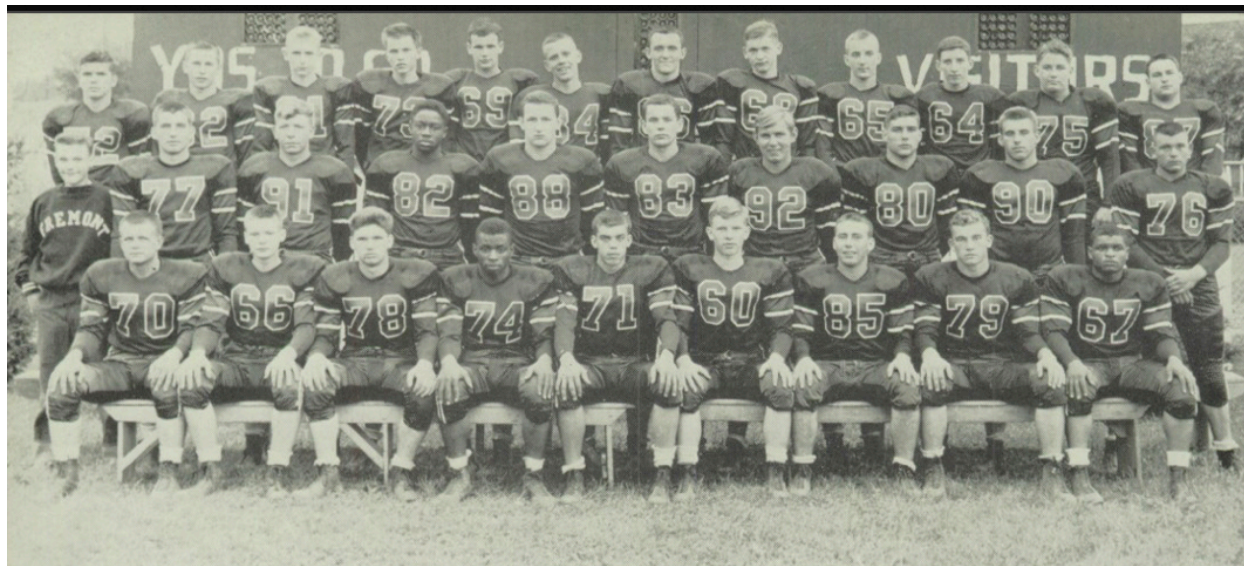


1949 Season review...

Varsity Football

Do you remember the 1949-1950 football season, when our Little Giants won nine, and lost only one?

Ross took an early lead and never lost it as they defeated the Norwalk squad, 32-13 in the initial game of the season.

Cleveland Brush was the second team to bow to the powerful Rossmen. They brought their squad here for the first time, and went home looking very sorry about the 65-0 score.

Next came Fostoria who wanted the win for the Buckeye League, and also to celebrate the dedication of their new stadium; but the Giants also wanted the game, and took it by a 28-7 margin.

The following week, hopes for a perfect season were shattered by the fleet-footed Findlay Trojans who never let Ross get ahead after Charlie Glover opened the game with a touchdown on the first scrimmage play. We lost 26-13.

Highly rated Sandusky received a shock a week later as the Giants ran over them 47-7 in a nevertheless hard fought contest.

Tiffin and Bowling Green were the next victims of the now un-stoppable Rossmen, and they bowed by scores of 78-0, and 46-0 respectively.

Ross overcame a three year jinx as they played powerful Elyria to a 7-0 loss on a wet, snowy field.

In closing the season, the Giants defeated Toledo Scott, 40-20, and won a co-championship with Findlay in the Buckeye League by downing Marion Harding, 28-0.

Giants Rack Up 26 Points In 1st Half; Glover Leads Attack

Ross high school, looking brilliant in some spots and ragged in others, defeated an undermanned but plucky Norwalk eleven 32-13 last night to inaugurate what is supposed to be the most glorious football season in the school's history.

The Giants of Coach Lester Binkley, before a capacity crowd, put over four quick touchdowns by halftime to delight even the most optimistic rooters and then let them down in the last half with some poor tackling and blocking.

Coach Grant Walls' Trainers, weak in the middle of the line presented two outstanding players in Quarterback Bill McKinley and Fullback Jack Coll. The latter was handicapped by a bad knee, hurt in a scrimmage with Lorain early in the week. McKinley filled the air with passes. Norwalk hurled 21, with eight of them hitting the mark. Inept receiving caused several to go incomplete.

Anspach Tossed Out

Ross performed without the services of Guard John Anspach after late in the second quarter. Anspach was ejected when an official alleged he was using a knee improperly. After the game the stellar Ross guard denied the infraction.

Fullback Bob Markley, boomed as another Bob Beck, went like a house afire until midway in the second quarter when he bogged down after an old hip injury was aggravated.

Charlie Glover, 170-pound junior, who was outstanding throughout, treated the audience to a dazzling display of broken-field running. He scored three touchdowns, one of them on a 55-yard dash after Norwalk scored its first touchdown in the third quarter.

Binkley's boys scored with 5 minutes and 40 seconds left in the opening period, with Glover going the last 15 yards. Markley bucked 10 for another t.d. with two minutes gone by in the second canto. Markley plunged over for the extra point after both six-pointers.

Sherman's Run Nullified

After Norwalk was set back deep in its own territory on a 15-yard penalty for unnecessary roughness, Dick Sherman intercepted a pass by McKinley and dashed 30 yards after some tricky maneuvering but the play was called back when Ross was detected holding on the four-yard line. The Giants put the ball in play on the 19, from where Glover scampered around end be-

hind excellent blocking to cross the final chalk mark.

