Young swimmers shine

Christopher Hoffman won the 200 freestyle, Scott Kosakowski the 200 IM and 500 freestyle, and Keith Wasserman the 50 freestyle and 100 butterfly Tuesday as Ross' boys defeated Port Clinton 136-36.

"I graduated a ton of seniors from last year and we picked up young kids," Little Giants coach Phil Moran said. "We had a lot of (personal best times). That's all you can hope for right now. The kids are still learning."

Brett Foos won the 1-meter diving competition, Graham Moor the 100 freestyle and Collin Michael the 100 breaststroke for the Little Giants.

"The meets are stepping stones for the end of the season," Moran said. "You do some things good and some not so good and then we try to fix it."

"There's a big difference between practice and meets. Sometimes a kid will surprise you."

Luke Kingsborough, TJ Harkness, Moor and Bobby Carnicom won the 200 medley relay, and Hoffman, Kosakowski, Moor and Wasserman captured the 200 freestyle relay. Moor, Wasserman, Hoffman and Carnicom won the 400 freestyle relay.

Kingsborough shaved time to finish second in the 100 butterfly at 1 minute, 8.31 seconds.

"With the young kids, seeing little pieces of the puzzle come into place is good to see," Moran said of his team overall.

Haley Fisher won the 200 freestyle and 100 backstroke, Sammi Miller the 50 and 100 freestyles, and Megan Hawk the 100 butterfly but the Little Giants narrowly fell 94-92.

"Half our team is young," Miller said. "Everybody stepped up. A lot of the team had PRs. When one person gets a good time, everybody else is in a good mood."

Danielle Minier won the 500 freestyle for the Little Giants. She noted an environment Tuesday that saw both sides encouraging teammates as well as opposing swimmers.

"As a team, without the positive attitudes ... it was a relaxing meet and that's why my 500 was a PR (5:39.96)," Minier said. "We build off each other."

Fisher, Laura Duncan, Hawk and Miller won the 200 medley relay while Fisher, Devyn Swigart, Holly Phillips and Hawk took the 200 freestyle relay. Miller, Minier, Alesha Overmyer and Duncan won the 400 freestyle relay.

"Overall, it was a great first home meet," Miller said after the competition had been switched from Port Clinton's pool. "I'm excited to see what we go at the end of the year. The times have been great and we have a lot of potential."

Duncan broke her own school record in the 100 breaststroke Saturday with a best of 1:06.80 to finish third at the Ned Reeb Memorial Invitation at Ohio State. Duncan was also 13th in the 100 butterfly.

Ross finished sixth as a team. Fisher was seventh in the 200 IM and 12th in the 100 breaststroke, Miller was eighth in the 50 freestyle and 10th in the 100

freestyle, and Hawk was 20th in the 200 freestyle and 20th in the 100 freestyle.

Fisher, Duncan, Hawk and Miller were fourth in the 200 medley relay and fifth in the 200 freestyle relay. Minier, Fisher, Phillips and Overmyer were 19th in the 400 freestyle relay.

Kosakowski was 13th in the 500 freestyle, and Kosakowski, Carnicom, Moor and Wasserman were 15th in the 200 freestyle relay and 13th in the 400 freestyle relay for the boys.

Minier sparks Ross to win

FREMONT — Danielle Minier is by no means long when it comes to physical stature.

But what the Fremont Ross senior lacks in length, she more than makes up for with speed and desire. Both were needed in the final leg of the Tuesday's 200-yard freestyle relay.

Entering the water just .07 seconds ahead of Oak Harbor's Allie Dombrowski, Minier swam a split time of 26.07 seconds to edge Dombrowski at the finish and give her relay, which consisted of Alesha Overmyer, Holly Fisher, Holly Phillips and herself, the win.

The Fremont Ross girls topped the Rockets 111-72 in a dual meet at the Hawk-Bucci Natatorium.

