Clinton, Aman had scored 18 points.

In the junior varsity contest, Ross notched an 18-14 win.

Ross will host Oregon Clay Tuesday at the high school. The JV game will begin at 6:30 p.m.

## Little Giant girls hit victory column

Fremont Ross employed a stingy zone defense and Roxie Price rammed in eight of 11 shots to unravel Oregon Clay's girls basketball team 33-29 Tuesday at Ross High School.

The win was the first of the season for the Ross girls against three losses. It was Clay's first test of the still young roundball season.

"Roxie played pretty well," beamed a happy Sue Wolf, coach of the Little Giant girls. "She had not been playing well the last couple of games."

Price, a scrappy 5-1 senior guard, popped in 12 points in the first half as Ross broke out to a 19-12 lead. She pumped in one of two shots in the first eight minutes and then gunned in four of five in the second. The Little Giants suffered through six turnovers in the opening period as baskets by Mary Powers and Cindy Szabo pushed Clay into a 4-0 lead. A free throw by Paula Zimmerman four minutes into the game was Ross's first.

Price stole the ball and laid it in for the Little Giants first bucket at the 2:40 mark and free throws by Barb Bliss and Diane Flickinger gave Ross a 5-4 lead at the end of the quarter.

The Little Giants started to the half-time with the biggest of the night, on Price's hot shooting and by dropping in six unanswered points in the final three minutes.

Clay used a man to man (girl to girl) defense in the early stages of the game and it was just like a Christmas gift to Wolf.

"I was glad to see them using it," she smiled. "It was to our advantage because of the speed Roxie and Diane have out front, they were able to get some good shots, especially Roxie."

Flickinger had nearly the identical shot as Price, but she had the misfortune of having an invisible lid on the basket. Several of her shots rolled around and off.

Clay caught fire at the start of the third period and went on a 10-2 scoring

spurt to grab a 22-21 lead. Szabo hit two baskets in the first minute and two more with a turnover on a technical foul on Ross by Powers that put Clay on top for the first time in the final half. There was a little over four minutes gone when Powers canned a three.

Bliss and Ross back ahead with a jumper from the right but Szabo's short shot from the left put the Eagles on top again 24-23. That was the last time, however, that Clay was to lead.

Flickinger banked one in from the right and Bliss lofted a soft shot in from the circle for a 27-24 lead at the end of three.

Price banged in two 15-footers in the first four minutes of the final period to put Ross ahead 31-24 and the game was out of reach. The Eagles did close the gap to 33-28 but Flickinger canned a pair of free throws with two minutes left to ice the game.

"We did pretty well defensively tonight," Wolf explained. "Before this game, in our zone, we had Roxie guarding the wrong person. Instead of falling back toward the middle when the ball went to the side, she had been going out."

Price finished the night with 18 points with Flickinger and Bliss adding seven apiece. Szabo had 13 for Clay.

In the junior varsity game, Lisa Swidersky hit two buckets in overtime for a 21-17 Ross win. The win upped the JV's record to 2-2.



Playing its best was not quite good enough Tuesday for the Ross High School Little Giants girls basketball team.

"They are just good," a not too overly distressed Sue Wolf, Ross coach, grinned after she had watched a well disciplined and sharp shooting Toledo Central Catholic team drill the Little Giants 65-24.

"I think we played well tonight," Wolf offered despite the lopsided score. "As a matter of fact, I feel that if we had played this well in the other games that we lost, we would have won them."

The loss was Ross's fourth in five contests while the TCC Irish ran to its third consecutive win against no losses this season.

"We are fortunate up there," Central Coach Fran Krompak smiled, "in that we have one heck of a good grade school program. These girls have been playing basketball since the fifth grade."

Employing a zone press along with a half-court trap, the Irish forced Ross into numerous turn-

overs throughout the game. Central dropped the press at the start of the second period after they had taken a 22-4 lead.

Peg McCarthy, a 5-8 sophomore, banged in 10 points and Central popped in 10 of 22 shots in the first period pullaway for the Irish. McCarthy who drove the base line consistently as well as sweeping the boards for sure followup shots, led all scorers in the game with 16, canning eight of 14 from the field.

Kristi Gordon, a 5-9 senior, collected 12 points for the Irish and along with McCarthy and 5-10 sophomore Chris Tuttle, shut Ross out on the boards. Tuttle wound up with eight points.

Central slammed in 30 of 73 shots for a 41 per cent shooting performance while pulling out quarter leads of 22-4, 41-10, and 54-14.

The closest the Little Giants got to Central after Mary Ann Robinson's jumper from the top of the circle put Central on the scoreboard first was 4-2 a minute and a half into the game. Barb Bliss's short jumper, however, was one of only two buckets for Ross in the initial stanza.

The Little Giants had problems getting off a decent shot against the tenacious Irish defense, lofting only 33 toward the basket all night. They made only seven of them.

Diane Flickinger led the Ross girls with eight points; Roxie Price followed with seven and Bliss finished with a half dozen.

In the junior varsity game, the Irish rolled over Ross 29-8 to drop the Little Giants JV mark to 2-3.

NEW YORK (AP) — Middle linebacker Jack Lambert of the Pittsburgh Steelers was selected the National Football League's Defensive Player of the Year today by The Associated Press.

Lambert was an easy choice with 42 votes from the 84 ballots cast by sports writers and broadcasters in the 28 NFL cities. Defensive tackle Wally Chambers of the Chicago Bears finished a distant second with 10 votes while defensive end Tommy Hart of the San Francisco 49ers had seven and cornerback Monte Jackson of Los Angeles had five.

Others receiving support included Lambert's linebacking partner, Jack Ham of Pittsburgh, defensive end John Dutton and tackle Joe Ehrmann of Baltimore, cornerback Mike Haynes of New England, the defensive rookie of the year, and defensive end Coy Bacon of Cincinnati.