Sherman, kicking with a special tee, missed the try for the extra point, the ball going to the left of the goal posts.

The Trainers, a bit demoralized by such rapid scoring gave Ross the ball on their 47-yard line when a fourth-down pass fell incomplete. A series of plays carried to the 20 and Glover went over untouched but another 15-yard penalty, this time for clipping set the Giants back to the 21. A line play picked up three yards to set the stage for the last score of the second quarter.

Batie Dashes 18 yards

George Batie, substituting for Sherman, accounted for the touchdown on an 18-yard dash on a reverse. Sherman's kick was again wide to the left.

The change for the worse in the Ross team was evident shortly after the second half was underway. A 32-yard kickoff return by Hester gave Norwalk the ball on the Ross 48. After advancing to the Ross 36, Coll took a pitchout from McKinley and eluded several so-called tacklers and went into the end zone.

Rich Meagrow's extra-point try went astray, and Ross still lead 26-6.

It was shortly after Meagrow's jaunt that Glover, who was a will-of-the-wisp runner last night, embarked on his long run.

With the Giants in possession on their own 47, Glover zoomed around right end, dodged the defensive left halfback by cutting to the east sideline and scooted past the safety man. Glover's speed was too much. This time Sherman, who slicked two extra-point tries to the left, changed direction and booted one to the right of the uprights.

Norwalk struck back and scored on a 19-yard aerial from McKinley to Dave Hester, who took the ball over his shoulder in the end zone. This time Meagrow's kick was through for the extra point.

Tonight's Foe At Harmon Won 8 Of 9 In '48; Kickoff At 8

Ross high school will be out to live up to its rating as the No. One football team in northwestern Ohio tonight when it plays Euclid Brush at Harmon Field. The kickoff is slated for 8 o'clock.

The Giants are expected to be below par for the invaders, who opened their season last Friday by losing to Willoughby 18-13. Ross thrashed Norwalk 32-13 in its inaugural. Charlie Glover sparked the Giants, scoring three touchdowns.

Brush operates from a single wing with a balanced line. Ross also runs from the single wing but generally deploys an unbalanced line.

Won Loop Title

Tonight's foe of the husky Ross-men had an impressive season in 1948, winning eight and losing one. The lone loss was to University

prep school of Cleveland, 28 to 14. Brush won the Greater Cleveland Conference last season.

The visitors will be handicapped by the loss of Carl Snider, 175-pound junior halfback, who received a broken nose on the kickoff of the second half last week. Snider was the kingpin of his team's offense.

Coach Charles Schlaff will call upon two sophomores at the half-back spots. Bob Spies will be running in place of Snider.

Ross high may open with big Phil Keller in the starting lineup. Keller, a 200-pound senior, has a good chance of starting at right tackle, with Bob Biggs, 206-pound sophomore, moving to guard. The move would bench Guard Marlin Farver, 175-pound junior.

Titworth To Get Chance

Fullback Bob Markley is listed as a starter but Coach Les Binkley indicated last night that he would use him sparingly. Bill Titworth, 155-pound senior, will probably see a lot of action in Markley's place.

Halfback Dick Sherman was in uniform last night as the Giants ran through plays and practiced defensive work on kickoffs. He missed two practice sessions this week because of illness.

In uniform tonight for the first time will be Dean (Humphrey) Kellogg, 250-pound guard, who will play with his right arm strapped to his side. The strap will be used to keep Kellogg from raising his arm high enough to throw a tricky collarbone out of place.

Rich Pacing Event Won By Promotor Of Trotting Plum

DELAWARE, O., Sept. 23.—(P)—The nation's richest pacing event was won yesterday by a horse owned by the promotor of the nation's richest trotting race. The fourth annual Little Brown Jug, a Grand Circuit classic, was won by Good Time, owned by Hambletonian Promotor William H. Cane of Goshen, N. Y.

The 1949 Jug was worth \$58,231.30. The 1949 Hambletonian was valued at about \$69,000. The victory by the highly favored Good Time was worth \$23,312.53 to his owner. It boosted his winnings for the year to \$48,415 and his two-year "take" to \$98,848.

The fast-stepping bay colt beat 15 of the nation's fleetest three-year-old pacers under the clever handling of Frank Ervin of Sedalia, Mo. The race was run before 27,000 spectators in two elimination heats with the five leaders in each heat running in the third heat.

Nine Boys Cross Brush Goal In 10-Touchdown Rout; Giants Score 40 Points First Half

Ross high turned on the power last night and spanked the daylight out of a willing but mis-matched Brush of South Euclid 65-0 in a game that saw the Giants impressive in all departments of play.

Our Boys scored 40 points in the first half and 25 in the second in a 10-touchdown parade that saw nine players chalk up six-pointers. About 8,700 persons witnessed the onslaught.

It was strictly no-contest after the first few minutes when the spunky visitors held Ross for downs and then pulled a "huddle play" to gain 20 yards. From then until the last four minutes the visitors were never close to pay dirt.

Even two linemen got into the scoring act and the Giants displayed a passing attack to prove their versatility. Dan Miller fell on a fumble by Brush's Bob Spies in the end zone for the first touchdown after Ross lost a scoring opportunity when Bob Markley lost the ball hitting into the line from the Brush four-yard marker.

Glover rounded right end for the extra point and the Rossman led 7-0 with six minutes and 55 seconds

Ross's third touchdown was a beauty and came from (of all things) a pass. The Giants were situated on the Brush 49-yard line after being handed a 15-yard clipping penalty. Glover took the pass from center, faded 10 yards and pitched the oval to Hosea Sims, who caught it on the 20 and eluded the defenders for a 49-yard scoring play.