On the individual side, Minier won the 500 free (5:43.24) and 100 breaststroke (1:15.29). She also swam anchor on the winning 200 medley relay (1:55.54) with Megan Hawk, Laura Duncan and Sammi Miller.

"We've done a lot of work lately, and tonight all the girls were really pushing

hard for this meet," Minier said. "That 1:15 for me in the 100 breaststroke was a new PR, so I was excited about that."

Minier was the homecoming queen at Ross in the fall, and she's hoping her royal powers will carry over to the pool the rest of the winter. She is yet to make it to state, something Miller, Duncan and Hawk have all accomplished.

Miller won the 200 (2:04.14) and 100 free (54.61) Tuesday. Duncan won the 100 but-

terfly (1:01.27) and 50 free (25.57), while Hawk took second in the 50 free and 100 free.

Winning the 200 individual medley was Haley Fisher. She, Duncan, Hawk and Miller took top honors in the 400 free relay (3:44.76).

It was two other non-winning efforts, though, that stood out to Minier.

"Alesha Overmyer had a random swim tonight in the backstroke and she did really good, swimming a 1:12," she said. "And Emily Moyer was the anchor for the third-place 400 free relay we had, and she passed the opponent next to her to pull out a high finish for us."

On the boys side, Scott Kosakowski was one of three multiple individual winners for the Little Giants, who topped Oak Harbor 111-75.

"I'm liking my year so far, it's looking good," Kosakowski said. "The team seems to be grouping well, we're getting a lot of PRs, and like usual, I'm hoping for better things in the future here as far as districts and the state meet go."

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Swimming

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Kosakowski won the 200 IM (2:16.02) and 500 free in Tuesday's meet. He joined T.J. Harkness, Keith Wasserman and Bobby Carnicom on the winning 200 medley relay. Kosakowski, Wasserman, Christopher Hoffman and Lorenzo Zamora won the 400 free relay.

"Right now, we're doing hard practices, but they don't even feel hard because we're so in shape," Kosakowski said. "This is where a lot of our times are going to drop and where it's going to help the most."

Kosakowski is aiming for a 4:40 in the 500. He won Tuesday with a time of 5:15.46. Behind him in second, sophomore Lorenzo Zamora shaved 20 seconds off of his personal best time, touching at 5:48.39.

"Lorenzo really stepped up in the 500," Ross coach Phil Moran said. "Then I turned right around and threw him on the relay and he swam the anchor for the winning 400 relay."

Wasserman won the 200 free (1:57.42) and 100 fly (1:00.66) for Ross. Carnicom was a winner in the 50 free (23.88) and 100 free (53.16). Brett Foos won the one-meter diving competition with 198.30 points.

Ben Dresser swam a time of 1:03.14 to win the 100 backstroke for the Rockets.

Dresser teamed with Cervantes, Eli Boldt and Ayrton Wiegand for a second-place effort in the 200 medley relay. He, Cervantes, Wiegand and Ian Rhoades were second in the 400 free relay, while individually, Dresser added a second-place swim in 50 freestyle (24.25).

"I'm dropping time and I haven't even tapered yet, just because Michael and the others encourage me so much," Dresser said. "Our relays are really coming along too and we're dropping time in those as well."

Cervantes won the 100 breaststroke, swimming a time of 1:07.49. He added a runner-up finish in the 100 butterfly. Rhoades took second in the 200 free, Boldt in the 200 individual medley and Wiegand was runner-up in the 100 free. On the diving board, Devon Griffin scored 177.05 points to place second.

In the girls meet, Jordan Thorp won the one-meter diving competition with a score of 174.70 and Kaylie Hallett-Szymanski took top honors in the 100 backstroke (1:09.56).

Ross finishes second in home swim meet

FREMONT — A wall-to-wall battle ensued between Ross' Laura Duncan and Sandusky's Taylor Vargo during the 100-yard breaststroke of Saturday's Daniel H. Lease Little Giant Invitational.

