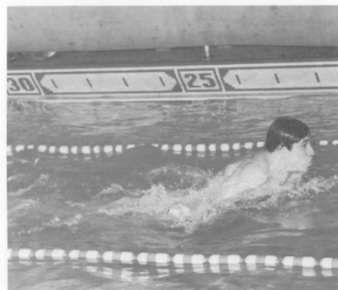
Christensen, Willer Capture High Honors

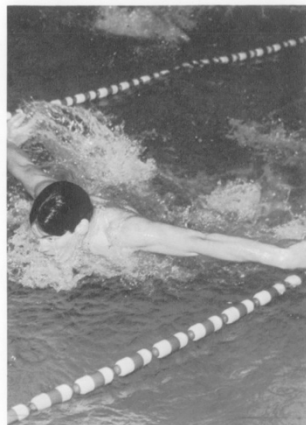
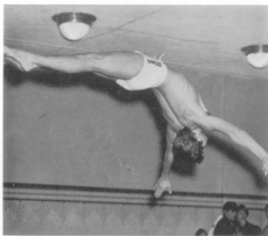

Ross High Swimmers Begin '71 Campaign

"I can't say enough about the attitude. These fellows have been working extremely hard and are anxious to get the season started."

Those are the comments of Fremont Ross swim coach Ron Zwierlein, who will lead the Little Giants against Colonel Crawford tomorrow in their opening meet of the season. The meet at Colonel Crawford is scheduled to start at 4:15 p.m.

The Little Giants, who have been hampered in practice sessions by the flu bug and also colds, went against Toledo St. Francis in a time trial meet yesterday and Zwierlein was fairly pleased with the results.

"St. Francis was the number two team in the state last year and they have a lot of outstanding individual returning," Zwierlein said, "but our fellows turned in some decent times. Overall, the times were above average for this time of the season."

The Little Giants will use a lineup that will be sprinkled with untested seniors and sophomores along with a number of veterans.

One of the strongest events on paper for the Purple and White appears to be the 200 yard medley relay where three lettermen — Dave Billman, Steve Willer and Andy Christensen — will be joined by Kim Michaels.

Michaels is a senior, who's making his first appearance with the tankers.

"I don't know why he didn't come out before, but he sure could have been a big help," Zwierlein said. Michaels, like other members of the relay team, will compete in at least one other event.

Michaels is also slated to work in the 100 backstroke with another senior, Tom Hakes, Hakes swam for Ross last winter but did not have enough points to earn a letter.

Billman is also slated to swim in the breaststroke with Darriel Mann. Willer will double in the butterfly while Christensen is also scheduled to work in the 400 freestyle relay and diving competition.

Christensen is expected to be one of the state's top divers. He finished 13th in the state competition last year and made a strong showing in various AAU meets throughout the state this summer.

"We're expecting big things from Andy," Zwierlein said. "He made a tremendous amount of improvement over the summer. In fact, he was beating some of the fellows who had finished higher than he did in the state meet."

The Little Giants will probably employ Kent Collins and Tom

White in the 200 freestyle with Kevin Brawley and Hakes in the 200 individual medley.

"Brawley has been sidelined after having minor surgery and we still aren't sure of his status for the Colonel Crawford meet," Zwierlein said. "But we expect him to be a big help throughout the season."

Sophomore John Cramer and Frank Mattson will form the Little Giant entry in the 50 freestyle. Bob Serwin will join Christensen in the division competition.

Willer's partner in the butterfly will be Toby Peck.

A pair of sophomores, Cramer and Mark Schiefer, will be the 100 freestyle competitors. Scheduled for duty in the 400 freestyle are White and Collins.

Zwierlein will employ Cramer, Dave Jones, Schiefer and Christensen in the final event, the 400 freestyle relay.

"We'll be strong in different areas," Zwierlein says. "I expect to pick up a lot of events in the butterfly, diving and breaststroke. The medley relay should also be strong. We do lack depth, however."

The Little Giants received a severe setback early in the season when one of last winter's top freestylers, who only missed the school record by two seconds, failed to come out for the squad.

"When that boy decided not to come out, it took away our depth in the 200 and 400 freestyles," Zwierlein said. "Those are the events where a coach likes to have some experienced swimmers."

The second-year head coach expects the character of the Ross campaign to be determined in the meets prior to the Christmas holidays.

"If we can get a couple of victories under our belts it will be a big help," Zwierlein says. "These young fellows need a couple of wins to gain their confidence."

