Turnovers can kill a basketball team.

The Fremont Ross girls learned that Saturday in their season opener after Bellevue forced the Little Giants into 31 miscues en route to a 55-40 decision in Bellevue.

The victory lifts the Redmen to 2-0.

Alisa Raifsnider scored 20 points to lead Bellevue to the victory. Using full-court pressure, the Redmen outscored the Little Giants 31-19 in the second half after leading 24-20 at the intermission.

Amy Schepflin had 10 points for Ross and Shelley Hetrick added nine. Kim Zelms had nine for Bellevue.

The Little Giants were led by Shelley Hetrick, who scored 10 points. Amy Schepflin added eight, and Shannon Watts and Cindy Laird both had six.

Ross suffered from poor shooting, hitting only 28 percent from the field.

Macomber tops Ross

Ross was its own worst enemy Thursday as Toledo Macomber rolled to a 43-29 victory in the Little Giants' home opener.

The defeat dropped Ross to 0-3 while the Lady Macs picked up win number four against no losses.

"If we got rid of the dumb turnovers, we would have been in the game," Ross Coach Sue Wolf said.

Ross committed 35 turnovers, 14 of them in the first eight minutes. The turnovers helped erase a 48-20 rebounding advantage Ross had against the bigger Lady Macs.

"We did," Wolf said, "get into our offense. We had not been able to do that in the other two games because of turnovers."

Ross led twice — 3-2 and 5-4 before Macomber, with Kim Hutchens scored six points, outscored the Little Giants 10-1 in the last four minutes of the first quarter to take charge of the game.

Macomber built the lead to 22-9 and it never got below 10 after that.

Amy Schepflin had 12 points and 15 rebounds for Ross.

"I could not ask her to do anything more," Wolf said about Schepflin, a six-foot senior. "She helping bring the ball upcourt

and getting the girls into the offense. She showed good leadership."

Hutchens led Macomber with 13 points and 6-2 freshman Sha-Ronda Purley came off the bench to score 10.

Shelly Hetrick added seven for Ross with Shannon Watts and Cindy Laird getting five apiece.

Ross made 12 of 46 shots and Macomber 19 of 46.

In the junior varsity game, Ross raised its record to 3-0 with a 31-26 victory. Joy Eishen had eight points and Shari Root seven for Ross.

Saturday, Ross travels to Newark in the Buckeye Central Conference opener.

Pressure defense, balanced scoring and strong rebounding are the ingredients for a blow-out.

At least they were for the St. Joseph Central Catholic girls basketball team in its Midland Athletic League opener against Hopewell-Loudon Thursday night.

"(St. Joe) played that pressure defense and we never got into our offense," said Hopewell Coach Jim Dillard. "I thought they really played well. We knew coming in they would be the team to beat."

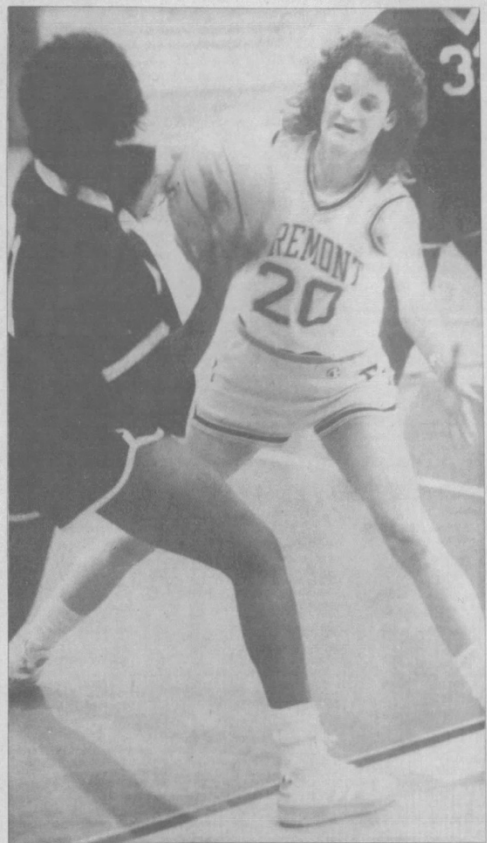
"If they play that good, or even half that good, they will be awfully tough to beat the rest of the way."

