

## *Open April 6 At Marion Harding* **Brant Optimistic As Ross Prepares For Upcoming Track And Field Season**

Fremont Ross track and field head coach Ron Brant is building his 1972 squad around 10 lettermen who return from last spring's squad that compiled a nifty 7-1 dual meet record.

"On paper we don't look as strong as we were last year but I'm optimistic," Brant said recently as he prepared the Little Giants for the season opener at Marion Harding's all-weather oval April 6.

"Last season we were strong in the middle distance, distances, relay events plus the shot put, discus and pole vault. Now we appear to have some strong individuals in the sprint and hurdles. Most of the fellows in those events competed as sophomores last year."

Three of the returning lettermen were in the state competition last spring. Junior Rob Lytle was a qualifier in the 100-yard dash, Tom Liggins competed in the shot put while Tom Pitts was a member of the mile relay team that competed in Columbus.

Lytle and Liggins are both scheduled to see duty in the sprint events (100 and 220) this year and could also form part of the 880 relay. Lytle is a junior and Liggins a senior.

Also competing for spots in the sprint races are sophomores Randy Robertson and Jim Heidleberg.

"The two sophomores along with Liggins and Lytle don't look too bad right now," Brant said. "I'm hoping to get a lot of points from those fellows."

Pitts and another letterman, Ken Price, are both back to compete in the high and low hurdles. They were the number one and two hurdlers as sophomores last season. They are being pushed by Jeff Porczak.

Pitts is also being worked in the 440 along with Tim Smith, a brother of Earl Smith, the most valuable member of last year's squad, and Jon Smith. That trio is also expected to form part of the 880 relay.

Seniors Kirt Stout and Chris Widman are working out in the 880 with juniors Mike Hunt and Steve Young. Stout, Widman and Hunt will also see duty in the mile run.

Three juniors—Dave Damschroder, Mark Hoffman and Mark Reardon—are joined by sophomore Randy Patrick as the leading candidates in the two-mile run.

Liggins is back for the shot put. Bob Koebel, who lettered as a sophomore, also returns in the shot with senior Larry Johns.

Three lettermen—Chuck Celek, Kim Michaels and Pitts—are scheduled to see heavy duty in the high jump.

The leading candidate in the discus is letterman Andy Sale. He'll probably be joined by Koebel.

"Right now, Sale looks as good as Tom Nighswander did at this time last season," Brant said. Nighswander broke the school record in the discus twice during his senior campaign.

Senior letterman John Werling is the only returnee in the pole vault. But the Little Giant coaching staff hopes to get help from a pair of sophomores, Jeff Opelt and Keith Pettiford.

Jon Smith and Jeff Porczak appear to be the leading contenders for the long jump assignments.

Besides the dual meet record, the Little Giants will have their work cut out attempting to better some of their other performances in 1971. They won the Fremont Night Relays, placed fifth out of 12 teams in the Marion Relays, were

seventh out of 28 squads at the Blade Relays, third among eight in the Buckeye Conference, second among 11 in the sectional and third of 29 in the district competition.

Six three-year lettermen—Bill Burkett, Chuck Miller, Mike Ruland, Earl Smith, Tom Nighswander and Mike Tooman—have graduated. Also gone are Nick Heidleberg, Dave Kridler, Claude Price, Bruce Schneider, Al Sewell, Mark Shimer and Barry Hawk. Heidleberg, Price and Schneider each lettered twice for the Purple and White.

Smith was regarded as one of the top middle distance runners to come out of Ross in the last quarter century. He competed in the 880 where he finished second in the state and also anchored the mile relay team that now has the school record.

Brant is being assisted by Norm Bray, Tom Armstrong and Jim Pasch. Bray tutors the sprinters, hurdles, relay teams and long jumpers. Armstrong is in charge of the shot put and discus competitors while Pasch coaches the pole vaulters and high jumpers. The middle distance and distance runners are under Brant.

After the meet with Harding, Ross travels to Bowling Green April 11 before opening its home campaign with Elyria April 13.

# Giants Trip Harding

MARION—Veterans and rookies combined to provide Ross with an opening day 72-55 track and field victory over Marion Harding Thursday.

