## Giants Play Pt. Clinton March 3; Sandusky High, St. Mary's To Clash

Luck was with Fremont Ross when pairings were made at Sandusky Saturday morning for the Sectional Class A basketball tournament.

Fremont, seeded No. 2 on its 14-2 record, was cast into the lower bracket, where its toughest opposition will be either Norwalk or Tiffin Columbian, both defeated by Ross during the season.

Bellevue, seeded No. 1, is in a tough upper bracket that includes Tiffin, Calvert, Sandusky and Sandusky St. Mary's. Ross drew Port Clinton, winner of only one game, while Bellevue drew Tiffin Calvert and plays the winner of the Sandusky-St. Mary's game.

### Sandusky, Norwalk Seeded

The seeded teams were Bellevue, Fremont, Sandusky and Norwalk, with the latter two having records of less than .500. The fact a team with a 4-9 record was able to be seeded indicates a weak tourney field, but the tournament could turn into a real thriller, especially in the upper bracket.

**Vic Malinovsky, Sandusky high athletic director and tournament manager, is preparing for a packed house on March 2, when four teams with big followings take the court.**

However, it is doubtful if the 2,500 capacity Sandusky junior high gym will be more than half filled the next night, March 3, for games between Fremont and Port Clinton and Norwalk and the Columbian-Willard survivor.

Bellevue and Fremont are favored to meet in the finals.

### TOURNEY CHATTER

George Janson, Tiffin Columbian mentor, is lavish in his praise of Bill Rohrbach, the Calvert center. "Don't sell Calvert short against Bellevue," he warns. "Rohrbach can wreck a club. He's the best I've seen all year, and he has some pretty good boys to go with him. You have to play him close to stop him, and if Bellevue happens to lose a couple of big boys on fouls, look out."

Janson's Columbians defeated Calvert two weeks ago despite 41 points by Rohrbach. Grant Walls of the Norwalk thinks Bellevue has a better team than when it won the state championship in 1945.

"They're getting stronger as they go along," asserted Grant. Janson was opposed to setting up a practice schedule of tourney teams on the Sandusky court. He felt it was putting too much stress on the event and the sport as well. It since his opponent Willard, will get a workout Janson will take his Tomatoes to Sandusky for a practice session. "Some coaches yell about a home court

advantage, but Sandusky has won the tournament only three times in 25 years," commented John Malcolm, Register-Star-News sports editor. John Feicht of St. Mary's agreed that it shouldn't be much of an adventure. The St. Mary's players were gathered outside the building and as soon as the pairings were made, Feicht went out and told them they had drawn Sandusky. A big roar of approval went up. "Our kids were hoping it would turn out this way," said Feicht.

Rohrbach has scored 542 points in 15 games this season, an average of 36 per game. Max Morrison, coach of Mount Zion and a member of the District board, attended the drawing. He told this reporter that Fremont lost the Class B district tournament because of general dissatisfaction of the way tickets were handled. But John Titsworth, Ross faculty manager, said he never received any complaints. John feels the shift to Mansfield was the work of H. L. Bowman, Bowling Green superintendent, head of the District board. Ivan Wilhelm's Bellevue club will have to face three dangerous and inspired teams if it goes to the finals. Calvert should be up for the first round game, and if the Redmen get by that one and run into St. Mary's in the semi-finals (St. Mary's will be favored over S. H. S.), the Panthers are capable of matching them in speed and shooting ability.

And if Bellevue passes those two tests, it probably will face Fremont in the finals and the Little Giants haven't forgotten that 72-65 setback of Feb. 2. St. Mary's battled Bellevue on even terms until the last minute in a regular season game. The doors will open at 6 p. m. for each tournament session. Representing Ross at the pairings were Coach Al Ziemke, Assistants Paul Raines and Bob Seole and Faculty Manager John Titsworth.

# Giants, Columbian Easy Winners; Calvert (Rohrbach) Plays Sandusky

SANDUSKY — Just before his Tiffin Columbian team took the court against Norwalk, Coach George Janson declared: "If we get by this one we'll be hard to stop. We'll be hard to get out of there."

