## Mansfield Out; Giants Tackle Woodward Here

Fremont Ross will meet Toledo Woodward at 4 p.m. Wednesday on the Anderson Field diamond to decide the Class AA District baseball champion in this area. Ross defeated Mansfield Senior high 7-4 at Mansfield Monday in a semifinal game and Woodward won the other semifinal 4-1 over Rossford last week at Toledo.

The Ross-Woodward winner will advance to the Lima Class AA Regional tournament Friday and Saturday.

Lefty Dick Dundore got past a shaky first inning to handle Mansfield fairly well the remainder of the game and give Ross a 6-2 season record. Mansfield is now 9-5.

### Dundore Doubles

Dundore supported his own cause with two hits, his double in the second inning starting a three-run rally by the Little Giants which erased a 2-0 Mansfield lead.

The Tygers scored two in the first on a walk, two errors and three singles.

With one out in the second for Fremont, Dundore drilled a double. He scored on a fielding error by Mansfield starting and losing pitcher Jim McKee. Dan Moran had walked prior to Jack White reaching base on the error. Moran also scored on an error and White came across on a single by Jerry Jones.

### Three More

Ross came back with three more runs in the third on a walk to Denny Stine, singles by Dundore, Maury Gnepper, Moran and White and one Mansfield error.

Final Ross run in the fourth was scored by Roger Mann who singled, advanced to third on a single by Harry Walter and came home on a fielder's choice.

Mansfield scored a run in the sixth on a walk and error and another in the seventh on a walk, error and single.

Dundore struck out six, walked three. McKee fanned three, walked four.

Ross committed five errors and Mansfield six.

### Terry's Stalling Tactics Upset Tribe Batters; Yankees Triumph

CLEVELAND (PA)—The next time the Cleveland Indians face Yankee hurler Ralph Terry, the game may run five hours—unless an umpire acts to speed up the pitching.

That's the ultimatum issued here Wednesday night by Tribe manager Joe Gordon after the three-hour game which New York won, 4-2. Terry was accused of using stalling tactics to upset the batters.

"Either the umpire makes him pitch faster, or the game will go five hours," Gordon declared. "We'll step out every time he's finally ready to pitch."

After repeated protests from the Cleveland dugout, Umpire John Rice finally did approach the mound to suggest a speed-up.

The game ended the Indians' eight-game stretch against the Yankees and the Chicago White Sox. The Tribe won five of the eight, taking three of four from the Yankees and two of four from the Sox.

Gil McDougall's second-inning homer with two aboard carried the Yankees to victory Wednesday night. Terry, who went the distance, gave up eight hits.

New York was held to five by

loser Wynn Hawkins, Johnny Killebrew and Jim Perry.

Two Franconi pitched Terry for a homer in the sixth and also knocked in the Tribe's other run with a first inning double.

Killebrew, who hurled the sixth and seventh innings, retired six straight Yankees. In his last three appearances, he has retired 21 consecutive batters, earning a reputation as a remarkable relief man.

The Tribe has an off-day today before opening a two-game series here Friday against the Boston Red Sox.

Ross defeated Toledo Woodward before a large crowd at Anderson Field Wednesday by a 14 count to win the District Class AA baseball championship and first place trophy.

Dundore allowed Woodward seven hits, struck out 8 and walked 2 to gain the decision. The southpaw, with deceptive speed, had now won six games this season without a setback.

Dundore has pitched and won five tournament victories for Ross. He has finished all five of the tournament games.

Ross will meet Upper Arlington of the Columbus area at 1:30 p.m. Friday at Lima in a Regional semifinal. Game will be played on Diamond 6, Fairport Park, located about six blocks from downtown Lima on the west side.

Other semifinal game will send Lima Senior against Columbus St. Charles at 3:30 p.m. Lima defeated Defiance Wednesday 9-7 at Lima.

Finals in the Regional will be at 2 p.m. Saturday and will feature the two Friday winners. Regional title advances to next week's state baseball finals at Columbus.

The Little Giants won the Lima Regional two years ago and advanced to the state finals. Ross was runner-up to Cincinnati Elder in 1958.

The Giants smashed 11 hits off starter and senior Maurice Kocher, Woodward right-hander. Kocher struck out 4 and walked 6.

## Ross Baseball Team Has Run-Making Ability

Two years ago Fremont Ross advanced to the Class AA State baseball finals via a pair of victories in the Lima Class AA Regional tournament.

The Little Giants today begin a quest for another Regional diamond championship and a trip to Columbus for the State meet.

Ross was scheduled to meet Upper Arlington this afternoon in one semifinal of the tourney at Lima. Other game matched Lima Senior and Columbus St. Charles. Winners meet at 2 p.m. Saturday in the Regional Finals.

Ross, in 1958, lost in the finals of the State tourney to Cincinnati Elder.

The 1958 team featured the brilliant pitching on Lefty Doug Gallagher who was signed shortly after school let out by the Detroit Tigers. He was given a substantial bonus. Doug is pitching now with Detroit's Class A. Knoxville team.

### Dundore Mound Ace

Ross has no Gallagher on the 1960 baseball edition. Junior southpaw Dick Dundore has been the pitching ace in all five Ross tournament victories thus far. He has not been brilliant but has hurled effectively especially in the clutch.

The 1960 Ross team lacks the exceptional ability of Gallagher on the mound and is not deep in the pitching department.

However, the 1960 team is a much better hitting club as compared to the 1958 unit. The hard and timely hitting and effective pitching of Dundore plus fair defensive play has guided the Little Giants to at least a District baseball crown.

Defensively, the 1958 team was much smoother than the present outfit.

So it's the hitting power of Ross that must be counted on to propel them to the state finals this season.

Let's take a look at Ross high's power:

The Giants have scored 69 runs in 9 games (won 7, lost 2) or an average of 7.7 per game. Least number of runs scored by Ross in any game this year has been four.

Opponents have tallied 30 runs in nine games.

### Leading Hitter

Leading hitter for Ross is Harry Walter, 15 hits in 32 at-bats for a .469 average.

Slugger Denny Stine has a .464 mark on 13 for 28 and has three home runs and three doubles.

Roger Mann has a .406 mark on 13 for 32.

In the .300 category are Jerry Jones and Dundore, .333 each, with 9 for 27. Dundore has five doubles to his credit.

Maury Gnepper is hitting .281 with 9 for 32; Jack White .214 on 6 for 28; Dan Moran .200 on 6 for 30; and Milt Hetrick .095 on 2 for 21. Hetrick is an excellent glove man at first base.

Dundore has a 6-0 pitching record. He has appeared in all nine Ross games, has five complete games, worked 44½ innings, allowed 16 runs, 28 hits, struck out 63 and walked 20.

Tom Lee has a 1-1 mark, has appeared in two games, made two starts, worked 8 innings, allowed 6 runs and 4 hits, fanned 9, walked 7. He is a senior righthander.

Sophomore Denny Ohms is 0-0, has pitched in 3 games, worked 5½ innings, allowed 4 runs and 3 hits, struck out 6, walked 4. He is a righthander.

Stine is 0-1, one game, one start, worked 4½ innings, allowed 4 runs, 3 hits, struck out 4, walked 3. He is a junior righthander.

Team has excellent coaching. Leroy (Cot) Marquette, head coach, and Hank Miesle, assistant, both played in organized baseball and came close to making the major leagues.
