Rains Wash Out Phoenix Open, Tommy Aaron's Three-Under 68

PHOENIX, Ariz. (AP) — Tommy Aaron and the weatherman aren't on the best of terms today.

Aaron, getting his usual jump on the rest of the field, was the clubhouse leader with a three-under-par 68 Thursday before rain washed out the first round of the \$80,000 Phoenix Open Golf Tournament.

All scores were erased, and the field was scheduled to make another try today, weather permitting.

The forecast was for occasional

pre-tourney favorite Arnold Palmer, were deadlocked at 71. Defending champion Rod Pumphrey was one of five at 73.

Aaron is known for his fast starts on the pro tour. He had 12 opening rounds in the 4th last year and picked up again last month with a first-round 65 in the San Diego Open.

Despite his hot early shooting, Aaron never has won on the pro tour.

Warriors Gain

Little Giants To Defend Buckeye Swimming Crown

Fremont Ross swimming team will be seeking its third Buckeye Conference championship at Sandusky Saturday. The Sandusky high school pool will be the scene of the third annual conference swim championships. Ross has come home with the title each of the two previous times.

Preliminaries of the conference meet will be at 11 a.m. with finals at 2 p.m.

Although the only team to capture the championship Ross enters the meet as an underdog to a strong Findlay contingent. Findlay boasts team depth which is all important as five places count toward the standings in each event. The Trojans can also point to a pair of dual

meet victories over Ross and one over Sandusky. Fourth team to compete in the conference meet for the championship trophy is Mansfield.

Coach Jack Balsizer rates Findlay as the team to beat and rates his Little Giants and Sandusky as capable of pulling the upset of the Trojans. Mansfield is a team with several good

swimmers capable of individual titles, but lacking in team depth. "It will take a complete team effort on the part of any of the three schools (Findlay, Sandusky, Ross) to win this one,"

praised Coach Balsizer. Best times recorded this year by Buckeye Conference swimmers are lower in two events than those which stand as champion

ship meet records. In these two events, 200-yard medley relay and 50-yard freestyle, chances are best for a conference record to fall.

Findlay has the best 200-yard medley relay mark with a 1:50.8 timing. The current conference record for which they will be aiming is 1:31.1 set by Fremont Ross.

Only Dan Kohn's 1:02.9 in the 100-yard butterfly for Ross stands as a conference best this season. On the other hand, seven of the conference records are held by Fremont swimmers. In addition, Mike Gabel, who graduated from Ross this past year, was the 1965 conference diving champion.

The meet will include one new event, the 400-yard freestyle relay. Findlay this season has recorded the best mark at this new distance, 2:41.5. Whoever wins this event will be establishing a conference record.

THREE RECORDS BY FREMONTERS

Disqualification Costs Ross Third Buckeye Swim Crown

SANDUSKY — Because of the victory celebration there was no victory Saturday for Fremont Ross in the Buckeye Conference Swimming meet. Findlay wears the champion's mantle, but the Little Giants came home knowing they were the best team in the conference for the third consecutive year.

The pressure was intense as

any one of three schools could win the conference meet going into the final event. Findlay, Sandusky and Ross, could win with the 12 points for first in the 400-yard freestyle relay. The victory would mean Ross continued as the only school to ever wear the Conference swimming crown.

Fate played a dirty trick as Ross won the final event too

easily. A jubilant relay team member jumped into the pool to congratulate the anchor man and Ross was disqualified. The rules of swimming meets clearly state no one shall enter the water until all contestants had finished the event.

The splash of joy not only cost Ross the championship, but it dropped them to third behind

Sandusky and Findlay. Final conference meet standings were Findlay, 65; Sandusky, 60½; Fremont, 52, and Mansfield, 22½.

Despite the disappointment, Coach Jack Balster was pleased with what he called "The finest all-around team effort that I can remember a Ross swim team giving in my five years of coaching here." In praise of his team he added, "They performed beyond my highest hopes for them, and proved that they are the best team in the conference this year."

Not only was it a hotly contested meet, it was a fast one. Two conference standards fell and two more were tied. Ross swimmers set the two new records and afforded one of the ties, in all three incidents lowering or matching records already held by Fremont swimmers.

Two New Records

New records were set by the 200-yard medley relay team of Rick Kidney, Glen Zimmerman, Dan Kehr and Ken Mathias. They cut eight-tenths of a second from a former Fremont record with a 1:50.3 for the relay.

