Familiar faces, some changes on Ross schedule

Radeloff is dean of BCC coaches

Fremont Ross will play the same 10 teams as in 1989 but at the same time, the Little Giants will face new teams.

Confusing? Rex Radeloff hopes not.

Radeloff, beginning his fifth season as head coach of the Little Giants, became the senior coach in the Buckeye Central Conference over the winter after guiding Ross to an 8-3 record and a spot in the state playoffs. Four of the five BCC schools have new head coaches and a fifth team on the Ross schedule, Lakewood, also has a new leader.

"That will definitely make it more interesting," Radeloff said while relaxing between August practices. "You go into the season thinking you have the same 10 opponents — which we do — but when I look at the first five games, the coaches are the same as last year and that makes it a little easier to prepare. There is not going to be a lot of changes or at least I don't anticipate that."

"But the last five games, all the teams have different coaches. Even though you know some of the personnel coming back, you really have no idea what they are going to be doing offensively and defensively and that is like playing five new opponents."

Zanesville, under Whit Parks, took advantage of outstanding tailbacks while running the antiquated single-wing. With new coach Clarence Perry, that offense is gone.

"I know he runs an 'I' offense and a 50 defense and that is completely different from what they did in the past," Radeloff said.

At Newark, Tim Thimmes is

gone and Paul Starr, who coached successfully at the school a few years ago, is back.

Little Giants will keep teams guessing

There was little guess work for an opponent's defense when Ross was on offense last season.

When it came third-and-one or third-and-four — any tight situation — Terry Carter was going to get the ball some way. But Carter has moved on to Miami of Ohio and everyone else in the Little Giants offensive backfield was claimed by graduation or were scholastic victims.

Along with the backfield, Ross lost a couple of wide receivers.

Also lost was an offensive philosophy, Little Giants offensive coordinator Dan Fought said.

"It won't be a new philosophy as far as plays but you knew when we needed the tough yard last year, Terry Carter was going to get the ball in some manner," Fought said. "We'll stay in the 'I' but it will be a guessing game on the defense's part because we are going to anybody and everybody until

someone dominant comes out of the pack."


Carter, the second all-time rusher at Ross with more than 3,600 in three seasons, and quarterback Cory Lance gave Ross a 50-50 attack last season. Carter rushed for over 1,000 yards and Lance passed for better than 1,000.

"That is what we want to do again," Fought said.

A pair of juniors, Nick Wolf and Justin Perry, are vying for the quarterback slot.

"I think the quarterback situation is a good one," Fought said. "Nick has looked good all summer and Justin is just a step behind him. Both of them are throwing the ball well; it's a matter of if one gets hot, it's his job but both have to learn to relax."

Chris Benson, who finished the season as Lance's backup, is at split end this season.

"He was a split end before he was a quarterback," Fought pointed out. "We put him out

there because he can put pressure on the defense quickly."

Juniors Marcus Holbert and Alec Shawl are in the running for the fullback slot along with David Lopez and Cory Sewell.

Hector Rodriguez is at tailback. Rodriguez, a senior, did not play football last season while living in Florida but did two years ago in Medina.

"He has picked up things well the last few days," Fought said. "Hector has breakaway speed."

Sewell and Shawl are the backups at tailback.

"We have three good tailbacks and the public's view of young kids coming up, they do have some talent," Fought pointed out.

Chad Brown, a senior, returns at tight end. Stan Root and Ryan Zimmerman will also see action

Ross defense strives to 'control the game'

Joe Siesel admits their are times when he doesn't mind watching the offensive phase of football.

"Yes," the defensive coordinator for the Ross Little Giants said, "I like to watch defense unless the offensive sticks someone — I like that."

Siesel has made a habit of turning out good defensive units for better than a decade and he knows how a good defense should work.

"It is one where everyone on the team plays as a unit and everyone does their job and reacts to the football," Siesel explained. "It has to get a lot of people to the ball and they have to like to hit people."

Siesel added, "You try to go out there and create turnovers and we always want to control the tempo of the game."

Five starters return for Siesel, leaving him with a substantial task of finding players for six positions.

Jeff Green, Chad Green and Brian Moreno are the returnees on the front four with Paul Rostetter the lone returning linebacker. Free safety Chris Benson is the fifth returning starter.

"The three big kids up front should be the strength," Siesel said, "if they turn it loose."

Jeff Green, 6-7, 260 pounds, has been moved from tackle to defensive end.

"He has to learn the position," Siesel said. "He will have pass rush and at the same time, still must shut off the off-tackle hole."

Chad Green, 6-2, 285, will be at one tackle slot with the other being filled by Joe Frederick or Dan Frederick. Other tackles include Cory Gammertsfelder and Lamar Jones.

Moreno is at the end opposite Jeff Green. The other ends are Crispin Cook, Damon Walker, Ryan Zimmerman, Brian Darr, Neil Boskovich and Jason Schenk.


with a playing cast. Chad Brown, Dave Collins, Doug Siesel, Marcus Holbert, Doug Fitzgerald and Todd Desbin are other inside linebackers getting a look.

Jason Wilhelm, Stan Root, Dave Lopez and Mike Villarreal are in the outside linebacker picture.

With Benson leading the secondary, the other starters will come from Hector Rodriguez, Kenny Winters, Alec Shawl, Cory Sewell, Bill Barbarree or Chad Bruns.

Siesel, late last week, said "I am not super-satisfied with anything yet. We look great, look great, look great and then we have a big screw-up."

"I'd be very happy to see the defense come together as a unit and if it started the season with a bunch of three downs and out."