Zwierlein and his assistant, Jack Kramer, have been working with a 23 man squad. Mattson, Willer, Peck and Christensen will serve as the Little Giant co-captains.

Ross Swimmers Drop Opener

NORTH ROBINSON — Colonel Crawford swept the first two places in four events powering the Eagles to a 59-36 swimming victory over Ross yesterday.

It was the opening meet of the season for the Little Giants. Ross begins its home campaign against Port Clinton Monday at 4 p.m.

Colonel Crawford received one-two finishes in the 200 and 400 freestyle, the 200 individual medley and 100 backstroke. The Eagles also blanked Ross in the day's final event — the 400 freestyle relay.

Ross had three individual first places and also took the opening event, the 200 medley relay. Posting individual firsts were diver Andy Christensen, Steve

Willer (100 freestyle) and Dave Billman (100 breaststroke).

The relay team was formed by Kim Michaels, Billman, Toby Peck and Andy Christensen.

Christensen acquired 214.85 points in the diving competition, which established a new pool record at Colonel Crawford.

Willer posted a neat :55.8 in the 100 freestyle while Billman was timed in 1:12.6 for the backstroke. The winning Ross relay squad had a 1:58.1.

"The fellows who took first places for us turned in some good times for the first meet," Little Giant head coach Ron Zwierlein said. "Christensen had a real good performance when you consider that he was just recovering from the flu."

In the 200 and 400 freestyle events where Colonel Crawford built up a 16-2 scoring advantage, Ross was missing sophomore Kent Collins, who is recovering from a flu attack.

"I hope to have him back for the Port Clinton meet, but even then it will be pretty rough for him," Zwierlein said. "Usually these flu attacks break down the endurance of an individual."

The loss of Collins just compounded a depth problem for the Little Giants.

"Five fellows who swam with us last season are not out and it hurt us," Zwierlein said. "We just lacked the personnel to compete."

"Colonel Crawford had a fine team and some of their times were pretty good for a small school. They've had an AAU

summer program for six years and also have a new pool. All of these things have helped them build a fine program. Most of their squad was composed of seniors."

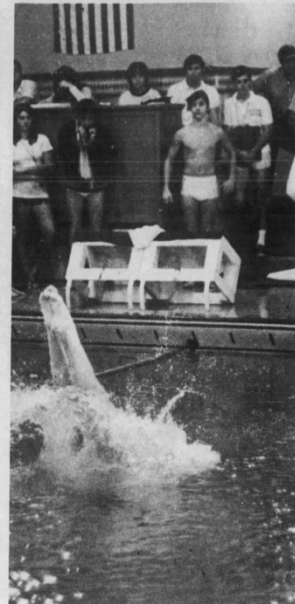

Michigan State Whips Kentucky; Rupp's Crew Due For Poor Year

In Adolph Rupp's first 41 years as basketball coach at the University of Kentucky, the Wildcats never had a losing season.

This could be the first. "We haven't got it this year," said the venerable 70-year-old Rupp Monday night after the seventh-ranked Wildcats were upended by Michigan State 91-85 for their second consecutive setback after three victories.

"We just don't have the material," Michigan State Coach Gus Ganakas concurred with Rupp's observation. "Kentucky certainly is not as strong as it has been in the past," said Ganakas.

Since Rupp became Kentucky's coach in 1930, the Wildcats have won an amazing total of 858 games while losing only 183. They also have won the NCAA title four times, the National Invitation Tournament championship once and the Southeastern Conference crown a record 26 times.

Marquette, ranked 15th in the latest Associated Press poll, was the only other member of the Top 20 in action Tuesday night, and the Terrapins trampled Georgetown, D.C., 79-46 as 6-foot-11 sophomore Tom McMillen erupted for 32 points. UCLA, winner of the last five NCAA championships, easily retained its position atop the rankings in this week's voting. The Bruins, unbeaten in four games, received 37 first-place votes and 898 points in out-distancing Marquette, which finished second with 708 points. South Carolina was third, followed by North Carolina, Penn. Brigham Young, Kentucky, St. John's, N.Y., Florida State and Ohio State and Southern California, who tied for 10th.

Then came Indiana, Long Beach State, Jacksonville, Maryland, Southwestern Louisiana, Louisville, Princeton, Virginia and Houston.

Rupp, the winningest coach in collegiate basketball history, said he was "bitterly disappointed" over the Wildcats' loss to Michigan State. "We should have beaten that team," he added.

