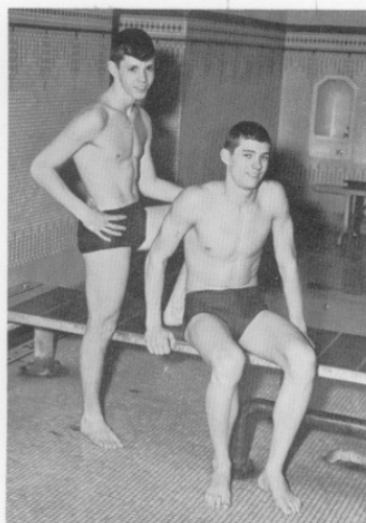

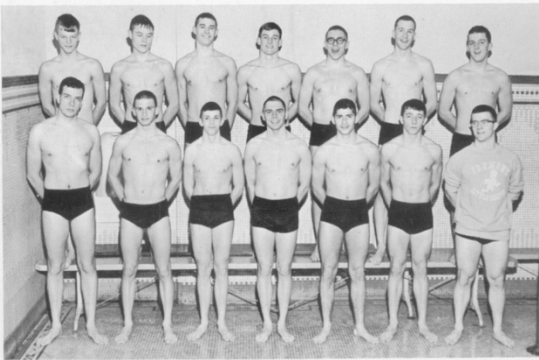

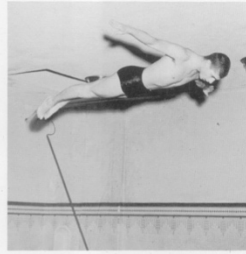

Babe Parilli Saves Job, Patriots' Hopes

Boston's Babe Parilli, taunted by a chant and faced with a long stay at the unemployment office, salvaged his job and the Patriots' title hopes just in time to set up a key clash with Houston that may finally decide the American Football League's Eastern Division scramble.

Early last week Boston Coach Mike Holovak threatened Parilli with the loss of his job if he was unable to move the club against Buffalo. Then, in the second period Sunday, Fenway Park, fans began to chant for Parilli's substitute, Tom Yewic. They got him.

But they got Parilli back at the start of the third quarter, and the 19-year pro veteran completed an amazing flip flop, passing for one touchdown, then scoring the clincher himself for a 17-7 victory over the Bills.

The victory moved the Pats, 6-5-1, into a tie for first place in the East with Houston, which is 6-5 after being shut out for the first time in 45 games—27-0 by San Diego's Western Division leaders. The Patriots meet the Oilers in Houston this Sunday.

The New York Jets, meanwhile, remained in contention in the East with a 5-5-1 record by blanking Kansas City. It was the first shutout in 54 games for the defending league champion Chiefs, bogged down with a 2-7-2 record.

The league's only other game was played Thanksgiving Day, with Oakland defeating Denver 26-10 and remaining two games behind the Chargers. The leaders meet at Oakland Sunday, with the Chargers needing a victory to clinch their third title in the AFL's four-year history.

Ross Tankers Set Sights On District Crown Again

With seven lettermen returning and possessing a great deal of depth, Ross high school's swimming team has a strong chance of repeating as district champions this season.

Only problem facing Head Coach Bill Faunce at this time is who will handle the 50-yard free style event, which was capably taken care of last year by Tom Lloyd. Both Lloyd and Jack Jaisler, two of the finest Fremont tankers ever to splash in the Junior high pool, are continuing their careers at Florida State university under Bim Stultz, a former coach here.

"We will miss Lloyd and Jaisler," said Coach Faunce, who is being assisted this season by Jack Balsizer and Mike Cochran, a new addition to the staff.

"Both Lloyd and Jaisler were the type of boys whom we could count on last season. They went out and got that first. We are not so certain of our firsts this year."

Bob Lozano, a double letter-winner, heads the returning lettermen. He is a diver, as is John Tuckerman, who received his 'P' last season. Other lettermen include Jim Foreman, Charles Fangbener, Jack Kramer, Bob Hite and Larry Sloan.

As a sophomore, Sloan earned a total of 96 points for his efforts. This figure was third highest on the team behind Jaisler's 129 and Lloyd's 105 points.

Faunce figures he is strong in the middle distance events — namely the 200 and 400-yard free style races. Sloan doubtless will be entering in these. Backing him up will be Bob Lloyd, who turned in an outstanding job in winning an event in the district, and Fangbener.

Fremont has a new date on its schedule this year—the Buckeye Conference championships to be held at Sandusky on Saturday, February 15. Along with the Little Giants, tank crews from Sandusky, Mansfield and Findlay will be represented.

Bears Forget Revenge Bit

CHICAGO (AP)—“That revenge business is ‘greasy kid stuff’—we’ve got our eye on that division championship, not the San Francisco 49ers.”

That was owner-Coach George Halas’ comment when asked if the Bears would be particularly steamed up Sunday in Wrigley Field against the club which inflicted Chicago’s only defeat in 12 National Football League sacts.