The veterans who sparked the Little Giants were Tom Liggins, Rob Lytle, Kirt Stout, Tom Pitts and Dave Damschroder. And, they got a big assist from two sophomores—Jeff Opelt and Jim Heidleburg.

Opelt, a pole vaulter, had never gone above 11-6 in pre-season drills. But yesterday he went 13-0 and finished second behind Harding's Mike Jackson. Jackson also went 13-0 but won the first place points on the basis of the number of misses.

Heidleburg recorded a pair of third place points. He was a late entry in the long jump and his best leap of 20-4½ was good for third and then a 24.2 clocking in the 220 gave Ross another team point.

"The performance of those two fellows was real pleasing," Ross head coach Ron Brant said. "We never expected Opelt to go 13 feet."

Lytle was the only double winner in the meet that was raced over Harding's all-weather oval that will be the site of the Buckeye Conference meet next month. His 10.1 out-distanced the field in the 100 and he came back with a neat 23.8 in the 220.

"Rob seems to be picking up where he left off last year," Brant said. "Those times are outstanding for this time of the season."

Lytle was an entrant in the 100 of the Class AAA competition at the state meet in Columbus last spring.

Liggins led the Little Giants to a sweep in the shot put. His winning put was 50-½ while Bob Koebel (46-5) and Larry Johns (45-2) placed second and third, respectively.

Stout nailed a first for Ross in the mile run, just edging teammate Chris Widman at the finish line. Both Little Giant seniors were clocked in 49.6.

Pitts came up with more first place points in the 440. He was clocked in 53.6 compared to a

54.3 for Harding's Ralph Ring, the second place finisher.

The final individual win for the Little Giants came in the two-mile where Dave Damschroder led Ross to a sweep of all three places. Mark Hoffman was second and Randy Patrick third for the Purple and White.

Ross completed the meet with a victory in the mile relay. Ken Price, Stout, Tim Smith and Pitts toured the oval in 3:36.3.

The Little Giants return to action Tuesday at Bowling Green. The first home meet is at Harmon Stadium Thursday against Elyria.

## St. Joe Linksters Upset Oak Harbor

OAK HARBOR—Fremont St. Joe pulled off a mild upset by tripping Oak Harbor, 5½-3½, in a scholastic golf match played at Portage Point Golf Course Wednesday.

Oak Harbor, which is favored in many circles to win the Sandusky Bay Conference championship this spring, entered the meet with a 1-0 record. It was the first meet of the season for the Crimson Streaks.

St. Joe was paced by senior John Szabo, who fired a 40 and decisioned Tim Ford, 1½-½. The Streaks also received 2-0 victories from Steve Poseler and Bob Heckters.

Poseler fired a 42 compared to a 44 for Oak Harbor's Jim Murray. Heckters checked in at 44 after nine holes while Jay Pinson registered a 45 for Jay Pinson.

John Knopp authored the only win for Oak Harbor. He took a 2-0 decision from St. Joe's John Halm. Knopp carded a 42 compared to Halm's 53.

In team strokes, Oak Harbor had a 172 compared to St. Joe's 179.

"I think we surprised them with our play," St. Joe head coach John Kahle said. "We actually won the match at the ninth hole. Steve Poseler and John Szabo each picked up an extra team point for us on the final hole."

"Poseler had a par four compared to a five for Murray which gave Poseler both a point for holes and strokes. Then Szabo had a four and Murray a six that gave Szabo the point for total strokes."

# Lytle, Price Set Pace For Cindermen

**BOWLING GREEN** — Next comes Elyria.

Fremont Ross tuned up for its important meeting at Harmon Stadium Thursday with Elyria by routing Bowling Green and Napoleon in a triangular meet Tuesday. The Little Giants, who are now 3-0 on the campaign, recorded 80 points while Napoleon finished with 45 and Bowling Green 37.

Ross had six individual places — two in the field events and four running — in the 15 event program. But two speedsters, Rob Lytle and Ken Price accounted for both of the track wins.

Price, who's only a sophomore, won both the hurdle events. He took the highs in 15.5 and then turned in a 20.8 to outdistance the field in the lows.

