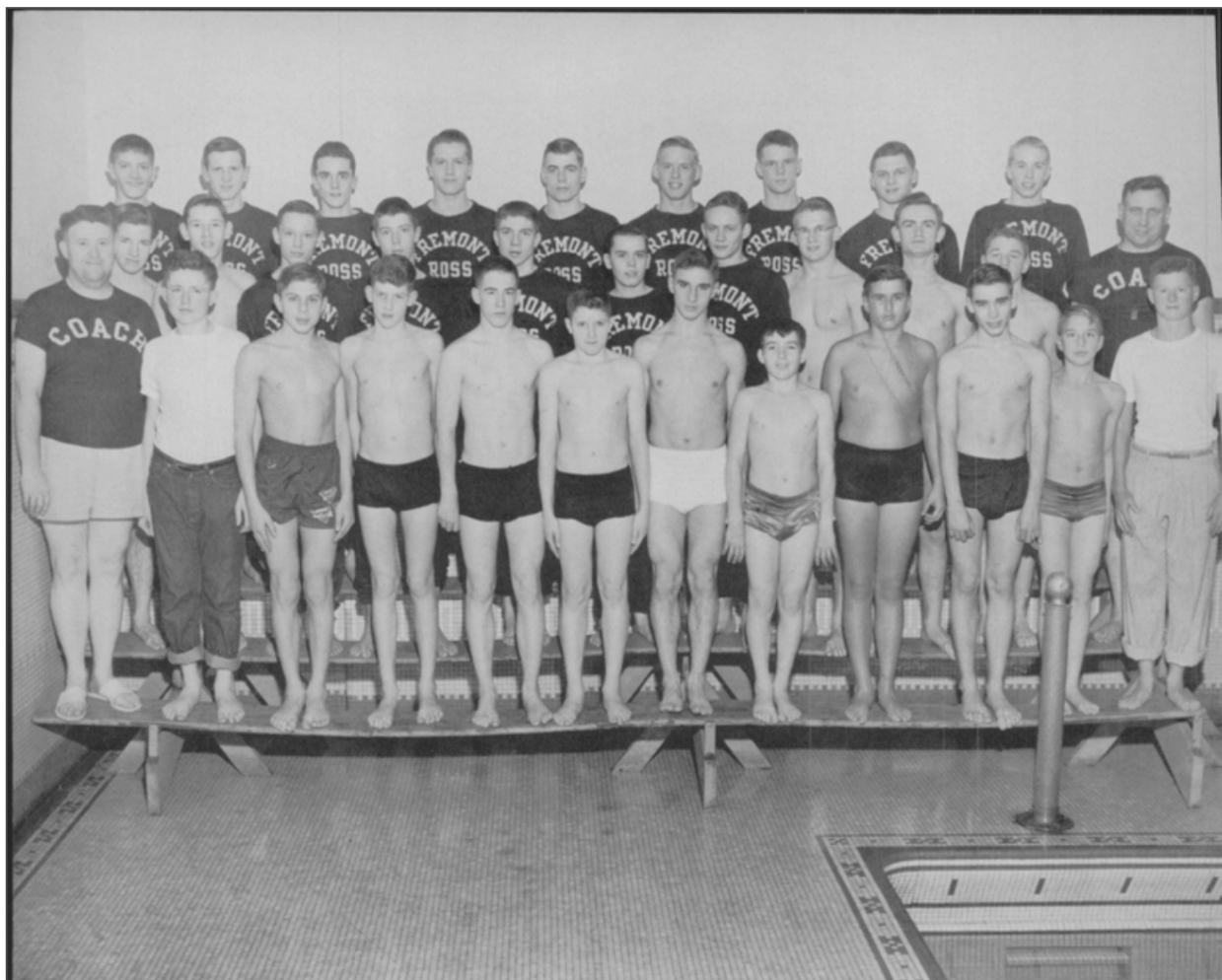

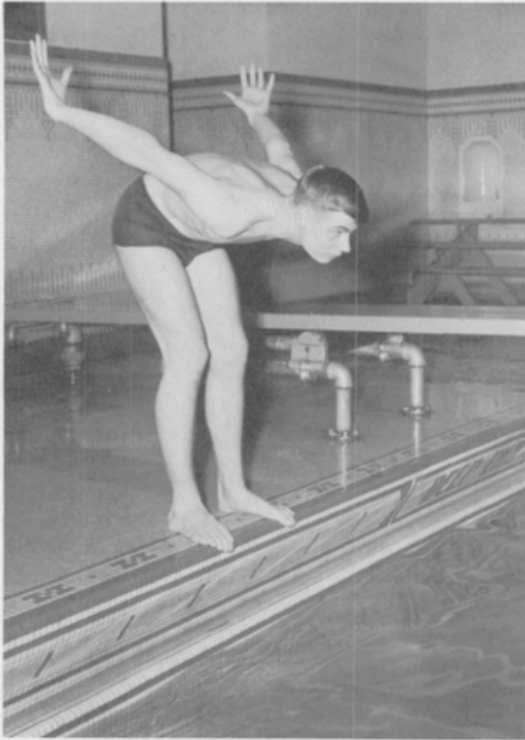

VARSITY SWIMMING...