Michigan State's Mike Robinson and Kentucky's 6-11 Jim

Andrews shared game scoring honors with 32 points apiece. But Andrews often was slow getting up and down the court, enabling Michigan State to dominate the rebounding.

McMillen, Maryland's heralded center, hit 11 of 15 field goals and 10 of 11 free throws in leading the Terrapins past Georgetown.

Elsewhere, unbeaten Missouri, rolled to its sixth victory, beating St. Francis, Pa., 104-96. Kansas State broke loose for 52 points in the second half and routed Creighton 90-68.

Streak Freshmen Edged

Port Clinton's freshmen held St. Joseph's to three points in the fourth quarter Monday for a come-from-behind basketball victory. The score was 30-26 in a close contest played at Port Clinton.

Each quintet hit only four points in the first period, then St. Joseph took a lead which it protected until late in the game, only to hit a frigid spell in the last canto.

Tom Kowalski and Joe Guyer had eight points each for St. Joseph; Joe Taroli had 12 for the winners.

Ross swimming coach Ron Zwierlein said very little to his team during workouts last week about its opening day loss to Colonel Crawford.

Team members did all the talking. "I wasn't supposed to know about it, but the team had a couple meetings among themselves to chew each other out about their performances against Colonel Crawford," Zwierlein said yesterday.

Evidently, the meetings did some good. The Little Giants came up with some gutsy performances in staggering Port Clinton, 50-45, at the junior high school pool Monday afternoon.

"I have to consider this an upset," Zwierlein said. "I figured the meet on paper the other night and the best we could do was come within one point (48-47) based on previous times. But these kids really turned in some outstanding performances today."

It wasn't an individual victory that Zwierlein listed as the turning point in the meet, however. Instead, it was a second and third place finish from Tom White and Mark Schiefer in the 400 freestyle.

"After that race we had 40 points and I saw we were able to pick it up eight more in

the final three races," Zwierlein said.

Depth Pays Off
Ross had only five first places in the 11 events, but the Little Giant depth accounted for six second places and five more thirds.

The 200 medley relay team of Kim Michaels, Dave Billman, Andy Christensen and White gave the Little Giants a 7-0 lead with a sizzling 1:56.2 performance.

Toby Peck followed with an individual win in the 200 freestyle. Port Clinton's John Merrill and Jim Loosinger took second and third but Ross still had a 12-4 lead.

Ross failed to nab a first in either the 200 individual medley or 50 freestyle. The Little Giants

did take a second and third in each event, however, and were ahead 20-14 after four events.

The 200 IM winner was Mark Waltz. Frank Mattson and Dave Vandergriff picked up the Ross points. The Redskins' Greg Wood was followed to the wall by Ross' Steve Miller and John Cramer in the 50 freestyle.

One-Two In Diving
Andy Christensen and Rob Serwin finished one-two in the diving competition to hike Ross' cushion to 28-15.

Waller followed with a first in the butterfly and even though Port Clinton took a second and third Ross still had a 33-19 lead.

Peck finished second in the 100 freestyle between Port Clinton's Greg and Brad Wood. Peck was

five-tenths of a second away from Greg's winning pace.

The second and third from White and Schiefer followed to give Ross a 40-30 advantage. In the next event, the 100 backstroke, Port Clinton had a first (Dave Allen), but Ross countered with a second and third from Michaels and Tom Hakes. That made it 44-35.

Ross sewed up the win with Billman's first and a third from Darrell Mann in the 100 breaststroke. That made it 50-38. Port Clinton closed the meet with a victory in the 400 freestyle relay.

The Little Giants will bid for their second win when they entertain Lima Senior at Saturday at 2 p.m.

Rockets Outbound For 50-26

Akron Cans Last Seven Shots To Edge Toledoans 80 to 76

Toledo University won the statistical battle and the first half, but lost the game Monday as the Akron Zips came from behind to defeat the Rockets 80-76 in non-conference basketball action.

The victory was Akron's fourth in as many starts. It was the first season loss for the Rockets, now 2-1.

The Rockets wound up the game shooting 52 per cent from the field, compared to the Zips 50 per cent, and outrebounding Akron 50-28. Akron had the edge from the free throw line with 22 conversions in 21 tries. Toledo hit on just 14 of 25 from the charity stripe.