Lytle remains undefeated in the 100 and 220. He had a 10.2 in the century yesterday and came back with a 22.1 in the quarter.

Tom Liggins and Jeff Opelt notched the other first place points for the Little Giants. It was the second individual win of the campaign for both.

Liggins took the shot put competition with a heave of 53 feet five inches while Opelt, a

sophomore had a winning pole vault of 12-0.

"Ken Price is doing a heckuva job for us right now," Little Giant head coach Ron Brant said. "He's closing in on both school records. He has the potential to take both of them if he continues to work."

The school record (15.1) in the high hurdles was established in 1937 by Pete Fox. The low hurdle standard is 20.0 and was authored by Ron Whitcomb in 1954.

Brant also commented about the performances of Lytle, Liggins, Jeff Opelt and Kim Michael.

"The sprint times of Lytle were good for that track and this time of the year," Brant said. "We're pleased with the progress he's making."

"Liggins also is getting good distance in the shot put. He could also break the school record (55-10). Opelt has been a very pleasant surprise for us so far."

"Michael high jumped 6-0 for second place. That's the best he has done in his career."

The Little Giants also picked up first place points in the 880 relay. Jim Heidelberg, Randy Robertson, Liggins and Lytle finished with a neat 1:35.6.

Besides Michael, Ross also had second places from Bob Koebel (shot put), Jim Heidelberg (long jump and 220), Tom Pitts (440) and Kirk Stout (880).

Of the second place point-getters, Michael, Liggins and Stout are the only seniors. Koebel and Pitts are juniors while Heidelberg is a sophomore.

Koebel also took a third in the discus competition. A pair of sophomores, Tim Smith and Terry Shearon, also bagged third place points. Smith competed in the 440 and Shearon the low hurdles.

The Thursday match with Elyria shapes up as a revenge meet for Ross. Elyria was the only team that beat the Little Giants last spring when Ross finished with a sparkling 9-1 record. The Pioneers also nosed out Ross for a second in the Buckeye Conference competition and then were the only team to beat the Little Giants in football last fall.

Gibsonburg has picked up where it left off last spring in the Sandusky Bay Conference baseball race.

