Bellevue girls hold off Little Giants for 50-48 victory

BELLEVUE - It was a shutout followed by a slump that ended just in time.

Bellevue held Ross scoreless in the first quarter, taking a 13-0 lead, but struggled before slipping past the Little Giants 50-48 in a high school girls basketball game Saturday.

"All we needed was a basket and a free throw," Ross Coach Sue Wolf said about her team's scoreless opening period, "and we would not have had this."

As it was, Wolf had to settle for a half-hearted state of satisfaction: Happy over the comeback but down because of

being unable to finish off with a win.

After the dismal first eight minutes, Wolf's team rallied to trail 26-20 at halftime. Late in the third quarter, Ross ran off nine consecutive points for a 39-30 lead.

Ross's first points — Joy Eishen's two free throws — of the season, 13 seconds into the second quarter, closed Bellevue's lead to 13-2. It was a quick trip uphill after that.

With Eishen scoring seven points, Amy Ritzman coming off the bench to add six more and Stephanie McGee three to go with a scrambling defense, Ross closed to 24-19 before settling for

the halftime deficit.

Ross caught the Redmen 28-28 on Eishen's bucket 2½ minutes into the second half. Kim Borys' basket gave Ross the lead and after Danielle Somogyi pulled Bellevue even, the Little Giants ripped off the next nine points.

Eishen took a pass from Dian Schepflin for a layup and Borys fed McDonald for another for a four-point Ross lead. Ritzman knocked in a free throw and Schepflin got a pass from Missy Smith for a layup and a 37-30 lead. Borys' bucket put Ross up by nine with a minute left in the third quarter.

"We played very well for eight minutes but there were six (third

quarter) that we did not play at all," Bellevue Coach Ron Brown said.

But it was wakeup time for the Redmen. Tracy Powell's long 3-pointer with a half-minute remaining in the third quarter, provided the spark.

Bellevue, with Kim Zelms, Somogyi and Heather Mowery, cut the Ross lead to 46-43 with 1:35 to play. Eishen's two free throws stopped the Redmen drive temporarily, but Somogyi's bucket and a pair of costly turnovers in the final 1:10 cut down Ross.

Zelms' hit a pair of free throws after a Somogyi interception. Another turnover with 45 seconds was followed by two more Zelms

free throws, putting Bellevue on top 49-48, and the Ross comeback was over.

Jim Ross lost Eishen, who led all scorers with 16, and McGee in the final four minutes on fouls.

Schepflin finished with 12 points. Powell had 11 and Zelms 10 to lead Bellevue.

Ross was 18 of 52 shooting from the floor and Bellevue 18 of 41.

The Little Giants had a 44-24 rebounding edge. Ross had 37 turnovers, six more than Bellevue.

"Well, a lot of players played," Wolf said.

But the sting of the loss wiped out any real satisfaction.

Ross girls notch first basketball win

An early taste of victory was the way Fremont Ross girls basketball coach Sue Wolf described the Little Giants' 60-54 victory Tuesday night over Huron.

"It's a great feeling to get (the first victory) this early," Wolf said.

Ross, 1-1, didn't win its first game in 1988 **Girls Basketball** until Dec. 8 after an 0-5 start.

In other games Tuesday, Lakota won its first game under new coach Jim Balsizer, 42-38 over Old Fort, Sandusky St. Mary's beat Gibsonburg 64-45, Oak Harbor routed Genoa 66-32, Buckeye Central topped Margaretta 52-46 and Norwalk defeated Bellevue 45-30.

At Huron, Kim Borys scored 20 points and Ross held off a late Huron comeback. The Little Giants led 48-35 after three quarters but the Tigers got no closer than the final count.

Stephanie McGee, who led Ross with eight rebounds, chipped in 12 points as did Joy Eishen.

Stacie Esposito scored 18 points and Michelle Drury added 16 for Huron, 2-1.

Esposito, who scored 33 points against Danbury Saturday, was held to six in the first half by Ross's Missy Smith.



Little Giants stop Pirates

Three games into the season and Ross is a game away from equaling its victory total of a year ago.