George Batie, the No. 1 substitute halfback, took charge of the fourth crossing. He went around left end for 28 yards. Several Brush tacklers had shots at him but they bounced off.

No. 5 was tallied by Fullback Markley from the 16-yard line after Ross worked the ball there on a 23-yard punt return by Dick Sherman and a 22-yard gallop off right tackle by Sophomore John Lewis.

Allen Gallops 30

John Allen, 203-pound junior center, became the second lineman (exclusive of ends) to get a touchdown when he intercepted a pass thrown by Spies on the Brush 30 and went all the way. Allen showed exceptional speed for his big frame.

The Ross center played improved ball in all departments. Allen also intercepted another pass a minute before the end of the first half, which ended with the Giants on top, 40-0.

A blocked kick, the second in the game, led to the 46th point shortly after the third quarter was under way. Spies recovered his own boot on the Brush 26-yard line on fourth down. On the next play, Glover passed to Dick Sherman, who was all alone in the end zone.

Surratt Goes to Town

Jerome Surratt, another galloping sophomore, injected life into the one-sided contest in the third period by displaying speed and elusiveness in dashing 20 yards as Ross made it 53 to 0.

Ross threatened to score shortly before the third period ended after Dick Sherman made a one-handed interception of one of Spies' tosses on the 50 and returned it to the Brush 27.

Surratt later made a 27-yard scoring dash after Ken Wolf, sub-center, recovered a Brush fumble but the play was called back when Ross was detected holding. Surratt, Lewis and Titsworth then collaborated in a drive that wound up with Titsworth plunging four yards for the tally.

Surratt wound up the scoring by dancing down the left sideline for a 42-yard run. The run was made possible when Wolf hopped on a short kickoff by Titsworth to give Ross the ball in Brush territory.

Brush Drive Halted

At this stage of the game the plucky Brush eleven engineered a march from its own 23 to the Ross one-yard line. The visitors had two tries from the two, but a fourth down line buck failed on the final play of the game.

Ross ran its five extra points, Markley and Titsworth scoring two each and Glover one.

The Brush high band received a well-deserved round of applause, and the visitors' cheer leaders also came in for praise. They were whooping it up right down to the last whistle.

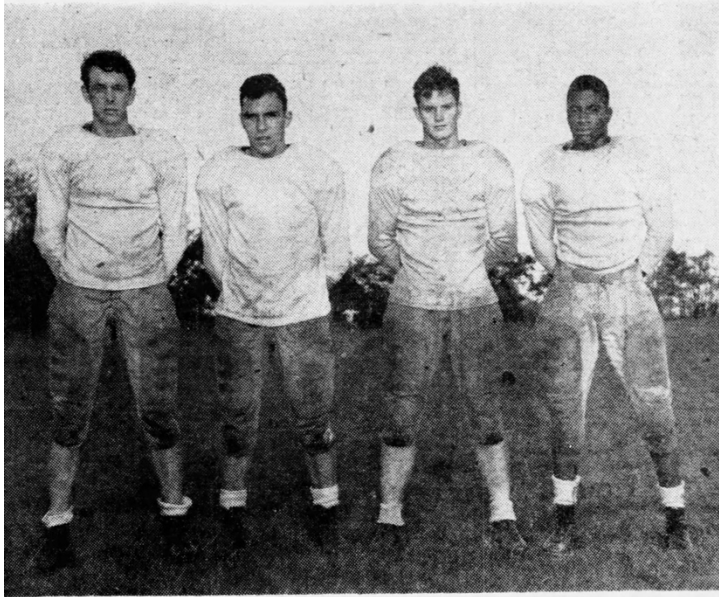

Redmen Sure To Be 'Up' For Stadium Dedication; Time Set For 7:45; Sellout Looms

Ross 33, Fostoria 7.

Ross gets the honor of dedicating Fostoria high school's new football stadium tonight in a game that will have to find the Giants at their best as they make their first start on a foreign gridiron this season. Kickoff time is 8:15.

The Redmen have been pointing for Ross since the season began and tonight may find them at their peak as they enter the game under ideal conditions for an upset. This will be the Giants' opening Buckeye League game.

FOSTORIA SCHOOL officials predict one of the largest crowds in the school's history for the 27th meeting between these old rivals. Ross has captured 17 games in the series while losing eight and tying 1.

Extra Seats Available

The permanent stands, on the east side of the field, will hold 2,280 persons, a Fostoria school official said last night. Temporary stands on the west side will accommodate 2,500, a total of 5,780. If the overflow occurs as expected, more temporary seats that will hold 700 will be erected beyond the end zones.

While there are no figures available, the crowd of 6,500 that saw Fremont play in 1917 on the old field is believed to be the largest in the school's history. The figure can fluctuate either way because there were so many standees, many of whom obtained entrance without purchasing a ticket.

COACH LES BINKLEY of the Giants was prepared for a rugged scrap tonight. Pointing out that the pre-game ceremonies, which begin at 7:45, will find the foe with added incentive to halt his club. Binkley was fearful that his boys would run into an inspired Fostoria eleven that would play beyond its strength.

May Try Some Tricks

The schools are well aware that they have been thoroughly scouted and it is reasonably certain that they will be tossing new weapons into their attacks. Fostoria opened its season with a last-second victory over Shelby, 20-14, then lost a heartbreaker to Marion last week 14-7.

In the Shelby thriller, Halfback Dick Danter took a pass in the end zone from Jim Cook to erase a 13-14 deficit. Against Marion the Redmen outchugged the Presidents' heavier line for three quarters before succumbing to Harding's two-platoon system.