"It's hard," he said about recovery. "The first couple of semesters, it really tore me up thinking about the guys traveling and playing away games. Just standing on the sidelines with them, going to team meetings and practices and not being a real part of it, it bothers you."

Now two long scars on his left knee and long, hard hours of rehabilitation are vivid memories of his fight to get back into the BGSU defensive picture.

The technology major has passed physical tests during rehabilitation but flunked one keeping him out of last spring's practice.

Standing in the lounge, Laird was fresh from the first day's workout of summer practice and passing its first test. He had faltered briefly.

"We ran 110-yard sprints," he described, "and I caught myself limping on it; I was afraid of putting full pressure on it. I had to keep thinking: keep going 100 percent; put weight on the left foot."

"It turned out pretty good," Laird said, breathing a small sigh.

The next big test — taking the first hit in practice — is downplayed by the former high school All-Ohio offensive lineman.

"Sure, I worry about low blows," Laird said, "but the main thing I am worried about right now is working up the depth chart."

"I have to start from the bottom and work my way up. I am number three tackle but that is because I am just coming back."

Laird feels the hardest part of his recovery is behind him, calling the rehabilitation sessions of one to two hours a day brutal.

"I still have memories of what happened that day (when he was injured)," he said, "but then I remember what I have to do."

"I guess a lot of coming back has to come from the heart — a lot, definitely a lot," Laird said quietly.

Are there self-doubts?

"Once or twice I have had them" he admitted, "but I forget about 'em and keep going. It may be hard sometimes, but I'll keep going."

Of that, there is little doubt.

"I can't remember the years he (Starr) was there," Radeloff said, "but I think his record was 53-37 — so he was successful but I know very little of what he will be doing."

Lancaster probably will not be radically revamped.

"I look for very little change," Radeloff explained, "because the defensive coordinator, Tom McCurdy, has taken over. I think they will pretty much be the same offensively and defensively."

Jim Caserta is Findlay's third coach in as many years, moving over from Paulding.

"From what I know," the Ross coach said, "he is going to be an 'I' man and I think '50' defense. That will be somewhat similar to what they have done in the past — not so much as last year when they ran the run and shoot, a really a wide-open offense."

Lakewood has Kevin Fells at the helm. He moved up from Sidney after guiding the Yellow Jackets into the second round of the state playoffs last season.

"That will be a wide-open offense," Radeloff said.

Glancing at the other Ross opponents, Radeloff capsulized his expectations:

□ Columbian.

"I look for them to come out emotionally high for the game. We have struggled the last few years (losing three of four) against them. We are certainly going to come out and try to be in mid-season form because — the way I look at it — they come out that first game, execute very well ... it is like they are in mid-season form."

"They point to us as being one of the big games of the year," Radeloff said, "not to say that I don't point to them. I do, too, but I think overall, the way our schedule goes, every game is a big game."

□ Macomber.

"They always have one, two, or three outstanding players who can go on to Division I college football and it will be the same way this year," the Ross coach said. "They have a great tight end and their quarterback is back. They can run and defend, they are strong and quick."

□ Sandusky.

"You know they are looking and pointing at us and Elyria — those were their two losses last year. I am sure they are looking at us as a must game. They have to come over here and perform," Radeloff said. "They were dis-

pointed in their loss to us but that was one of the keys to our season."

□ Whitmer.

"We had a good game against them last year and beat 'em pretty good," Radeloff recalled, "but after that game, they changed some personnel and became a good football team, ending up 6-4."

"They ended up strong playing young kids. They had to bring them along slowly because they had a predominantly senior team the year before, but they finished on a strong note. I know they are looking at us because that defeat

was probably one of their worst in a few years."

□ Madison.

"It was probably the most exciting game we played last year (Madison won 33-32)," Radeloff said. "Madison was 1-3 coming in here but I knew they were not a 1-3 team; they should have beaten Fostoria; had an overtime win against Galion and lost to Mt. Vernon.

"Those 3 losses, when I looked at them on film, I knew they were going to be a tough team.

"They have two of their running backs back and some other skilled people back," Radeloff

said, adding, "and they are well-coached. Dana Woodring does an excellent job."

Summing up, Radeloff said, "We have a solid schedule of ten good football teams and to pinpoint one and say it is a definite win, you cannot do that."


"I am optimistic and the kids are optimistic," the Ross coach said, "but we know every game is going to be a football game, a close battle. I think we have the nucleus from last year's group — we lost a lot of seniors and they played a lot of time — but I still think we have a nucleus there to be an excellent football team."



Other tackles in the Ross picture are Jeremy Yarborough, Joe Frederick and Doug Whipple. Scott Aldrich, Dan Frederick and Damon Walker could be in the guard rotation.

Chad Green is backing up Hahn.

"The pass protection could be a little bit better," Fought admitted, "but that is always the last thing on the offense that develops."

"We are hoping the defense does a good enough job the first couple of weeks to give us some experience," Fought said. "We want the ball in our hands quite a bit and hopefully our defense is 'three and out' giving us a lot of opportunities to get some experience."

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Little Giants want to avoid turnovers

As in most football games, turnovers are expected to play a big part in the outcome of tonight's season opener between Fremont Ross and Tiffin Columbian at Harmon Stadium.

"It's going to boil down to execution and turnovers," Columbian coach John Tomaszewski said. "And I would like to think the kicking game would figure into the outcome."

A year ago, Ross committed seven turnovers — three fumbles and four interceptions — and Columbian took advantage for a 26-20 victory.

"We've talked about last year ... understanding why we lost," Ross coach Rex Radeloff said. "The upperclassmen know what that first loss felt like, but you

don't dwell on the past."

