Defense key to Ross game

If a basketball coach does not have a lot of size or a lot of experience, there are two things that he can do: go find the nearest dark corner and hide or prepare his team to think defensively.

Ross Head Coach Ken Miller meets all those factors only he has not given a thought about hiding in the corner and for all intents and purposes, his team has not given that extreme measure a thought.

Miller sat in his office in Ross High School and thought awhile before talking about his fourth Little Giants hardwood team. When he finally started to talk, he confirmed the defensive thinking.

"We don't have a lot of size or experience," he reaffirmed, "so in order for us to get the job done, we are going to have to be prepared mentally to do a strong aggressive job on defense."

"In other words, our whole game centers around defense."

Miller, whose team got off to a wobbly 2-6 start before winning seven of eight last season returns three lettermen who played instrumental parts in Ross' final 10-10 mark. The brightest hope is probably 6-6 senior Dave Fahrbach, a third team All-Buckeye Conference selection a year ago.

The one-year lettermen who will draw the starting assignment against Fostoria Wednesday in the season home opener, showed glimpses of brilliance last year but during practice this fall has been hampered by a foot injury.

A pair of returning guards, two-year letterman Garry Clark, a senior, and single letter winner Pat

Belch, also a senior, will handle the out front spots for the Little Giants.

"Fahrbach is probably our biggest offensive threat," Miller speculated, "but Clark and Belch can also score."

Teamed with this threesome will be a pair of seniors who stood out on the Ross JV squad a season ago; John Kiser, and Denney Smith.

Kiser is 6-0 while Smith is a high jumping 6-2. Both will go at forward slots.

Backing up the first Ross five for the Fostoria game will be 5-8 senior Kim Stout at guard, 6-2 senior Randy Smith (played JV ball as a sophomore but sat out last season) at forward, and 6-5 sophomore Larry Williams who will help Fahrbach with the center duties.

Miller rates his team's over all quickness as its biggest asset. "We are going to have to put it to use by playing a tight man-to-man defense," he said.

Pointing to the fact that his team has been inconsistent in scrimmages from the mental aspect of the game, Miller feels that he and assistant coach Don Burgess have the Little Giants to the point where they know they have to be "competitive to win."

Some of the mental problems that the Ross squad has faced in scrimmage are defensive breakdowns. "You have to have all five doing the job because when one breaks down, everything breaks up."

Rebounding will be one of the items Ross will have to work hard on this season. Because of the size element, Miller concedes that he will have to send more people after the ball this season, consequently, Ross' fastbreak possibilities may be canceled out the bigger portion of the time.

"We don't really force the fast break on them," Miller said. "They have the green light to go if it is there but we have to get the ball first."

Fahrbach and Smith are rated as the best Ross rebounders with Smith's inexperience at the varsity level a possible handicap when it comes to positioning.

At the offensive end of the court, Miller says his teams have always been pattern oriented but this year's team will have to be diversified.

"When one of the big scorers is out," he said, "we are going to have to go deliberate — when everyone is intact, we will play our normal game."

Ross gets its first chance to act "normal" Wednesday night when they host Fostoria, a team that the Little Giants pounded 57-26 in the opener last season. The junior varsity game begins at 6:30 p.m. with the doors to the school opening at 6:15.

Rod Winke scored 20 points to lead Riverview. Jay Willmeth with 13 and Jim Smith with 11 scored all of School of Hope's points.



Young cagers impressive as Fremont wins, 47-31

Ross High School's head basketball coach Ken Miller wasn't particularly surprised that his Little Giants got off to a slow start in their season opener against Fostoria Wednesday night, but he had some good reasons to be pleasantly surprised by the work of some of his young cagers.

The Giants, after struggling for almost a half, pulled away from the visiting Redmen and posted a 47-31 victory.

"I thought both of our starters who didn't have any varsity experience did an outstanding job," Miller said after the game. "Once they got a little experience they were quite poised I thought."

John Kiser and Denny Smith, two seniors who were key men on the Ross junior varsity team last year, played big roles as the Giants moved from a deficit late in the second quarter to a solid lead by the end of the third period.

Both scrambled on defense and Kiser had five points and Smith four as Ross moved away in the third period.

Kim Stout and sophomore Larry Williams also gave Miller something to smile about.

Stout, the backup guard, "did an outstanding job coming off the bench," Miller said. "He knows what he has to do."

"And, I thought Larry Williams held up real well for a sophomore."

Williams saw plenty of action and had a couple of key buckets when the Little Giants were behind early in the second quarter.

Williams is due to continue seeing plenty of action, working as one of three Ross big men who will be shuffling in and out of the lineup. Williams, Smith and senior center Dave Fahrbach play the shuffling game and Miller has good reason.

"We are going to have to alternate because our defense is so demanding on the big man." The Ross press, as is the case in many successful full court presses, has the big men putting pressure on the in-bounds pass. That means, as Miller points out, "They have to be tough on their men from end line to end line."

So, Miller had some reasons to be pleasantly surprised even though he "expected that slow start."

That expectation was fulfilled as the Giants struggled for the first period and most of the second, having difficulty finding the hoop and the opening in the defense.

"We had some kids without any experience out there and Fahrbach hasn't practiced much during the last six days because of a sore foot," Miller explained.

Fahrbach was one of those who had some problems in the early going, but once he got loosened up the lucky center began to standout in the crowd.

He finished the night with 12 points as one of three Little Giant players in double figures and was a dominant figure on the boards.

Other double figure scorers for the Giants were Kiser with 11 and Garry Clark with 10. Clark and Pat Belch started at the guard spots for the Giants and helped the Giants fight off their first game problems with their scrappy floor play.

After trailing for most of the first half, the Giants finally went ahead to stay on Clark's basket with just 40 seconds to go before the intermission. Clark took a timely pass from Fahrbach after working himself free along the baseline. Fahrbach then canned a hook with just six seconds on the clock and the Giants took a 21-18 lead into the lockerroom.

The lead seemed to help the Giants relax and they began finding the open man, moving more confidently and hitting the mark with their shots. They outscored Fostoria 14-6 in the third period to put the game out of reach.