But the Mid-American Conference Rockets saw a comfortable 15-point lead midway through the final period dissolve, aided by seven costly Toledo turnovers and

an uncanny Akron scoring spree in the game's closing minutes that saw the Zips hit their last seven shots from the field.

Game scoring honors went to Toledo center Tom Koslitz with 26 points. The independent Zips were led by the 24 points of forward Len Paul.

Youngstown stayed unbeaten in three games with an easy 86-57 victory over hapless Ohio Wesleyan.

Penguin senior guard Billy Johnson topped all scorers with 30 points. Ray Schmidt was high man for the Bishops with 21.

Ohio Wesleyan is now 1-4 for the year. In other games on Monday's brief schedule, Eastern Kentucky, 2-2, defeated Dayton 98-91, dropping the Flyers to 2-3; and Virginia's Old Dominion College handed Xavier its third loss of the year against one win, 90-88.

First Place In Final Relay Gives Ross Narrow Swim Win

A convincing victory in the meet's final event—the 400 yard freestyle relay—pushed Fremont Ross past Lima Senior, 51-44, at the junior high school pool Saturday.

Dave Jones, John Cramer, Tom White and Steve Willer swam in the final event for the Little Giants, who now have back-to-back victories after losing their opening meet. They combined for a 3:53 showing while the Lima quartet could muster only a 4:02.

The final event began with the score deadlocked at 44. It was the

third time during the afternoon the meet was tied. The score was also knotted at 17 following the 50 freestyle and 35 after the 400 freestyle.

"It was an excellent meet,"

Ross head coach Ron Zwierlein said. "We knew it was going to be close and I kept Tom White and Steve Willer out of an event earlier to save them for the relay."

"I thought the meet might go down to the relay and I wanted to have the best people available. It was actually a guessing game between the Lima coach and myself. We were trying to get our

people where we thought they could do the most good while they were avoiding Lima's strengths."

Lima had six individual victories but Ross won both relay events.

"The 200 medley was real important—it got us going," Zwierlein said. "I thought our fellows swam a fantastic time (1:55) for this early in the year."

The winning foursome in the medley was composed of Kim Michaels, Dave Billman, Andy Christensen and Cramer.

Ross failed to get a win in the next three events—200 freestyle, 200 individual medley and 50 freestyle—but the Little Giants did score in each event.

"Those three races were tremendous," Zwierlein said. "In each race the Lima man just touched out our fellow for first place." Toby Peck (2:06.4) finished behind Chris Barr (2:05.9) in the 200 free. Five tenths of a second separated Lima's Mark Basinger (2:35.9) and Tom White (2:36.4) in the 200 individual medley while Willer missed a win in the 50 free by three tenths of a second. The winner, Craig Hill, was clocked in 25.0 compared to Willer's 25.3.

Ross, which trailed only once (43-36), took a 25-18 lead after the diving competition where Andy Christensen and Rob Serwin finished first and second.

Christensen, who's unbeaten this year, came through with a 205.70 performance.

The Little Giants had only one place winner in the butterfly, but that was Toby Beck's first. Mark Schiefer and Dave Jones took a second and third in the 100 freestyle while Scott McCord picked up a third in the 400 freestyle.

Lima pulled ahead when it received a first place from Jim Tschur and second from Gary Newell in the 100 backstroke. Ross got a third from Michaels. Tschur also won the 100 freestyle.

The Little Giants pulled even in the next-to-last event, the 100 breast when Billman took first and Darrel Mann was second.

"We had to have a first in that race," Zwierlein said. "If a Lima man would have been first we would have lost the meet before the last race started."

Zwierlein pointed to the Ross performance in the diving and the number of second and third place finishes for the Little Giants as being the keys to the win.

"Our fellows had just been beaten out in those first three individual races and it looked like things would go Lima's way all day," Zwierlein said. "Then Christensen and Serwin came through, it gave our kids a big lift."

"The second and thirds were very important. It kept Lima from scoring heavily. Those points mean a lot in a meet that is as close as this one."

The Little Giants will not compete again as a team until January 7 when they host Napoleon at 4 p.m. The following day Ross competes in the Bowling Green State University Relays.

The divers will compete in a diving event at Berea-Midpark high school December 27.

Fremont Ross divers, sparked by a second place performance by veteran Andy Christensen, gave a good performance in the first annual Midpark Invitational Diving Meet yesterday.

Christensen finished second behind Jim Kennedy of Findlay while sophomore Rob Serwin finished fifth and junior Dave Vandergrift took eighth.

