GENOA TRIPS LAKOTA, 61-51:

Ross Holds Off Rockets, 47-46

Ross high's cagers took a shaky step into the second round of sectional tournament play Friday night at Tiffin Columbian gym, eking out a one-point victory over a scrappy and near-victorious Oak Harbor Rocket quintet. The score was 47 to 46, the Little Giants blowing a comfortable 12-point margin which prevailed with the score 38-26 as the final period started.

Coach Dick Norman's boys play their second joust of the tourney trail tonight on their own court against Genoa at 8:30. It will be the second game on the card, Fostoria high's Redmen and the St. Joseph Streaks opening the card at 7:15.

Genoa's Comets had a battle on their hands, but managed to pull away in winning their first round encounter from Lakota's young and diminutive Raiders, 61-51, this affray being the second on the card at Tiffin Friday night.

A small crowd witnessed the double bill, slippery roads and deep, wet snow keeping a lot of cage fans at home.

The Little Giants wrapped their ball game into two periods, the second and third. In the first and fourth sessions they played a poor game of give-away, every player in the starting lineup being tense, uncertain and slow. There was little drive, and very poor shooting.

In the opening period Ross had 17 cracks at the basket and netted only two of them. Time after time the Ross youths were open for good shots, but couldn't can them. The fourth period brought a repetition of the first, when eight shots were taken and only one was hooped.

But that fourth period bucket was a big one, John Prosser stealing the ball and dribbling in for a bunny to give Ross a 45-44 lead with only 1:17 to play. Half a minute later Buzz Baldwin of Oak Harbor fouled Russ Hagerty in an attempt to get the ball, the cool sophomore dropping in two free tosses to make it 47-44. Only five seconds remained when Jim Robertson took the inbound pass after Hagerty's last foul shot, and with Coach Norman and every-

one on the bench yelling to the Ross boys to stay away from him, he dribbled the length of the floor to make it 47-46 as the buzzer sounded.

Oak Harbor, driving hard and confusing Ross with a press much of the time, built a 9-5 lead at the end of the first period, but in the second canto the Little Giants canned seven of 15 shots against Oak Harbor's one for eight, to gain a 22-17 halftime lead.

Pete Davis was assigned the job of playing Baldwin, the Oak Harbor great who was still a little weak from a session in the hospital with bronchitis, and he did a good job of it. Davis got into foul trouble, though, leaving the game via the thumb with 2:28 to go in the game.

In the third period Ross played even better ball, hitting seven of 15 shots, the same as in the second quarter, while holding Oak Harbor to three of 10. As the last period started Ross looked comfortably ahead, but lost its lead, with Oak Harbor cutting down the margin with a lot of foul conversions, and some neat shooting, hitting six from the field out of nine tries.

With three minutes to go Davis hit two free throws for Ross to grab a 43-40 edge. Then Jack Baumgartner broke through the Ross defense for a layup, and Barry Finken dribbled in for another bunny to take a 44-43 edge.

It was then that Prosser canned the only Ross bucket of the period, and Hagerty hit his charities.

Prosser left the game in the first minute of the second quarter with an ankle sprain. He had just dropped two fine shots from the outside to give Ross a 10-10 tie when he fell on the court. His ankle was taped but he did not go back into the game until there was 6:40 to go in the last period.

Davis paced the Little Giants with 12 points, while Ron Geller and Baldwin were tops score-wise for the Rockets, the former with two buckets and 12 charities for 16, Baldwin hitting five and five for 15.

The Genoa-Lakota tilt was a see-saw scrap after the Raiders were able to get started, but the Comets of Jim Luallen had too many guns. They had height, and speed, and a lot of fight, but Lakota had speed, too, and determination. The Raiders out-rebounded Genoa 30 to 25.

Luallen got an excellent game out of rugged Elmer Fredrickson who hit 21 points, and a fine one particularly defensively from Lyle Sieving. Dix Martin, the Genoa threat from way out, came

through at times with sweet shots, but was well covered much of the time by Bill Zimmerman.

Coach Max Chapman of Lakota has only two seniors on his first string, Gary Snyder, who kept pegging away for 20 points, and Dale Stewart.