Fostoria had some of its own first game problems, but many of those could be directly attributed to the Ross defense. The Little Giants' pressing man to man was active and persistent throughout the night, forcing some turnovers and making the Redmen take some poor shots.

The Ross High reserve team also scored a opening game victory. The reserves thrashed the Fostoria crew, 42-27.

The Little Giants do not play again until they tangle with Mansfield at home next Friday.

Mansfield at Ross tonight

Elyria is favored in Buckeye race

The race to see who can get ahead of Elyria begins tonight in the hardwood battles of the Buckeye Conference.

The Pioneers, winners of the title last season with an overall 22-2 mark, were picked by seven of the eight BC coaches to win the 1975-76 crown. The eighth coach, Mike Riley of Elyria, said the conference is well balanced with any one of four teams capable of winning the title.

Games around the conference tonight have Admiral King visiting Elyria; Findlay at Lorain; Marion at Sandusky; and locally, Ross will host Mansfield.

Elyria returns 6-9 junior Richard Montague, who lettered as a 6-6 sophomore. Riley has built his team around the lanky center this season and stopping him will be difficult.

Mansfield, Admiral King, and Findlay are picked to battle for second spot with Lorain and Sandusky being noted as the loop's "dark horses." Ross and Marion are not given much of a shot at escaping the lower two rungs of the BC ladder.

Ross split with Mansfield last season as each team won at home. The Tygers have six returning lettermen, four of them sophomores.

In their only game to date, the Tygers lost to Ashland 57-50, despite three players hitting double figures. Eric Jefferson, 6-2, and Don Gross, 6-2, both canned 15 points. Jefferson is a junior and Gross, a senior.

Bernard Ford, 6-0 senior who played at Mansfield Madison last season, dropped

in 11 points. The rest of the Tyger lineup against Ross will probably consist of Brent McFarland, 6-0 senior, Cliff Belmer, 6-2 junior, or Joe Adamescu, 6-4 junior.

Ross coach Ken Miller will counter with 6-6 senior Dave Fahrbach as center; senior John Kiser (5-11) and Denny Smith (6-2) at forwards; and seniors Pat Belch (5-10) and Garry Clark (5-10) at guards.

The Mansfield game is part of a double weekend for the Little Giants. Saturday night, Wapakoneta will visit the home of the Little Giants.

Both evenings begin with the junior varsity game at 6:30 p.m. at the Ross gym.

Other area teams in action tonight will have Margaretta going up against Danbury-Lakeside at the Lakers' home.

A full slate of games is scheduled in the Suburban Lakes League. Genoa is at Oak Harbor in the inaugural game at the new Oak Harbor High School.

Lakota visits Gibsonburg, Eastwood at Woodmore, and Otsego is at Elwood.

Galion will visit Bellevue in a northern Ohio League game and Port Clinton will visit Bedford, Mich. in a Great Lakes League encounter.

In the Seneca County League, Bettsville will take on Old Fort on the latter's home court in the first of the two school's annual shootouts. The game marks the first SCL game for each school.

"I'm not using this as an excuse for our performance, what I am talking about, is entirely divorced from the game," the Ross coach finished his blast at what he considered poor pregame coverage of Ross games.

Ross thumps Wapakoneta 67-40; Clark nets 24

Ross reacted on a lesson from the coaches' pep talk Saturday night and cast out a hapless Wapakoneta Redskins basketball team. Playing the pressure defense, Ross bounced back from a lackluster showing on Friday night to outmatch the Redskins 67-40.

The turnaround, two in three games, was in doubt for only the first few seconds. Garry Clark, who had his biggest night in three years of play for the Ross varsity with 24 points, dropped in a layup off the opening tip for a 2-0 Ross lead three seconds into the game. Ross slapped on its full court pressuring man-to-man after the basket and the issue was settled.

"It was a good comeback," assistant varsity coach Don Burgess explained after the game, referring to the Ross 58-48 loss to Mansfield on Friday. "We played a good hustling, aggressive defense, the kind that we preach."

The preaching taken to heart, Ross forced three quick turnovers and bounded out to a 9-0 lead on Denny Smith's bucket, and two free

throws and a bucket by Dave Fahrbach. Kurt Hegemier ended the Ross scoring domination with a goal from the middle for Wapak 5:10 mark.

Hegemier scored the first eight points as the Redskins closed to within 14-8 but a Clark charity toss and a bucket got the little Giants rolling and started turning the night into a nightmare for Wapak.

"Clark had a good driving game," Ross Head Coach Ken Miller recalled after the game and then added, "Last night we had to play with the same intensity that we did tonight."

Hegemier was actually the only offense the Redskins could muster. The only returning letterman, the 6-3 forward dropped in 16 points before having to depart the game with a cut over his left eye in the third period. He did not return to the floor and finished the game, trailing 54-34 at the end of the third stanza, scored only six points without him in the final period.

The only thing that bothered the Ross coaches was the fouls that the Little Giants committed.

Ross was charged with 10 fouls in the first period alone and 21 in the game.

"That was probably the biggest disappointment of the night," Burgess said about the fouls. "There was too much reaching and grabbing but when you play an aggressive defense you will get the fouls. The reaching and grabbing comes when you are tired and we may have been tiring the game Friday toward the end of the game."

Wapak used a man-to-man defense but switched to a pressure 2-2-1 zone in the third period which immediately forced Miller to call timeout.

"The fouls we had did not force us to adjust anything," he said. "We did make an adjustment when they went to the zone but our kids adjusted well after the time-out."

Fahrbach was the only casualty of the fouls, being whistled to the splinters with 5:17 to go in the game. He scored 11 points before being exiled. Clark's 24 led the Little Giants whose final 27 point lead was the biggest of the night.

Smith tossed in 14 for his season high.

Hegemier's 16 paced Wapak. He was the only double figure scorer for the Redskins.

Coach Jim Miller's junior varsity team upheld its record to 5-0 with a 43-32 win. The JV held a commanding 22-7 lead at the half. Dan Sachs and Tim Price with eight points apiece led the JV's. Eddie Jones added seven.

