Outlook: Schimmoeller will be learning the league as well as his own players his first year at Oak Harbor after coaching Fremont Ross last season. Port Clinton has most of a squad that advanced to regionals back. Perkins has won the league the last three or four seasons. Schimmoeller said the Rockets will be aggressive on the basepaths. Oak Harbor should be adept at small-ball — laying down bunts and stealing bases. Senior Shana Paule (of, p) will see time after coming over from Woodmore.

Outlook: All the players on this year's roster except freshman Jake Molyet (2b, of) received at least minimal experience on the varsity team last season. Old Fort will not have a junior varsity team this year. SJCC and Tiffin Calvert are the favorites in the MAL. Each has strong coaching as well as pitching. Both are also extremely sound fundamentally and commit few errors on defense. The MAL should be a relatively tough conference. Old Fort remains young with a number of juniors. Old Fort should be markedly improved from last year, buoyed by the return of Ardery, who did not pitch last season because of a knee injury. Ardery is likely to be the closer and has tremendous power at the plate. DuBois hopes to continue to build the program and believes last year was a step in the right direction after the team won zero games two years ago. The Stockaders were fourth in the MAL in hitting (.324) last year and the bats should again be a strength. Nine of the 15 kids on the roster can pitch so determining roles will be essential.

Outlook: Ross made a splash in the state rankings last season before slumping to close the year. Garza, Cobb and Ruiz should provide the team with solid leadership. Hall hit over .500 last season. Findlay is probably the league favorite with Napoleon close behind. Each is typically long on talent and proficient with the fundamentals.

The Little Giants should be very competitive in the league. The Little Giants will be adept at putting runs on the board and should play solid defense behind several returning hurlers. Continued development among the pitchers would buoy the team's confidence. Dennings was a junior varsity coach at Ross last year and head coach for St. Marys Legion for the last three years. Ross's lineup is heavily-laden with juniors but each has two years of varsity experience already. Dennings said maturity and the speed at which the newcomers get acclimated will be keys.

Outlook: The Crimson Streaks were tabbed by coaches to finish first in the MAL this season. That certainly is no surprise with Wammes and Miller back at the front of the rotation. The pair has pitched each of SJCC's important league games the last three years. Miller handed Wammes a one-run lead in the regional semifinals last year before Wammes blew the save and subsequently sent the team to state with a home run. Calvert, St. Wendelin and Seneca East have a lot of returning talent and should also battle for the conference. Junior Ryan Schmidt is the frontrunner to replace Nate Kerr at catcher. Roth and Swaisgood also saw time on the mound last season so the top four hurlers return. Five position players, including shortstop and center field must be replaced. Sophomore Anthony Rushee will likely start in the middle-infield after primarily pinch running last year and Grant Barbour should slide into the spot in center field.

Dyer was first-team all-league and Golightly was honorable mention last year. Sophomore Josh Zollinger will vie for time at second base. The league's projected finish according to coaches is Eastwood, Elmwood, Lake, Otsego, Woodmore, Genoa, Gibsonburg then Lakota. With Dyer as the ace, a solid infield and a young but talented pitching staff the Wildcats could very well surprise some people this year. The team's top four pitchers (11 of 13 victories) return and the seniors should provide plenty of leadership. Dyer also led the team in hitting last season (.377).

No doubt about Ross opener

The only parallel was the circumstance surrounding the endings.

Last year, the Fremont Ross baseball team's season opener at Sandusky Perkins was shortened with the score tied because of darkness.

A season later, the two teams once again failed to play a regulation seven inning game because of poor visibility.

But there likely wasn't any speculation of what the outcome would have been this time around.

The Little Giants used a five-run

fifth inning and allowed only three Perkins hits as they cruised to an 11-2 victory Thursday over a perennial area power.

The game was called in the bottom of the sixth when Ross had one out.

"I'm pretty pleased the way we started off," first-year Ross coach Andy Denning said. "I couldn't ask for a whole lot more out of us."

Denning, a Little Giant junior varsity coach last year, led the way in his first varsity level game after taking over for Rob Schimmoeller in the off-season. Schimmoeller is now

the head coach at Oak Harbor.

"He's really happy with us," third baseman Brad Cobb said of Denning. "We like him. Everybody respects him."

The sentiments were certainly reciprocated Tuesday — especially in Cobb's case.

The senior was 2-for-3 — including a triple and double — with three RBIs from the No. 7 spot in the batting order.

"I felt pretty good," he said. "I kind of struggled in scrimmages earlier this year."

Perkins, which lost its first game

after beginning the season with two wins, went 20-7 last year before falling in the district semifinal. One of those setbacks came from Ross in a rescheduled game late in the season.

The Pirates have claimed the Sandusky Bay Conference championship seven of the last eight years — including the last four titles.

"It just goes to show our program is right up there with all these other well-known programs," Cobb said.

Cook is one of at least five Ross pitchers who will be called upon to take the hill for Dennings this season.

Cobb, Garza, Kory Decker and Mike Abbott give Dennings the luxury of

choosing between several serviceable arms.

"The depth is definitely there," Cobb said. "We have players who can fill in anywhere."

Robbie Hall singled home Aaron Opelt to begin the Little Giants' scoring barrage in the fifth inning as Ross batted through the order.

Cook followed with an RBI double to make the score 6-2 before Cobb brought home a pair of runners with a double of his own.

"I knew we had the capabilities," Dennings said of the scoring outburst. "I didn't know if we would show up today being the first game with jitters and what not."

Ross faded down the stretch last season and finished 15-10.

The Little Giants had a cameo in the state rankings early in the year, but ultimately fell in the sectional opener to Mansfield Senior.

"We were supposed to be good last year, but I think we'll have a little better team this year," Cook said. "I think we can make a run at something. We should be very tough in the league and go far in the tournament. Anything less, I won't be happy."



At approximately the same time the chance at victory for Fremont Ross was slipping away, Aaron Opelt made sure to pull it back in.

With visiting Findlay looking to add to a two-run lead in the fifth inning, the Little Giant standout center fielder reached out in full extension to make a remarkable catch, thus preventing an extra base hit by Trojan Andrew Badertscher.

In turn, Ross added five runs in the bottom of the frame on its way to an 8-6 victory over the defending champion of the Greater Buckeye Conference.

The spectacular defensive effort by Opelt — one of his several in the game — served as a fitting metaphor for the Little Giants, who have let several games slip away in the early stages of contests this season.

"I can get to them pretty quick — that helps me a lot," Opelt said, "but I get pretty good jumps on it."

Opelt also had a two-run single in the third inning.

Kyle Cook pitched six innings and allowed 10 hits to earn the win on the mound. Ricky Clark threw a scoreless seventh to pick up the save for Ross (8-4, 2-1 in the GBC).

"It's great to beat Findlay," he continued. "They and Sandusky are our No. 1 rivals. We just love to beat them anytime in any sport."


Decker capitalized on the fifth-inning outburst with a two-run single to left-center to make the score 8-5.

But Ruiz too recovered as he allowed only three hits in seven innings. He walked four and struck out four.


"We threw the ball well enough to win but didn't get it done in the other aspects of the game," Dennings said.


The loss dropped Napoleon to 2-17 (0-7).
