Girls squad is 'good and solid'

One day stood out particularly well for the Ross girls track team last season. That was the day the Lady Little Giants surprised several by winning the Class AAA Sectional Meet.

That may have been a sign for the 1980 spring. At least listening to Jolyn Smith, the head coach, that triumph in 1979 seemed to be disclosure of the coming season.

"Sure," she said, "we had a good day that day."

What about this year's team?
"Overall," Smith began, "everything is good and solid. The only weakness that we may have, is that we do not have depth in the high jump."

Ross record holder Amy Lindstrom, however, is back for the Lady Little Giants. Smith pointed out that, there are a couple of sophomores that have shown well in practice and could give Ross some unexpected depth at the event.

Laurie Smith, a junior, is back in the shot put. She heaved the iron ball over 37 feet last season and could beat that mark this season.

"We do have some good shot putters," the Ross coach pointed out.

Ross was hurt by three letter winners not coming out this season but with promising sophomores could possibly offset that trio of losses.

Margaret Van Gilder, the school record holder in the discus is back. The senior suffered a knee injury requiring surgery during the basketball season but the knee is reportedly not acting up for her.

Johanna Hawk, a junior letter winner will be functioning in the shot put and the discus.

In the sprints, Ross will have Tonya Tucker back as the central figure. She will be in the 100, 200 and the two relay events. Smith also said that there are some promising sophomore sprinters but did not want to mention them, pointing out that the un-

derclassmen must prove themselves first.

Judy Shetzer and Tammy Haas will be the primary figures in the hurdles and the longer sprints. Haas holds the Ross record in the 400 meter event. Della Hall is also expected to be a moving figure in the sprints for the Lady Little Giants.

In the distance events, Emma Almager and Kim Lenz, a pair of letter winners, will be the leaders for Ross.

"We do have depth in the distance events," Smith insisted, "but we have more depth in the sprints."

"Last year in the sectional," Smith continued, "our depth came through in the sectionals and this year, we have quality and depth. They also have a great attitude and if they keep that, we should be able to finish high (in the Buckeye Conference meet)."

The first meet of the season will be April 2 when Tiffin Columbian comes to Fremont.

Ross High School track team previews

Boys team after the whole 'ball of wax'

Norm Bray's "ball of wax" could turn into a snowball.

"If everything goes right," he hedged Wednesday while skimming over a description of his 1980 edition of the Ross Little Giants boys track team, "we should have a shot at the whole ball of wax."

Meaning, first of all, a strong shot at winning the Buckeye Conference title. Last year, despite compiling the team's first unbeaten (7-0) dual meet season, Ross finished only third in the conference. The Buckeye meet is the beginning of the wax ball.

"If we do well in that," Bray, in his second year as the head coach, said, "we should be strong in the sectional and district."

An advantage the Little Giants will have when it comes to the wax ball is that the May 10 Buckeye Conference meet will be run on the friendly all-weather surface of the Little Giants home track. As a matter of fact, the Ross boys will venture out of Fremont only

once all season and that is to the all-weather track at Lorain.

Bray feels that his team will be strong in the sprints, very representative in the distance events and, outside of the long jump, average in the field events. In the hurdles, Bray's team will have to develop some depth.

Two lettermen plus unproven sophomore Sam Lindsey and senior Brian Whatley are the primary sprinters. Curtis Lee, a junior, and Willie Gentry, a two-year letterman, are the veteran sprinters.

"Our distance events will be much improved," Bray said while pointing out another two-year letterman Mike Martin. A senior, Martin is especially strong in the 800.

Another senior letterman, Rob Zoller will be a factor in the 1,600-meter run. A pair of sophomores, Jeff Slaughter and Dwayne Endicott, will give the Little Giants strength in the 1,600 and 1,200 runs.

With junior Tom Pendrey along with Gentry

and promising sophomore Tony Gant, Bray can be excused for smiling broadly when talking about the long jump. Pendrey is a 22-foot jumper while Gentry has been over 21.

Gant cleared over 20 as a freshman.