Fremont's swimming squad opened their 1954-55 season by traveling to Sandusky January 13 where they were defeated by the Blue Streaks 51-24. The Little Giants were at home for their next two meets. January 20 Ross played host to Toledo Y copping their first victory by defeating the Y 39-36. Fremont took firsts in the diving, both relays, and the 100 yd. backstroke. The Little Giants again played the role of the host by enter-

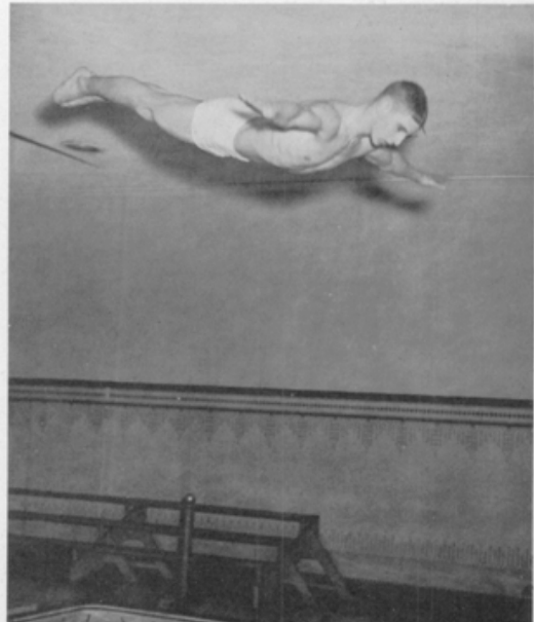
taining Western Reserve Academy January 22. Western Reserve won the meet 47-28. January 27 Sandusky came to Fremont and defeated the Ross tankers 50-25. Fremont won firsts in the 50 yd. free style, 100 yd. free style, and the 100 yd. backstroke. February 4 Shaker Heights came to Fremont and left with a 51-24 victory over the Little Giants. Charles Hull broke the school record in the 100 yd. free style. The new record was 55.5.

THE SWIMMING SEASON . . .



Charles Hull was captain of this year's swimming team, in addition to being one of the outstanding swimmers in the history of Ross High. He set a new school record in the 100 yard free style by first swimming it in 55.5 seconds, and then breaking his own record twice. His best time for the year was 55.1 seconds. He placed first in the district meet in the 50 and 100 yard free style. He placed second in the state meet in the 50 yard free style, and third in the 100 yard free style, with times of 24.6 seconds and 55.1 seconds.

Jim Weaver, this year's state champion diver, is the first Ross diver to win the state diving title since 1942. Jim was undefeated in dual meet competition and was 2nd in the Bowling Green Relays, losing to a Michigan diver. He also placed first in the district meet. Jim's margin of victory at the state meet was .15 of a point over second place and .45 of a point over third place.

Corthell Ties Pool Record

SANDUSKY — Sandusky high school's swimmers won their third straight victory and boomed their state championship hopes with a smashing 54-21 victory over the Fremont Ross Little Giants here Thursday night. It was Fremont's opener.

The well-balanced Blue Streaks took seven firsts in inflicting the worst defeat on the Little Giants in many years. The score is the largest ever made by Sandusky against Fremont.

A classy back-stroker, Bob Corthell, and a top-notch free-styler, Charles Hull, were the only Fremonters able to win a race. Corthell tied a Sandusky pool record when he turned in the time of 1:04.6 for 100 yards. The mark was first set in 1940 by Sandusky's Hedges.

Sandusky's swift medley relayers, Lehrer, Rehfuß and Ben Lauber, established a new pool record with the time of 1:44.7.

Hull, after being nosed out by Murschel in the 40-yard free-style, came back to win the 100.

Fremont will stage its first home match next Thursday night against the Toledo Y. M. C. A.

Winning three of the last four events, the Ross high school swimming team came from behind to edge Toledo Y. M. C. A., 39-36, in the local pool last night. The Fremonters return to action Saturday at 2:30, meeting Western Reserve Academy.

The Toledoans brought a potent one-two punch here in Chet Jastremski and Jerry Lemke, but after the individual free-style events, the Fremonters got into high gear.