Both the Little Giants (8-2) and Tornadoes (7-3) went on to qualify for the Ohio High School Athletic Association playoffs last season, but each team will be without two of the players who were a big part of that success

when tonight's game begins at 8 p.m.

Ross, which leads the series 22-9 with one tie, lost quarterback Cory Lance and tailback Terry Carter to graduation. Columbian graduated quarterback Jim Newland and running back

Bryan Miller.

"(The Tornadoes) are very sound at what they do," Radeloff said. "We told the kids, 'do your assignment, be aggressive and get to the football.'

Columbian operates out of an offense designed to spread the defense.

"Both their quarterbacks can throw the football consistently as far as being on target, and they will throw the football," Radeloff said. "Whenever you spread the defense, it creates a lot of man-to-man coverage."

Tomaszewski expressed an approach that could possibly be more conservative.

"We don't have time to be real sophisticated," he said. "We're going to have to be fairly simple and do the best we can."

"Our offense by very nature is

deceptive, and we hope that we'll be a factor. We're going to have to try and vary things up."

Ross, meanwhile, must contend with a blitzing Tornado defense.

"They like to stunt with their outside linebackers and their inside linebackers, and they will do a number of things in the secondary," Radeloff said. "We've worked hard on picking up when they are stunting."

"We want to attack the different type stunt with particular plays. Read the defense, pick up the stunt and make the correct call."

"We've worked with the quarterbacks (Nick Wolf and Justin Perry) and they understand what they need to do although it will be difficult under fire in their first varsity game."

Little Giants run past Tornadoes

Rodriguez gains 220

Good things come to those who wait.

Fremont Ross coach Rex Radeloff apparently was in that frame of mind Friday night during the Little Giants' 14-7 victory over Tiffin Columbian at Harmon Stadium.

"We were going to do what we had to do to get a drive going and get the ball in the end zone," Radeloff said.

The Little Giants did just that.

Trailing 7-6, Ross drove 83 yards in 12 plays and Hector Rodriguez plunged over from the 1 with 7:35 remaining.

Rodriguez, who rushed 32 times for 220 yards, scored Ross's first touchdown from 48 yards out with 3:31 left before halftime. Rodriguez carried the ball on every play of the five-play, 80-yard drive.

"It's hard to control a kid like that for the whole game," Columbian coach John Tomaszewski said. "You always know Fremont is going to have a speedy tailback."

"Their size were on us in the third quarter when they were moving the football."

The winning touchdown capped a 12-play, 83-yard drive which began after Kenny Winters intercepted a Jeff Bright pass at the Ross 10 and returned it to the 17.

"We knew (the Tornadoes) were going to complete some passes," Radeloff said. "Any team that works on their passing game as much as they do will."

"But we came up with some big defensive plays. That's going to happen. That has to happen."

Columbian drove from its 16 to

the Ross 27 after Todd Drake recovered a Rodriguez fumble, but Winters stopped the threat.

"We need to score more points for the way we moved the football," Tomaszewski said.

Bright, who was spelled at

times by Vince Perrine, threw for 147 of the 179 yards Columbian gained passing. He was 6-of-8 for 95 yards in the first half and 4-of-15 for 52 yards in the second.

"I think our secondary got a

victory over the Tornadoes at Harmon Stadium Friday night. Rodriguez gained 220 yards on 32 carries.

little bit of confidence after halftime," Radeloff said. "They were so worried that they would get beat deep that they gave the receivers too big of a cushion in the first half."

Columbian drove 84 yards in 15

plays for its only score midway through the second quarter. Bright scored from the 1 after completing five straight passes for first downs in the drive.

Rodriguez then gained 10, 16, 14 and 2 yards before sweeping right and cutting back against the defensive flow on his 48-yard touchdown.

Cory Sewell's interception gave Ross a chance to take the lead at halftime but Justin Perry's first-and-10 pass for Winters from the Columbian 31 was intercepted by Chad Ward at the 4.

Perry and Nick Wolf split time at quarterback and combined to complete just 3-of-15 passes for 55 yards.

Rodriguez, though, made up for the lack of a passing attack. Of Rodriguez's 32 rushes, he was tackled for a loss only once and was stopped for no gain twice.

"There was a block every time," he said.

Marcus Holbert added 73 yards on 11 carries for Ross, including 59 in the second half and 32 on the winning touchdown drive.

The Tornadoes failed to capitalize after Ross took a 23-yard loss in punt formation on the fourth play of the game. Little Giant punter Allen Dorsey was tackled on the Ross 26, but Curt Mellott missed a 22-yard field goal six plays later.



Line of scrimmage key to victory

The team that controls the line of scrimmage will likely emerge victorious when Fremont Ross hosts Toledo Macomber Friday night at Harmon Stadium.

"I think (the Little Giants) might be able to outmuscle us," Macomber coach Brad Hathaway said. "We've got big kids, but we're not very physical."

Ross, which defeated Tiffin Columbian 14-7 last week, will try to duplicate last year's 34-16 victory over the Macmen.

Little Giants coach Rex Radeloff likes to talk of "controlling defensive down people."

He likes his own down people to avoid being controlled.

"Our down people played well last week, especially (defensive tackles) Chad Green and Joe Frederick," Radeloff said. "Joe really had an outstanding game."

After Tiffin Columbian gained 76 yards on 32 carries (just over two yards per rush), Tornado coach John Tomaszewski said "it's hard to control them."

That's where it starts against Macomber's explosive offense led by quarterback Mike Moore, a returning starter, and tailback James White.

"They do have speed ... in the backfield and the two wideouts, and they can power you," Radeloff said. "They're going to test the defense."