Tygers rip Little Giants 58-48

It took Ross forward John Kiser only 12 seconds to score the first two points of the game against Mansfield but after that, the Ross Rockets were off and far apart.

Mansfield, after a slow start, warmed up to thump Ross 58-48 in the Buckeye Conference lidlifter for both schools. The Tygers stumbled to a slow start but started to take charge in the second period. By the time the first few moments of the second half rolled around, the Tygers were in control.

Ross was stone cold in the field and the free throw line for the night. No matter what they tried, nothing seemed to work and the farther the game progressed, the more futile the Little Giants attempts became.

Playing a full court man-to-man pressing defense, Ross was even at the end of one 10-10 tie. The Tygers had given the ball away nine times in the initial period and did not find the handle on the ball until midway through the second eight minutes of play.

At that point the Tygers, with Bernard Ford tossing in eight points in the period, built up a 29-10 lead before the second half began. Fahrbach canned a shot from the left side to cut the margin to six. The Tygers then began what Mansfield coach Jim Goode considered the turning point of the game.

"When we got those two baskets at the end of the first half, it seemed to really get our kids up," Goode said. "Then when we got those two quick baskets at the start of the third quarter, that gave us a 14-point lead."

Defensively, the way the Tygers played did not surprise their coach.

"That's all we do in practice is work on our defense," the Tyger handler pointed out.

"Really, though, we wanted to stop Fahrbach but I still think we got his points. We did stop the other players."

Fahrbach led all scorers with 22 points but the next best scoring for Ross was turned in by John Kiser and Denny Smith with six points apiece. Mansfield was led by Ford's dozen. A trio of other Tygers, Eric Jefferson, Joe Adams, and Brent McFarland, notched 10 points.

Goode, whose team plays a tight man-to-

man defense that is built on quickness and quickness, was slow picking up the men and we were not getting the pressure that we would have liked to have seen."

Miller hinted that he may have some doubts about the type of pressing man-to-man defense that his team has played in the first two games of the season.

"I think a lot of our kids don't have the endurance to play a base line to base line defense. I know it seemed that every phase of our game tailed off after awhile."

Ross will host Wapakoneta tonight at the high school. The junior varsity game will begin at 6:30 p.m.



"I know one thing," Ross coach Ken Miller pointed out in a universal coaches' comment, "we must be prepared for anything."

Miller did say that his team would be "ready to meet the press."

Last year, Harding and Ross split with both teams winning on each other's home floors.

Harding, like Ross, fields a team that lacks a lot of experience. There is some but three returning people who did see varsity action for the Prexies did not start all the games last season.

Chief returnee is Luther Jones, a high jumping 6-3 junior forward who had 12 points in his first three games. Teammed with Jones is another junior, Jeff Turner, 6-4.

At the guards will be a pair of junior varsity players from a season ago, 6-1 junior Bob Gooding and

6-1 senior Jeff Kirkpatrick. The center is Clyde Lutsch, a 6-6 junior.

Chief subs for Coach Doug Riley's squad is Mickey Williams, a letterman, who plays forward. He is a 6-3 senior. In the first game of the season, Williams tossed in 18 points but has cooled off to six in his last two contests.

The center replacement is burly 6-2, 230-pound Darrell Middleton with Thurmon Floyd, senior, 5-11, and Kelly McGowan, junior, 5-7, at the guards.

"They tried a man-to-man press and two different zones against Sandusky," Miller said when he was asked what defense he expected to face.

"Against them, Sandusky pressed and they had trouble with it," Miller said.

As for his team, Miller

will start the same five that have opened the first three games of the season. At center will be Dave Fahrbach, 6-6, with 6-2, Denny Smith and 5-11 John Kiser at forwards. The guards will be 5-10 Pat Belch and 5-10 Garry Clark.

Clark hit 24 points in last Saturday's win over Wapakonetta (67-40), which is the top point effort of the season for Ross.

"We are going to go with what we have spent a large amount of time working on," Miller said, indicating that his team will stick with the full court press and a tight man-to-man.

Ross' success against Wapak was explained by Miller as being relaxed after being "uptight" against Mansfield on Friday night.

"The fact we were uptight affected our shooting and offensive execution," he said. "Then we got behind for the first time this season and it was the first time they experienced that as a team."

That's one experience that Miller and his Little Giants will be trying to avoid Friday night.

Deliberate Ross sacks Harding

MARION — The dark depths of Marion Harding High School's gym was no place for "race horse" basketball fans Friday night.

There were no shot a second offenses or fire at will strategy. Instead there was patient deliberate offense.

Ross proved that patience and being deliberate with virtues by using both to win its third game in four contests with a 48-44 Buckeye Conference win over the Harding Presidents. The win evened the Little Giants' BC mark at 1-1 but dropped Harding to 0-2 in the conference and 0-4 overall.

Denny Smith, who two years ago had not competed in an organized basketball game, hit three clutch layups in the final period to turn the tide of the game toward Ross. The 6-2 senior popped in 12 for the night but really made his presence in the final eight minutes.

"He hit three key drives," Ross Coach Ken Miller confirmed. "I think when he got the easy layups in the final period, that really got us the game."

With Harding playing a tight man-to-man defense which, according to Miller cut off the Ross passing lanes, the Little Giants were forced out and away from the basket in the final eight minutes. Miller had its team working deliberate in the period with the idea of getting the middle open for drives.

The Little Giants responded to the deliberate play by controlling the ball so much, that at times the offense ate up 30 seconds before a shot was taken and the shot usually came from in close.

Tied at 33-33 at the start of the final stanza, Smith gave Ross the lead with a layup off a missed shot by Dave Fahrbach. Two straight buckets by Fahrbach had Ross in front 39-33 before Harding's Jeff Turner scored on a layup off a pass over Ross' full court press.

Smith's second layup plus two free throws by Pat Belch upped the Little Giants' lead to 43-35, the biggest of the game. A bucket and two free throws by Mickey Williams cut Ross' lead to 43-39 before Smith dropped in another driving layup and Belch clicked again on two charity tosses to put Ross back up 47-39 with 1:35 to go. That was the game for Ross.