The Little Giants struggled early but pulled together in the second half for a 50-42 high school girls win over Sandusky Perkins Tuesday night in the Ross Purple Pit.

Ross was 3-17 last season but is now 2-1.

"I don't want to think about that," Ross Coach Sue Wolf said when reminded that Ross did not win its second game last season until Jan. 28.

"This one is a win we'll think about tonight and tomorrow we'll start getting ready for Clay (Dec. 16)."

She had wiped out the doldrums of last season quickly.

Ross trailed 14-8 before rallying in the second quarter. Stephanie McGee tossed in six points, Kim Borys five and Dian Schepflin four as Ross chugged to a 24-22 halftime lead. Perkins,

1-2, never regained the lead but never let Ross out of its sight.

In the second half, Wolf had her team in gear. After being outrebounded in the first half, the Little Giants began aggressively boxing out on the boards. Joy Eishen, who scored 10 of her 11 points in the second half, grabbed 10 second half rebounds and Schepflin corralled six more.

"Rebounding was one thing we stressed at the half," Wolf said. "We said 'Keep them off the boards.' "

It was advice heeded and when Ross began to pull the Perkins defense out away from the basket, Wolf had the Pirates where she wanted them.

"We pulled the offense higher up on the floor and was trying to make them come out further away from the basket," Wolf described. "That gave us more room to work to get position for shots."

Ross led consistently by four to six points in the second half until

Perkins closed to 42-41 on Jackie Dixon's free throw with 3:40 to play.

Borys gave Ross breathing room with a one-hander from the top of the key with two minutes remaining but Nikole Dye's free throw two seconds later kept Perkins within a bucket.

Shari Root gave Ross a boost after that. Schepflin made the front end of a one-and-one, missed the second but Root grabbed the rebound, went back up and was fouled. She made one

of two for a 46-42 lead with 1:02 remaining.

Clay deals Ross girls 47-45 loss

Oregon Clay spotted Fremont Ross an 18-point lead, then stood back and watched the Little Giants self-destruct at the foul line in a 47-45 high school girls win Saturday.

Ross, 2-2, missed 12 of 16 free throws and a chance up upsetting the unbeaten Eagles. Clay, 7-0, made six of eight free throws.

"The free throws beat us," Ross Coach Sue Wolfe said, "but I'm happy with the kids; I see a lot of progress."

Ross trailed 2-0 before outscoring the Eagles 24-4 in the next 8½ minutes for a 24-6 lead.

"We could not put the ball in the hole," Clay Coach Mike Csehi while issuing a sigh of relief. "We missed 11 layups in the first half and you can't win many games doing that."

Ross led at the half 26-17 on Amy Ritzman's 30-foot, 3-point shot at the buzzer. But Clay, with Sue Pollauf, Andrea Wasserman, Tracy Vargo and Julie Unsinger leading the way, outscored Ross 21-12 in the third quarter, forging a 38-38 deadlock.

Unsinger's 3-pointer cut the

Ross lead to 35-34 but Shari Root put Ross back up by three before Wasserman's basket pulled the Eagles back within a point with a minute remaining in the third quarter. Ten seconds later, Wasserman's rebound bucket gave Clay its first lead since the first basket. Kim Borys' free throw tied it after three quarters.

Ross never led again but tied it at 40 before falling behind 46-40 with 2:55 left. Dian Schepflin hit a free throw, Joy Eischen followed with a bucket and Schepflin hit a rebound shot, cutting Clay's lead to 46-45 with a minute to play but a pair of turnovers in the last 40 seconds sealed the Ross defeat.

Eischen popped in a game-high 18 points for Ross and Borys added 11, but just one in the second half. Unsinger had 13 and Wasserman 10 for Clay.

Ross was 20 of 48 shooting and Clay 20 of 54. The Eagles held a 43-33 rebounding advantage. Clay had 31 turnovers, 21 in the first half. Ross had 24.

In the junior varsity game, Deana Lilley's last second five-foot jump shot from the middle of the lane gave Ross a 37-35 win. Ross is 3-1.

Little Giants' comeback stops Newark 42-39

Ross had problems putting the ball in the basket but had little trouble holding onto it while squeezing past Newark 42-39 Saturday in a Buckeye Central Conference girls basketball game Saturday in the Purple Pit. Ross made only 14 of 54 shots (26 percent) but committed only 10 turnovers, two in the second half.