"They like to trap inside with the fullback (Rennel Madden) then turn and pitch. Somehow get the ball to White on the out-

side and go."

White scored all Macomber's points in a 15-14 loss to Anthony Wayne last week. The Macmen scored on their first possession of that game and had a touchdown called back because of a penalty the second time they had the ball.

"After that, we were a different team," Hathaway said.

Moore will throw to wide receivers Brian Kemp and Fred Smith as well as tight end Monte Monifeatchurs.

Tackles Vincent Tisdale (5-11, 275) and Charlie Blair (5-9, 245) anchor the offensive line.

Macomber lost five fumbles against the Generals.

"We have to hold onto the ball," Hathaway said, "and we can't make mistakes on defense and give up the big plays like in past years against Ross."

Two of Ross's touchdowns last year against Macomber came on a 33-yard Cory Lance to Darnell McDonald pass and a 41-yard run by Terry Carter.

Macomber's base defense features a five-man front, but the Macmen will use a four-man front in passing situations.

"Their tackles like to penetrate hard, and the secondary will dare us; they line up anywhere from 5 to 7 yards off the ball," said Radeloff, who added that the Little Giants spent more time on their passing game this week in practice.

Quarterbacks Nick Wolf and Justin Perry, who both played against Columbian, shared practice time this week as well.

Rodriguez and Co. continue Ross running back tradition

Hector Rodriguez's performance last Friday made him another drop in the bucket in Fremont Ross High School football lore.

The senior tailback got a toe-hold on taking his place in the long line of Ross running back greats.

The transplanted Medina player via Florida, Rodriguez is the gleam that tops a shining list of current Ross running backs waiting in the wings.

Running back, a.k.a. tailback/fullback in Coach Rex Radeloff's I-formation, is one position the Little Giants are deep in this season.

The nice thing about Rodriguez's supporting cast is that they are all underclassmen.

The players seeing the most action are interchangeable. Junior's Alec Shawl and Cory Sewell can step in at either fullback or tailback. Both are strong runners who do not have the quick-

ness of Rodriguez but may be a bit more physical.

Junior Marcus Holbert is the starting fullback who helped clear the holes for Rodriguez last week. After seeing Holbert grind out 73 yards up the middle, I feel he could also play tailback.

That cast has relegated a pair of standout sophomores to junior varsity status: Adam Knipp and Tyrone "Toddy" Williams. Knipp is strictly a tailback and Williams could play at either backfield spot.

Add another pair of sophomores, fullbacks David Heidelberg and Juan Gonzalez, and the running back future at Ross is very rosy.

The group may not be cast from the molds of a Big Thunder (Lewis) or a Little Thunder (Surratt); a Level, Lytle or Liggins; the Bates and the Browns; Smith or Tiller; Demmel, Franks, Miller or Shaw, or for that matter, a Carter.

But one thing is clear: before their Ross careers end, they may join that cast of stars from the past.

The only problem is, because of the positions they play, there may not be room for all of them.

Ross fans take note: In the home football programs, there are nomination forms for the Ross Athletic Hall of Fame. Should you need more than one nomination form, they are also available at the Ross High

School athletic department office.

Please nominate the athletes, coaches or people you feel have been instrumental in athletics at Ross and are deserving of Hall of Fame induction. The qualifications and requirements for inductees are on the form.

True, the form does ask you to do a little work, but please fill it out as completely as you can. The research group of the committee can delve further into the nominations but it must have a base from which to begin.

Remember, the Hall of Fame selection committee relies on nominations from the public and for a person to be elected to the Hall of Fame, he, naturally, has to be nominated. It is up to you.

Currently, there are 26 persons or teams left from last year's nomination list. Surely, with your help, that list should double this year.

Please note ... if you nomi-

nated someone last year and that person did not get elected, his nomination will remain on file. You do not have to renominate that particular person.

The next class of inductees will be selected in November.

Ross will nip Macomber but the passing game will have to work, 20-18; Eastwood will top Clyde 22-14; Oak Harbor will drain Lake 24-12; Bellevue over Port Clinton 21-20; Gibsonsburg will nip St. Wendelin 14-13; Margaretta over Keystone 31-12; Seneca East over Woodmore 22-8; and Maumee over Findlay 18-14.

That's the attitude the Fremont Ross and Sandusky football teams are taking as they prepare for Friday night's game at Harmon Stadium.

"Our kids know what the game is all about, and I'm sure Fremont's kids know that to," Sandusky coach Larry Cook said.

The Fremont rivalry with Sandusky dates back to 1895. Sandusky leads the all-time series 45-30 with eight ties.

last year.

"I certainly think it's one of the top rivalries in the state of Ohio," Cook said. "At least it is to the people in Fremont and the people in Sandusky."

Motivation is unnecessary.

"The kids are excited about playing, but

they were in these kind of games last year," Ross coach Rex Radeloff said. "Going into a game like this, you concentrate on what your opponent is going to do."

"The intensity of preparation is the key, and we've had good intensity at practice."

Both teams are 2-0 entering Friday's game. Ross defeated Tiffin Columbian 14-7 and shut out Toledo Maconber 25-0, while Sandusky topped Cleveland Benedictine 21-7 and routed Cleveland West Tech 51-0.

Ross has been most effective running the ball, and Sandusky's potent rushing attack is led by fullback Shon Grant.

While Ross will try to stop Grant and Matthews, Sandusky is concerned with Little Giant tailback Hector Rodriguez.


"We hope to contain him and keep him from breaking the long gainer," Cook said, "and I don't think you can look past the young man at fullback (Marcus Holbert)."