Harding had taken a 27-23 lead into the dressing room at the half thanks to a defense that limited Ross to a mere six shots in the second period.

"They were switching defenses quite well in the first half," Miller said. "The way they were switching was really unexpected."

Miller was pleased as he added "Our kids adjusted well to the switches so they did not get rattled."

Doug Riley, Harding's coach, was dejected but complimented Ross on the win by simply saying, "They played well."

About his own team Riley said, "We made a couple of mistakes — you can't dribble up the middle through a crowd and expect to keep it."

Riley was referring to two costly turnovers in the final period that led directly to Ross baskets that opened the lead from four to eight points for Ross.

Harding's offense plus whistles from the men in the striped shirts helped force Ross from its pressing man-to-man into a "2-3" zone in the latter stages of the second period. Playing deliberately, Marion's Bob Gooding and Jeff Kirkpatrick hit from long range to bring Ross out of the zone but the defensive switch accomplished what Ross wanted assistant coach Don Burgess said.

"We were just trying to buy time," Burgess said, "and we did get the time because they did not shoot right away. We didn't expect them to hit the two long shots though."

Ross will have little time to savor the win because Tuesday they face Findlay, an upset 46-45 winner over Elyria Friday night. The Little Giants take on the Trojans Tuesday at Findlay.

Dave Fahrbach was high for Ross with 13 against Harding with Smith's dozen next in line. John Kiser and Belch had nine apiece. Williams had 12 for Harding.

The Little Giants JV team lost its first game in four outings, 49-38 to the Harding JVs. Randy Hammer had 11 and Eddie Jones 10 for the Ross team.

Lorain next for Ross

Lorain started the season on the right foot but since that time, the Steelers have not had a leg to stand on in basketball action.

The Steelers bounced highly regarded Lorain Southview 62-44 in the season opener but have dropped the next three contests, including two Buckeye Conference encounters. The Lorain crew will roll into Fremont Friday night to test Ross, a disappointing loser (59-55) to Findlay Tuesday night.

"About the only thing I am disappointed with (other than the score) in the Findlay game," Ross Head Coach Ken Miller said Wednesday, "was the defense.

"We started out changing from man-to-man to zone and back and forth but we had to give it up when our kids became confused with the switching," Miller said. "I guess it's our (the coaches) fault that we put the kids on the floor that way."

But out of disaster, Miller did point out one thing that worked out for Ross in the defensive quandry. "Normally, being confused on defense as much as we were should have killed us but I think because we were so confused, it may have confused Findlay offensively."

Lorain is quick according to Miller but putting aside the defensive lull against Findlay, the veteran Ross coach said his team would open with the man-to-man. "I think we have the quickness to play them that way," he said.

Providing much of that quickness in the Steeler lineup is returning lettermen and starters Bernard George, Virgil Williams, and Bryson McCall.

George, a 6-0, senior, is the Steelers' chief scoring threat from the outside and on the fastbreak. In the

two BC games, he has dropped in an average of 17 points. Williams, 6-0, senior who was an All-Ohio football selection the past two years, cavorts at a forward spot and is mainly a defensive player.

McCall is the tallest of the Lorain crew at 6-3. The senior center ranks fourth in the BC scoring race behind George with a 15-point average.

"We may rest Fahrbach a little more each quarter," Miller pointed out. "When David gets tired, he has a tendency to get into foul trouble."

At 6-6, Ross can ill afford to lose Fahrbach's height on the boards. Spelling the Ross center will be sophomore Larry Williams who has scored 14 points in Ross' games to date.

Other games in the BC Friday, include a battle of the leaders at Sandusky. The Blue Streaks, with Paul Biddle (14.5) and 3-0 overall and 2-0 in the conference, will host Findlay, 5-1 and 3-0 in the BC.

At Elyria, the Pioneers (2-2) will be bidding for BC win number one against Mansfield (1-2 and 1-1). Admiral King, who along with Findlay and Sandusky is unbeaten in conference play with a 2-0 mark, will host Marion Harding (1-4 and 1-2) in the final conference game.

Slumbering Ross defense helps Lorain to 59-53 conference win

Lorain arrived late, started slowly, but speeded up, and left Ross with the feeling that they had never trudged through the doorway to the hallowed halls of the Little Giants' kingdom.

The Steelmen, delayed on the Ohio turnpike by a stubborn bus, played listlessly in the first 16 minutes but set fire to the nets in the third period and outlasted the Little Giants to a 59-53 Conference win over the Little Giants. The win was the first in conference play for the Steelmen in three outings and dropped the Ross squad to 1-3 in B.C. play.

Lorain Coach Dale Reichert, not so handy with taken down by his starter at half time and up on the Steelmen. Trailing 23-21 at the half, Lorain nipped off 22 points in the third period to leave the Little Giants reeling.

"We made a change in our offensive starts," the Steelmen's coach said. "We had the low post men come instead of coming straight out when we went on offense."

While that may have keyed the Lorain pullaway, Ross assistant coach Don Burgess had a better description.

"We just went to sleep on defense," he said. "They beat us down the floor and then ate us up on the inside."

Ross Head Coach Ken Miller backed up his assistant's thinking. "It (Ross' defense) just didn't get the job done."

With Byron McCall pouring in 10 of his game high 25 points in the third quarter, Lorain bolted from the two-point halftime deficit to grab a 27-23 lead one minute into the third. The remainder of the quarter, keyed by McCall's two fielders, ran off six straight points to take a 42-31 lead, the biggest of the night.

Lorain opened the game with a tight "2-3" zone, switched to a pressing man-to-man late in the second quarter before switching back to the zone in the third period.

"Really it wasn't their defense as much as it was ours that beat us," Miller said in explaining that the Lorain zone did not affect his team all that much.

Then the Ross mentor threw a jab at the officials. "They (Lorain) are quick and they are a good ball club," he began, and then added, "as long as the officials (David Pagan of Ashland and Fred Cripe of Elkhart, Ind.) let them knock you around like they did."

