ROSS TRYING TO FIT PIECES TOGETHER

FREMONT - Fremont Ross did not have to scour the school to get athletes interested in playing basketball.

More than 50 players tried out for to play for the program.

That is great news for longtime coach Mark Gedeon and his staff on one hand, but having so many players does have its drawbacks.

"It also set us back a little bit too in terms of these other programs, from Day 1, they're adding stuff to what they had in place in the summer," Gedeon said. "We did a lot of reteaching at the beginning. It's a work in progress, and it has to come together real quick. It doesn't leave us much time."

As practice got into full swing, the Little Giants were much like a puzzle. Plenty of pieces capable of fitting in various places. But this puzzle doesn't come with a picture on the box to show what it's supposed to look like.

"We're still trying to find a little bit of an identity right now," Gedeon

said. "I do think we have some versatility. We're still trying to figure out what our strengths are going to be. Are we going to be an up-tempo team, are we a half-court team? Are we going to be a pressing team or an inside-outside

team?"

However the puzzle ends up, Gedeon went on to say he believes senior forward Steven Blodgett will be at the center of it. A season ago, the 6-foot-6

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post player averaged 5.1 points and 5.2 rebounds per game.

"(Blodgett) is definitely going to be a focal point of what we want to get accomplished on the floor," Gedeon said. "We saw in our first scrimmage that a lot of things can feed off his presence whether he has the ball in his hands as a scorer or as a distributor or just his presence allows our shooters or driving lanes to be open."

Also returning from last season are seniors Tavarius Simms (5.1 points, 5.7 rebounds per game), Brody Chudzinski (5.5 points), Jarren Hampton and JaVonte Garza. Ross went 8-16 last season.

Ross also is expecting major contributions from senior Jermani Holmer, junior Brandon Trolie and junior point guard Taylor Druckenmiller.

"You look up the definition of a gym rat, and Taylor is it," Gedeon said. "He just loves to play basketball, loves the game. I think any coach would be excited to coach somebody with his passion for the game of basketball and really wanting to do things right."

After a sixth-place finish with a 4-10 record in the Three Rivers Athletic

Conference, Ross knows contending for a championship will be a challenge. But the Little Giants do expect to be competitive.

"We know it's great competition, but our kids have seen and been ex-

posed to great competition," Gedeon said. "We know if we do things together as a team, hopefully that can offset some of the great individual talents we see in our league."

Ross ready for opener

1st game will be Friday
after two cancellations

FREMONT - After safety concerns over a Nov. 20 altercation canceled two boys basketball games and a swim meet, all against rival Sandusky, the Fremont Ross boys basketball team is looking forward to playing its first game of the season Friday night.

The original home opener, scheduled

for Nov. 27 against Sandusky High, was postponed until Tuesday, and was canceled once again after school officials and Fremont police decided the safety of students, parents and the community was threatened.

The safety concerns stemmed from a fight between groups of young adults from Fremont and Sandusky at the Nov. 20 Ross girls basketball game. Police were dispatched to the school around 9:20 that night, and according to an incident report, four officers monitored a large crowd as it was dispersing after the game.

No arrests were made, but when the boys teams were scheduled to play Nov. 27, threats were made and officials canceled the game, and later canceled the rescheduled game. Police and school officials did not reveal the source or nature of the threats.

The basketball teams have been caught in the middle, meanwhile, and the Little Giants are ready to get their season started.

"It's been an emotional roller coaster," Ross coach Mark Gedeon said. "No question our kids wanted to play and Sandusky kids wanted to play. We've been working hard all summer and fall. It's a special rivalry for both sides."

Gedeon hopes to play the next regularly scheduled game against the Blue Streaks, scheduled for Jan. 23 in Sandusky, but understands that there are safety protocols in place.

"We take threats very seriously and we trust those same steps will be taken

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before we play them," Gedeon said.