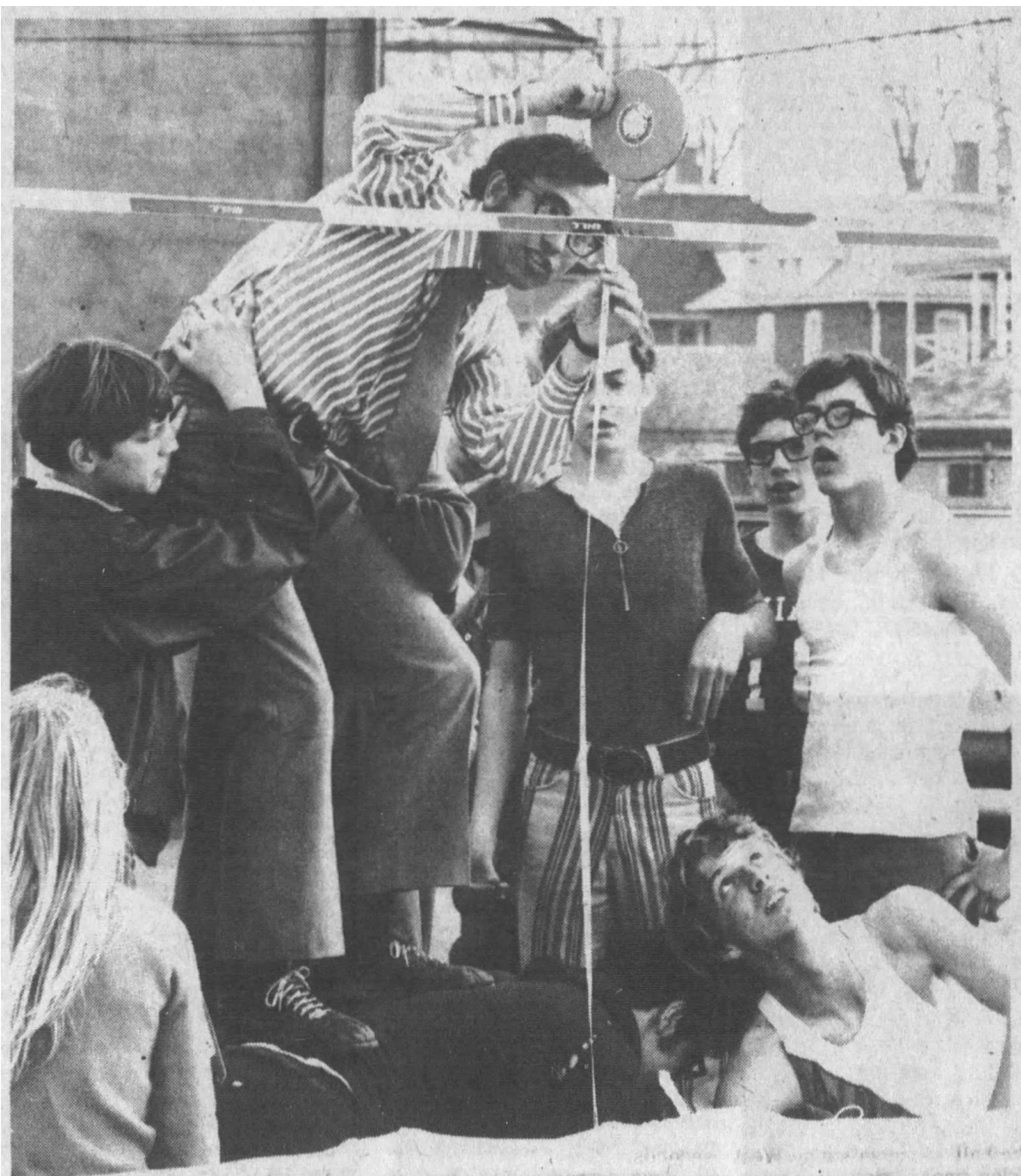

The baseball player's strike which has left a sour taste in the mouths of everyone—owners, players and fans—came to a screeching halt Thursday.

The Major League season will begin in earnest Saturday when all clubs swing into action.

But what remains ahead? Only time and the fans can provide the answer to that question.

It's going to be interesting to see how the fans react to the dispute when the players take the field. Will the stadiums be packed or will many be half empty because of a nationwide boycott that has been advocated by some individuals?

We feel certain that the stadiums throughout the nation will have their normal crowds. At Shea Stadium in New York, that means the Met followers will pack the place. And at Cleveland, the Indians will have their normal crowd of about 14,000 for a Saturday contest.

We don't think there should ever be a strike in sports. The baseball players and owners have certainly learned that it wasn't worth it and we feel sure the athletes in other sports will take a long look before they ever think of striking.

The impact of the strike won't be known for a long time—Oakland owner Charlie Finley said this week it would be five years before anyone could determine how much the week stoppage has affected the "Grand Old Game."

But we're sure of one thing, baseball has suffered a tremendous loss. Any firm that has a strike never fully recovers. The big business—auto makers and steel firms and their employees—never recover from a strike.

Baseball will be the same.

## Pacers Advance With Narrow Playoff Win

Coach Bob Leonard and the Indiana Pacers can relax now for all of two days. Then all they have to do is play the Utah Stars in the American Basketball Association's West Division final series.

"This series has been awful tough," Leonard said after the Packers whipped the Denver Rockets 81-49 Thursday night in the West Division semifinal playoffs. "It's been tough both physically and mentally and I can't look ahead to Utah yet. Any time you play a seven-game series like this you've got to relax a little."

Indiana turned back a Denver rally late in the game and got a stellar performance from Freddie Lewis with 20 points and great defense including two blocked shots in the final 14 seconds.

Lewis scored the Pacers' final field goal with 1:31 left to give the winners a 90-87 lead. Denver's Ralph Simpson made it 90-89 with 25 seconds on the clock, then Lewis blocked his two shots, and Billy Keller added a free throw for Indiana.

Roger Brown tied Lewis for team honors with 20 points and Simpson was game-high with 30 points.