Genoa held a 13-10 edge at the quarter, and was ahead only 30-29 at halftime. As the final period started Genoa had a two-point margin, 47-45.

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But in the final period superior height and experience played big parts, the Genoa lads pulling away as the game ended.

Since there is 'no tomorrow' in cage tourney play, Oak Harbor and Lakota hang up their togs, the former with a 9-7 season's mark and the latter with 2 and 17.

Ross takes a 7-13 record into the game tonight against Genoa's 7-10.

GIANTS PREP FOR ST. FRANCIS:

Hyzer Out For Season, Prosser Back, Coach Ill

A practice session injury ended the high school basketball career of Ross' Guard Alex Hyzer.

Hyzer twisted his knee Monday afternoon during practice and now is on crutches. Earlier this season he was out a week or two with a sprained ankle.

Sickness also has taken its toll as the Little Giants prepare to meet Toledo St. Francis Friday night in Bowling Green in the windup of "AA" sectional tournament play. Coach Dick

Norman missed Monday and Tuesday workouts because of the flu and Guard Bill Feagins was absent Tuesday.

One bright spot amid the unhappy news was the return to practice of Forward John Prosser, who missed Saturday's game with Genoa because of a bone chip in the right ankle. The injury is mending quickly and barring further agitation of the ankle Prosser should be ready by Friday.

Tip off time against the Knights of St. Francis is 9 p.m.

Hyzer has been one of four guards Norman has alternated during the second half of the 1962-63 season. Others are Feagins, Dick Hufford and Russ Hagerty. A healthy Feagins, Hufford or Hagerty would probably form Ross' starting backline. Prosser, Jim (Pete) Davis and Frank Moore likely would work up front.

Taking over practice while Norman is recovering (Norman indicated Tuesday he would try to be back Wednesday afternoon) is Assistant Don Purvis.

Purvis had a 'chalk talk' Tuesday afternoon with the team, going over the strength of St. Francis.

According to the word of area coaches who have played St. Francis, the Knights have a tremendous fast break and rely heavily on offensive spark from their guards, Joe Gorski and Mark Paluszak, both about 5-8. Gorski is smart, an excellent shooter and leads the fast break. He scored 22 points against tough Toledo Woodward but was shut out against Toledo Rogers last week when the Knights earned their tourney berth, 36-33, in overtime.

Paluszak is the best ball handler and top dribbler on the club. He has an effective two-hand set shot.

Boys up front for St. Francis are tall. They are 6-4 center Chuck Strenzski, 6-2 Forward Phil Provo and 6-1 Forward Frank Maher, who also has been alternating with Greg (6-2) Merritt.

John Titsworth, who handles Ross' athletic business, said the tournament has been drawn through the district, and that should Ross win Friday night it would meet the winner of the Toledo Woodward - Toledo Waite game the following week in Toledo. Fostoria, which plays Toledo Libbey at 7 Friday, would have to win in order to set up a game with the winner of the Toledo Central-Toledo Macomber game.

Titsworth indicated that next year the entire tournament, from sectional through to state, may be mapped out in advance.

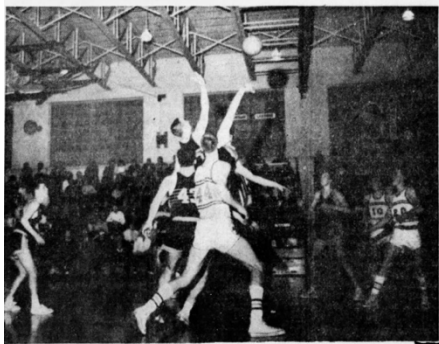

Prosser's Only Basket Gives Fremont 44 To 43 Victory Over St. Francis

John Prosser, held out about half of the game in his first start after suffering an ankle injury two weeks ago, scored his only basket of the contest Friday night at Bowling Green State university, but it was a big one.

Prosser's rebound shot of a missed free throw by Center Frank Moore with only 40 seconds to play gave Fremont Ross a thrilling 44-43 victory over Toledo St. Francis in the wrap up of the "AA" sectional basketball tournament.

Ross now goes to the Toledo district tourney for the second consecutive year and will play Toledo Woodward next Friday night at the Toledo fieldhouse. Woodward downed Toledo Vawt 59-40 in the Toledo Sectional Friday.