"It was simply a case of two teams being better than one," explained Fostoria Coach Tom Bender.

FOSTORIA OUTGAINED Marion in rushing and was even in the matter of first downs, both teams having nine.

Better Than Jackson?

Spearheads of the enemy's attack are Jimmy Johnson, a freshman halfback touted to be a greater prospect than the celebrated Carlos Jackson, and Lynn Echelberry, red-headed senior fullback who gained a lot of yardage through the Marion line.

Johnson scored a touchdown against Marion, a run of 21 yards, but the play was called back because of a clipping penalty.

Boosting the Redmen's defense will be the return of Ronnie Wedge, a senior guard, who was injured in a preview at Findlay. Wedge, a letterman, is considered one of the better defensive men on the squad. He is one of four regulars back from last year. The

others are Quarterback Paul Mitchell, Echelberry and Bill Hirsh, a guard. Danter, a senior, the right half, earned a letter as a sophomore but missed last season because of a broken leg.

BOTH SCHOOLS operate from the single wing. Ross's offense is built around Halfback Charlie Glover, 165-pound speedster, and Bob Markley, hard-running fullback. Markley will probably be on the sidelines if Ross kicks off tonight, yielding to Bill Tittsworth, 155-pounder, on defense. Markley has been bothered by a bruised hip and Binkley plans to use him only where it is necessary.

Dick Sherman, shifty right-half, was bothered by a cold all week but is reported to be okay for tonight's game. The Fremont aggregation is in tip-top shape aside from Markley's chronic ailment.



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Redmen On Deficit Side In Running Plays; Sherman Stars

Ross high school, putting on an impressive defensive display before a near-capacity crowd of approximately 6,000 persons last night, served notice on the Buckeye league that it is going to take home the championship for the third straight year by manhandling Fostoria, 28-7.

Although the Giants of Coach Les Binkley were admittedly below par in spots they showed the throng a rock-ribbed line and a trio of hard-running backs in disposing of the Redmen in their dedication of the new Memorial stadium.

Sparked by the clever running of Halfback Dick Sherman, who turned in the outstanding game of his career, and the steady driving of Fullback Bob Markley, the Giants completely subdued their foe except for a last-second pass in the first half which left the Redmen trailing only 9-7 at intermission.

The game would have been even more one-sided had it not been for a siege of fumbles which kept Ross from scoring two more touchdowns in the first half.

The Fostoria ground game showed a net yardage of minus eight as a forward wall led by End Hosan Sims, Guards John Anspach and

slightly better than five yards per try.

Sherman was even more effective, gaining 138 yards in 16 cracks. Ross kicked off and after stopping the Redmen, threatened to move into pay dirt quickly. A drive that started on their own 49 bugged down on the one-yard line, however, as Markley was held for no gain on fourth down one yard from the goal. A fumble by Charlie Glover on third down was a key play in Fostoria's success in stalling off a score.

Cook Tackled in End Zone

The Redmen elected to run the ball from their own one-yard line and on the first attempt, End Hosan Sims tackled Fostoria's Jim Cook in the end zone for a safety. Charlie Zumpft kicked off from the Fostoria 20 and after Glover returned the kick to the Ross 38, the Giants again headed for pay dirt only to be stymied by Dick Sherman's fumble after a beautiful 24-yard run. It was a pretty piece of work by Sherman that was spoiled by the miscue.

This time Rhude punted and the Redmen immediately embarked on a 37-yard drive that saw Markley counting from the four-yard line.

Whodunit? Fostoria's touchdown was the result of some questionable generalship. Ross had the ball on its own 35-yard line with only three seconds to play in the first half. On fourth down and 15, Glover was called upon to pass but it went incomplete.

Fostoria took over and on the last play of the half Cook pitched to Rhude who took the ball on the 15-yard line and romped over. The play covered 55 yards. Carl Zumpft's placement was perfect, narrowing Ross's margin to 9-7.

It was a different Ross team that took the field in the second half. Obviously upset at Fostoria's rally for a touchdown after holding the Redmen without a first down in the first two quarters, the Giants began a t.d. march after receiving the kickoff. The drive was for 51 yards and was highlighted by a 24-yard caper by Sherman and some hard plugging by Markley. The latter tallied from the two-yard line and then bucked over for the extra point.

Markley Goes Over Two minutes later Ross had another touchdown, the Giants marching 53 yards. A dazzling run of 29 yards by Sherman plus a couple of 10 yard plunges by Markley placed the ball on the one-yard line, from where Markley scored. The Ross fullback also plunged for the extra point.

It was after this touchdown that Fostoria took to the air and made its best offensive showing. With the aid of two interference rulings, Jim Cook passed the Redmen down to the Fremont one-yard line. There a five-yard penalty set them back and four heaves by Cook went astray, with Billy Titworth, defensive fullback, intercepting the fourth-heave. He was tackled in his end zone, enabling Ross to put the ball in play from its own 20.

Ross then drove 80 yards in four minutes with a Sherman-Sims pass gaining 21 yards to place the ball on the Fostoria's seven-yard line. With less than 10-seconds remaining, Markley ploughed over the middle to give Ross its final tally. Markley was halted in his try to run the extra point.

Sherman Is Elusive Although Markley, 185-pound junior tallied three of the touchdowns, all were set up by incredible running by Sherman, who ignited the team in the second half after Charlie Glover was rendered inactive by a leg injury.

Over at Findlay, Coach Howard Yawberg said he was "pretty nervous and jittery." Asked for an opinion on the outcome, the likeable Yawberg stated:

"I honestly don't know, there's no common ground on which to grade Fremont. Our scouts haven't seen us play, but they tell us that Ross has a terrific team. I hope we can hold the score down."