Lorain, with McCall, Virgil Williams, and burly Kevin Huff, shoved, slammed, and pushed their way to domination on both boards and strangely enough, Reichert had his players clean up after the officials' boards to get the job accomplished.

"Our kids seem to forget about the defensive board," he explained. "They go to the offensive board well but I had to remind them at the half to concentrate on the defensive boards."

His attempts at bringing back memories to his team failed and helped shove Ross to its third loss in six games.

The Little Giants started slower than it took Lorain to get to Fremont but grabbed a 9-8 lead on Dave Fahrbach's bucket in the first quarter after trailing 0-3. Ross led after one stanza 11-10, fell behind twice in the second period, but took the lead at intermission before Fahrbach's bucket put the lid on Lorain's four.

The Little Giants never led in the second half after falling behind in the first minute but Ross did cut the Lorain lead to three at 54-51 with 2:09 to play. However, back-to-back buckets by Williams and McCall in the final minute erased the Ross hopes of pulling the game out of the fire.

Ross hit only 18 of 45 shots officially to Lorain's 25 of 56. The Steelmen fired in 11 of 19 in the third period while Ross had five of 11.

In addition to McCall's 25, Lorain got eight points from Williams, Huff, and Bernard George. Fahrbach led the Ross attack with 10. Pat Belch led the last ditch effort for Ross with eight last quarter points to go with his two of 11.

"What we do now," Miller concluded, "is pick up the pieces from here and go."

The Little Giants will get a chance to put the pieces together when they host Sandusky, Saturday, Dec. 27. The two teams remained undefeated Friday night with a 66-56 win over Findlay. Sandusky plays at Elyria tonight.

The Ross junior varsity game was canceled because of Lorain's late arrival.

Elsewhere, Michigan crushed Southern Illinois 85-50. Michigan then tripped Princeton 66-61 in the Michigan Invitational at Ann Arbor; Mississippi State nudged Dayton 56-54 and Long Beach State turned back Washington State 80-74 in the Dayton Classic at Dayton, Ohio.

Ross hosting Sandusky Saturday night

Ross will square off against the surprise team of the Buckeye Conference, Sandusky, Saturday night at the Little Giants home court.

The Blue Streaks, currently the BC's top scoring team with a 61.0 average, opened the season with four consecutive wins, which included the first three conference tilts. Sandusky dropped its first game of the season last Saturday night to a hot shooting Elyria quintet but still holds a share of the BC lead with Findlay at 3-1.

Led by Jesse Jackson, Paul Biddle, and Ken Pearson, the Blue Streaks are classified as a "quick team but not exceptionally tall," according to Ross coach Ken Miller.

"Against Elyria," Miller recalled, "Sandusky had a strong first half but I think the game the night before (a 66-56 win over Findlay) may have taken something out of them in the second half."

Elyria sank 11 straight shots in eight minutes in the contest to pull away for a 62-47 win.

Biddle is the tallest Blue Streak at 6-4. The junior center is 13th in the conference scoring race with 12 point average but has hit on 56 per cent of his shots. Jackson, a 5-10 senior guard, is 10th in the BC scoring parade with 12.8 norm, and, like Biddle, is hitting over 50 per cent from the field with a 53-plus percentile.

Pearson, a 6-3 senior, is dropping in points at a 10.3 pace in conference games to give the Blue Streaks three potent scorers. Teammed with that threesome is 6-2 senior John Clark and 5-8 junior Mike Pettit or 5-10 junior Mike Ehrhardt.

Normally, it is not unusual for Sandusky Coach Gary Reynolds to use 10-11 players during a game.

"They'll pick you up and play you base line to base line on defense," Miller said about the Sandusky

defensive system. "Primarily, they play man-to-man."

Ross is coming off a two-game losing streak with the last loss to Lorain 59-53 which dropped them to 1-3 in the conference.

"We have not developed consistency," Miller said about his team. "At times they have played a brand of ball better than any of the teams I have had here but we are not consistent."

Ross, as a team, is averaging 51 points per game in conference play, a figure that puts them dead last. Defensively, the Little Giants are second, allowing only 55 per game, five behind Elyria.

The junior varsity game will begin at 6:30 Saturday night.

In other Buckeye Conference games, Findlay will travel to Admiral King where a share of the conference lead is at stake. Findlay is 3-1, the same record as the Admirals after a 67-53 win over Lorain Tuesday night.

Elyria, 2-2 in the conference, will travel to Marion Harding. The Prexies are also 2-2 in BC play. The final conference tilt will send Lorain to Mansfield.

Sandusky soph too much for Ross

Sophomore Glen Redding helped Sandusky to "regroup" and at the same time, caused Ross Coach Ken Miller to see a replay.

Ross lost its third straight game 60-57 to the Blue Streaks in a game that was not as close as the score indicated. The win upped Sandusky's Buckeye Conference record to 4-1, good enough for the lead along with Admiral King. Ross slipped to 1-4 in the BC and 3-4 overall.

The Little Giants led at the half 23-22 but only because of some sloppy play by the Blue Streaks. The lead could have been more substantial for Ross but misses on six short shots early in the first period served as a warning to how erratic the Little Giants' play was to be in the game.

Gary Reynolds, Sandusky coach, pulled a switch on Ross by starting Redding and Ken Grant in place of Paul Biddle and Ken Pearson, the latter two of the top scorers in the conference.

"We played sluggish in the first half," Reynolds said about the obvious. "The people we started had not played together that much and it showed."

Denny Smith of Ross scored six of his 16 points for the night in the first period to lead Ross to a 12-12 tie. The Little Giants, taking charge of the boards early in the game, had taken a 12-7 lead but watched it melt away by going scoreless the last three minutes of the first stanza.

Pat Belch popped in five points to lead Ross to the narrow halftime lead. The Little Giants, showing a trait that has become common to them in the first six games of the season — missing free throws — connected on only five of 13 charity tosses to give Sandusky a first-half break.