Then after his Columbians defeated the Truckers, 64-51, to enter the semi-finals of the Class A Sectional finals against Fremont Ross last night, Mr. Janson, realizing he was speaking on the record and trying to minimize his optimism, said: "I look at it this way. We'll give 'em a battle, but they have too much height for us."

When he said "they" he was referring to the Little Giants, who breezed to an 82-40 victory over Port Clinton in the opening game on last night's schedule. Vic Malinovsky, tourney manager and Sandusky athletic director, optimistically estimated the crowd at 500, and nearly half of the fans were from Tiffin.

The crowd should pick up tonight when Tiffin Calvert and fabulous Bill Rohrbach take the court at 7 o'clock against Sandusky and Fremont returns to meet the spirited Columbian team at 8:45. Many will be on hand out of curiosity, wanting to get a look at Rohrbach and his mates, who upset top-seeded Bellevue Tuesday.

## Ross Subs Used Freely

Fremont didn't have much opposition, but their performance last night was a good one. The Giants showed speed and a good eye for the basket and appear to be in their best physical condition of the season.

With tonight's game coming up, Coach Al Ziemke substituted frequently. He rested Larry Miller all of the second quarter and used four substitutes and Miller in the third. Ziemke cleared the bench in the fourth quarter.

Port Clinton had three boys who don't average more than 5-6 in height and they were no match for the tall Fremonters. Dick Harter took point honors with 17. Henry Tiller scored 16 and Miller 13. Bob Twarek didn't get any field goals, but he managed to wind up as the scoring leader for the Redskins on eight free throws. Port Clinton made only nine field goals.

## Truckers Close For Half

Norwalk gave Tiffin a battle for a half, but the Tornadoes' balance took effect in the third quarter. Norwalk, with Jim Spettle and Dave Hunter doing most of the scoring, held the lead several times in the second period. Tiffin, led by sub Charles Adams and Gene Cook, forged ahead 48-41 after three quarters. Hunter fouled out early in the fourth period. The Tornadoes handled the ball well after a jittery start. Bill Groman's all-around play featured Tiffin's offense. He scored 16 points. Spettle, leading scorer in the Northern Ohio League, tallied 22, 10 on free throws. Spettle wasn't up to snuff in field goal shooting.

Season scores show that Fremont is in for a rugged scrap tonight. Ross conquered Tiffin here by three points, spurting from a tie score in the last 35 seconds, and it pulled the game at Tiffin out of

the fire in the last two minutes, winning by eight points. Tiffin led at the two-minute mark.

After losing two season games to Fremont last year, Tiffin, then coached by Harry Auble, upset Ross in tournament play.

If Ross wins tonight, tickets for Saturday's 8 p.m. finals will be on sale at Tremper's News Stand.

# DeMarco Lifts Title

NEW YORK (AP)—It took Paddy DeMarco nine years of fighting to learn self-control, but when he did it brought him the world lightweight championship.  
Paddy, a cocky, flat-nosed little guy from the Cough Navy Yard section of Brooklyn, supposedly on the downgrade as a boxer, won the title last night by decisively outpointing Jimmy Carter in 15 rugged rounds at Madison Square Garden.  
It was an astounding upset in the eyes of the slim crowd of 5,730, which rooted DeMarco in, but Paddy had a simple and logical explanation for it.  
"It was my smartest fight," he said. "I held control, did what I was told, boxed and jabbed him." Carter, usually the calm, confident fighter, apparently didn't know what to make of all this. He was counting on DeMarco

DeMarco.  
The victory didn't bring any great financial reward for DeMarco, who at 26 has been fighting professionally for nine years. But it did bring a lot of satisfaction.  
Oddly, it was DeMarco who was supposed to get the title shot when Carter won it from Ike Williams three years ago. But he was taken sick and Carter got the chance to win in an upset as surprising as last night's.  
When DeMarco finally got his chance, the experts made Carter a 4-1 favorite and were picking him to win by a knockout, just as he had in three title defenses last year.  
DeMarco, with his handlers repeatedly warning him not to get excited and to fight as he had planned, took charge almost from the start. He made Carter fight the way he wanted, piled up an

# Giants Overcome Columbian In 2nd Half; Sandusky 'Holds' Rohrbach To 21, But Teammates Get Hot

SANDUSKY — Fremont Ross, which was favored to get this far, and Tiffin Calvert, which wasn't supposed to get beyond the first round, clash tonight at 8 o'clock in the finals of the Class A Sectional basketball tournament being conducted in the junior high gym.