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Sandusky powers way past Ross

The fallout from Sandusky's 31-0 victory over Fremont Ross Friday night at Harmon Stadium isn't known yet.

How Ross bounces back, spirals or stumbles from here will mark the end result of its 84th meeting with Sandusky.

"One game does not make a season," Ross coach Rex Radloff said. "I knew (the Blue Streaks) were a good football team, but I don't think they are 31 points better than us.

"They played as well as they can play,

and I don't think we played as well as we are capable of playing."

Sandusky, 3-0, dominated from the first drive — an 11-play, 76-yard display of power football.

After tailback Joe Matthews and fullback Shon Grant battered the Ross defense, quarterback Mike Franklin sneaked over from the 1.

Franklin, who completed 8-of-12 passes for 158 yards, also ran in from 26 yards out midway through the second quarter and completed touchdown passes of 65 yards to Andrew Johnson and 12 yards to Bill

Knupke.

"We felt if we were going to play with them, we had to go after them," Sandusky coach Larry Cook said. "We challenged our offensive line to see if it could do a job, and it did a job."

The Streaks rushed for 264 yards, including 113 on 20 carries by Matthews.

"They took control," Radloff said. "I thought we could shut their trapping game down, but they overpowered us."

Franklin's second score came one play after Ross defensive end Brian Moreno left the game with a leg injury. Franklin kept

the ball on an option left and ran through a hole that Moreno might have filled.

"We wanted to use the option to stretch the defense from sideline to sideline," Cook said. "We like to play sideline to sideline so we can utilize our speed."

Ross was limited to 133 yards, with 36 of those coming in the first half.

"We got behind 19-0, and we were forced to put the ball in the air," Radloff said.

"We have to be more consistent throwing the ball, but you can't do it without the

running game."

Whitmer posts 27-7 victory

TOLEDO — The Fremont Ross offense continues to sputter.

Ross amassed 119 yards Friday night and mustered six first downs in Toledo Whitmer's 27-7 victory at Memorial Stadium.

Whitmer, 3-1, got 147 yards rushing and two touchdowns from tailback Eric Willis. Quarterback Aaron Bunker and wingback Eric Fritz added short scoring runs for the Panthers.

"We were concerned with (Ross's) size up front ... we didn't know if we could block them," Whitmer coach Pat Gucardi said after the Panthers rushed for 249 yards. "We tried to find a crack for our running backs, and they only had cracks; they didn't have holes."

Ross, 2-2, has been outscored 58-7 in its past two games.

"Third-and-long situations killed us," Ross coach Rex Radeloff said. "We couldn't make the big play."

The Little Giants converted just one of 11 third-down plays and were one of three on fourth down. Both conversions came on their final possession.

"We've got to be able to sustain drives to keep the defense off the field," Radeloff said. "We knocked (the Panthers) off the ball on one play, and Hector (Rodriguez) went the distance."

Rodriguez, who rushed for 74 yards on 18 carries, dashed 53 yards after a pitch right with 2:54 left in the first half.

If the Little Giants needed a jump start, Rodriguez tried to give it to them. His touchdown cut Whitmer's lead to 20-7.

Justin Perry completed 2-of-20 passes with three interceptions. To Perry's credit, though, eight passes were dropped.

Another pass was stolen away from Kenny Winters in the first quarter by Brian Miscikowski, who had all three interceptions.

The lack of a passing game and an inconsistent running game was most evident on the Little Giants' second possession of the second half.

From the Ross 19, Rodriguez rushed for two first downs and fullback Marcus Holbert ripped off a 12-yard gain. Perry followed with an incompletion on first down.

The pass appeared to be an ill-timed one.

New coach Paul Starr has changed Newark's defensive philosophy from a 6-2 look that featured blitzing linebackers to an angle defense with a five-man front.


"We've got to be able to control the angle, and take care of the nose," Radeloff said. "Any time you play against a 50 defense, you have to control the nose guard."

Little Giants open BCC play with 42-21 win

The backfield depth of the Fremont Ross football team showed at the forefront of a 42-21 victory over Newark Friday night at Harmon Stadium.

Sophomore Tyrone Williams, filling in for regular starting tailback Hector Rodriguez, rushed for 215 yards on 29 carries as Ross amassed 376 yards in the Buckeye Central Conference opener for both teams.

"It felt great to win a game coming off three losses," said Williams, who is known as Toddy around the football field. "We

had a good week of practice, and I was confident we could win."

Rodriguez was out with a slightly separated shoulder.

"The doctor gave Hector the OK, but he didn't have any contact all week," Ross coach Rex Radeloff said. "We wanted to start Toddy and see how he did.

"If we didn't need Hector, and Hector understood that, he wasn't going to play."

He wasn't needed.

Williams rushed for 56 yards on Ross's first drive, which Alec Shawl capped off with a 3-yard run, and ran 61 yards for a touchdown the next time he

touched the ball.

"The line blocked really well," Williams said. "They had holes the whole game, and I was hitting them great."

Newark, 3-3, made things interesting late in the first half, driving 70 yards before Brian Jeffries threw a 13-yard touchdown pass to Paul Chapman.

"They were gaining confidence," Radeloff said. "We had to generate something and get the ball in the end zone."

Williams ran nine times for 52 yards on a 68-yard drive, including a 9-yard touchdown run.

"That was an important touch-

down," Radeloff said.

Justin Perry's 14-yard touchdown run capped a 60-yard Ross drive at the outset of the second half. The Little Giants then drove 85 yards in 10 plays before Perry eluded Newark's pass rush and hit Allen Dorsey for a 29-yard touchdown.