Yawberg went on to predict that both teams would score, an opinion that is prevalent among followers of both teams. Findlay has proven it can score from any position on the field, striking for touchdowns on runs of longer than 50 yards seven times this season. Ross has shown it is vulnerable to passing, but the situation is the opposite on the ground, where the Giants should have a marked superiority.

Speed Vs Brawn

It will be a test of speed vs brawn, with the Trojans on the speedy side. Sparked by three lightning backs in Eddie Rate, Dick Hill and Bob Wise and a good passer in Fullback Koehler, the

ANSPACH AILING

John Anspach, stellar guard on the Ross team, may miss tonight's game with Findlay. Anspach has a back ailment, described by Dr. A. R. Fuller as strained muscles and ligament. Dr. Fuller said the player had difficulty in getting out of a chair today. He rated Anspach only a 50-50 chance of being in the lineup tonight.

Trojans have racked up 14 touchdowns in three games, blasting Columbus Aquinas 35-12, Lima South, 21-12, and Bowling Green 42-7. Jack Phillips, place-kicking specialist, has converted after each touchdown.

The Giants come in to tonight's game with victories over Norwalk (32-13), Euclid Brush (65-0) and Fostoria (28-7). In each contest it has been simply too much power on the part of the Rossmen, who average about 200 pounds on the line.

The Giants' offense will be weakened tonight, however, if Charlie Glover is unable to perform in top form at halfback. Glover severely injured an ankle in last Friday's game at Fostoria.

Hill's Long Runs Too Much As Trojans Race To 26-13 Victory

Spotting Ross high six points and a 30-pound weight advantage per man, a well-drilled Findlay high school eleven overpowered Ross high last night 26-13 before about 6,300 fans at Harmon Field.

The snappy Trojans of Coach Howard Yawberg gave a display that Fremont fans will remember for a long time. It was a display of how speed and determination can overcome physical advantages, which the Ross team unquestionably held.

A line that blocked and tackled with devastating effectiveness plus a 136-pound halfback named Dick Hill, who scored three touchdowns, ruined the hopes of the Giants followers for an undefeated season. Hill and his teammates simply ran over the ponderous Ross aggregation, something that no one thought was possible.

Three First Downs for Ross
The Trojan defense restricted Ross to only three first downs, none of which came in the first half. Findlay held a 19-6 margin at intermission.

Before the crowd had time to get settled down Ross was out in front. Dick Sherman, 158-pound senior, went off right end for 51 yards on the play following the kickoff. It was done with such ease that it appeared that what was advertised as a good football game was going to be another walkaway for Ross.

Instead the Trojans scrapped back and went into the lead and held it, abetted at times by a fumbling Fremont eleven.

After Sherman's touchdown, fullback Bob Markley failed in an attempt to plunge over for the extra point. Ross kicked

to the Trojans and they failed to gain and it was the opinion of many that the Trojans would find that first series of downs repeated throughout the game. But Findlay had other ideas.

Ross could do nothing after taking fullback Jim Koehler's punt and then the fun started. Sherman punted to the Findlay 24.

Hill drove 66 Yards. Dick Hill, on a pitchout, went over the left side of the line for 56 yards to the Fremont 19-yard line. He was nearly flopped for a loss before getting loose.

Ross rose to the occasion on three running plays which netted only six yards but on fourth down halfback Bob Wise took a handoff and flipped into the end zone to Quarterback Eddie Rate, who was all alone.

Little Charlie Phillips, who is used for extra points only, then put the Trojans out in front with a perfect place kick, his 15th consecutive conversion this season.

The ensuing kickoff found Ross unable to gain, but the Trojans were not so handicapped. Sherman's punt rolled dead on the Findlay 30 and on the next play some Trojan trickery put Koehler in the clear for a 61-yard run to the Ross nine-yard line.

Phillips Finally Misses
Hill was trapped for an eight-yard loss to the 17, but on the next play he started to his left then cut back over tackle and behind excellent blocking rolled over untouched. Phillips then missed his first extra point attempt of the season to make the score board read Findlay 13, Ross 6.

Again the Giants' running attack was stopped, with a mixup on signals costing the Giants 20 yards as the pass from center rolled to the 14-yard line on first down. Sherman booted to the Findlay 35, the ball being allowed to roll dead.

Hill, again showing his speed, went over the left side and rared the 65-yards to the goal line without a man getting near him. The blocking in the line and in the secondary was terrific. The midget halfback hesitated slightly as he secondary was terrific. The midget then cut through a gaping hole that was formed when the heavy Ross line smashed through. His blockers made the path and from then on Hill was on his own. Phillips again kicked wide of the mark.

Findlay was only eight yards away from pay dirt when the half ended, getting the ball when Ross failed to move on fourth down with 16 seconds left.

Hill Dooms Hopes
Ross was still in the game at halftime, but Findlay quickly deflated the Giants' hopes of a comeback when Hill scampered 60 yards for a t. d. on the third scrimmage play of the third quarter.

It was another example of excellent blocking in the line and Hill's speed. The fleet senior backfield star had a 10-yard lead over the nearest Ross defender

before he reached midfield.

From then on it was mostly an exchange of punts, with Ross shooting for long gains on passes most of the time.

It took a fumble on the part of Findlay's Wise to give Ross a scoring opportunity midway in the fourth quarter. Earl Looman recovered a misplaced lateral on the Findlay 29. Then, after Sherman gained nine at right end, the play was called back, Ross was penalized 15 yards for holding and the threat was temporarily stalled.