Both teams won pressure-packed games before a crowd of 2,700 Friday night to set the stage for a dramatic finish tonight. The winner advances to the district tournament in Toledo next week. The season comes to an end for the loser.

The Little Giants and Senecas had it when the chips were down in the semi-finals. After Dick Sullivan's five field goal spree in the closing minutes gave Calvert a 78-72 verdict over a battling Sandusky team in the first game, Fremont Ross pulled an 83-76 thriller out of the fire in the last half against Tiffin Columbian.

The teams treated the throng to some dazzling shooting, especially Tiffin Columbian. The gear-up Tornados scored on 32 of 66 field goal attempts and more than 20 of their goals came from the outer spaces.

### 32 For 56 For Calvert

Calvert was even more torrid, scoring on 32 of 56 tries from the field against Sandusky. The Blue Stricks achieved one objective — stopping Bill Rohrbach, the 6-6 Calvert center who made 39 points when Calvert upset highly-favored Bellevue, but other Senecas sizzled the nets to thwart Sandusky's efforts.

Coach Harold (Whitey Regan posted 6-4 Gene Miller and 6-3 Skip Routh in front and behind Rohrbach, arms extended. Very few passes got through to the big boy, but he still managed to collect 21 points.

Rohrbach attempted just 14 shots — and made nine.

Joe Scherger, a pint sized guard, not considered much of a threat, poured in five field goals in the first half. In the waning moments Sandusky forged ahead 69-68 after Tom Murray waged a one-man assault on the nets, but Calvert's Dick Sullivan scored on four straight shots, giving him five - for - five in the last four minutes. Sullivan scored 24 in the Bellevue surprise and had just three field goals until his outburst last night.

Dennis Bridgner, the star full-back in football, played a remarkable board game for Calvert after drawing four personal fouls in the first half.

Murray was the game's high scorer with 22 points. Sullivan and Rohrbach each making 21.

Miller, Harter Star

Tiffin. It was the third time this year the teams have waged a thriller — and Fremont won 'em all.

Miller collected 22 points by halftime as the Giants managed to get a 35-33 tie. Then Harter's effective rebounding and three goals helped Ross to a 57-53 lead after three quarters.

Columbian led by seven points in the first frame on long shots. Miller, using a jump shot from all angles, fired the Ross comeback in the second quarter. Neither team cooled off at intermission, making their first seven attempts of the third quarter.

Ross led 44-43 after two minutes of the third, then Baron made a long one. Miller added two jump shots and Harter sank a rebound to put Ross out in front 52-43, the longest lead either team enjoyed. Tiffin bounced right back to get within four points by the end of the quarter.

### Black Comes Through

Tiffin tied the score at 68-68, 70-70 and 72-72, then Miller sank a foul and Charles Black, another sub, walked up and converted two free throws despite the thundering boos of the crowd, which objected to an official's version of an infraction. Jack Baron, who got Ross out of difficulty with his ability to advance the ball against a pressing defense, hit a snowbird, and Black took off the pressure when he intercepted a pass at midcourt and dribbled in for a layup.

The throng was rooting for Columbian and undoubtedly Calvert and Rohrbach will be the people's choice tonight, but this reporter is impressed with the way the Giant's play under pressure. Crowd reaction doesn't seem to bother them.