The Blue Streaks, trailing by one, ripped off 11 unanswered points at the start of the second half before the stunned Little Giants could score. Two timeouts and nine turnovers into the period, Ross trailed 41-27 and the game was as good as in the bag for the Blue Streaks.

"We were trying to regroup our starting lineup," Reynolds explained while reflecting on his team's first half showing. "In the second half we started to get it together a little better."

Pearson made his appearance in the period and responded with six points. "He (Pearson) missed three days of practice because of the flu," Reynolds explained, "and his doctor and our trainer did not want him to play much."

Biddle, the other deposed Blue Streak starter, dropped in four points in the third period pullaway.

With the deposed starting duo scoring in the clutch, the man with his foot on the accelerator was Redding. The 5-10 soph, making his first varsity start,

pumped in 11 points in the period and continually befuddled Ross defenders with his drives and quick accurate jumpers from 15 feet or more.

"We are trying to bring him on slowly," Reynolds said about Redding.

Redding finished the night with 27 points to top all scorers. He hit all three of Sandusky's last period field goals as Ross crept close at the end.

Up 59-47 with less than two minutes to play, the Blue Streaks eased up and Ross warmed up a little. Three buckets by Smith, two more by Kim Stout, and a single fielder by Garry Clark closed the gap for Ross. Smith's layup with a second to play brought the Little Giants to within three but the issue was no longer in doubt at that point.

"This was just like a duplicate copy of last week's game with Lorain (Ross lost 59-53)," Miller recalled. "I don't think you could have come any closer to duplicating it even if you had drawn it up."

Commenting about the shift in the Sandusky lineup, Miller said, "It didn't make any difference who he started, they all played in their other games and have played about the same amount of time. I don't think he (Reynolds) really has a set lineup."

The third quarter breakdown by Ross was a mystery to the Ross coach. "I wish someone would tell me what happened in that period. We asked the players and they don't know and we (coaches) don't know either."

Smith's 16 led Ross with Clark notching 12, all in the second half. Dave Fahrbach added 11 for the Little Giants.

Ross came from a 13-0 count in the junior varsity game to dump the Blue Streaks 48-46 to up their record to 5-2. Eddie Jones led the Ross JVs with 14 points.

Elyria tonight for Ross

Smarting from three straight losses, Ross basketball Coach Ken Miller may be sending a "new look" Little Giants team onto the floor against Buckeye conference toughie, Elyria. The BC clash will begin with junior varsity play tonight at 6:30 p.m.

Miller, who has started the same lineup of Dave Fahrbach at center, John Kiser and Denny Smith at forwards, and Garry Clark and Pat Belch at the guards, in Ross's first seven games, said he will be going with that same lineup again but that it may not remain intact very long into the game.

The Ross coach had wanted to rest Fahrbach, the 6-6 senior by using sophomore Larry Williams two games ago but his plans were discarded when Williams became ill. Now it appears that Miller will be returning to that format.

While spelling the guards with Kim Stout as he has all along, Miller will be testing sophomore Randy Hammer, 5-10, at a wing spot at favor of Kiser or Smith.

"We are going to keep him (Hammer) eligible for two quarters of play in the varsity game," Miller said and added that Darrell Daniels, a junior who played two quarters against Sandusky after seeing action in the junior varsity game, will also be eligible for two quarters of varsity play.

Miller looked back over the recent

losses and said that the brute strength of conference teams has taken its toll on Ross.

"It seems that the strength of Buckeye Conference teams is the distinguishing feature of the conference," he said. "In the first half we can stay with the teams on brute strength but really start getting knocked around as we start to get tired in the second half."

Still, despite his team's 3-4 record, Miller has seen some bright spots and has not tossed the season away to a complete experiment with younger players.

A few of the bright spots occurred against Sandusky last Saturday in a 60-57 loss. Down by as many as 16 points, the Little Giants refused to cash in their chips and closed the gap on a very quick, potentially high scoring Blue Streaks squad.

Ross will face Elyria and its pressurized defense which features 6-9 junior Richard Montague. The guards are 5-9 Hubert Oliver and 5-9 Mark Haddox. The forwards are Robert Trice, 6-0, and Rick Hoskin, 6-0. Haddox and Hoskin are the only seniors on the starting Elyria five.

Elyria carries a 6-2 record overall and 3-2 BC slate after thumping Marion Harding 50-29 a week ago. They are the top defensive team in the BC allowing only a little over 46 points per game.

LORAIN — A "phantom" foul took the thunder out of the best show of the season for Ross and gave the Admirals just the kind of upset they wanted as the Admirals stop the Buckeye Conference standings.

out-of-bounds and had started upcourt when a shrill whistle was heard.

Stout had been called with tapping the wrist of Smith, who at 5-10 jumps like a 6-6 high jumper, as he was shooting. Smith called it putting the ball through the hoop and the Admirals took the foul and purposes had enough of an edge to keep Ross at bay.

Ross rally falls short

Say "third quarter" in the locker room at Ross High School and you see a pained expression appear on the faces of Ross basketball coach Ken Miller and his assistant Don Burgess.

The third quarter has been a jinx for the Little Giants in the last four contests and the Ross staff would just as soon not hear those two words. Like it or not, the third period was the Ross team's bugaboo again Saturday night but that stanza was a carry-over from Elyria's second quarter spurt.

Burgess expressed his views of the game by saying, "I thought our kids really gave us an effort."

"Defensively it was good — there were only two areas we should have been better and that was on the inside against Montague. We did not collapse on him and force him to 'kick' the ball out, instead he had the jumper from in close."

Garry Clark, fired in 17 points to lead Ross and all scorers in the game. His six points down the second quarter stretch kept the Little Giants hopes alive. Clark was the only Ross player in double figures. Montague finished with 15 with Hoskin taking top point honors for the Pioneers. Oliver finished with 12.

"All it takes is a couple of kids getting hot," Miller pointed out. "We may have had a little mental letdown after the game with Admiral King (a 58-57 loss Friday night) and you have to have a couple of players to ignite you."