## Junior High Track Squads Score Wins

Fremont's seventh, eighth and ninth graders posted track victories Wednesday. Ninth grade team whipped Port Clinton, 80-4 to 28-1; eighth grade team beat Clyde, 36-4; and seventh grade squad downed Clyde, 62-19.

In the freshman meet, Larry Liggins and Ken Franks each won two events. Liggins captured firsts in the shot put and low hurdles events and Franks finished first in the 440 and 200-yard runs. Other first-place finishers for Fremont were Guy Cunningham, Neal Oberholzer, Bruce Good and Scott Barmann.

Eighth graders taking first place finishes for Fremont were: Rick Kusner, Victor Strimma, DeLeon, Terry Backley, Harold Darr, Terry Bates, Tom Bachman, Hal Hawk, Joel Bollenbacher, Randy Nahn, and John Robertson. Kusner set new school records in both the shot put and discus events. He put the shot 46-5 while whipping the discus 103-4. Kusner also ran the 100-yard dash in an 11.5 clocking.

First, Ross was beaten quite handsily by the Pioneers in a dual meet at Ely Stadium last spring. It was the only defeat the Little Giants were to suffer.

Then the Pioneers edged the Purple and White for second place in the Buckeye Conference meet.

Last fall the two rivals met in the sixth game of the football campaign with unbeaten records and when Harmon Stadium had cleared it was the Pioneers who still had the lily white report card.

Elyria followed with a second place finish in the Buckeye Conference cross country meet while Ross struggled to end up fifth when Brant thought the Giants had a better squad. And, to make matters even more embarrassing, the Pioneers took a pair of convincing wins from the Little Giants on the basketball floor this winter and then managed to win the Buckeye Conference wrestling championship while Ross placed second.

So, the Little Giants were taking dead aim at the Pioneers when they arrived 35 minutes after yesterday's meet was scheduled to get under way.

"This was our revenge," said Ross' star sprinter Rob Lytle, who took both the 100 and 200 and ran the anchor for the winning 800 relay.

Lytle gave one of the finest performances ever by a sprinter in ancient Harmon Stadium. He tied the stadium record (10.8) in the century and only missed by the 220 standard (22.2) by a tenth of a second.

"It was one of the best showings ever by a sprinter on that track," Brant said. "I've never seen anyone perform like that since I've been here."

In the 100, Lytle was matched against Elyria's sensational speedster Ike Maxwell, who came into the meet with credentials just as impressive as Lytle's.

"That was the big shootout," Brant said. "That was the race everyone came to see."

With a crowd that Brant described as being "the biggest dual meet crowd in Harmon Stadium since I've been coaching here," watching Lytle get a quick start and had Maxwell looking at his back throughout the race.

The timers clocked the powerfully built Maxwell in 10.05 but many observers at the finish line thought Lytle had a much larger margin.

Then in the 200, Lytle got the lead in the first 25 yards and never gave it up. Maxwell was beaten after the first 100 yards and Lytle Giant sophomore Jim Heidelberg managed to grab a second while Maxwell could garner only a third.

Lytle's breath-taking win in the century, which tied the Harmon Stadium record, was one of three turning points in the meet according to Brant, who will take the Giants to Tiffin for the William Krause Relays Saturday.

Brant also figured an upset victory by sophomore Jim Heidelberg in the long jump and one-two finish by Kirt Stout and Chris Widman in the mile as being the keys to their startling upset.

"First Heidelberg best Maxwell in the long jump," Brant said. "I'm sure they never expected a sophomore to beat

Maxwell. Then Maxwell lost again to Lytle in the 100 and Kirt and Chris followed with that fine showing in the mile.

"I'm sure that broke Elyria's spirit. They didn't seem to have anything left after that. They just seemed to be going through the motions."

The wins in the 100 and mile ignited the Little Giants. They followed with an impressive win in the 800 relay and then Tom Pitts and Tim Smith picked up a first and third in the 440.

Phil Oliver broke the Ross blitz with a win for the Pioneers in the 180 low hurdles, but Ross came back to win the final four races.

Stout picked up his second win by a full second in the 800, Lytle followed in the 220 to ice the victory. Then the Giants swept all three places in the two mile before adding five more points with an impressive victory in the mile relay.