"If they would have determined a team champion we would have won easily," Ross head coach Ron Zwierlein said following the meet.

"I was real pleased with the performance of our kids. For Serwin and Vandergrift this was their first big competition. Serwin was in 10th place behind Vandergrift going into the semifinals but did very well in his last couple of dives."

Kennedy, who finished second

in the state high school competition last winter, scored 458.25 compared to a 429.45 for Christensen.

Rocky River's Bill Smith placed third with 396.35. Serwin had a 331.70 for fifth.

Vandergrift totaled 231.80 for his eight place finish.

"The meet should be a big help for Christensen," Zwierlein said. "It will give him some idea of what to expect from divers in the northeast part of the state when the state competition is held."

Christensen represented Ross in the state competition last winter and is expected to make the trip again this winter to Ohio State.

Yesterday's meet was designed to give divers more experience under championship conditions, much the same as they will face during the district and state meets.

A total of 24 divers began the competition.

A four second victory in the last event — the 400 freestyle relay — enabled Ross to pull out a 54-40 scholastic swimming victory over Napoleon at the junior high school pool yesterday.

Ross entered the last event with a 47-40 lead. If the Little Giants would have placed second in the relay, the meet would have ended in a 47-47 deadlock.

Peck's first place in the 200 freestyle cut the Little Giant deficit to 11-5. Ross gained the lead when Tom White and Mark Schiefer placed one-two in the 200 individual medley where the Napoleon entries were disqualified.

Jones' first and a third for Frank Mattson increased the Little Giant bulge to 19-14 after the fourth race. When Christensen and Ron Serwin finished one-

two in the diving it hiked the Little Giant advantage to 27-15.

Peck and Willer garnered first place points in the next two events — 100 fly and 100 freestyle — but those were the only place winners for the Purple and White in those events.

Napoleon tankers took the first two spots in the 400 freestyle and the Ross advantage was sliced to 38-31.

The visitors got another first in the 100 backstroke but Ross

managed to get a second from Kim Michaels and third out of Tom Hakes.

Billman was Ross' only point getter in the 100 breaststroke where Napoleon pulled within seven points going into the final event.

"Peck, Jones, White, Schiefer, Willer, Billman and the 400 relay all did a fine job," Zwierlein said. "Peck's double was real important and that time in the 200 free is his best. Willer, Billman

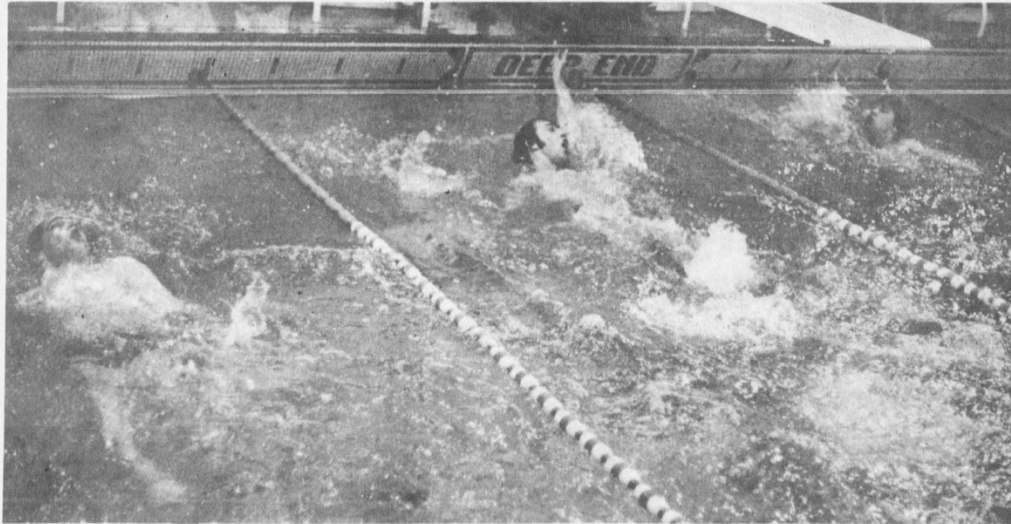
and the 400 freestyle relay also had their best times.