"That is the worst we have shot the ball in quite awhile," Ross Coach Sue Wolf said.

Wolf also pointed out that her team did have its best free throw shooting game. The previous three games, Ross made 21 of 55 from the foul line while dropping

two of the three, but Saturday, the Little Giants were 14 of 25, including seven of 10 in the final eight minutes.

Ross, 4-3 and 1-1 in BCC play, trailed 17-11 after one quarter and fell behind 21-11 in the second quarter before Vickie Castile came off the bench to spark the Little Giants. Castile sank a pair of free throws and two baskets and Ross trailed 23-22 at the half.

Castile sparked a 16-0 scoring run, putting Ross up 29-23 with 3:22 remaining in the third quarter.

Joy Eishen, who led all scorers with 18 points including eight of 10 at the foul line, pulled Ross even with a free throw and put

the Little Giants ahead 30 seconds into the second half with a bucket from the left corner for a 25-23 lead.

Newark, 2-8 and winless in three BCC games, tossed a couple more scares into the Little Giants, going ahead 33-31 and 36-35 before Kim Borys tied it with a free throw and Dian Schepfelin's sank two more foul shots for a 38-36 lead with 1:59 to play.

Eichen made two more charity tosses for a 40-36 lead before Tasha Davis hit a layup and a free throw, cutting the Ross lead to 40-39 with 43 seconds on the clock. Eishen iced it with 17 seconds remaining, hitting two more free throws.

"The kids did not quit," Wolf said, "when you get down that far — it is sort of funny — with this year's team, I was not nervous."

"I knew they were going to come back and they did."

While Ross had a poor shooting game, Newark was only slightly better, making 16 of 51 shots (31 percent) but just five of 32 in the second half. The Wildcats had 20 turnovers and outrebounded Ross 47-38.

Eishen was the only Little Giant in double figures but Schepfelin had nine and Castile finished with eight. Bekkah Berryhill had 15 and Davies 11 for Newark.

Ross made quick work of an early charge by Madison and rolled to a 58-41 high school girls basketball victory Thursday night in the Purple Pit.

"That did not look like an oh-and-eight team at first," Ross Coach Sue Wolf said.

The Rams started quickly, trying to get the Little Giants to run but after Ross pumped in nine of 16 first quarter shots, the Rams had only brief charges left. The Little Giants, despite missing five layups, led 22-11 after one quarter before knocking in eight of 14 shots in the second quarter for a 40-19 halftime lead.

Madison, 0-9, chopped the Ross lead to 43-31 late in the third quarter before a Little Giants spurt made it 47-31 heading into the final eight minutes.

Dian Schepfelin scored 10 of her game-high 15 points in the first quarter and Vickie Castile came off the bench to score eight of her 13 in the second quarter.

The Stockaders did, however, move ahead of Fremont St. Joe in the league standings with a 22-20 victory over the Crimson Steaks.


Old Fort improved to 5-4 and 5-2 in the MAL. St. Joe fell to 6-4 and 5-3 in the MAL.

A stone-cold final quarter and numerous missed opportunities tripped Ross Monday night in the Purple Pit.

Ross girls find way to win

Little Giants top BCC foe Findlay

A year does make a difference. Just ask Fremont Ross girls basketball coach Sue Wolf.

"Last year, if a team went ahead of us at that point, we would not come back," Wolf said, "but this year's team looks for a way to come back and it did tonight."

The short-order comeback netted a 45-40 win for the Little Giants over archrival Findlay in a Buckeye Central Conference game at the Purple Pit.

Ross, 6-5 and 2-2 in the BCC, led by as many as 10 points, 22-12, in the first half but fell behind twice by a point in the frantic fourth quarter.

Findlay took its last lead, 40-39, on sophomore Stacy Corso's foul line jump shot with 1:24 to play.

The Little Giants put on fast-paced but cautious offense on its trip downcourt before Joy Eishen launched a jumper from the right of the foul circle. The ball hit the front of the rim, bounced up and dived lazily through the net with 23 seconds left.