"It was a total team victory," a beaming Brant said. "The kids did everything we asked them to do."

Brant was probably the most surprised person in the stadium when the final victory margin of 41 points was posted. In fact, Brant wasn't expecting a victory.

"On paper Elyria was a much better club than we were," Brant said. "I thought we could get beaten by anywhere between 20 and 27 points."

"But we had a meeting with the kids on Wednesday and told them what they needed to do. It was just a super effort on the part of everyone."

The Little Giants were just as impressive in the field events as they were on the track. Liggins led the Giants to a 1-2 finish in the shot put. Rob Koebel was second.

Elyria's Dale Griffin took first in the discus, but Ross countered with a second and third from Andy Sale and Koebel.

Sophomore Jeff Opelt continued to please the coaches. He finished second in the pole vault where he lost first based on the number of misses. Opelt and Elyria's Jim Snook both went 12-6.

And, in the high jump senior Kim Michael finished second, but in the process he established a new school record. Michael cleared 6-1 to crash the old mark of 6-4 which was established back in 1957.

"I'm real happy for Kim," Brant said. "He's been working to get that record for two years. Now, since he does have it I think he's going to go even higher for us."

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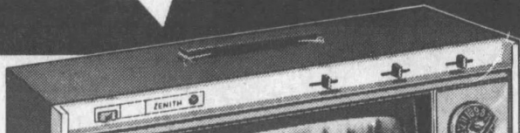
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# Findlay Cindermen End Winning Skein

FINDLAY—The rubber match involving the track and field squads from Ross and Findlay will take place at the Fremont Night Relays Friday.

The Trojans, after finishing 16 points behind the Little Giants at the William Krause Relays in Tiffin Saturday, turned the tables in a dual meet Tuesday and whipped Ross, 74-53.

The loss crushed a Ross dual meet winning skein that had extended to nine meets over a two year period. It dropped the Little Giants to 4-1 this spring.

"The meet was similar to our meet with Elyria last Thursday," Ross head coach Ron Brant said. "Once Findlay got rolling we couldn't stop them."

All was not lost for Ross, however.

Even though he finished second in the 180 low hurdles, Ken Price established a new Ross record with a 19.9 clocking. It broke the old mark of 20.0 set during the 1954 season by Ron Whitcomb.

Findlay's Hal Paul nipped Price at the finish line by a tenth of a second. Paul also picked off

firsts in the long jump (20-0) and 120 high hurdles (15.1).

Ross' junior sprinter Rob Lytle turned in a 9.975 in taking the 100. He is unbeaten in the century this spring. But in the 220 Lytle was nicked at the finish line by Curt Hippensteel in a disputed decision. Timers clocked Hippensteel in 22.4 while Lytle had a 22.45.

The Little Giants tallied first place points in two other running events. Tom Pitts won the 440 with a 55.1 and was followed to the finish line by sophomore teammate Tim Smith (55.9).

Price, Lytle, Smith and Pitts combined to win the mile relay in 3:40.6. They had almost a three second edge over the Findlay quartet.

Ross was outscored 27-18 in the field events but did have a pair of firsts. Tom Liggins took the shot put (50-3¼) while Kim Michael paced the high jumpers.

Michael and Paul both cleared 5-10, but Michael was awarded first based on the number of misses.

Junior Bob Koebel continues to give Ross field events points. His 47-2¼ effort in the shot was good for second and he added a third in the discus by hurling the platter 122-10½.

## Ross Golfers Pocket No. 3

FINDLAY—A two-over-par performance by junior Bob Moll sparked Fremont Ross to a 10½-2½ win over defending Buckeye Conference champion Findlay at Findlay Country Club Tuesday.

Moll, who lettered as a sophomore, shot a 37-37-74 playing in the No. 2 position. His sparkling play — 14 pars, three bogeys and one birdie — earned a 3-0 decision over Craig Vandlik, who shot a 40-39-79.

MARION — The better the competition the more Rob Lytle likes it.

The ace of the Ross sprint corps was at his very best for the Marion Night Relays Friday and was one of only two contestants who took away more than one first place.