It was Hammer that lit the fuse and Garry Clark that kept the fire burning high for Ross after the 5-10 sophomore's departure. Clark tossed in 21 points, 15 in the second half.

Hammer had a shooting night that bordered on the near perfect at the halftime break of the varsity game. The Ross hotshot had played two quarters of junior varsity ball and hit six of six shots in the third period for a Ross high 12 points. Eligible for only two more quarters of play for the night, Hammer started the second quarter of the varsity game and hit three of four shots.

With the four minutes to go in the half and Ross down 23-17, Miller called a timeout to straighten out the Little Giants' attack against the Polar Bears' "2-3" zone. Hammer, playing on the wing was prompted to shoot and responded with three straight shots to bring Ross back to only a 27-24 halftime deficit.

In the third period, Clark began to warm up with eight points but it was Hammer who hit the bucket to get Ross even at 32 with two minutes to go in the stanza. Clark scored from the corner to give Ross its first lead of the night (a lead they never lost) and Hammer's fielder from the left corner put Ross's lead up to four.

From that point, it was the scoring of Clark and Denny Smith plus the scoring and rebounding Dave Fahrbach down the stretch to complete the fourth Ross win in 10 games.

"I was just about ready to tell him (Damron) to go out to the top of the circle and shoot jump shots," a dejected George Patterson, coach of Woodward said about his star's poor shooting from the stripe.

Ironically, Damron could hardly miss from the field and led all scorers with 24 points.

"We just lost it at the line," Patterson said.

He was right on that point as both teams hit 24 buckets. Ross fired up 68 shots and Woodward, 65. Ross hit 14 of 19 free throws and outrebounded the Bears 49-33 while being guilty of only 14 turnovers, 12 in the first half.

Speaking of the Ross "ignitors" Miller concluded his views of the game, "We got a couple of kids to ignite up and David (Fahrbach) started to rebound better — things just started to fall into place."

All Miller has to hope for is that things continue to fall in the right places even if he has to "Hammer" them into place.

Ross loses heartbreaker to Mansfield

MANSFIELD — The second time around in the Buckeye Conference proved to be more of the frustrating same for the Ross High School Little Giant basketball team.

The Giants, who began their second swing around the Buckeye here Friday, dropped a heart-breaking 56-55 decision to the Mansfield Tygers.

It was the seventh conference loss in eight games for the Giants as they have dropped seven games by a total margin of 30 points. Ross is 4-7 overall.

The Tygers moved their record to 3-5 in the conference with two of the victories coming against the Giants. They are 3-4 overall.

The winning basket for Mansfield was scored by guard Brent McFarland, who broke loose for a left corner jumper with 28 seconds left. A hook shot by Dave Price with 10 seconds left in the final seconds to secure the victory for Mansfield.

Although Mansfield coach Jim Goode said the game was another of many indicators this season of the balance in the conference, Ross coach Ken Miller is wondering when the breaks will start balancing in favor of Ross.

"Talk about luck. It sure can't get any worse," related a dejected Miller after the game. "It's tough on them, (players) but it will start turning for them one of these times."

This is typical of the balance in the Buckeye

Conference," Goode said. "This is the best balanced I've ever seen it. Fremont's only won one game, but that doesn't mean anything."

The game was as tightly contested throughout as the final score showed. A slow first quarter by Ross held the Tygers to a 13-8 lead. The Tygers led by five twice in the second period and it was the largest lead any team had.

Some good free throw shooting helped Ross cut the gap in the second period, as it sank six of seven in the period and 13 out of 15 for the game. In contrast, the Tygers had two of five from the line.

"We were playing zone (there was in a 1-3-1 throughout the game) you don't foul much," Goode observed. "Especially as good as they were playing it. We had trouble penetrating against their defense, but when we did penetrate we were fortunate to hit some."

The lead changed hands five times and was tied four times in the third quarter, before the Giants' two buckets by game-leading scorer Fahrbach (17 points) and Dennis Smith scored six unanswered points to take a 40-36 lead.

Going into the fourth quarter the Tygers switched from their man-to-man defense to a half court zone press. It forced 10 Ross turnovers and helped the Tygers regain the lead at 45-44.

"We thought we would put a little rat on them to change the pace," said Goode. "We were able to deflect some passes."

Ross tied it 48-48 midway through the period on a

basket by Pat Belch and two free throws by Fahrbach. Fahrbach, on a three-point play put Ross ahead 53-52 with 2:27 left, after Tyger leading scorer Cliff Belmer (15 points) scored two buckets underneath. Orin Butler put Mansfield back on top 54-53 on a rebound shot by Garry Clark, who had 16 points for Ross, quickly put Ross back into the lead on an outside jumper.

With 1:22 left to play Fahrbach was fouled by Don Gross, who then fouled out with 14 points scored. Fahrbach had just come up with a steal before the foul.

The 6-6 center missed the first of the one and one opportunity, but the Giants got the ball back again after a missed Mansfield shot. An errant pass turned the ball over to the Tygers, which set them up for McFarland's game winner.

"It did not hurt, that really hurt," Miller said of the Ross turnover. With 36 seconds left after Mansfield had taken the lead for good, Miller said he had no intention of holding it up for a final shot.

"We were one down," Miller revealed. "If we miss it we don't have anything. 'We take it when it comes.'"

Price had 15 points and 10 rebounds for Ross in the final 20 seconds, but a pass to him was quickly knocked out of bounds by Mansfield. After Fahrbach missed his 15-foot hook shot there was a jump ball with one second left. Miller had something to say about Fahrbach's shot.

"It looked like he was fouled to me," the coach said.

Fahrbach and Smith combined to help give a Ross a 39-21 edge in rebounds. Ross hit on 21 of 51 from the field for 41 per cent, while the Tygers hit on 27 of 58 for 46 per cent.

Goode said he felt only 10 turnovers committed by his team (it is averaging 20) kept the Tygers in the game. Ross committed 17 turnovers.

Miller revealed that the Giants played the Tygers differently than in their 58-48 loss in Fremont. He said they beat them in Fremont, but found the Tygers to be too quick.