Duncan would get good jumps off the wall, but Vargo would catch right back up.

In the end, it was the finish that won out. Vargo swam a winning time of 1:07.64, just beating out Duncan's 1:07.65 in the closest race of a meet that

saw six new event records.

"I usually take out the first 50, but Taylor can bring it back really fast and finish," Duncan said. "I know it's always going to be a good race when I race her. We're good friends, and I think we push each other to be fast."

That swim was the only non-winning effort out of Duncan. Individually, the junior won the 100 butterfly (1:01.56). She also led off the winning 200 freestyle relay with Megan Hawk, Haley Fisher and

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Sammi Miller (1:41.08) and was the second swimmer on the 200 medley relay with the same three that started the day by winning in a new meet record time of 1:51.57.

The Ross girls took second overall (674 points) behind new Three Rivers Athletic Conference rival St. Ursula Academy, which won with a score of 878. Sandusky was third at 482, Brush was fourth with 396.

"We've been having good swims in that relay all year," Duncan said. "So we were excited to break the record. I think it pumped us up for the rest of the meet."

Graham Moor had two second-place swims individually as the Little Giant boys were second (697 points) to St. Francis De Sales (1,265). With 453 points, Sandusky was third and with 264, Tiffin Columbian was fourth.

Moor, a junior, swam a 2:10.82 to finish runner-up to Sandusky's Jack Stauffer in the 200 individual medley. His time of 56.85 in the 100 fly was second to Dan DiSalle of St. Francis.

"I normally go around that time in the IM, so that was nothing I wasn't expecting," Moor said. "And I'm just coming off of being sick, so I'll take those times."

Moor has patiently been waiting his turn at the relays the past few seasons. But with swimmers like Alex Hoffman and Dexter Foos, just to name a few, it made the road a tough go.

"Last year we had some of the fastest swimmers I've seen in quite some time with Alex, Luke (Wilhelm), Eric (Yuhás) and Keith (Wasserman), who is back on again this year," Moor said. "They made it nearly impossible for guys like me to get on it."

"Now that I'm on it, I don't

want to lose that tradition we've had. We want to go as fast as we can, just to make sure no one else on the team can take us off of them."

Moor was the pace-setter for the second-place 400 free relay (3:30.37) with Wasserman, Scott Kosakowski and Chris Hoffman. Moor, Wasserman, Bobby Carnicom and Chris were third in the 200 free relay.

Wasserman took third in the 100 free, while Chris was fifth in both the 50 and 100 free races. Kosakowski had a fourth-place effort in the 500 and Carnicom was fourth in the 50 free.

On the girls side, Haley Fisher won the 200 IM (2:15.24). Miller was second in the 50 and 100 free, while Danielle Minier was second in the 500 and third in 200 free.

Alesha Overmyer touched the wall in third for the breaststroke behind Duncan and Vargo for and fourth in the 100 fly. Haley Fisher and Holly Phillips were third and fourth, respectively, in the 100 backstroke. Hawk was fifth in the 200 free.

"The girls swam great, and I thought we had some really good times," Ross girls coach Tina Moses said. "They're all working really hard right now, and we're doing a lot of yards in practice, so I'm very pleased."

Kortni Lagrou's eighth-place swim in the 500 was a swim that didn't get a lot of attention, but was one that stood out to Moses.

"She's a freshman and this was only the third time she swam it, and she had a considerable time drop," Moses said.

Ross will host Notre Dame Academy and St. John's Jesuit on Tuesday. It'll be Senior Night and a Swim For Life event will be taking place where the two teams will also be raising money for Heartbeat.

Ross sweeps season's final dual meet

FREMONT — Phil Moran had a little spending to do Tuesday night.

Having promised his boys on the Ross swim team that he'd put a dollar down for each toward ice cream if the Little Giants beat Toledo St. John's Jesuit, the coach was forced to pay up when his 'A' 400-yard freestyle relay came through, winning the final race to clinch a 97-92 victory on Senior Night.