Coach Dick Norman of Fremont will attend a drawing Sunday to determine the time the Little Giants play Friday night. Also part of the district, strong Toledo Central takes on host Fostoria next Friday as a result of both team's victories in sectional play.

Central smashed Toledo Maconber, 60-36, Friday and Fostoria outscored Toledo Libbey, 35-44, at Bowling Green.

Ross (3-12) overcame a cold shooting first half in which the Little Giants once trailed 28-1 early in the second quarter. Ross went until the 2:31 marker of the first period before Moore tossed in the first Fremont basket. Score at this point was St. Francis 18, Ross six.

Joe Gorski and Phil Provo of the Knights put their team ahead 14-6 at the close of the first period. Ross stalled the final 30 seconds in an attempt to get that last shot before the buzzer. Ross did not make it.

Again Fremont opened cold by going almost two minutes before Moore hit a basket. Moore scored again seconds later to move the Little Giants up to 22-12, and when Dick Hufford canned a three-point play at the 3:37 reading it was the first basket from a Little Giant other than the Ross pointman, who turned in one of his outstanding games of the season Friday in netting 17 points.

Ross began catching up late in the second period as Russ Hagerty, going all the way at guard and turning in a fine floor job the also pulled in 18 rebounds to cap Ross honors in that department, scored on a three-point play. He was followed by a trio of points by Moore just before halftime.

St. Francis took a 26-21 lead into the dressing room. Jim Davis, who also was limited to just one goal by the sticky Knight man-to-man defense, opened the second half with his bucket and Ross was

beginning to close the gap. Hufford, who hit four long shots, gave Ross its first tie of the night at 30-28.

The game was tight from that point on.

Mark Paluszak, one of two shy little St. Francis guards, canned three straight free throws midway in the third quarter to give the Knights of Don Vight a 32-30 margin. Hagerty's goal cut that to 32-31.

Then Moore, an driver off the post, dribbled in to put Ross ahead 33-32 with 2:25 to play.

St. Francis again took the lead on a follow up shot by Forward Greg Merritt. Hufford was good from way out but Provo scored late in the period and St. Francis held a 36-33 advantage going into the fourth quarter.

Provo, St. Francis called a time out and when the teams went back on court there was some discussion as to who would jump for the Knights—big Provo or St. Francis' Provo was declared the jumper and he beat Davis to the ball but caught it on the way down. This is a violation. Ross was given possession and held on the final 14 seconds. Prosser was fouled at the buzzer but he missed the shot that Ross did not need.

The Little Giants, jubilant with their victory, paused long enough to be presented the sectional trophy (as was Fostoria after the first game) by Coach Harold Anderson of the Bowling Green Falcons. Anderson served as tournament director.

Fremont took 21 first half shots and made six for a percentage of 28.5. St. Francis hit on 11 of 23 for 47.6 per cent.

St. Francis actually made three more baskets than Ross, 17-14, but Fremont hit on 16 of 26 free throws to the Knights' nine of 18. Ross outscored St. Francis 33-31.

Moore and Hufford were the field goal shooting stars for Fremont. Moore had six of 13 and Hufford drilled in four of 10.

Fostoria gave away plenty of height to Libbey and the Redmen made up for the disadvantage by hustling the Cowboys off the court and forcing numerous Toledo turnovers.

The final minute was the most hectic. Davis rebounded Maher's missed free throw and passed to Hagerty. The sophomore of the Little Giants was tied up by Paluszak, but Hagerty won the tip.

Maher then fouled Moore, setting up Prosser's heroics with 40 seconds showing. St. Francis brought the ball down court and Davis tied up 6-3

The jury voted that Kirkland was the father of a 22-month-old boy, named Willie Kirkland Jr., the son of divorcee Mrs. Margaret Edwards, 33. She filed the suit in December 1960, claiming the child was conceived July 31, 1960, when Kirkland was a player with the San Francisco Giants.

The boy was born May 16, 1961. Judge Clarence Morris ordered Kirkland to continue paying temporary child support of \$100 a month until permanent settlement is reached next Thursday.
