Throws Second No-Hitter Of Season

Bork Throws Second No-Hitter, Ross Loses Game

Senior right-hander Terry Bork pitched his second no-hit game of the season Tuesday night, but Fremont Ross was eliminated from contention for the Buckeye Conference baseball title. Despite the flawless pitching of Bork the Little Giants fell 2-0 to Lorain Admiral King.

The game decided the eastern division representative in the Buckeye Conference final play-off.

King has been a nemesis to the usually strong fielding Ross team. The Little Giants concluded the season Tuesday with a mark of 12 wins, four losses. Three of the four losses have been to Admiral King. In losing three games to King by counts of 11-2, 3-2 and now 2-0, Ross has allowed a total of 14 un-earned runs.

Bork so far this season has thrown a pair of no-hitters and two one-hitters. Ironical as it may

seem, he lost one of each, in addition to losing a 17-inning game in the district finals.

Tuesday the tall right-hander struck out nine and walked only two with near perfect control. Only three balls were hit to the outfield by King, one caught by Mike Hetrick in right and two by Del Schultz in center. Bork struck out the side in the second and third, and also retired King in order two other frames.

Ross players committed three

errors. King scored first in the opening inning when Juan Pagan walked, stole second and then went to third on a wild throw to second by the catcher. Bork detected a squeeze play coming and threw a pitchout. Catcher Steve Raines in his haste to turn and put the tag on the runner dropped the ball.

In the fifth inning King came up with its second run when Joe Serrano reached first on an error by second baseman Junior

Pence. Serrano stole second, moved to third on a passed ball and scored when Bork was charged with a balk.

Ross left nine men on base, leaving the bases loaded in the first and fifth and two on in the third. In the third Ross had men on second and third with no one out and the meat of the batting order—Tim Thomas, Terry Bork and Del Schultz—coming to bat. King relieved its starting pitcher Denny

Losh and Jim Bonominio came in and got the side out.

DETROIT (AP) — Neither Cleveland Manager Birdie Tebbetts nor Detroit's acting skipper Bob Swift are too excited about the fact that the Indians will still be in first place when their four-game series ends Thursday night.

The Indians assured themselves of a slightly longer stay by beating the Tigers, 2-0, on Luis Tiant's four-hitter in the second game of a two-night doubleheader Tuesday.

The Tigers spotted the Indians five runs, then charged back to win the home run-dominated opener, 7-6.