Ross needed to win both relays to pull the meet out of the fire, and the Little Giants took both races with plenty to spare.

Freshman Aids Win

Norman Kroh, David Carl (a freshman) and Bob Corthell won the 150-yard medley relay with plenty to spare, then the quartet of Dick Sabroske, Bob Agee, Tom Hite and Jack Balsizer romped home to win easily in the 200-yard free-style relay.

Jim Weaver contributed an important victory when he won the diving event over Tom Blair, who was fourth in the state as a member of the Akron South squad last season. Myers' victory meant the Little Giants still had an outside chance if they could win either the individual or relay in the medley and the relays.

Until Weaver's victory, the only Ross first was hard-working Corthell's back-stroke triumph.

In the closest race of the night, Jastremski, a high school freshman, nipped Charles Hull in the 100-yard free-style.

"You can't kick when they show improvement." George Gruse said of his Ross high school swimmers after their 50-25 loss to Sandusky's veteran squad Thursday night in the Ross pool.

Although the Little Giants went down to their third defeat in four matches, they put up a better battle than when they were trounced by the same team in the opener. They also did better, said Gruse, than in their meet with Western Reserve Academy last week.

Brilliant Ben Lauber, state champion in the medley, spearheaded the Blue Streaks. He won the 200-yard free-style, pulling away from teammate Dave Ortman in the last 25 yards, then came back to cop the medley, an event in which a swimmer goes 25 yards back-stroke, 25 yards breast-stroke and 25 yards free-style.

Hull Wins Two Events

Fremont's points were compiled by veterans. Charlie Hull raced to victory in two free-style events, the 50 and the 100; Bob Corthell copped the back-stroke and Jim Weaver came through in the fancy diving.

Hull edged Sandusky's Paul Murschel in a thrilling 50-yard race, the first of the night, giving Ross a short-lived 6-3 lead in the match as Corthell placed third. Hull trailed by a hand-length until the last three yards, when he touched out Murschel.

Corthell grabbed the lead and held it against Sandusky's Lehren in the 100-yard back-stroke. Hull then came back to take the 100 and Weaver edged Sandusky's Alan Routh in diving. Routh was runner-up for the state title last year, so Weaver's triumph puts him in the picture in the 1955 state championships.

Ross high's next meet is with the 1954 state champion, Shaker Heights, in the local pool next Friday, Feb. 4.

Ross high school's swimmers face rugged competition in successive days beginning Friday.

George Gruse's tankers, who have lost three of four outings, face the defending state champions, Shaker Heights, here Friday. On Saturday, they go to Bowling Green State University for the annual relays sponsored by the university.

Friday's meet with the Red Raiders will start at 3:45 p.m. Originally, Gruse announced the meet for 7 o'clock, but the visitors prefer the earlier starting time.

Shaker Heights has lost one decision, that to Sandusky, a team which owns two victories over Fremont. Gruse is making no predictions, but he sees a good chance of upsetting the Red Raiders.

Seven In Relays

The B.G.U. meet will present seven high school teams. It's the ninth annual relays, with the first event to start at 2 p.m.

In addition to the Little Giants, the participants will be East Grand Rapids, Mich., defending champion; Canton McKinley, Sandusky, Shaker Heights, Cincinnati Walnut Hills and Monroe, Mich., a real classy field.

There will be six events, the 200-yard free-style, 400-yard free-style, 200-yard breast-stroke, 200-yard back stroke, 225-yard individual medley and 150-yard medley. Exhibition diving will also be held but will not count in team points. Medals will be awarded to all members of the first three relay teams in each event.

Newcomer May Help

Gruse's squad has been augmented by the arrival of Bert Lloyd. He moved to Fremont last week from Ashboro, North Carolina.

Lloyd, a junior, once lived in Lakewood, being a member of the junior varsity team. He is a native of Fostoria.

Hull Breaks School Record In 100

Corthell, Weaver Also Nab Firsts

Charles Hull, a senior, owns the Ross high school speed record for the 100-yard free-style event as a result of Friday's swimming match with Shaker Heights.

The defending state champions from the Cleveland area won a 51-24 decision, but the Little Giants' "Big Three" of Hull, Bob Corthell and Jim Weaver again won their specialty events.

Hull, brother of Keith Hull, a Little Giant lineman in football two years ago, swam 100 yards in 55.5 seconds, clipping three-tenths of a second off the record of 55.8 set in 1947 by Bruce Ransom. He also won the 50-yard free-style.

Corthell copped the back-stroke and Weaver won the fancy diving. These two and Hull have scored practically all of Fremont's points this season.

Ross will compete in the Bowling Green State University relays today.