Last Oct. 20, the downtrodden 49ers stunned the Bears, 20-14, at San Francisco. That’s the sole blot on Chicago’s record of 9-1-2 which has the Bears one half-game ahead of runner-up Green Bay in the Western Division race.

In the two weeks still left in the NFL campaign, the Bears meet San Francisco and Detroit, both in Chicago, while Green Bay is at Los Angeles today and at San Francisco a week from today.

“The championship is what we’re after,” said 68-year-old Halas, whose Bears won their last divisional crown in 1956.

Halas said the Bear squad would watch the Packer-Ram game on television. “We’ll be able to sleep overnight on what happens to the Packers,” he said. “But whatever happens, I don’t think we’ll have any thought Sunday afternoon other than beating the 49ers.”

Fremont jumped off to a 7-0 lead after winning the 200-yard medley relay event to open the meet. Winning those seven points for the Little Giants were Jack Kramer, Bob George, Bob Hite and Jim Brehm with a time of 1:56.3. Fremont soon was ahead 20-5.

Jim Foreman was the only Fremont swimmer to win two individual events — the 200-yard free style and 100-yard free.

Coach Bill Faunce, starting his sixth year as coach of the local tankers, said those showing good performances for this first meet were Ron Roberts, Bob Lozano, Kramer and Larry Sloan. Fremont Ross' first regular swimming meet of the season will be held at the Junior high pool Friday at 4 p.m. with Mansfield Malabar, a high school in its first year of existence.

Only other previous action Ross has had at home was the inter-squad dual to introduce the new campaign.

Both the Little Giants and Malabar enter this meet undefeated. Fremont routed Mansfield Senior last week and Malabar pocketed victories over Ashland and Mansfield Senior in a triangular and over Ontario in a dual meet.

Malabar's top swimmer is Dave Beard, a three-year veteran who started out with the Senior high Tygers before his transfer. Beard, who holds the Fremont pool record in the 400-yard free style at 4:33.6, can swim any free style event. He was a state finalist last winter in the 200-yard free style.

Others looking sharp so far for the visitors are Bob Barbone, diver; Sophomore Dick Steen, free style and butterfly; Dave Pruninger, 200-yard individual medley or butterfly; and

Tom Allen, 100-yard backstroker.

Coach Bill Faunce, who indicated that most of his boys are still far off from their best times, believes the key to the meet hinges on whether his squad can win the seven-point opening event—the 200-yard medley relay. Going after the plum are Jack Kramer, Bob George, Jim Brehm and Charles Fangboner.

Defending state high school swimming champion Akron Buchtel visited Fremont Junior high pool Friday night and showed local tank enthusiasts a strong squad which could go a long way again in the state finals in March.

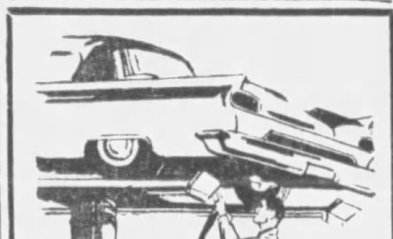

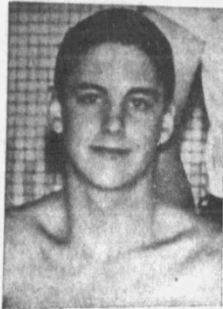

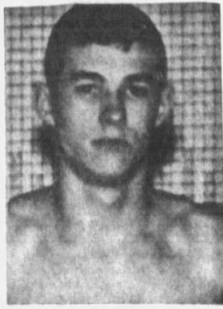

PHOENIX, Ariz. (AP) —Jack Nicklaus remembered something Arnold Palmer showed him two years ago and used it to advantage in winning the \$50,000 Phoenix Open, an event Arnie had captured the past three years.

"He used a driver on all the holes and won by a mile," Nicklaus recalled as he pocketed the first prize check with a 66 and 72-hole score of 271.

The burly young pro from Columbus, Ohio, proved his ability with a driver when he blasted 50 yards off the tee on the fourth hole and then hit hole high, six feet away from the hole on the 305-yard fifth hole. That brought a birdie and eagle and sent Nicklaus into the lead to stay en route to his first 1964 victory.

"You hit a driver and you have a chance for birdies," Jack explained. "You may hit behind trees a couple of times, but overall it's to your advantage to use the driver."

He proved it with a finish three strokes ahead of the tourney's Cinderella man, Bobby Brue, a former Milwaukee amateur star who got into the event only because 11 others dropped out. Brue, 29, was the

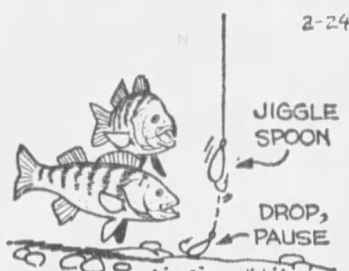