In the hurdles event, lettermen Greg Brown and Hank Davis are expected to be the primary hopes with Pendrey and Gant getting a shot at working into the events. The latter two will have their first exposure in competition April 2, when Ross hosts Tiffin Columbian in the season lifeline.

Outside of the long jump, Dennis Murray in the discus offers the strongest hope for Ross.

As a sophomore, he hurdled the platter 138 feet.

"They (field events) will be just average," Bray admitted again but added, "until we can get to working with them."

By that, he meant getting the untied competitors experience.

Girls track roundup

Ross girls set four records

Ross's girls team set four school or field records while rolling over Tiffin Columbian 87-27 Tuesday at the Ross track.

The records were evenly divided — two in the field events and two others in the running part of the dual meet.

Judy Shetzer shattered the long jump mark for the field as well as the school. The Ross senior soared 16-8, two and one-half inches better than Jodi Price's school and field mark set in 1979.

Laurie Smith sailed the discus 109-4 for a new field mark. The old mark of 105-5 was set in 1979 by Margaret Van Gilder.

Joan Osmon claimed a new mark in the 800-meter run, clipping off the distance in 2:39.09. The old field mark of 2:37.1 was set by Julie Etherington of Sandusky last season.

Tammy Haas was the only double winner

for Ross, capturing the 100-meter hurdles and the 200-meter dash.

In other girls meets, Clyde opened with a win, stopping Perkins 67-34; Lakota routed Elmwood 81-29 and Woodmore tripped Genoa 67-43.

Mary Garvin won the 1600 and 800-meter runs to pace Clyde to the opening victory. Garvin recorded a 5:49.4 in the 1600 and posted a 2:36.5 in the shorter race.

The Fireflies won all relays, taking the 400 relay in 54.9, the 3200 in 10:56.6, the 800 in 1:59.8 and the 1600 in 4:45.0.

Martha Sampson won two events and anchored a winning relay team for Genoa but Woodmore's depth swept the Wildcats to the win. Sampson won the 100 and 200-meter dashes and ran on the winning 400-meter relay team.

Amy Damachroder won the 800 while also running on Woodmore's winning 3200 and 1600-meter relay team. Patti Kontak won the hurdles and took second in the high jump for the Wildcats.

Barb Lentz won the discus and shot put events for Genoa.

Diane Dennis and Jackie Holman set records in Lakota's easy win. Dennis flung the discus 116-feet to break Chris Jeffer's school mark set in 1977 by four and one-half inches.

Holman high jumped 5-1½ to break her own mark of five-foot set in 1979. She also won the long jump in the Tuesday meet.

Nancy Wonderly won the hurdles and 100-yard dash for the Raiders while Barb Wildman took the mile and half-mile races, also for Lakota.

Columbian stops Little Giants

Tony Gant came within one inch of tying a 24-year-old Ross long jump record and Greg Brown equaled last season's personal best in the high hurdles but Tiffin Columbian ended Ross's seven-meet win streak Tuesday in boys high school track.

The Tornadoes piled up 10 first places while swapping the Little Giants 81-46 in the dual meet. It was the first loss for Ross over two seasons.

Gant, a sophomore, cleared 22-7 in winning the long jump. That was just short of the legendary Jim

Tiller's mark set in 1956. It was a new field mark for the 2-year-old Ross all-weather facility.

Brown recorded a 15.1 in the 110-meter high hurdles, a time that equaled his 1979 season best.

Columbian, however, led by the four-first place show of speedster Larry Peck, pranced to the win. Peck won the 100, 400 and 200-meter dashes and ran a leg of the winning 1600-meter relay.

The Little Giants picked up other firsts in the 400-meter relay with the team of Willie Gentry, Gant,

Tom Pendrey and Curtis Lee; Mike Martin with a 2:06.07 in the 800; and Dennis Murray in the discus with a toss of 129-9½.

In other boys meets, Lakota storied to a 113-31 walkaway over Elmwood and Genoa stopped Woodmore 86½-49½. Clyde defeated Perkins 85-40 but no results were available.

Arnold Scherger tied his own Lakota school records in the 120-yard high hurdles and the 330-yard lows. He ran the former in 14.8 and took the latter in 41.6.

