## Fremont to Have Full Line of Entries Saturday

Fremont Ross High school's track and field team is geared for action at 2 p. m. Saturday at Harmon Field in its first meet of the year, against Mansfield High's powerhouse.

### Ready To Go

With few good days for open air practice, but after several weeks of indoor work, the Ross tracksters will have a full list of entries for the scheduled 16 events of the meet.

Facing a hard season and with few experienced men, Coach Harold Althoff's aggregation will be placed to a severe test against the Mansfield trackmen.

Fremont will enter two complete set of teams in the 880-yard relay, medley-relay and the mile-relay, the closing event of the meet.

# ROSS HIGH GOES INTO ACTION IN TRACK MEETING

## Coach Whitey Althoff's Boys Have Tough Rival Booked

With cool winds nipping at their heels, Fremont Ross trackmen took to field and track at 2 p. m. Saturday against Mansfield High in the opening dual meet of the year, at Harmon field.

### Battle Strong Team

Coach Whitey Althoff's team in battling against a strong track field was depending on some of the new men added to the squad this year from the lower classes.

Mansfield's team has been one of the most formidable in central and mid-west Ohio areas for a number of years, having won some of the larger meets sponsored by universities in those regions.

Mansfield has developed field events to far greater extent than most high schools, and has added to its total points for deciding points in that branch on several occasions.

Against his strong foe, Coach Althoff had a well balanced team but with much of its talent yet a matter of conjecture. The meet results are expected to show just what strength Fremont possesses and to bolster up any weak places to develop in the 16 scheduled events.

With little outdoor practice behind them, due to nippy breezes and cold days in recent weeks, Coach Althoff's squad will go into action with little but indoor experience for the events.

## Outpoint Little Giants By Capturing In Finals Of Sixteen Events Here

Fox Takes First in Three Contests; Squad Does Well for Little Period of Preparation; Mansfield Wins, 71 to 61

After holding the lead throughout three-fourths of the scheduled track and field events in their dual meet with Mansfield High school, Fremont Ross High yielded their first season's opener, 71 to 61, at Harmon field, Saturday.

Showing strong in the running events, Fremont captured first place in eight of the 16 events, but lagged in field competition, a strong point with Mansfield.

### Ross Does Well

Taking early lead, Fremont was apparently headed to take the meet until Mansfield began to roll up points to close the breach.

With ten events tucked away, the Little Giants lost their lead when points on the medley race put Mansfield ahead, 52 to 48. From that point on, the visitors never trailed.

### Records Intact

Neither Fremont High school nor Harmon field records were endangered by times or results of any of the events.

Due to the chilly winds sweeping the field, the track and fieldmen were at a disadvantage as far as any record-breaking was concerned.

It was the first time the new track, transferred last year from an adjoining field to in front of Harmon stadium, was in use.

When you take into account the fact that Fremont was without the service of track facilities last year, and that Coach Wilbur Althoff and his boys are starting out from the beginning, you have to give them a lot of credit for their showing against Mansfield.

### Fox Shows Well

Pete Fox capped first in the shot-put, 120-low hurdles, and high jump for Fremont.

Joe Lewis, well built Negro lad, had little trouble to take honors in the 440-yard dash, and broad jump, and lost out by narrow margin in the 100-yard dash, run off in the slow time of 10.7 seconds.

Keller, of the Little Giants, finished easily to take the mile.

Traveling the 200 yards in the low hurdles at fast clip, Spangler, of Fremont, maintained a close advantage over Heiser, of Mansfield, to win in 24.4 seconds. The hurdles distance was changed last year from the old 220-yards.

Fremont's mile relay team, with Ferguson, Gene Hofelich, Ballard and Dunlap, easily outdistanced Mansfield, in the fair time of 3:47.5. The school record is 3:53.1.

In that event, Wolfe was scratched from the list, his place being taken by Hofelich.

### Two Boys Hurt

Two of Fremont's boys were injured while in events, having effect on the scoring.

Joe Lewis pulled a muscle while rounding the curve on the 220-yard dash, and was forced from the running.

The injury caused him considerable pain at the time, but he expected no ill effects.

Fox bumped his knee in the 120-high hurdles and lost out. He made light of the injury.

The high hurdles are three feet, three inches high, three inches in height having been taken off by the national rules committee last year.

In the only other unexpected difficulty encountered by Fremont, Hofelich was disqualified in the 440-yard dash, when he stepped out of his lane.

### Teams Are Even

Mansfield's medley relay team finished 25 yards in the lead in that event, 13th on the program. Fremont made a cheap sweep in the mile-run, but Mansfield captured all places in the discus and javelin.

With their next home meet not until April 14, when Bellevue and Oak Harbor come here, Coach Althoff was expected to have gained numerous points on his material to be in good condition for that competition.

## TEXAN RALLIES TO SNATCH WIN IN GOLF EVENT

Byron Nelson Is Champion In Big Time Links Competition

AUGUSTA, Ga., April 5.—There's no doubt about Byron Nelson's "Mead" any more.