Geller said the Crimson Streaks executed the game plan to perfection.

"It feels good to be able to pick up on what they did and make it work for you," he said. "We knew we had to prevent Ar-bogast (Hopewell's Wanda) from shooting the outside shot and keep their big people off the boards."

"We did an excellent job stopping the outside shot. The pressure on (Hopewell) at the guard position really hurt them. Gonya, (Tracy) Overmyer, (Teresa) Reardon, (Maureen) Barry and (Amy) Kramer really did a nice job."

And although Stephanie Dutcher and Lisa Reinhart (the big people Geller talked about) had 14 of Hopewell's 22 rebounds, they scored just six and three points respectively.

The Fremont Ross girls basketball team took advantage of inexperienced team to win its first high school girls basketball game of the season 63-36 Thursday.

"We played pretty well our last game, and we turned things around this game," Ross Coach Sue Wolf said.

"We missed some easy shots, but we made more easy ones than we usually do." Wolf said the Giants' heavy schedule hurt the team early in the season.

Mattox gets 34; PC ends streak

PORT CLINTON — The Port Clinton Redskins painted themselves a victory portrait.

The Redskins made 20 of their 23 field goals on layups and other assorted shots in the paint to brush by Fremont Ross 53-46 Wednesday night in a non-conference girls basketball game.

Jacque Mattox scored a game-high 34 points, 21 in the first half, to lead the Redskins to their third straight victory and their first win over the Little Giants since 1973.

"Obviously, we got the shots we wanted, especially in the first half," said Port Clinton Coach Doug Armstrong, his team now 3-2. "What we have to do now is learn to play with a lead. We lost some intensity in the second half and let them back in the game."

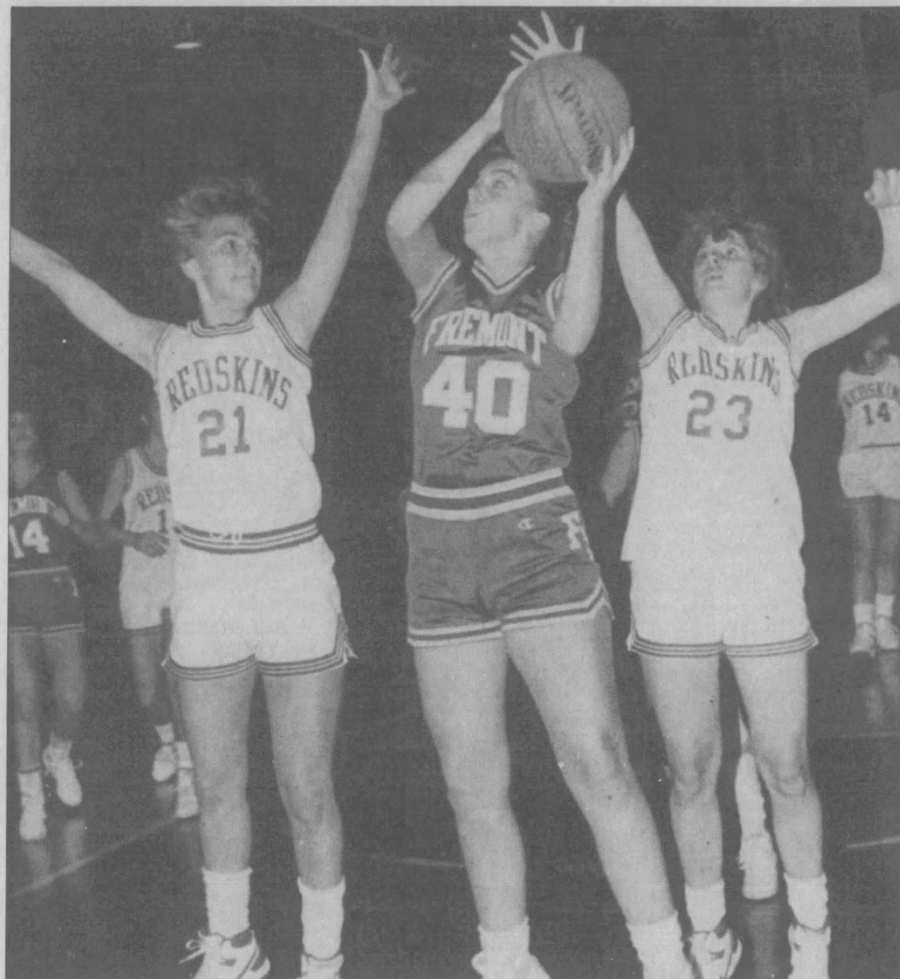
The Redskins built a 31-13 half-time lead, mainly by picking up easy baskets off their 2-2-1 full court press and by picking through Ross pressure for other uncontested shots.