Lytle, with the best performance of his career, out-distanced the field in the 100-yard dash and then came back to pick up the first place medal in the 220-yard dash.

## Track-Field Victory

Ross reeled off 10 first places compared to Tiffin Columbian's four in an abbreviated track and field meet at muddy Harmon Stadium Monday.

Other underclassmen who score in individual events include Bob Koebel, Doug Kridler and Robertson.

Koebel was second in the shot put while Kridler had the longest leap of his career (20-1) to finish second in the long jump and Robertson placed third in the 100.

## Liggins Named Top Senior Athlete

### At Ross High Sports Awards Night

A brilliant individual career and a sparkling high school sports year came to a close in the Ross High School cafeteria last night with the annual Spring Sports Awards Night.

The end of Tom Liggins' career as a Little Giant ended with a standing ovation as he walked to the podium to accept the Jack Baron-Tom Sherman Memorial Trophy, symbolic of being named the school's outstanding senior athlete by members of the coaching staff and administration.

"There isn't too much a person can say at a time like this," the popular Liggins said. "I just want to say thank you to all the coaches for all the things that you have done for me."

Liggins' appearance at the podium to receive the coveted trophy didn't come as a surprise to anyone in the audience.

"He is one of the finest young men I've ever known—on and off the athletic field," Ross' Athletic Director Dick Sherman said. "Ross High School can be proud of him, his parents can be very proud and so can his race. It will be a long time before we forget the accomplishments of Tom Liggins at Ross High School."

The presentation to Liggins followed ceremonies honoring the baseball, golf, tennis and track and field squads. Special awards were given in each sport and the varsity athletes who qualified also received their letters.

Little Giant head baseball coach Tom Dorman introduced his three tri-captains, Jim Fausey, Roger Hetrick and Chuck Lindsey, who helped lead the Little Giants to an 11-6 record and Class AAA sectional championships.

Lindsey, who led the squad in practically every offensive and defensive category, was also named the most valuable player. The award for the best offensive player went to Mike Lowery while Hetrick received the trophy for being the best defensive performer.

Dorman awarded letters to 14 varsity players—eight seniors, five juniors and a sophomore.

For the first time in Charlie Baker's five-year tenure as Little Giant golf coach, two players, Jim Decker and Bob Moll, were named most valuable. The two juniors played in

the number one and two positions for the Purple and White throughout the 11-3 dual meet season. The dual meet mark represented the best record in Ross links history.

Moll, by the vote of his teammates, was also named honorary captain of the squad. That honor usually goes to a senior, but there was only one senior on this year's roster and he didn't play a varsity match.

The senior—Dave Wightman—along with two juniors and a pair of sophomores received letters from Baker.

Larry Shilling, a junior, received two of the five special awards given for tennis. He was named captain and also most valuable by his teammates.

Other special tennis trophies went to Ron Kanan (most points), Jeff Wingo (most games) and Steve Frost (most improved).

Tennis coach Pete Michaels, who watched the Little Giants close their campaign at the Rodger Young Park Courts today against Port Clinton starting at 4 p.m., gave letters to four seniors, five juniors and one sophomore.

Liggins joined Ken Price at the speaker's stand to receive a captain's trophy for track and field. They were elected at the start of the season by their teammates.

A junior, Rob Lytle, who was the leading scorer on this year's squad which had a glittering 8-2 record was the most valuable track and field athlete.

Lytle was beaten only once in the 100-yard dash this spring—at the district finals last Saturday by the defending state champion, Bob Lawson of Toledo Libbey. Lytle also ran in the 220 and was a member of the Ross mile relay quartet.

Ross High Principal Duane Wamsley didn't leave the cafeteria empty-handed. He was given a sectional baseball trophy, Buckeye Conference and Northwest District golf trophies plus track and field trophies for the Fremont and Tiffin Night Relays to put in the bulging Ross trophy case.

"This has to be one of the finest overall athletic years Ross has had in a long time," Wamsley told the audience. "I think Ross is on the way back and will be a contender in all sports in the near future."

For three of the track and field participants and the four-man golf team, the season isn't over. They still have appearances in their respective state meets in Columbus this weekend.