"My heart was really pounding on that shot," Eishen said about the last of her 14 points.

A breakaway bucket by Dian Schepflin and Vickie Castile's rebound at the final buzzer polished off the win.

The game was characterized by a pressure defense and a crushing rebounding assault by the Little Giants.

Ross led 13-12 after one quarter, a period in which it had 13 offensive rebounds while missing 18 of 24 shots.

"I don't know why we are missing the shots we are missing," Wolf said quizzically, "they are good shots."

Ross, despite making just 10 of 43 first-half shots, led 24-18 at halftime after Schepflin followed up her own missed shot.

"She always gets a basket when you don't want her to. That one at the end of the half was a big one," said Findlay coach Bill Lobb.

But it was the Ross defense and a commanding 29-12 first-half rebounding advantage that held the Trojans off in the first half.

"We wanted to block out and take the baseline away," Wolf said, "and we accomplished both."


And the pressure?

"We wanted to put the pressure on their guards," Wolf said.

That was not lost on Lobb.

"Anyone who has seen us play, knows that is what to do," Lobb said while admitting his team.


Eishen followed with a 12-foot jumper with 1:34 remaining to put Ross up by one but Corso's shot gave Findlay the 40-39 lead.



Ross girls top Clyde

The Clyde Fliers found out Tuesday night that sometimes big things really do come in small packages.

Fremont Ross's Kim Borys (5-1), Amy Ritzman (5-2), and Joy Eishen (5-6) combined for 25 points and 15 rebounds in the Little Giants' 49-35 homecourt, non-conference victory over the Fliers.

Borys scored 13 points and Eishen added 10, supporting Dian Schepflin's game-high 16 points.

Ritzman and Borys also led the Ross attack throughout the slow-paced first half. Both were either the thief, or villain, in most of Clyde's 19 turnovers.

Ross, 8-6, started sluggishly (four of 16 shooting from the field) but the Little Giants led 13-11 after one quarter.

Nelson, who led Clyde with 12 points, scored the first basket of the second half, giving the Fliers their first lead of the game since an 8-7 advantage in the first quarter.

The Fliers, 4-11, never led again after Ross regained the lead on a three-point play by Eishen that made it 26-24.

Ross outscored the Fliers 26-13 in the second half.

"We weren't moving on defense in the first half," Wolf said. "We had to move our feet. We had to keep our intensity up and we did that."

The Little Giants also moved their feet on defense, limiting Clyde to four points in the third quarter.

Borys connected on consecutive 18-footers and Eishen added a basket to push the Ross lead to 32-26 after three quarters.

"Their press bothered us, and we panicked," Clyde Coach Nancy Hanger said. "When we did break the press, we weren't able to use finesse with the ball."

"There were a lot of body fouls that threw our passing off, and that gets you upset when you feel people on the court aren't observing what happens."

Ross won the battle inside, gathering 38 rebounds to 34 for Clyde. Schepflin led Ross with 10 rebounds and Lindi Morrison had 10 for the Fliers.

Ross built its biggest lead, 45-30, with 2:08 left on a layup by Schepflin, who scored half of her points in the fourth quarter.

Lancaster clinches BCC title with win over Ross

Lancaster survived a pair of cold quarters with a sizzling free throw exhibition to defeat Fremont Ross 44-36 in a Buckeye Central Conference girls basketball game Saturday.

The victory clinched Lancaster's third consecutive conference title. The Golden Gales are 7-0 in BCC play. In three BCC seasons, Lancaster has lost just two conference games.

Lancaster, tied for 10th in the latest Division I Associated Press rankings, made 18 of 20 free throws including 12 of 12 in the final quarter.

That shooting offset a second quarter in which the Golden Gales did not make a basket and a fourth quarter that produced just a single field goal.

"That's not good," Lancaster Coach Steve Clippinger said.

But he took it with a smile. The torrid free throw shooting made up for a 13-of-31 shooting performance.

"All of them are good at the free throw line," Ross Coach Sue Wolf said. "That is where they beat us."

The Little Giants made just 13 of 51 shots, five of 20 in the final eight minutes, and just seven of 17 free throws.

