Spring sports slowed by winter temperatures

Just when you thought there was no use for the old Wal-Mart site on East State Street, we offer a suggestion:

A baseball field.

That's what it became thanks to Mother Nature's annual spring game of Name that Forecast — for the Fre-mont St. Joseph Central Catholic baseball team this week.

Employing the techniques that six years of coaching have produced, Crimson Streaks head coach Rick Barbour found

himself launching fly balls to his troops in the parking lot of the Applewood Shopping Center. It was Barbour's way of sidestepping the soupy condi-tions of the Sacred Heart School's athletic fields, the result of the snow, rain, ice that have fallen in the winter's waning weeks.

"The weather hasn't cooperated a whole lot, but then again it usually doesn't at this time. We got out for one full workout last week," said Barbour, whose team had to play second-fiddle in its own gymnasium last week when St. Joe hosted an auction.

Forecasters predicted the next coming of the Ice Age Tuesday, but brief snow and resulting frigid air was the reality. The drier air was a blessing for some, not for others.

"I was looking forward to a day off," quipped St. Joe boys tennis coach Brian Miller.

"It's not bad so far, except it's freezing outside. We got out about four or five days and we've had some good weather.'

Getting outside doesn't always mean getting things accomplished.

"With practice as cold as it is," said Bellevue tennis coach

Lee Booze, "you don't get to sort things out very quickly. We've tried to get outside every day. We went out (Tuesday) but you can't really play much. We've been outside every day and you do some running, but you just don't get to play much tennis."

Booze has encountered dilemmas similar to those of his fellow Bellevue coaches and the programs at Fremont Ross; they started late because of the schools' basketball success.

"We got pushed back a couple of days because of boys basket-

Outlook: Expect typical Fremont Ross softball this spring, as the Little Giants, want to make opponents work on defense. With the added speed of St. Joe transfer Erin Lytle, Schaaf and Horn in the outfield rotation, causing chaos could come easily for Ross. "A lot of teams don't execute; we try to take advantage of that," Schell said. While Ross is an experienced team, it is also young (just two seniors), meaning that any success this year could carry well into the future.



Well, party on, coach, but you may not want to invite Slark to too many more soirées. She tends to spoil the fun.


Unless, of course, striking out 11 times, having only one run-ner reach second base and barely making contact on numerous other occasions is classified as a good time.

With two speeds - fast and faster - and an occasional drop-your-drawers changeup, Slark struck out five Ross hitters more than once.


"I depend a lot on my defense, and I think they did a great job," Slark said. "It was a team effort. I don't like to take a lot of credit for myself."