Ross, 3-3, made it 42-7 on Marcus Holbert's 1-yard run midway through the fourth quarter.

"We wanted to get possession and score in the first, second, third and fourth quarters — especially the first and third,"

Radeloff said.

The Wildcats had not allowed any points in the first and third quarters of any of its game so far this season.

"I was hoping no one would be able to run the ball that way on us," Newark coach Paul Starr said. "They just blew us off the line of scrimmage.

"Give credit where credit is due; their backs ran real well... that's all there is to it."

Alec Shawl rushed for 30 yards, all on the opening drive, Holbert gained 56 on 10 carries and Adam Knipp added 40 on nine carries for the Little Giants.

"We knew we had to block the angle one-on-one," Radeloff said. "Against a 50 angle defense, you have to block the nose guard and the tackles. That's the way we feel because we knew we could (block) the linebackers.


"By far, this was the best game by the offensive line."

The Ross defense, meanwhile, limited the Wildcats to 143 yards until the fourth quarter.

"We knew (Newark quarterback Brian Jeffries) would throw the ball, but our primary (goal) is to shut down the run," Radeloff said.

Jeffries completed 7-of-14 passes for 73 yards with two interceptions.

Aaron Fink, who finished with 112 yards, scored on runs of 6 and 66 yards in the final period.

"We took advantage early in the week," Ross coach Rex Radeloff said. "We used the extra time to prepare ourselves.

"Technique-wise, there were things we weren't doing as well as we were early in the season. A lot of things you overlook during the season because normally you're preparing for the opponent.

"I think it will pay off in the end product ... the game."

Zanesville, under first-year coach Clarence Pery, defeated Findlay 21-14 a week ago. Ross whipped Newark 42-21.

"We want to build on what we did last week," Radeloff said. "That was our best performance so far offensively and defensively ... on both sides of the ball."

Radeloff said Zanesville, which shelved the single wing offense in favor of I-formation and switched its defense from a six-man front to a five-man, is similar to Newark.

Hector Rodriguez, who sat out last week with a partially separated shoulder, returns for the Little Giants.

Williams rushed for 215 yards and two touchdowns against Newark. Rodriguez has rushed for 584 yards and five touchdowns.

Ross must control Zanesville's defensive tackles, Steve Steffey and Trent Reid, who also anchor the offensive line.

The Blue Devils run a simple offense, according to Radeloff.

"(Perry) is going with a few things, and they're building on that," Radeloff said. "They trap with the fullback (Pete Matthews), run the sprint draw and the sweep and use the sprint-out pass and the play-action pass."

"They don't run the option, but we're preparing for it because the quarterback (Chris Curtis) can run."

ing on me," Green said last Friday after Ross beat Newark 42-21 at Harmon Stadium. "I was getting frustrated on an individual level.

"The coaches told me 'you have to get in gear because there are a lot of people (colleges) looking at you.'"

Green, a 6-foot-7, 270-pound senior, realized part of his problem during the second half of Ross's 27-7 loss to Toledo Whitmer Sept. 14 — he was not an effective football player while playing both offense and defense.

"I had to make up my mind," Green said. "I came in Saturday morning after the Whitmer game and told coach (Ross offensive coordinator Dan) Fought I wanted to go one way."

One way — offensive tackle — as opposed to playing both tackle and defensive end.

Green played perhaps his best half of football during the first half Sept. 21 during a 30-14 loss to Mansfield Madison.

"(Playing only offense) helped because I was getting tired (going both ways)," he said. "I think it helped the offensive line because they knew there wasn't that many people going both ways."

The line played its best game last Friday, controlling the line of scrimmage as Ross amassed 376 yards rushing.

"Brian Moreno (Ross co-captain who shares time with Paul Rostetter at right guard) and I sat down as captains with the rest of the seniors and we asked ourselves 'what can we do to help motivate the team?'

"We decided it was our job to help get everybody ready to play."

They did it last week in preparation for the Wildcats.

Ross, which travels to Zanesville Saturday night, has four games left this season. Green, though, most likely has a college career in front of him.

"At the beginning of the year, I was thinking about my future," The Ross co-captain said. "I put pressure on myself, but it was nothing I couldn't handle. I knew I had to perform being a three-year starter."

Green said he has been approached by the University of Toledo, which would like to make him "a pulling guard" as well as several other colleges.

"I could fit into the (Mid-American Conference)," he said. "If I work hard, I could fit into the Big Ten."

"It depends on preparation and attitude."

Right now, Green's attitude is pretty good.

Little Giants' defense, offense, rips Zanesville

ZANESVILLE — A third column on the scoreboard would have been appropriate.

"Hey, we got 12 of those points," a jubilant Joe Siesel exclaimed after Fremont Ross dealt Zanesville a 39-0 setback Saturday night at the Blue Devils' home.

In Siesel's eyes, the scoreboard should have read: Ross offense 27, Ross defense 12, and in both cases, Zanesville a fat zero.

"It's a shutout — that's something to talk about," Siesel, the Ross defensive coordinator, said after his team's second shutout of the season. "The defense got six points and the punt team got six."

Ross, 4-3 after its second straight win, took over first place in the Buckeye Central Conference race at 2-0. Zanesville slipped to 3-4 and 1-1.

Defensive end Brian Moreno delivered the straw that broke Zanesville's back, plucking a fumble out of the air and running 74 yards for the touchdown, putting the Little Giants up 20-0 with 3½ minutes remaining in the third quarter.

"That ball looked huge," Moreno said as he relived the play. "I saw it up in the air — that's mine ... I'm going.