It was their first victory over the Titans in more than a decade.

"Food always works when you're working with athletes who are starving," Moran said.

The Little Giant girls completed the Three Rivers Athletic Conference sweep, beating Notre Dame Academy 103-83.

"This was a dual meet to remember for us seniors, and it was cool that both teams won," Ross girls swimmer Sammi Miller said. "Everyone had great swims. It was a great way to finish off the dual season."

The ending only helped build the excitement. Going into the final event tied with St. John's at 87, senior Keith Wasserman got

the 'A' 400 free relay off to a great start, handing it off to Bobby Carnicom with a lead of over three seconds.

"I looked up and I saw the national champions of 1941 banner (hanging at the far end of the pool where the swimmers turn) and that got my engine roaring," Wasserman said. "I wanted to end my senior year with a victory against St. John's."

Scott Kosakowski and Graham Moor did the final two legs. Moor tapped the wall with a winning time of 3:27.27.

Jerrod Simpson and Luke Kingsborough swam a time of 3:51.61 — breaking four minutes for the first time this year — to finish third and clinch the win.

The Little Giants' last known win against the Titans came back in 1998.

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"Usually they hand our butts to us," Wasserman said. "But tonight was the best our team has looked. Everyone was cheering and had fun with it. We came together as a group."

Individually, Wasserman won the 200 and 100 free races. He, Carnicom, Chris Hoffman and Moor won the 200 free relay.

St. John's had a lead until event 14 of the 24 scheduled, when the Little Giants finished one-two-three in the 100 free. Carnicom touched behind Wasserman for second, then Hoffman beat out St. John's Austin Lazenby, 54.38-54.87, for third.

"We really caught them off guard there," Moran said. "That was a 13-3 point jump, which was good for us because we were behind."

Moor won the 100 butterfly for the Little Giants' only other individual win. He was second in the 200 individual medley, while Carnicom was second in the 50 free and Kosakowski was second in the 500 free and 100 backstroke.

Dexter Foos scored 201.50 points to take second in diving.

"It was the first meet we swam all year where the guys actually showed some passion and even showed heart," Moran said. "Which is kind of ironic since we had Heartbeat (of Fremont) here. Maybe they should do that project every meet, because they actually showed some tonight."

Ross showed leadership as well. During the girls' 500, Wasserman and the other seniors took the team into the equipment room for a pep talk.

"We got together and had a team discussion about what we wanted to do," Wasserman said. "We just tried to pump up the kids because it was our last dual meet and we wanted to win."

Aside from it being the final dual meet, it was also Swim For Life night. With help from the high school leadership class taught by Mike Gilbert, the swim program raised money Tuesday for Heartbeat of Fremont.

"We'd been working on it since the beginning of the year," Miller said. "It was a great turnout. I'm excited to see how much we raised. It was a lot of hard work."

Miller showed plenty of effort in the pool, too. She won the 50 and 100 free events, individually, and teamed with Megan Hawk, Alesha Overmyer and Danielle Minier to win the 200 free relay. Miller, Hawk, Haley Fisher and Laura Duncan won the 400 free relay.

"I had a PR in my 100 (53.74), so that was probably my best swim," Miller said. "But I'm excited for the end of the year. If we have times like we had tonight, we're going to really do well."

Holly Phillips, Duncan, Haley Fisher and Minier won the 200 medley relay. Duncan won the 100 fly (59.94) and 100 breaststroke, Minier the 500, Hawk the 200 free and Fisher won the 100 back.

Overmyer was second in the 100 fly and third in the 200 free, while Fisher and Minier were second and third respectively in the 200 IM. Phillips took second in the 100 back and third in the 100 fly and Hawk was runner-up in the 100 free.

"The girls were so excited for this meet," Little Giants girls coach Tina Moses said. "We had really good times for this time of year."