Despite the threat of violence that surfaced before the Ross-Sandusky games, Fremont District Superintendent Traci McCaudy said Thursday that security for school sporting events will not be increased. She said there are no problems between Ross and any other teams, and that the number of security personnel is determined by the size of the crowd expected.

McCaudy said she thought she had resolved the situation after sending letters to four men allegedly involved in the Nov. 20 fight, barring them from school property.

The letters were dated November 24 and were hand-delivered by Fremont police to three Fremont residents, Tyrese Fisher, age unknown, James Jackson, 19, and Howard Chapman, age unknown, and sent by certified mail to Scottie Palmer, 18, of Sandusky.

In the letter, McCaudy informed each individual that "because of your behavior you are being ordered to stay off school property at all times ... If you are found to be in any building or on lands of Fremont City Schools, legal actions will be taken."

McCaudy said Thursday that these were the only four involved.

"It will be just these four (barred) at this time. They were the four involved in the Nov. 20 altercation," she said. "I am confident the police department will come to a resolution on this matter."

McCaudy stressed that none of the young adults involved is a student at Ross or Sandusky High.

While it is unclear how authorities became aware of the threats, a review of Palmer's Facebook page showed a message posted on the account Tuesday saying, "Why Fremont School Just Called Me An Said The Game Was Cancelled.... Hahhahaha soo funny."

Two of the other men alleged involved in the Nov. 20 altercation have criminal records.

Chapman was sentenced to three years of community control, or probation, after pleading guilty to burglary charges on July 31.

Jackson pleaded guilty to disorderly conduct at Ross High in 2014 and was given a year's probation and 20 hours of community service.

Fremont Interim Police Chief Jim White said detectives are investigating the incident and that it was not the first time a group of young adults from Fremont and Sandusky have been involved in an altercation.

"We had problems in the summer with a group in Fremont and Sandusky at the biker club (Knight Riders Motorcycle Club) on Adams Street and Bidwell Avenue," White said Tuesday.

Fremont police were dispatched to the club June 5 for reports of a large fight with gunshots fired in the area, a police report said.

The report said Ryan Hollingshead, 18, of Sandusky, was shot in the left cheek with a BB gun. Officers were unable to locate a suspect in the shooting.

White was not available for comment Thursday, but Tuesday he said he is unsure how many people are in each group.

McCaudy said she and White plan to hold a phone conference Friday with Sandusky City Schools Superintendent Eugene Sanders and Sandusky Police Chief John Orzech.

Ross struggles in opening loss

FREMONT - Ross coach Mark Gedeon admitted it was nice for his team to get out and play someone other than each other after the season opener against Sandusky was postponed twice over the last two weeks.

Unfortunately for the Little Giants, the opponent was one of the best teams in Northwest Ohio in Toledo St. John's Jesuit.

Ross scored just two points in the second quarter as the Titans racked up a 52-28 Three Rivers Athletic Conference win on Friday.

"First and foremost, we were facing a very talented team," Gedeon said. "St. John's is outstanding

fundamentally and very well-coached. We had to play well for long stretches in order to be successful and that's hard against them."

The Little Giants (0-1 overall, 0-1 TRAC) trailed 14-7 after one quarter before St. John's (1-1, 1-0) picked up the speed of the game in the sec-

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ond quarter to its liking. The Titans scored the first 12 points of the quarter before Jarren Hampton scored almost five-and-a-half minutes into the quarter.

It didn't deter St. John's, as they scored the next eight points for a 20-2 advantage in the quarter and a 34-9 lead at halftime. Ross had 11 turnovers in the first half.

"We were able to press pretty good and created the fast tempo," SJJ coach Ed Heintschel said. "Ross would probably rather play a slower tempo but we were effective in speeding it up."

The Little Giants scored as many points in the third quarter as they did the entire first half

but the speed of Gabe Kynard and Vincent Williams was too much for Ross. Kynard tallied a game-high 15 points and also pulled down six rebounds while Williams added eight points and five rebounds.