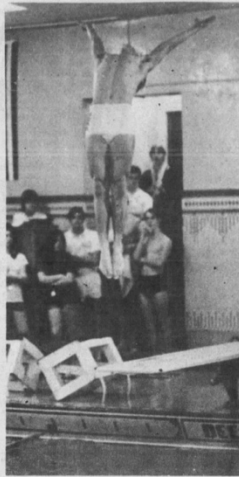

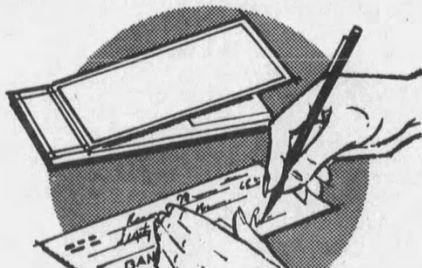

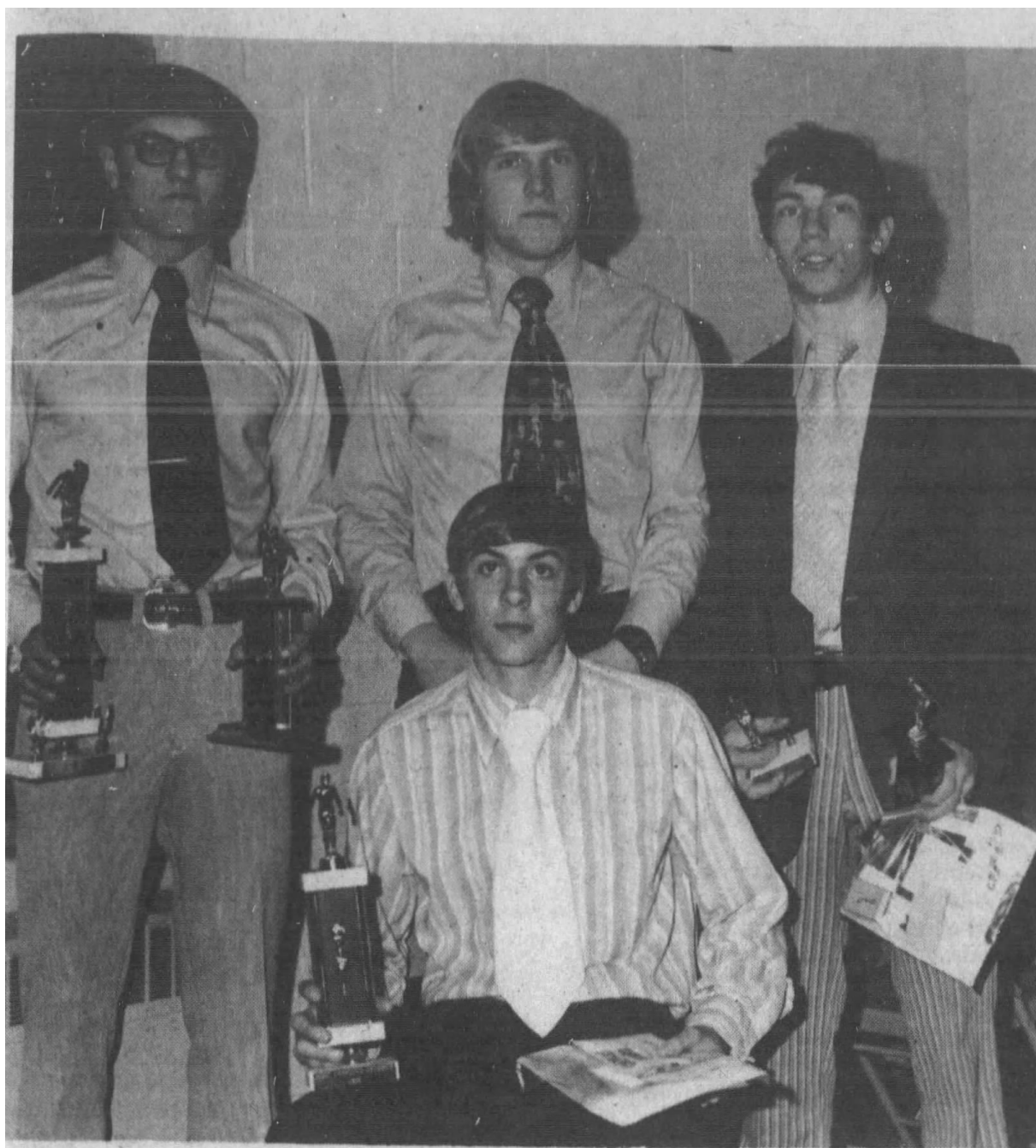