Mattox scored both ways. She had five steals to set up seven of her points, and was the recipient of numerous lob passes from guards Jennifer Heigel and Jodi Fall to set up another eight points. Heigel scored the other 10 in the half and finished with 13.

But the Little Giants, who trailed by as many as 19, managed to make things close by settling down and running their offense. They scored the last six points of the third quarter and the first six of the fourth get within four 42-38 with 6:18 to play. Lela Dorsey and Amy Schepflin had four each in that stretch.

Sandi Brough broke the string with two free throws and Mattox broke loose for a pair of short baskets to bring the lead back to 10. Ross came no closer until the final count.

"When we ran our offense and did what we were supposed to, we were able to get back in it,"

said Ross Coach Sue Wolf. "In the first half, I had to ask our girls what game we were playing so I knew what to coach. I don't know what we were doing."

What the Little Giants were doing was playing Port Clinton's game.

"That's the first time we ever

ran a press, and it worked well for us," Armstrong said. "We got them (Ross) to play the way we wanted to and I think it was the difference."

Despite the many easy shots, Port Clinton was just 23 of 59 from the field for 39 percent, and only 9-for-31 in the second half.

"That doesn't surprise me. We missed a lot of easy shots," Armstrong said.

Ross, which fell to 1-6, missed easy and hard ones alike. They finished 17 of 60 from the floor for 28 percent and had 22 turnovers. Schepflin led the Giants with 17 points and Dorsey added 10.

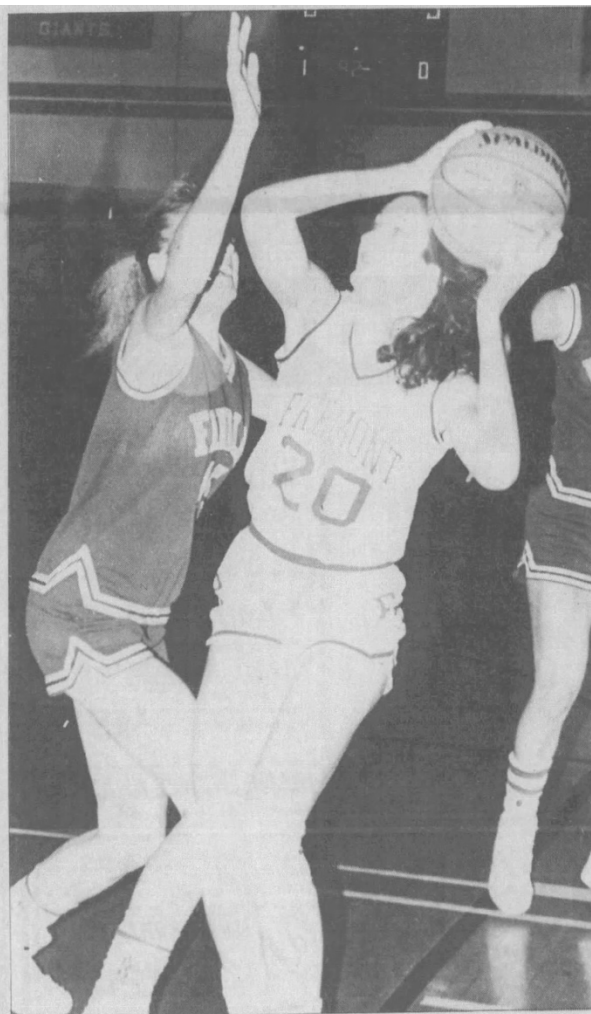