Ross trailed 14-4 after one quarter but six minutes into the

second quarter, the scrapping Little Giants cut the lead to 15-14 on Vickie Castile's rebound.

"Ross played hard," Clippinger said, "and we cannot expect to them (opponents) to come out and quit."

"Ross had a lot to gain," the Lancaster coach continued. "They could have gotten back into the conference race."

The Golden Gales did not afford the Little Giants the chance. Instead, Ross slipped to 2-3 and 8-7.

"Every time we would get to within three to five points," Wolf said, "they would spurt; they knew when they had to score and that is the mark of a good team."

Lancaster made five of six free throws in the second quarter for a 19-14 halftime lead. After Joy Eishen's bucket cut the lead to 19-16, Lancaster ran off six

straight for a 25-16 lead. In that spurt, Ross point guard Kim Borys picked up her fourth foul.

"We cannot afford to have Borys on the bench," Wolf said. "She is the one that gets the ball around to people."

Ross got back to 25-20 on back-to-back Eishen baskets with 3:15 to go but the Little Giants went cold, not getting on the scoreboard again until 5:18 remained in the game. By that time, Lancaster had a 34-29 lead.

Ross pulled close in the final three minutes on a trio of 3-point baskets by Amy Ritzman but the final margin was as close as Ross was to get.

"I'll take this effort every time

we play," Wolf said. "I told them in the locker room I have not seen a team that I would trade them for ... I'm proud of them."

Holly Coll, the BCC scoring leader with 21 per game, quietly scored 16 for the Golden Gales while Stacy List had nine on nine of 10 free throws.

Eishen led Ross with 12 points and Ritzman 10, all in the final three minutes. Castile added seven.

Ross outrebounded Lancaster 35-27, but the Gales committed 28 turnovers, three more than Ross.

Ross hosts Eastwood this evening. The junior varsity game begins at 6 p.m.

Ross girls handed nightmarish loss

Devils overcome 16-point deficit

It was a dream beginning that ended in a nightmare Saturday for the Ross girls.

Zanesville overcame a 16-point second quarter deficit to hand Ross a 54-50 loss Saturday in a Buckeye Central Conference girls basketball game at Ross High School, dashing the Little Giants' hopes of a second-place finish in the conference race.

"We lost it completely," Ross Coach Sue Wolf said. "We just did not do what we were supposed to do."

The loss dropped Ross to 3-4 in the conference race while Zanesville finished 5-3. Ross is 10-8 with games at Sandusky Tuesday and Findlay Thursday. The Blue Devils finished the regular season 8-12.

Ross, using precision passing, clutch rebounding and a hot shooting streak, charged from a 6-6 first quarter deadlock to a 26-10 lead three minutes into the second quarter. The Little Giants made six of their first nine shots in the period but missed their last four.

"The first quarter, we did not do anything," Zanesville Coach Dave Bell said, "but from about the third minute of the second quarter, I was proud of them."

The Little Giants lost their momentum in that second quarter swing.

Zanesville ran off five points as Ann Davy, Regina Gibson and RaShawndra Horton asserted themselves. By halftime, the Ross lead had dwindled to 30-26.

In the third quarter, neither team could muster an offense but Zanesville cut into the lead further, trailing 33-32.

In the final eight minutes, Zanesville put on a sizzling free throw exhibition, connecting on 10 of 10 and outscoring Ross 22-17.

"They did not do anything dif-

ferent to us defensively," Wolf said. "We started to miss some shots and then got gun shy."

"It's a tough loss for us," she said.

Thompson sealed the win with a pair of free throws two seconds later.

"We played well the fourth quarter," Bell said, "and Thompson and Bennett hit those free throws."

Zanesville entered the game making 55 percent of its free throws but made 18 of 23 against Ross.

Horton led the Blue Devils with 14 points, 16 rebounds and six blocked shots. Thompson finished with 12 and Davy had 11.

Eishen, Dian Schepflin and Kim Borys had 13 points apiece for Ross.

Ross made 18 of 56 shots and Zanesville 18 of 46, Ross was 13 of 20 at the foul line and led in rebounding 38-30. Zanesville had 17 turnovers and Ross 18.