## Team Effort Produces 83-78 Win Over Calvert; Rohrbach Scores 38, Fouls Out With 4:55 To Play

The "Solid Seven" of Fremont Ross were never more solid than Saturday night as they met the tremendous challenge of tremendous Bill Rohrbach to win the Sandusky Sectional Class A tournament.

In what was strictly a team achievement, the little qualified for the District tournament at Toledo University. Giants scored an 83-78 victory over Tiffin Calvert and Personal fouls played an important part in the contest from start to finish. The Little Giants suffered early when Larry Miller, 31-point star of the thrilling win over Tiffin Columbian in the semi-finals, drew three personal fouls in the first five minutes and Dean Doren incurred three by the end of the first quarter.

#### Miller Early Casualty

But after Miller left the game in the last minute of the third period, the tide changed. Big Rohrbach, a 6-6 giant who left a lasting impression on all who saw him perform, departed on personals with 4:55 remaining in the final quarter.

The Giants were ahead, 68-66, when Rohrbach lunged into Ted Houghtaling as they battled for a rebound. Houghtaling was one of seven Fremonters who carried the team to a 14-3 regular season mark and a Buckeye League championship in addition to Sectional honors.

Rohrbach scored a total of 38 points, and missed only 5 of 21 field goal attempts. In this writer's opinion, he played a greater game than when he tallied 49 in the first-round upset of Bellevue, because Dean Doren, Fremont center, played a steller defensive game, battling away at least a dozen passes into the pivot.

Joe Migliori's free throw with 4:40 to play left Calvert one point behind, then Dick Harter and Doren goaled in rapid succession. Houghtaling, who got all of his four goals in the last period, scored three times from the field and once from the free throw line to help wrap it up.

Three Fremonters and two Senecas fouled out. Fremont lost Miller with one minute to go in the third quarter. Henry Tiller was a casualty with 2:40 remaining of the fourth and Houghtaling was disqualified with just 7 seconds to go. Dennis Bridinger, hard-playing Calvert guard, drew Personal Foul No. 5 with 2:20 remaining and Fremont leading 75-72.

#### Doren in Top Form

Any number of factors could be regarded as turning points. Doren was brilliant, especially in the first period when he flashed his old form in the pivot to sink five goals and three fouls. His defensive play was almost equal to his offensive work.

Henry Tiller played his best game of the season on offense, scoring 20 points. Jack Baron, although lacking his usual accuracy in long-range shooting, hit a pair of timely second-half buckets.

For the second straight night,

substitutes Dick Harter and Charles Black came through with flying colors. Harter collected 8 points. Black 7. Harter stepped to the foul line when Calvert led 64-62 at the outset of the fourth period and pitched in two points to knot the score. It was tied no less than nine times in the last half.

#### Press Bothers Calvert

But it was bench strategy that threw Calvert slightly out of kilter. Ross went into a full-court press in the third period, and the Senecas couldn't handle it: They committed numerous errors, with Doren intercepting several passes in mid-court when Calvert tried to arch the ball to Rohrbach.

In spite of losing the ball frequently, Calvert was able to stay abreast in the third quarter. Ross once led 57-52, but Bridinger and Rohrbach tied it at 57-57.

Calvert's biggest lead was in the first period, five points, but the quarter ended with Ross on top 28-24. The Giants held a 42-35 advantage with two minutes remaining in the half but the peerless Rohrbach clicked on three straight shots and Ross left the floor at intermission with a 44-42 lead.

#### Miller Plays 8 Minutes

Miller actually played only eight minutes. He was taken out after his third personal in the first five minutes and he didn't return until the middle of the third quarter, then he fouled twice and watched the rest of the game from the sidelines.

Dick Sullivan, one of the tourney's better players, was Calvert's second best scorer with 14 points. Doren made 24 to pace Fremont.

More than 2,000 fans, the majority of them cheering for Calvert witnessed the finale. Both teams deserve plenty of praise for their efforts under the terrific pressure. Too much can't be said for Rohrbach and his supporting cast, especially Sullivan. Fremont can't point to any one individual as the hero. It took seven players.

The "Solid Seven" came through in the clutch — just as they have most of the season.

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