After an exchange of punts, Ross got a break when a Findlay back intercepted a Sherman pass and fumbled, with the Giants recovering. Sherman flipped a heave to End Hosea Sims, good for 22 yards to the 14-yard line. Sherman drove to the three and after three attempts Markley dove over for the score.

Dick Sherman place-kicked the extra point, narrowing the count to 26-13.

It was the last gasp by the Ross-men, however, as Findlay played methodically until time elapsed. Ross did not threaten in the final stages, taking to the air on almost every play.

It was a brilliant victory for the Trojans and a tribute to Coach Howard Yawberg, who had his team at fever pitch for his biggest game of the season. In the Trojan line, Darrell Courtney played an All-Buckeye league brand of football. Harold Yawberg, the coach's son, was a defensive stalwart also.

The big difference was provided by Hill, who gave no quarter despite his size. The midget speedster gave a display that Harmon Field fans will hold in their memory for a long time.

Findlay's passing attack was not particularly effective as Koehler was wild on several heaves. For Ross, Sims and Sherman were outstanding. Sherman was a bulwark in the secondary as well as the Giants' main offensive threat.

OVER SANDUSKY, 47-7

Giants Rack Up Largest Score In History Of Ancient Rivalry; Markley Leads Attack

An aroused Ross high school football team put on a display of power last night that approximately 7,000 Harmon Field spectators will remember for a long time as the Giants thoroughly and emphatically removed Sandusky from the ranks of the unbeaten with a smashing 47-7 triumph.

It was the greatest offensive display in the long series between the two schools, surpassing by one point the largest score ever recorded by the ancient rivals. The 1940 Sandusky team held the scoring record until last night. In that year, the Blue Streaks racked up 46.

Last night's game reinstated Ross among the football powers of Ohio and uncovered a pair of sophomore backs that should help keep the Giants up for two years.

The one-sided verdict that broke the hearts of Sandusky fans was a vote of confidence for the power attack employed by Coach Les Binkley.

Gain Up Middle

When the final returns were in it was the smashing of Fullback Bob Markley that spelled the difference between a mediocre or a great Fremont Ross team. Last night's aggregation was great as Markley drove over the middle for huge chunks of yardage and his injured cohort, Charlie Glover, ran the ends to demoralize the ambitious visitors from the start.

Glover's sudden return to the lineup was the spark the team needed. With the Streaks forced to spread their defense to cope with the threat of Glover's sweeping end runs, Markley had a field day up the center. And the 183-pound junior fullback never played a better game or hit the line harder than he did last night.

Playing like a man inspired Markley was in complete charge in the first half, when he gained 107 yards from scrimmage. In the second half the sophomores directed the attack.

The game was only two minutes old before Ross had a short-lived 6-0 lead. Halfback George Kreimes fumbled the kickoff of Hosea Sims and Guard John Anspach, who played an alert game all night, recovered on the 10-yard line.

Markley Scores From 7
Glover, whose sudden recovery from a badly sprained ankle amazed even the Ross coaching staff, drove for two yards and Markley added another pair. When Markley fumbled and recovered for a yard loss on third down it appeared that Sandusky had averted the threat. But the hard-working fullback went over on the next play with a seven-yard jaunt through the middle of the line on which he displayed both speed and power.

Halfback Dick Sherman missed the try for the extra point and then Sandusky got a chance to cheer. Taking the kickoff, the Streaks marched 71 yards into pay dirt, mixing plays and a deceptive running attack to gain the tally.

The key play of the drive was a third-down pass from Tom McGory to Jim Holzmiller to place the ball on the Ross 32. Don Cottey, fullback, and McGory drove over guard to put the oval on the 19 yard line. Five plays later McGory made the touchdown and Sophomore Ted Schwanger bucked over to give Sandusky the lead, 7-6.

Markley had the leading role in a series of plays that saw the Giants take the ensuing kickoff and go down field 57 yards for the touchdown that put them ahead for keeps. Quarterback Tom Lee, who threw devastating blocks most of the time he was in the game, galloped McGory's kickoff back to the Ross 43. Sherman drove over tackle for five yards and Sherman got six and a first down. Sherman added 9 yards and then Markley burst loose for 28 yards to the Sandusky nine. After Sherman picked up 2, Markley scored in two line bucks. Markley plunged for the point and it was 13-7.

Running with a loping stride, Lewis elminated an 85-yard excursion with a sprint around right end for 11 yards. Opposition Nil As Lewis Gets 314 Yards, Tallies Six T. D.'s

In what may be an all-time scoring record for a Fremont football team, Ross high school ran roughshod over Tiffin Columbian Friday night at Tiffin, winning 78-0.

It wasn't a case of sensational runs or cleverly-executed plays. It was simply the lack of opposition that provided the Giants with their touchdowns. Columbian's tackling was inept from start to finish as the spirited Ross backs moved past them for touchdowns.

The overwhelming loss was just another chapter in Tiffin football history. Columbian hasn't won a game since 1946. Last night's game started in a steady rain but the field did not become muddy. Rain ceased to fall after the first quarter.

John Lewis, 6 foot, 3 inch sophomore, racked up the startling total of 314 yards from scrimmage. He scored six of the touchdowns, three of them on runs of 50, 44 and 23 yards. The other three were short jaunts, measuring 7, 6 and 6.

Glover Scores On 1st Play

Lewis ran 42 yards for another touchdown in the third period but it was called back because of a clipping penalty.

With the second and third stringers in complete charge after the regulars went to the showers early in the third period, the Giants continued to move freely behind the quarterbacking of Dennis Sutter, who directed the team smartly.