Kehr also enjoyed the double success of setting a new conference and Ross school record as he became the fastest butterfly swimmer in Ross history. Kehr cut 1.5 seconds from the conference mark set by Jim Foreman of Ross with a 1:58.8 timing. This time is among the best in Ohio in only the second time Kehr has competed in the butterfly event. Kehr is only a junior with another year of competition.

Christy Double Winner

Brad Christy won the 200-yard freestyle with a 2:00.7 timing, which tied the conference record of Larry Sloan, formerly of Ross. Christy was the only double winner of the meet, also taking 400-yard freestyle.

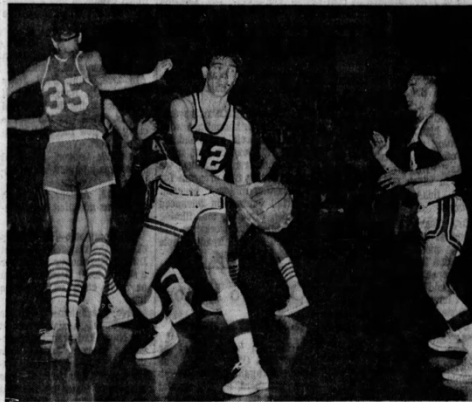
The fourth record performance came in the 100-yard freestyle, where Dick Sidner tied the Buckeye mark of 52.7 held by J. Diver, Findlay.

In seven other events Ross swimmers turned in their best times of the year. These swimmers, their times and finish in the event were:

Eric Wright, 100-yard freestyle, 52.8, second; Rick Kidney, 100-yard backstroke, 1:04.8, third; Bob Dray, 400-yard freestyle, 4:57, fifth; Christy, 400-yard freestyle, 4:30.5, first; Don Geyer, 100-yard breaststroke, 1:14, fifth; Glen Zimmerman, 100-yard breaststroke, 1:10.3, second; 400-yard freestyle relay team of Wright, Mathias, Jon Zink and Kirby Taylor, 2:38.1, first but disqualified. If Ross had not been disqualified the final relay would have stood as a conference record, since it was the first time the event had been run.

LITTLE GIANTS UTILIZE 'BREAK'

Start Is 88-67 Ross Victim

The observer who labels Fremont Ross a deliberate-style team would have had trouble justifying his estimation Saturday night. The Little Giants won game number 10 in 17 starts in a running fashion.

The Ross charges of Coach Dick Norman effectively utilized the fast break, momentarily forgot their defensive vigilance and toyed with the 100-mark chances before Norman freely substituted. Ross tallied 88 points in whipping Toledo Start, 88-67. The high point total came despite the fact a team of five reserves scored only three points in the final four minutes of the ball game.

Norman emptied his bench with 3:51 to play and the Little Giants in a commanding 85-55 lead.

Up until this time the Little Giants had shown a rare taste for the running game and proved quite adept at it. Although giving away height to one of the taller teams they had played this year the Giants were controlling the boards sufficiently to initiate the breaking style of play.

Ross had a 39-30 halftime lead but before putting together the biggest third quarter of the season to cement the con-

test. To date the third period had been one of letdowns that had been the margin in several defeats.

"It was pleasing to see them come out and go to work like that," noted Coach Norman in appraising the third period outburst.

Nine of 12 Ross field goals in the third period were directly attributable to the fast break. Tim Thomas and Terry Bork shared the linelight in the point-production department with 25 each. The pair combined beautifully in the running game, with numerous assists as well as points. Fred Tolhurst and Wally Pankrat were big men with rebounds and quick first passes to start the fast break.

To go along with the running game Ross hit 32 per cent of its shots from the field, 35 of 87. In contrast Start had a commendable 42 per cent with 22 field goals, but took 15 less shots.

The Little Giants showed a balanced ability on the backboards. Tolhurst led the rebounding department with 11, seven defensively and four offensively. Bork added seven rebounds, Fred Swaisgood nine and Pankrat eight. Each team had 34 rebounds.

Tolhurst, with 13 and Ted Wolfe at 11 were also in double figures for the winners.

Capitalizing on the late flourish three Start players ended in double figures. Lipner had

30, Littin 18 and Brighton 13. In reserve action Start desperation in the last quarter was costly. In an effort to get the ball the visitors fouled and the Ross reserves didn't miss. Ross reserves hit 25 of 36 free throws to put the game on ice.