"I pictured this in my sophomore, junior years — the whole time. It was a dream come true," Moreno said.

Moreno added to his dream game with two sacks, a tackle

for a loss and a knocked down pass.

"That's what you hope for," Ross head coach Rex Radloff said about Moreno's TD run. "That doesn't happen too often in a career to anyone in high school, college or pro; he happened to be in the right spot at the right time."

The defensive end was a standout among many for the Little Giants.

Chris Benson picked off four Zanesville passes to run his season interception tally to nine. His first theft was in the end zone and another killed a Blue Devil drive at the Ross 1.

Joe Frederick had two quarterback sacks and another tackle for a loss while Ryan Zimmerman had two late QB sacks and

Paul Rostetter had a seventh sack for the Little Giants.

Spicing up the defensive effort was Dave Lopez's blocked punt that set up another Ross TD.

Kenny Winters gave Siesel's special team its six-pointer, returning a fourth-quarter punt 36 yards, putting Ross ahead 32-0.

The Ross offense, which put 42 points on the board a week earlier against Newark, took cues from the defense.

After a sluggish first quarter, Benson's end zone interception set up an eight-play, 80-yard drive. Alec Shawl capped the drive, cutting up the middle off center Brian Hahn's block for 7-0 lead four minutes into the second quarter. Tailback Hector Rodriguez, back in the lineup after sitting out a game with a shoulder

injury, started the drive with a 28-yard sprint up the middle. Rodriguez finished with 164 yards on 19 carries.

Jason Wilhelm caught his third touchdown pass of the season, a 4-yard snag off his shoetops, from Justin Perry, with nine seconds left in the half, putting Ross up 14-0 at the half. Perry completed 5-of-8 passes for 34 yards in the game.

After Moreno's gallop, Lopez blocked Brian Blanton's punt and Crispin Cook returned it three yards to the Zanesville 17. Two plays later, Perry rolled around left end from 12 yards out for a 26-0 lead late in the third quarter.

Winters tacked on his punt re-

Little Giant victories over the Gales and Findlay next week, however, will bring the BCC crown back to Fremont.

"The kids know the meaning of the game," Radeloff said. "This is the position we wanted to be in after our losing streak."

Ross has developed a rivalry with Lancaster in the four years it has belonged to the BCC. To some, the rivalry is intense.

"I think it's become an excellent rivalry," Radeloff said. "I don't know if you want to call it

bad blood, but the games have been good ones with the exception of the last one."

The Gales routed Ross 42-7 in the playoffs last year.

Lancaster, 6-2 and 2-1 in the BCC, bounced back from its loss to Newark with a 47-0 thumping of Zanesville a week ago.

The Gales have scored 213 points and yielded a BCC-low 68.

"They're a good, solid defensive club," Radeloff said. "They might not be as quick overall (as last season) but fundamentally, they're sound."

Defensive tackle Mike O'Rourke leads the Gales' defense, which was formulated under Lancaster head coach

Tom McCurdy while McCurdy served as defensive coordinator under Phil Mauro.

"We're going to stay with what we've been doing," Radeloff said, "but we want to get outside more than we have been."

"If we want to get anything accomplished, we have to do a good job (blocking) on the defensive ends (Todd Plantz and Bill Westcamp)."

The Gales' offense is led by all-purpose player Colin Foote, who lines up in the backfield, at tight end and at a wideout.

"Their offense hasn't changed much," Radeloff said. "They're going to run the short and intermediate routes and when you

least expect it, they're going to go for the big (play).

"They do a nice job mixing up the plays."

Lancaster has tried to increase the impact of its running game.

"They've got a pretty good size offensive line and feel they can power people a little more this year," Radeloff said. "They rarely run outside."

Ross would like to duplicate last week's defensive effort in a 27-21 victory over Lakewood.

"We generated five turnovers last week," Radeloff said. "That's what we're hoping to do this week."

"We've got to intercept passes and cause fumbles."

Gales clinch BCC title tie

Football may be spelled a little differently in Lancaster after the Golden Gales did everything but lose to Fremont Ross Friday night at Harmon Stadium.

Spell it "Foote-ball." Punctuate it with defense and you would get no objection from coach Tom McCurdy after Lancaster defeated the Little Giants 14-9, assuring themselves of a share of the Buckeye Central Conference crown and depriving Ross of an outright title.

Colin Foote scored both Lancaster touchdowns — one on a 47-yard run and the other on a 14-yard run a few seconds after McCurdy had his Golden Gales make an early third-quarter statement.

"One of the key plays was when Colin broke the 40-yarder, or whatever it was," McCurdy, in his first year as the Lancaster boss said. "That got us back in the ball game and got our confidence back. At that point in time, Fremont was moving the ball."

He could have said Ross was moving the ball at will.

"Seventy-six plays," Ross coach Rex Radeloff said, his eyes riveted to a chart after the game. "You should win a game with that many plays."

Ross, with Hector Rodriguez running for 151 yards on 38 carries, rolled up 307 total yards while Lancaster had 172 on 37 plays.

Still, McCurdy felt his defense played a "helluva game."

"It bent a little bit, but we made the stops when we had to," he said.

The last "had to" stop erased the Little Giants' chances of clinching their second consecutive BCC title.

On the 14th play of a drive that started at the Ross 15 with eight minutes remaining, the Little Giants faced a fourth-and-inches at the Lancaster 20. Earlier in the drive, Rodriguez and bulled his way four yards on a fourth-and-three to keep the drive alive.

A few inches seemed a sure

thing. McCurdy's Gales didn't get that message as the left side of the defensive line stopped Rodriguez in his tracks, killing the Little Giants' hopes with 1:45 remaining in the game.