The gaudy blond, who came up from Texas a few years ago with the hottest and coldest game in big time golf, has convinced scoffers he's got the heart by his brilliant victory in the fourth Augusta national championship.

### Wins Hard Way

Byron won his greatest golf triumph yesterday the hard way. He took the lead and held it half way in the 72-hole fight, surrendered it to trail by three shots with 18 holes to go and then peppered the championship course with spectacular golf to win by two blows over Ralph Guldahl, comeback star now of Chicago.

His total of 283 came within one stroke of equalling the tournament record established by Gene Sarazen and Craig Wood in 1933, and was 21 better than Bobby Jones, who finished 29th among 46 starters. Nelson's score for the 72 holes was 66-72-75-70—283.

It was that final 32 that enabled Byron to apply a "full Nelson" on his field. Going to the 10th tee, he trailed Guldahl by four strokes and the sports writers began grinding out copy on Guldahl's victory. They suspected Nelson didn't have the heart; they knew he didn't have the game to close such a gap.

### Closes On 11th

Nelson closed it on the 11th and 12th holes. As Guldahl landed in the adjacent creeks off each tee to take 31 strokes on the aggregate par 8 combination, Nelson whirled over the same territory in five shots.

That was the story. Over the remaining five holes, Nelson was colder than ice, getting straight park. His victory was worth \$15,000.

Ed Dudley, home club pro who finished third, lost his chance on the second hole where he took a 14 had seven. Harry Cooper, Chicago, three shots behind with 18 to go, finished with a 74 and took fourth place. Dudley's total was 286, Cooper's 287.

## BOUT TO BRING IN LARGE GATE

NEW YORK, April 5.—

They're looking for a crowd of 15,000 and a \$50,000 gate at Madison Square Garden tonight when a couple of lightweights, Lou Ambers and Pedro Montanez, fight a 10-round bout with not even a title at stake.

That expectation is noteworthy in itself in a city where only heavyweight can ordinarily draw good crowds. It's even more remarkable because Ambers wasn't considered much of an attraction when he took the lightweight crown from Tony Canzoneri.

The Herkimer hurricane has gained favor, however, by keeping himself busy in non-title fights and getting licked from time to time.

The fans are turning out now to see who will be the one to belt him nose from the title.

They figure it may be Montanez, who has been gunning for a title shot since he came from Puerto Rico two years ago to start a victory march that now has gone through 58 fights, of which he has won 35 by knockouts. He has the speed and the punch to bring the scrap to a sudden end.

On the strength of his record, Montanez has been established as a 7-5 favorite, but the odds were shortening. Ambers hasn't a lethal punch, but he can toss jabs and dodge returns all night.

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# Seniors Are Second Place, Nosing Out Sophomores As Inter-Class Event Is Held

Good Weather Attends as Third Year Men Take Off  
Honors; Erchenbrecher First in

The Juniors swept the annual Fremont Ross High school Inter-Class track and field meet honors Wednesday afternoon at Harmon Field.

Snatching the lead from the start, the Junior class representatives steadily piled up points and were never threatened by their nearest competitors, the Seniors, who finished 19½ points behind them. Sophomores finished with a good third and Freshmen brought up the rear.

### Take Big Lead

Starting with the 120-high hurdles, first event of the afternoon, the juniors jumped into lead position, when Spangler copped the race in 18 seconds flat with a close lead over Bingman, also a junior.

The second event, the 100-yard dash found another junior, Erchenbrecher, taking honors, nosing out Ray Horn, a sophomore. The time was 11.3 seconds.

Keller, sophomore, set a 4:58.2 clip in the mile run, to take the third event of the day for the sophomores. He held a nice margin over Rosen, senior, when the race ended.

Juniors on the 880-yard relay team, Vaffis, White, Spangler, and Erchenbrecher, led from the first lap and finished in easy manner to win that event.

Pete Fox, senior, won the shot put with his heave of 37.8 feet, dropping the iron ball a short distance ahead of Rice, junior.

With only five events clicked off the junior already had a substantial lead. Scores at this point were: Juniors, 28; sophomores, 19, seniors, 15½ and freshmen, 6½.

### Take 440 Dash

The seniors forged ahead of the sophomores and remained there, largely due to points piled up in the field events during the latter part of the meet.

The seniors took a first and third in the 440, when Dunlap, senior, finished 10 feet ahead of Ballard, sophomore. Howell, Senior was third.

Two Juniors, White and Wolfe, had things all their way in the pole vault, White winning at 10 feet. He later kept on for practice purposes where the others left off.

With the meet one event less than being half over, Juniors practically clinched the lead scoring when Spangler and Bingman finished one, two, in 220-yard low hurdles. The distance separating the winners was ten feet.

No unusual records were set by the various classmen as juniors added to their points in the remaining events of the afternoon, including the high jump, 880-yard run, discus, medley relay, 220-yard