Rick Lee, third team back, intercepted a pass to set up one touchdown. He grabbed the aerial heave on the Columbian 35. Lewis and Tittsworth put the ball on the 23 from where Lewis scored after shaking off two defenders on the 10. Bob Biggs' kick was wide.

R. Lee Dashes 23

A punt that slithered Marion Miller's foot and wound up as a three - yard loss was responsible for the next-to-last t. d. Lee circled left end 23 yards from the Columbian 43 to put the ball on the 20. Lewis added 14 yards, Tittsworth 2 and then Lewis ran over untouched. Biggs' extra-point try was blocked.

Markley Totes Ball 39 Times As He And Glover Pace Attack; Bulldogs Get Minus 3 Rushing

A GROUND ATTACK that mixed deception with straight power was too much for a pass-minded Toledo Scott football team at Harmon Field last night as the Giants of Coach Les Binkley rolled to a 40-20 victory.

With Charlie Glover and Bob Markley doing practically all of the ball carrying, the Giants steamed at will, getting 19 first downs to 6 and 436 yards. Scott wound up with a minus 3 rushing and passed for 232 yards.

Both Glover and Markley put on tremendous performances, with Markley resembling a battering ram as he smashed over guard and off tackle for 196 yards. He carried the ball the unbelievable total of 39 times, making five touchdowns. Glover had a better ground average, going 228 yards in 21 attempts, better than 10 yards per carry.

There never was any doubt as to the better team, although Scott managed to stay within 6 points at halftime, the score being 20-14.

Scott tried only 16 ground plays and threw 24 passes. Twelve of them were completed. The Bulldogs made all of their touchdowns on passes.

Ross's ground game was deceptive in that it had Glover carrying the ball on reverses and Markley running on fake hand-offs. Much of the time the visitors were off balance for the hard-running pair of backs. Both are juniors and should give the Giants a potent attack in 1936.

Ross took 8 minutes and 50 seconds to get the first touchdown, with Markley going over from the 4-yard line after a 70-yard advance. Glover reeled off three gains of better than 10 yards, while Markley ripped off several of 5 to 10 yards. Dick Sherman, with Billy Titaworth holding, booted the extra point, the ball sailing out of the Harmon Field grounds.

Scott struck back with a 75-yard pass play to knot the count. On third down and 17 to go, Hank Garn, the outstanding Scott player last night, faded and threw a beautiful pass to Halfback Harold Watkins who made a sensational catch amidst two Ross defenders on the Ross 47 and ran the remaining distance to the goal. Jim Arbutnot booted the extra point and it was a 7-7 game.

Glover Scampers 33

The Giants came back in the second quarter to cross the goal line twice, Markley being on the scoring end each time. A 38-yard run on a reverse by Glover put the ball on the Scott 20 and Markley advanced the ball to the 8. The 185-pound fullback scored on fourth down from the 1-yard line. Sherman's kick was good.

With 7:45 left in the second quarter, Glover intercepted a pass by Garn and was downed on the Scott 28. Markley covered the final 7 yards, going through a gaping hole at right guard. This time Sherman missed the point.

Ross again invaded Scott territory, getting to the 20-yard stripe but a pass by Sherman was intercepted by Watkins on the 24. After a Garn-Watkins aerial gained 10, Garn hit Phil Oberlin on the Ross 40 and the Scott end made it to the 11-yard line.

Center John Allen temporarily stalled the threat by intercepting a pass on the 10 but Scott was given the ball again when Glover fumbled on the 6-yard line with 1:10 remaining. After Watkins lost a yard and Allen almost intercepted a pass, Garn heaved to Oberlin for the t.d. Arbutnot's kick narrowed the lead to 20-14 at intermission.

Markley and Glover led a Ross drive of 65 yards for a touchdown after four minutes had elapsed in the third quarter, with a 36-yard scamper by the latter placing the oval on the 8-yard line. Markley crossed the goal in two plays. Sherman's kick was good and the score read Ross 27 Scott 14.

The ensuing kickoff by Sims was fumbled by Quarterback Harry Young and he was finally downed on his own 3-yard line. Still relying on their aerials, the Bulldogs tried to pass out of the hole but were unsuccessful and on third down Garn got off a poor kick that went out of bounds on the Scott 28. Sherman fumbled on the next play, however, and the Bulldogs had possession on their 29. A series of passes found Ross backed into its own territory but Garn finally had to punt the ball rolling dead on the Ross 2.

Another long kick put Scott in the hole on its 6-yard line and the Toledoans gambled on a fourth-down pass from their 15. The ball was batted down by Allen and two plays later Ross had another t.d. Glover covering the 15 yards after Markley had been held to no gain. Sherman's kick was perfect and Ross held a 40-14 advantage with six minutes remaining.

An interference ruling set up Scott's final score, which came with about a minute to play. Garn heaved one into the end zone to a waiting Watkins, who made a beautiful fake to get in the clear. Arbutnot's kick was wide to the right.

Ross Line Rugged

The game was witnessed by about 4,000 and was played under ideal conditions. The Ross line played an outstanding game, as the statistics prove. It was the final Harmon Field appearance for the Giants, who next week go to Marion to wind up the season. A win over the Presidents will stamp the 1943 aggregation as one of the best in the school's history. The only loss by Ross this year was at the hands of Findlay, 26-13. The Giants now have won five games in succession.

Fremont high schools say farewell to the 1949 football season under similar settings tonight. Both are favored to win.

Both Ross and St. Joseph's will be gunning for title shares of their respective leagues as the Giants travel to Marion to meet Coach Pete Howison's powerful Marion Harding eleven and the Crimson Streaks play before a home crowd as John Roberts' Genoa crew invades Harmon Field.