Scherger also won the 100-

meter dash and the 220.

The only event that the Raiders did not take a first in was the mile run.

Mike Hoffman won the discus and shot put while Roger Hoffman tied for first in the high jump and won the triple jump.

Bob Claus paced Genoa to its victory over Woodmore. Claus won the high hurdles, finished second in the lows and ran on the winning 400 and 1600-meter relay teams.

Mark Nedelco was a double winner for Woodmore, taking the 1600 and 3200 meter runs.

Whitmer slips past Ross 71-64

Whitmer used a pair of sweeps in the distance events along with top two finishes in three other events to offset 10 Ross firsts to win a 71-64 verdict over the Little Giants in boys high school track Thursday.

The Panthers swept the first three spots in the 1600 and 3200 meter runs. Bob Paisie won the 1600 and finished second in the 3200 for Whitmer. Larry Siegfried won the longer race.

Whitmer took first and second in the shot put, discus and pole vault.

Greg Brown and Willie Gentry had a pair of first places for the Little Giants with Tony Gant winning once and running on two winning relays. Gentry made it three first places with a leg winning 400 meter relay along with a second in the long jump.

Brown took the high and low hurdles with Gentry winning the 100 and 200 meter dashes as well as

being on the 400 relay. Gentry was second behind Gant in the long jump. Gant soared 21-6, 11 inches ahead of Gentry.

Tom Pendrey's third place in the long jump gave the Little Giants one of its two sweeps. Gentry's win in the 100 was followed by teammates Curtiss Lee and Sam Lindsay for the other Ross top three sweep.

In the only other area boys meet, Clyde defeated Margaretta and Norwalk in a triangular. Clyde had 98 to Margaretta's 40 and Norwalk's 20. No individual results, however, were available.

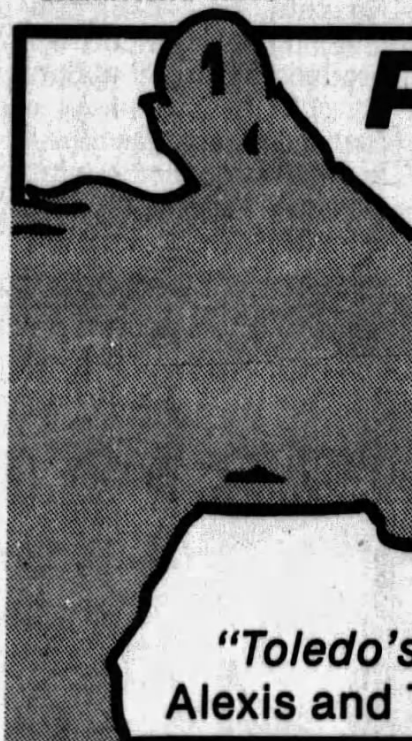

Track roundup

Ross defeats Harding

Ross defeated Marion Harding and a thunder and lightning storm kayoed both teams in high school boys track action Tuesday.

Rain forced the postponement of five other boys meets and four girls meets.

The Little Giants held a 33-21 lead after six events in the meet at the all-weather surface at Ross. The Ross squad swept the high hurdles and long jump and finished one-two in the century dash to record its first triumph of the season.

Greg Brown posted a 16.1 clocking in winning the hurdles. The time was a second off Brown's best time this season, however a strong cross wind hampered all runners. Hank Davis was second to Brown and Wilbur Bartson was third.

Tony Gant won his third consecutive long jump with a leap of 21-8. Willie Gentry was second at 20-11½ and Tom Pendrey cleared 20-10 for third.

Gentry led teammate Curtiss Lee across the line in the 100-meter dash. He was clocked in 11.4 while Lee was two-tenths of a second behind.

Jeff Slaughter was third in the mile for Ross in 4:59.6.

Dennis Murray finished second in the discus and shot put. He hurled the discus a season best 139-6½ and covered 43-6 with the iron ball.

Ross's next meet is Tuesday at Ross against Findlay. The meet begins at 4 p.m.

In other action, Clyde won its fourth meet of the season, taking an abbreviated 68½-37½ win over Bellevue on the Fliers' track. The 200, 3200 and 1600 relay were not run because of the storm.