It was the second time the Golden Gales dashed out a potential Ross scoring drive. The Little Giants drove to the Lancaster 18 late in the first half before the Golden Gale defense refused to bend further. A bad pitch that was recovered by Rodriguez moved Ross back to the 21, facing a third-and-13.

"We felt that if we were going to get beat, we were going to make them throw the ball to beat us," McCurdy said. "We were going to try to take the running game away — I don't know how many yards they ended up with — but we forced them to throw in throwing situations and I don't think they felt comfortable with it."

McCurdy's plan worked. Lancaster defensive back Steve Poston stepped in from of Justin Perry's pass at the Golden Gales 6 and returned it to the 38, preserving Lancaster's 7-3 lead.

Ross struck first, taking a 3-0 lead on Chris Benson's 27-yard field goal three minutes into the second quarter.

Lancaster retaliated, pinning Ross deep in its own territory before Steve Harris' 10-yard return on Nick Wolf's 41-yard punt put the Golden Gales at the Ross 49. Foote carried for two yards and then broke a counter play over the middle, broke to the sideline, avoiding Benson at the 15 and pranced into the end zone with 4:20 remaining in the half.

Lancaster took the second half kickoff and drove 80 yards in seven plays. Quarterback Nick McCoy hooked up with Chris Fauth on a hitch-and-go for 47 yards to the Ross 14 to set up Foote's second TD.

"The opening drive of the third period, you have to make a statement," McCurdy said. "I felt we had to take it in for a score and make a statement that this was our ballgame and we did."

Ross came back, driving 64 yards in 11 plays with a 23-yard Perry pass to Wolf for the TD

with 5:13 left in the third quarter. Trying to cut the deficit to within a field goal, Radeloff had his team go for two points but Perry's pass was batted down by linebacker Kirk Smith.

"Long pass and a run — big plays," Radeloff said quietly. "Except for the big play, we shut down the running game; we played that real solid."

"When they came out (in the third quarter) just dinkin' and dinkin' it — you know, short, short, deep. That was inevitable. It was a great pass, a great catch."

"They didn't let us get outside; they kept funneling us back into their linebackers but we kept biting at it — were getting three to

four yards each time but they did a good job of keeping us inside."

Ross, 5-4, must defeat Findlay next week to tie Lancaster for the BCC crown. Lancaster is 3-1 in the BCC and Ross 2-1.

"We wanted to win both of them," Radeloff said, "but now we can come back next week and get a share of it at least."

Ross vs. Findlay still important

The complete unveiling of the Fremont Ross passing game might take place Friday night when the Little Giants travel to Findlay seeking a share of the Buckeye Central Conference championship.

At least, the improvement of the Ross pass attack mixed with a "suspect" Findlay defense against the pass warrants it.

"I think we're going to put it up," Ross coach Rex Radeloff said.

Radeloff's revelation came after a short

discussion of the pros and cons of the matchup between the Little Giants' offense and the Trojan defense.

"The (defensive) front five (of Findlay) is pretty good," Radeloff said. "They've been doing a good job against the run."

"If anything, they have been suspect against the pass."

Tackle George Williams, who was returned from an injury, anchors Findlay's defense, which has allowed 173 points.

Meanwhile, Ross quarterback Justin Perry is coming of his finest passing per-

formance of the season. Perry completed 11-of-16 passes for 116 yards and one touchdown with one interception in a 14-9 loss to Lancaster last Friday.

"The passing game is starting to come around," Radeloff said. "They (Perry and his receivers) recognize the coverage real well right now."

Hector Rodriguez, who went over the 1,000-yard mark in rushing last week with 1,008, might be a popular target for Perry.

"(Toledo) Bowsher was able to get the ball to their backs," Radeloff said. "It's a

lot of man coverage, one-on-one, and that's good. You have to like that."

Bowsher defeated Findlay 9-7 three weeks ago.

Findlay, 3-6 and 1-2 in the BCC, features an offense with an interchangeable tailback and quarterback.

Chris Ireland is a running threat and potential passer from the tailback spot and also has switched positions at times with starting quarterback Glen Bair.

"We're preparing for almost anything," Radeloff said. "They're trying to knock us off and end the season on a positive note."

"We've got to recognize ... be able to see where certain people are at all times."

In addition to Ireland and Bair, wide receiver Aaron Gralak will be a focal point for the Ross defense, which includes free safety Chris Benson.

Benson has 11 interceptions this season — a Ross record which was previously held by Jim Hufford, who had eight interceptions in 1983.

The Little Giants, 5-4 and 2-1 in the BCC, played their best defensive game of the year against the Lancaster a week ago, according to Radeloff.

Of the Golden Gales' 172 yards

of total offense, 47 came on a touchdown run by Colin Foote and 47 came on a pass play which set up a 14-yard touchdown run by Foote.

"We stopped them all night long except for three plays," Radeloff said. "You look at the stats (Ross) amassed 307 total yards and say 'how could you lose a game like that.'

"It was frustrating, that's what it was ... for players, coaches and fans."

So, Ross must defeat Findlay to share its second straight BCC title with Lancaster.

"I'm still happy to be in that position," Radeloff said. "Someone said 'unfortunately we'll be playing for a co-championship.'

"I said, 'it's fortunate that

we're playing for a share of the championship.'"

Ross leads the all-time series with Findlay 42-19 with three ties. The Little Giants defeated the Trojans 27-20 at Harmon Stadium last year.

"(The players) are ready," Radeloff said. "Ever since I've been at Ross, it's always been a rivalry for the players."