Coaches Lester Binkley of Ross and Bob Smith of St. Joe sounded their most optimistic notes of the season as they awaited the finales. Binkley said if his team will display the spirit and drive in the game it showed in practice it should find Harding no obstacle. Smith said it was all up to his boys to block as they did in the second half of the Lakeside game last week, when the Streaks rallied to gain a hair-raising decision.

Findlay Hopes for Tie

Ross can grab off a half-share of the Buckeye League by winning and Marion is playing for the same stakes. If the Giants and Presidents tie, Findlay will win the championship outright.

St. Joe stands to gain a three-way tie in the Sandusky Bay Conference by whipping sixth place Genoa, Gibsonburg and Oak Harbor have already sewed up equal rights to first place.

There isn't an injury of any type in the Ross camp, but St. Joe's squad has Don Emick and Fred Durnwald to worry about. Emick will play, as his bad leg is as good or better than it has been in several weeks. Bud Gabel apparently has thrown off the effects of a pair of injuries that were instrumental in the Streaks' only losses this season. Durnwald has a leg injury that may keep him away from his quarterback post entirely.

Streaks Have Won Five

St. Joe has lost two games, tied one and won five in its eight starts. Genoa has only one victory, 21-0 over Clyde, and eight losses in nine starts.

The clash at Marion ranks behind only the Canton McKinley-Massillon clash in importance in the state this week. Both schools have lost once in nine starts. Ross to Findlay 26-13 and Marion to Columbus North, 14-7.

Comparative scores fail to establish a definite favorite. Marion trounced Findlay 30-20 two weeks after the Trojans spilled Ross, which would make the Prexies 32 points better than the Giants. On the other hand, Ross whipped Sandusky 47-7 while Marion did it by only 20-13. On that basis, Ross is 33 points better than Marion.

Harding rallied in the last period to nip Fostoria 14-7, while Ross whipped the Redmen 28-7, a difference of 14 points in the favor of Ross. Continuing with comparative scores, the Giants blasted Tiffin 78-0 and Harding did it 46-0, a 32-point difference.

Howison Drops Two Regulars

The Presidents may enter tonight's game minus the services of two regulars and a first-line substitute. Coach Howison cut the trio from the squad when they skipped school and practice Tuesday to go hunting.

Victims of the coach's action were Merle Daum, almost a certain bet for an All-Buckeye league center berth; Phil Messenger, guard, and Lewis McCabe, sub halfback. Daum, who generally plays 48 minutes, and Messenger are seniors. McCabe is a junior.

Daum's shoes will be especially hard to take as he backs up the center position of the line. An experienced man is needed at that slot and unless Howison has someone he can depend on to fill the breach, the Presidents' defense is certain to be below par.

Marion fans will witness a battle between two of the most highly-touted fullbacks in northwestern Ohio in Paul Ludwig of the Prexies and Bob Markley of

Ross. Both have earned the praises of opposing scouts and coaches as they have led their squads to outstanding records. Ludwig has more speed than Markley and because he almost single-handedly set off the fireworks at Findlay is rated slightly ahead of the Fremont battering ram.

Area fans are still talking about Markley's feat of carrying the ball 39 times against Toledo Scott here last week. He gained 196 yards.

Glover is Threat

Charlie Glover, halfback, gives the Giants a one-two punch that has no equal in northwestern Ohio. In fact, Glover is the leading ground-gainer among the Ross regulars and has made several long touchdown runs.

Glover had a cold earlier in the week but has recovered and is ready to take his place at halfback tonight.

St. Joe will mix passes and a running game against Genoa. The Streaks showed they could function on the ground by moving for huge chunks of yardage in the last two periods against Lakeside.

With Halfback Bud Gabel's passes failing to click at the outset, Smith ordered the St. Joe backs to use their ground game and Gabel and Bob Courtney immediately led with a 20-point parade to nip the Lakers 20-19. The lone pass completion came in the last minute and 45 seconds, Gabel tossing one to Hamilton for 20 yards to tie the score. The deadlock was broken when Hamilton took an extra-point pass from Ted Bantz, who faked a place kick.

Genoa Strengthened

Genoa Coach Roberts issued the word today that two boys who missed last week's bitter struggle with Oak Harbor will be in the lineup for the Bulldogs, Paul Nero, Genoa's best running back, will be ready to roll, as will guard Milton Schimming. The Rockets won 20-9.

Their presence last week might have made a difference against undefeated Oak Harbor. The Rockets were favored by several touchdowns, but Genoa led 9-0 at the half and 9-7 at the end of three periods. Only a last-half passing attack averted the biggest upset of the season in the Sandusky Bay Conference.

Roberts said his charges will put up a good battle and his tone indicated that Harmon Field spectators might see another photo-finish scrap.

Twinkietoes was a ball of fire as he ran the ends and tackled for 174 yards. He scored three of the Giants' touchdowns, the first on a 47-yard run.

HOSEA SIMS OF ROSS HIGH school, already the recipient of acclaim after spearheading a rugged Ross line through 10 games, was given the zenith of recognition today as Ohio pinned the badge of gridiron greatness on its scholastic stars.

Sims was one of 11 boys who come from all parts of the state to make up the 1949 Associated Press All-Ohio team, recognized as official by the Ohio Football Coaches association.

Three other Ross players, Guard John Anspach, Tackle Dan Miller and Halfback Charlie Glover, were chosen on the honorable mention list.

The senior bulwark, third Sims to cavort for the Giants, previously had been chosen to the International News Service All-State team and the All-Buckeye League team.

"Greatest End"—Binkley