"We got some easy baskets and got it inside well," said Heintschel. "Their defense was tough in all the switching they do but we played well. We pressured the ball and was able to get to the free throw line."

Ross made its first free throw but missed the final six shots at the charity stripe. The Little Giants had 26 turnovers and made 12-of-39 (30.8%) shots.

"We wanted to play different speeds against them but we knew they wanted to pick the speed up," Gedeon said. "We tried to control the tempo but we didn't read and react like we did in practice."

Two minutes into the fourth

quarter, Ross trailed 52-18 but outscored the Titans, 10-0 over the final six minutes of the quarter, including two 3-pointers by Taylor Druckenmiller.

"We definitely were happy with how we ended the game," said Gedeon. "We told Taylor to slow down and relax and he has a smooth shot when he does. We'll take this and build on it. We know we have to execute better but we played with better energy in the fourth quarter."

Kaleb Young topped the Little Giants with eight points. St. John's out-rebounded Ross, 37-26.

Ross returns to action Saturday when they host Clyde for the first time since before "at least 1950," according to Gedeon.

"It'll be fun and it'll be a fun atmosphere," Gedeon said. "The kids want to play in that so it should be a good game."

LITTLE GIANTS BOUNCE BACK FOR 1ST VICTORY

FREMONT - During Saturday's non-league game, it appeared as though Ross was the team that hadn't played the night before against one of the toughest teams in Northwest Ohio. Except they were.

The Little Giants used a renewed energy after Friday's lopsided loss and shot over 50 percent from the field in defeating Clyde 59-46 to improve to 1-1 on the season.

"We wanted to dictate the tempo," said Ross coach Mark Gedeon. "We relaxed in the second half and had some nice assists."

Ross used a 16-8 edge in the third quarter to turn a six-point lead into a 14-point advantage.

"We withstood some Clyde runs and executed like we wanted to," Gedeon said. "It helped to have a game under the lights already and have an extra week of practice than Clyde did."

Clyde coach Lou Garcia noted that adjustments by Gedeon and Ross on Zach Rieman were key in the third quarter. Rieman scored 12 of Clyde's 17 points in the first half, but mustered only two free throws in the third quarter.

"Zach kept us in the game, but they made adjustments to stop him in the second half," Garcia said. "He's a player and he's going to find his ways to score."

Jarren Hampton hit one of his two 3-pointers to put the Little Giants ahead 30-19 early in the third quarter. Later, Brody Chudzinski followed suit for a 37-23 lead.

"The kids were positive in the locker room," Garcia said. "They were OK with the loss even though it hurts. We will keep practicing and improve and get ready for Tiffin Columbian at home on Wednesday."

The Fliers (0-1) couldn't get any offense going throughout the night. They hit just 14-of-39 shots (35.9 percent) and never got within ten points in the fourth quarter. The closest Clyde got was 50-39 after 3-pointers by Conner Long and Seth Hohman.

"We used our offense to create better offense," Gedeon said. "We made the extra pass to get a better shot and our spacing was good. We attacked with a purpose."

Ross got a boost of energy from returning senior Ja-Vonte Garza, who missed Friday's game against Toledo St. John's with a sprained ankle. He scored eight points and

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played energetic defense.

"He's not 100 percent, but he played well," Gedeon said of Garza. "He wasn't able to cut like he normally would, but he used his basketball IQ,

which is high, to create other opportunities to help the team."

Rieman finished with 20 points and 10 rebounds

"We make no excuses whether we win or lose, but the edge to them was because they were a better team than us," Garcia said. "We're still trying to find it as a staff, as we've only been together for 13 days because of the foot-

ball team's run. I'm proud with how they played, though. Ross played well and it could've been a big win for them."

Tavarius Simms led Ross with 17 points and 11 rebounds.

"Tavarius finished well inside," Gedeon said. "He gathered himself and made some big shots for us."

SIMPSON'S 59 BEATS ALL

Little Giants have
no answer to stop
record performance

FREMONT - Xavier Simpson put on a show Tuesday night and the Fremont Ross boys basketball had a front-row seat.