Ross swimmers get tune up for sectionals

CLINTON—Ross swimmer Keith Wasserman is grateful February is here.

January put his physical limits to the test.

But the goal for all the grueling practices, and hard work is coming into sight. And it began after Saturday's Ken Gipe Relays.

Next Saturday is the Division I sectionals. But that's next week.

This Saturday at Port Clinton High School was all about having fun and letting loose. And Wasserman and his

teammates did just that at the meet with an all relay format, while keeping their competitive muscles stretched and limber at the same time.

Wasserman swam the opening leg of Ross' winning 400 freestyle relay and the second-place 850 crescendo relay, as the Little Giants won the meet with a team total of 76 points. St. John's Jesuit was second at 68.

Wasserman was joined by Bobby Carnicom, Christopher Hoffman and Graham Moor on the first-place 400 free relay, that topped the team from

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St. John's by over five seconds. Collin Michael, Scott Kosakowski and Moor made up the rest of the crescendo relay team.

"This is the meet where I just like to feel the water and get my stroke where I want it," Wasserman said. "But this is the relaxing point for us until we get to districts. It's a stress reliever. Just a meet to have fun."

The Little Giant's crescendo relay of Sammi Miller, Megan Hawk, Alesha Overmyer and Laura Duncan were one of two winning relays for the Ross girls who were second (50 points) to Notre Dame Academy (68 points).

Haley Fisher, Danielle Minier and Laura Duncan won the 300 individual medley, topping the second-place Lewis Center Olentangy team by nearly 10 seconds.

On the boys side, Ross got another win from Luke Kingsborough, TJ Harkness, Hoffman and Joshua Eakin in the 200 medley relay. Brett Foos won the diving event.

"We always try to have fun at this meet, and usually we'll stack a few relays, while the rest we just have fun with," Wasserman said. "But right now we're really starting to slow down. We're still going to work hard, just not as much as we've been."

Earning runners-up in the 200 fly-breast relay was Holly Phillips, Minier, Emily Moyer and Fisher. Hawk, Phillips, Overmyer and Miller took second in the 400 free relay. Other placers on the girls side were Holly Fisher, Valerie Bixler, Moyer and Alyssa Schwochow who were sixth in the 200 medley relay.

Finishing third in the 300 IM relay for the boys were Nick Hoffman, Lorenzo Zamora, Jer-

rod Simpson and Michael. Simpson, Carnicom, Kosakowski and Zamora were third to the wall in the 200 backstroke relay. Taking fourth in the 200 fly-breast relay for the Little Giants were Nick Hoffman, Harkness, Kingsborough and Eakin.

Joe Meyer, Jacob Berryman, Braydn Klein and Ty Wilson were fifth in the 200 underwater-free relay.

Lack of entry spots meant Saturday was the end of the year for some Little Giants. For Wasserman, it's just the start of a journey he hopes will end with him heading to Canton again after districts in three weeks.

He knows his two relays are already going to Bowling Green State University for the district meet thanks to the new system Division I uses. The top 24 times in each event around the state automatically qualify to the district level.

And in another week, he will taper, finally.

"Hopefully morning practices end soon," Wasserman said. "We need to rest. But I think we'll taper pretty well this year. We had coach for the whole season this time and we lost him for a little bit last year."

Oak Harbor's Tyler Johnson, Tony Dicesare, Curtis Priesman and Ian Rhoades took fifth in the 850 crescendo relay as the Rocket boys were fifth with 26 points. Johnson, Dicesare, Michael LaFountain and Zach Seaman were fifth in the 400 free relay.

Tracey Hanf, Elyse Hablitzal, Nikki Wilhelm and Brooke Tice were third in the 200 backstroke relay as the Oak Harbor girls were tied for eighth at 22 points.

Hablitzal, Wilhelm and Kaylie Hallett-Szymanski were fifth in the 300 IM relay.
