# ROSS TANKMEN IN EXHIBITION OF HIGH CLASS

## Initial Meeting at School Natatorium Proves Great Success

The first public swimming meet ever held in Fremont was an outstanding success at Ross high natatorium where Baumann (Bim) Stults, instructor, staged an aquatic entertainment for a throng of 200 spectators gathered to witness the gambols of the Johnny Weismullers of the future.

The meeting was conducted under the rules that govern affairs of the type and is preliminary to the first swimming contest with an outside school that is to be held in the near future with Sandusky high's Neptunes as the opposition.

Last night the contestants were divided into teams known as the Purple and the White. The Purple outfit won the sum total of points by the narrow margin of 42 to 39. The competition was keen and the youthful splashers, all of them boys, sure churned the heated water in the pool. As a contrast to the zero weather without, the swimmers within enjoyed real Palm Beach surfing within the depths and shallows of the heated waters of the Ross pool.

The White team propelled itself to a victory in the 200-yard relay as the opening number and did the stretch in 2:33 1-3. In the 100-yard breast stroke event, Sherlow was first, Kellogg second, while Reardon finished third.

Roth took the 50-yard free style event, Alberts was second and Brudzinski third. In the 220-yard free style attraction, Merrifield churned to a victory, with Stiger and Schott taking the heavy seas on their brows and chins in second and third, respectively. Time 3:11.7.

The century back stroke attraction was taken by Voss, with Reed and Norton second and third. Time 1:45.5. The 100-yard free style was another splendid event with Smith taking the honors and Hunt and Carter finishing one and two. Time 1:16.5.

Hasselbach, who defies that old swimmin' hole saying that regards diving like a feather and swimming like a stone, stepped forth with real Olympic grace and took the diving contest with all the class of a Captain Webb. Giebel placed second and a slick plunger named Potter, was awarded third.

The Purple team piled up sufficient points to win the meeting by making a clean sweep in the 150-yard medley.

The array of surfmen who displayed their skill last night indicate that from their rank and file a pretty slick swimming and diving crew can be selected and the outfit will be pointed to the meeting with Sandusky a few weeks hence.

In last night's official array, Captain A. Otto Baumann, Walter Weinhart and Chester Shively were judges; Bob Fangboner was starter, while John Fangboner and Jimmy O'Farrell were the timers.

# PURPLE TANKERS DEFEATED BY SANDUSKY TEAM

## Locals Make Good Show- ing in Their First Event of Kind

Fremont High's aquatic squad, making its first splash in a dual swimming meet, was defeated 57 to 18 by a more experienced school of tankers at Sandusky Saturday afternoon. The session was also the first water meeting between two schools in the Little Big Seven.

The Fremonters, in charge of Baumann (Bim) Stults, swimming instructor at F. H. S., despite inexperience in the affairs of the type, gave a good account of themselves and showed plenty of promise for future events. Sandusky took the 200 yard free style and 120 yard relays and also picked off five firsts and garnered a flock of seconds.

The purple and white team gathered its points in third positions and cashed in on the only first place they took in the event, Jimmy Hunt winning the 100 yard free style in slick fashion.

The event was not only an epoch in L. B. S. athletic circles but it was the opening number for annual tank tussles between the two contending schools and a fine promise of future entertainment when the water groups gather at the local pool.