The Lima Senior High School senior guard dropped a school-record 59 points for the Spartans, outscoring the Little Giants by himself, leading his team to a 103-57 win over Ross.

Simpson, who has committed to the University of Michigan, drained 23 field goals, including eight 3-pointers, and hit 5-of-9 free throws to surpass the previous record of 57 points, held by his cousin, Greg.

"I've had nights where I was feeling it, but not like this," said Simpson, who also finished with five steals and four assists. "This was different."

While Simpson went off on his historic night, the Little Giants (1-3 overall, 0-3 Three Rivers Athletic Conference) were left trying to figure out a way to slow him and the rest of the Spartans (2-0, 2-0) down. Making matters more difficult, Ross played without two starters.

Steven Blodgett (ankle) and Brody Chudzinski (concussion) missed the game and their returns are unknown, though Blodgett is expected back sooner than Chudzinski.

"You try picking your poison, he can hurt you in so many different ways," Ross coach Mark Gedeon said of Simpson. "You hope, with a long bus ride and in a different gym maybe he misses some of those shots early, but the way he started off you could tell he was in a special zone there."

Simpson's night started off quickly, draining a pair of 3-pointers in the game's opening 45 seconds as Lima jumped out to an 11-0 start.

Ross managed to climb back within five points midway through the period, but the Spartans not named Simpson also knocked down their shots as Lima connected on 14 3-pointers as a team on the night.

"They can beat you in so many ways, their quickness, their length, their physical strength too," Gedeon said. "It's not like they have any weak

players out there."

Ross trailed 23-11 after the opening quarter and Simpson opened the second period in the same fashion as the first, knocking down a pair of 3-pointers in the opening minute. He went into halftime with 29 points on 11 field goals, including five from long-range, but even then he wasn't thinking about breaking the mark.

"(Not until the) beginning of the third quarter when I was still hitting shots," he said. "At halftime I had 29 I was going to go with the flow for maybe 40, but once I was hitting shots, and I'm glad for the teammates I have because they were telling me when I got 50 then telling me to get

the record."

Another 18 points in the third quarter gave Simpson 47, 10 shy of the record, entering the fourth quarter.

Simpson tied the record on a steal and layup, then broke it a minute later on another layup, sending his teammates into a frenzy on the bench.

"My assistants told me, 'Hey, let him go,' because I was going to pull him out at the end of the third," Lima senior coach Quincey Simpson said.

"He had a special night," he added. "When you get those special nights

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from a player, sometimes you just have to let him go.”

Not to be forgotten, Ross senior Ja-Vonte Garza turned in a fine performance as well, scoring a team-high 22 points, with

three 3-pointers. He continued to be aggressive with the ball, without forcing shots, despite Simpson’s dazzling show on the other end of the floor.

“I thought Ja-Vonte, in the third quarter, re-focused himself very well, came out and had an outstanding quarter there,” Gedeon said. “He played with heart, played with

passion but didn’t force things. He was aggressive and played off their pressure and took whatever opportunities were presented to him.”

Note – The Little Giants filled the void left by the canceled game against Sandusky. Ross will host Holland Springfield at 7 p.m. on Wednesday, Dec. 30.

Ross comes out of gate rusty following break

FREMONT - A step slow on defense. A jump too late in the post. Shots that normally fall refused to do so. It all marred Fremont Ross' first game following a week off due to the holiday break.

The Little Giants came out of the gate slowly Tuesday and never got themselves up to speed in a 69-50 loss to Toledo Start.

"We had to come out with a defensive intensity to take away their outside shooting, we had to make sure we valued the basketball and he had to make sure we boxed out and rebounded," Ross coach Mark Gedeon said. "We actually put on the board 'Don't watch.' Those things, unfortunately, we did not do to the best of our ability tonight."

Ross had won its previous two games prior to Christmas to get back to a .500 record, but Tuesday's loss dropped the Little Giants back down to 3-4 overall.

