

F. H. S. ATHLETES CONTINUE GRIND

Captain Bob Ross, pole vault and high hurdles; J. W. Miller, dashes and broad jump; Eggie Newton 440 and broad jump; Nelson Jones, half mile; Ireland, mile and several other Fremont High school track men have been entered in the Mansfield district track events to be held next Saturday. Last evening in a practice session in the pole vault, Captain Ross soared over the stick at a height of 11 feet four inches, bettering the L. B. S. mark and flying four inches higher than the mark that won him this event in the meeting last Saturday.

FOUR CAPTAINS TO REPRESENT FREMONT HIGH

Ross, Miler, Newton and Jones Will Carry Ban- ners at Mansfield

The celebrated Four Horsemen of Notre Dame, Don Miller, Layton, Crowley and Stuhldreher, have nothing on the famous "Four Captains of Fremont High," when it comes to versatility and carrying the colors of their school into battle. Saturday down Mansfield way, four distinguished F. H. S. athletes, Bobby Ross, captain of the track team; J. W. Miller, pilot of the cage crew; Edgar Newton, leader of the baseball team, and Nelson Jones, who led the Bob Cats in football last fall, will represent the purple and white in the district track and field meeting. Four of them will make the trip on this occasion and this quartet, for the first time in local scholastic history, will represent the leadership in the four major sports at F. H. S.

Captain Ross will carry the burden of the pole vault and the high hurdles, Miller will look after the 220 dash, broad jump and a shot at the weights; Newton will take on the 400 and the broad leap, while Jones is entered in the half-mile. The four men may also line up in the sprint relay.

Other teams finished in the following order: Lima South, 13; Ashland, 12; St. Mary's 10½; Tiffin, 14; Bellevue, 7; Wapakoneta, 5; Bucyrus 4.

In accumulating their remarkable four man total, the Fremont team worked as follows: Miller took fifth in the broad jump. Newton was second in the 440 and finished third in the broad jump; Jones was third in the 880 and Captain Ross split a three way tie for top honors in the pole vault at 11 feet and was in a double count for fourth place in the high jump.
