"Pitching-wise I feel pretty confident,"

said. "She looks pretty good."
Hammond is supported by sophomore

Dayton last fall.

Wolf likes her teams to "play

tough defense and avoid mental errors" and feels this group can do that.

Offensively, Wolf said the Little Giants should show more power than in the past.

"We are making pretty good contact, and we have some peo-ple (Hammond, Watts and Williams) who can hit it longer this year," Wolf said, "but we haven't seen any real quick pitching yet.

"I really think the offense will take care of itself."