The holiday break presents coaches and players with a unique challenge each season, and every team responds differently.

"In general, anytime over the holiday break coaches definitely have a lot to do. We have four games over the break and there's a lot of prep time for coaches, but at the same time you have kids switching modes from going from exams to game mode, going on vacation for a few days and coming back."

Tuesday night Ross found itself trailing by just five at halftime, 28-23, but the Spartans jumped out to a fast start in the third quarter. While Ross turned the ball over twice and missed a shot on its first three possessions of the second half, Start had two steals and went 3-for-3 from the field to quickly open up a 34-23 lead. A 3-pointer a short time later gave Start a 9-2 start to the third quarter, prompting a Ross timeout. Start led by as many as 17 in the third quarter before Ross

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trimmed the deficit to 10 entering the fourth.

But hopes of Ross comeback were dashed when Start hit a pair of 3-pointers in the first 90 seconds of the fourth quarter and maintained a lead of 13 points or more the rest of the game.

"It's a team that shoots the 3-point basket well, is aggressive on the offensive glass and a team that will come and press you selectively," Gedeon said of Start. "The things we had to do we didn't do. I think everybody knew that."

Start outrebounded Ross by a 36-24 margin and senior T.J. Munn

grabbed 17 rebounds to go with 14 points for Start (2-5 overall).

Ross, which totaled 16 turnovers, made just one first-half 3-pointer and four from long-range for the night, while Start hit eight from behind the arc.

Jermani Homler led the Little Giants with nine points and a team-high five rebounds. Taylor Druckenmiller and Ja-Vonte Garza each scored eight for Ross and Jarren Hampton added seven.

"They got seven offensive rebounds in the first half and I believe we had seven turnovers that led directly to 12 points," Gedeon said. "When you give team second and third opportunities and take away opportunities for yourself, that's not a good equation."

LITTLE GIANTS PICK UP 1ST TRAC WIN

FREMONT — It's been nearly a month since Brody Chudzinski suffered a concussion. While the discomfort from the injury was bad enough, perhaps more painful for the Fremont Ross senior was having to watch his Little Giants teammates play without him.

But in his second game back in the lineup, and his first game playing extended minutes, Chudzinski and his

team got some pain relief in the form of Ross' first conference victory in a 56-45 win over Oregon Clay.

"I'm getting better every day. Headaches are going away, I'm getting healthier, getting back in shape," said Chudzinski, who was injured Dec. 11 in a loss at Findlay.

"I didn't come to the Lima game, that was tough. I was in bed crying because my mom wouldn't let me leave the house, I wasn't in shape to leave the house, but I wanted to be there with my team," he added.

Without their senior 3-point shooting specialist, Ross struggled to a 2-4 record, including three-straight losses entering Friday night.

Chudzinski hit a pair of 3-pointers against Clay, finishing with eight points, while helping guards Taylor Druckenmiller and Jarren Hampton find lanes to penetrate due to defenses having to respect Chudzinski's shooting ability.

"He's getting his lungs back and

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his legs under him after being out three weeks with the concussion," Ross coach Mark Gedeon said. "He's a key part of us. He's been dressing varsity since his sophomore year here. He's one of the people who spends all his time in the summer in here, a true basketball junkie and he gives a presence on the floor."

Ross took a seven-point lead into half-time then began the second half with one of its best quarters of the season. The Little Giants went on a 7-0 run in the opening 90 seconds on the third quarter to open up a 34-20 lead, forcing Clay to call timeout.

A couple of minutes later Druckenmiller converted on a 3-point play after getting fouled on a layup. With a minute remaining in the third, Druckenmiller found Chudzinski for a 3-pointer and 15-point lead.

"I thought very important was how we started the first and second halves," Gedeon said. "We moved the ball well, we didn't force and we made some plays there. That's something we've struggled with at times, finishing plays, making plays."

Ross needed its comfortable lead in