The Fliers, with Mike Wise claiming two firsts, won eight of the 12 events and tied for first in another. Wise won the 100 and 400-meter dashes, taking the former in 11.6 and the latter in 56 seconds.

Clyde finished one-two in the long jump, the 100, 400 dash and 800-meter run.

Boys meets that were postponed included Genoa at Lake, Woodmore at

Elmwood, Oak Harbor at Gibsonburg, Huron at Margaretta and Old Fort and McComb at Carey. The Huron and Margaretta meet was in progress and will be completed today, weather permitting.

The Genoa at Lakota, Woodmore at Elmwood, Oak Harbor at Gibsonburg and Old Fort, McComb at Carey girls meets were also postponed. In the one meet that was scored, Clyde defeated Bellevue 37-22 in seven events.

Clyde took two of the three completed field events and won two of the running events to give the Fliers the 15-point advantage.

Rhonda Kiesel of Clyde won the long jump with a leap of 15-6½ while Sue Killian, also of Clyde, grabbed the discus with a toss of 92-10.

Other winners for Clyde were Mary Garvin in the 1600 meter run in 6:06 and the two mile relay team of Garvin, Jenny Bible, Maggie Fultz and Trisha Weisheit.

It has not been decided whether the remainder of the meet will be completed.

Gentry's four firsts pace Ross boys win

Willie Gentry grabbed three individual firsts and was part of another to spark the Ross Little Giants to a 82-45 decision over Elyria in a Buckeye Conference track meet Wednesday afternoon.

Gentry took his firsts in the long jump, the 100-meter dash and the 200-meter dash. He was also part of the winning 400-meter relay team along with Greg Brown, Curtiss Lee and Sam Lindsey.

In all Ross had 11 first place finishes and six runnerup spots.

Other first place finishes for the Little Giants were recorded by Mike Mowry in the pole vault, Dennis Murray in the shot put, Greg Brown in the high hurdles, Greg Hedden in the 400-meter dash and Tom Pendrey in the 300-meter low hurdles.

In other area track meets, Gibsonburg remained undefeated by nipping Genoa 69-67, Old Fort whipped Danbury 79-48, Lakota edged Oak Harbor 69-67 in a battle

of unbeaten squads and Woodmore trimmed Otsego 92-44.

Genoa got one more first place finish than Gibsonburg but the Golden Bears relied on their five more second place finishes to defeat the Comets.

Derby darling favored in Preakness run

BALTIMORE (AP) — Genuine Risk, the filly trying to become the first of her sex to win the Kentucky Derby and Preakness, has been picked as the favorite in the second jewel of the Triple Crown.

Earle Hart, who establishes the odds at Pimlico Race Course, Tuesday selected Genuine Risk to go off at 9-5 with the West Coast favorite, Codex, close behind at 2-1.

Colonel Moran, the winner of the Withers Stakes at Aqueduct, was Hart's third choice at 4-1.

Lucky Pluck, meanwhile, became the ninth entry in the May 17 race. Hart made the horse, which is headed from Suffolk Downs to Baltimore, a 20-1 shot. The Michigan-bred gelding, which won Sunday at the Boston track in a six-furlong contest, has won three of 26 starts and has earned \$27,338.

Hart, meanwhile, rationalized Genuine Risk's one loss to Plugged Nickle and Colonel Moran in the Wood Memorial.

"I've got to go with the filly. I think she's done everything," he said. "I don't know anything much about Codex except what I've read about him. But he's won those two big races in California Santa Anita and Hollywood derbies, and he has Angel Cordero on him."

"As for Colonel Moran, I just couldn't put him any closer than third," Hart adds. "I know he finished ahead of the filly in the Wood, but I think she was bothered in that race and would have beaten him."

Jack Klugman, owner of Derby show horse Jaklin Klugman, arrived Tuesday at Pimlico and learned his horse was given 5-1 odds by Hart.

Although he said he was optimistic his horse would do well in the Preakness, he added, "Off the Withers, I think Colonel Moran is a big contender. I think he's the horse to beat."