A bad fourth quarter hurt the Ross junior varsity team as Mansfield turned a 34-33 deficit into a 56-44 victory.

stamina and has been subbing 6-5 sophomore Larry Williams for Fahrbach to give him some rest during games.



'New season' opener won by Ross

Ross started its "season within a season" with a convincing win and at the same time proved that, yes, there may be a home court advantage.

The Little Giants won game number five in 12 contests by completing a sweep of Marion Harding 51-40 Friday night at the lair of the Little Giants. Ross' win upped its Buckeye Conference mark to 2-7 while the Prexies slip to 3-6 in the BC and 3-6 overall.

"We told ourselves tonight that this was going to be a 21-19 halftime lead, and it was," said Ross coach Ken Miller. "Coach Ken Miller said, "We can't do anything about those past games so we just work on the ones we have left."

Breaking away from a 21-19 halftime lead, Ross' offense was able to switch zone defenses interspersed with a tight man-to-man to win game one of the new season.

Pat Belch, Garry Clark, and Dave Fahrbach each had 15 of Ross' points in the third stanza to give the Little Giants a 36-31 cushion at the end of the period and the final period was just a matter of getting into the rotations.

The home court win reversed a pattern that Ross and Harding had established over the past two seasons: winning on each other's home court. In the first game this season at Marion, Ross' attack upended Marion's 51-40.

For Marion, the game provided a luxury his team has experienced few times this season. With three minutes to go in the game and Ross up by nine, the Ross coach ordered his team into a slowdown offense.

The effect was to make Harding chase the ball but to say the least, Ross had its problems accomplishing that item.

"We usually are the ones chasing the ball," Miller laughed when questioned about the offense. "We haven't been in that situation since the last time we played Marion."

"All we really wanted to do was slow the tempo of the game down ... we would only take the good shot or a layup," Miller pointed out.

But defense is what sparked for Ross.

"Anytime you hold a team to 40 points, you have to do something," Miller said. "I felt our defense kept them off balance—they weren't sure of what we were doing."

The only defensive aspect that Miller did not like was the press. "We just did not react in it," he said. "Of course we only used it three times."

Larry Williams, Ross' 6-5 sophomore, drew praise from his coach for his defensive play. "At times he may have been doing a little like was the press," Miller said.

The 6-5 Garry Clark of Fahrbach combo jammed up the middle enough to limit Harding's big man, 6-5 Clyde Lutsch, to four second half points. He had eight in the first half.

For Harding coach Doug Riley, the game was a study in frustration.

"I don't know what happened. I don't think we had them out there tonight who played with any hustle or intensity."

"We were making mistakes that we were making in the first of the season," he muttered.

Ross was led in scoring by Fahrbach with 16 followed by Clark with 11. Belch had 10, all in the second half. Lutsch's 12 and Jeff Kirkpatrick's 10 led the Prexies.

The Little Giants hit only 18 of 52 shots but Harding was anemic at 61 of 113 from the field. Ross committed only 16 turnovers, with only three being converted into baskets. The Little Giants, meanwhile, converted 19 Harding outbounds in 18 points.

Harding led in rebounds 35-29 with 18 coming on the offensive board.

"That's something we are going to have to change at Tiffin. (Columbian will host Ross tonight)," Miller said.

Harding's JV won its fourth game of the season by hanging on for a 50-45 win. The loss dropped Ross to 6-6 for the season.





LORAIN—Ross, with a second half boost from Lorain, donned the masks of comedy and tragedy before pulling out a 61-56 Buckeye Conference victory Friday.

The third straight Ross win upset the Little Giants to an even 7-7 mark and put them into a tie with the Steelmen for sixth spot in the conference race.

Dave Fahrbach tossed in 26 points and grabbed 17 rebounds and Garry Clark collected 19 points the two Ross co-captains exemplified the hustling play turned in by Ken Miller's squad.

"Since we have been here at Ross," Miller recalled, "we have never had a team play with much enthusiasm in Lorain.

"Before the game tonight, we asked these players to play with a little more enthusiasm, the response was good and then quickly added, 'and they did a heck of a job. Ross plays Sandusky

Admiral King will invade Findlay in the key Buckeye Conference basketball game Friday night. The game highlights a four-game conference slate.

In other games, Ross will be at Sandusky, Elyria entertains Marion Harding, and Mansfield travels to Lorain.

The Admirals are riding at the top of the wave in the conference with a 9-2 mark while Findlay, after a 42-35 win over Ross Tuesday night, is in third spot in the topsy-turvy race with a 7-4 mark.

Admiral King will have to counter Findlay's Mike Brickman, the BC's second leading scorer and the inside game of Mark Van Gunten to take another step closer to the conference title. The Admirals' Rennie Harris is ranked fifth in the scoring race with a 16.2 mark.

Ross had a three-game win streak broken Tuesday

when they managed to hit only 13 of 62 shots from the floor. In Sandusky, the Little Giants will face a team that handed them a 60-57 defeat earlier this season.

Dave Fahrbach, Ross's 6-6 senior center, will lead the Little Giants. He is currently fourth in scoring, 16.3, and second in rebounding with a 10.9 average per game. Garry Clark, who saw spot duty for Ross Tuesday because of a sprained ankle, is 12th in the BC scoring race with a 12.6 mark.

Sandusky is led by Jesse Jackson, 10th in the BC with a 13.5 mark.

Ross is 3-8 in the BC and Sandusky is 6-4. The Little Giants are 7-8 overall while the Blue Streaks are 9-5.

Elyria is in second spot in the title race with an 8-3 BC slate and should improve that mark Friday at the expense of 3-8 (3-11) Marion Harding. The Pioneers' Richard Montague took over the scoring lead in the conference this week with a 17.8 ppg.

In the final conference tilt, Mansfield, 5-6 and 6-7, is favored over Lorain, 3-8 and 5-10. The Tygers are led by Bernard Ford, sixth in the BC with a 14.5 ppg. Lorain counters with Byron McCall, the conference's leading rebounder with a 15.5 mark and third leading scorer with a 16.3 mark.



Ross's 'big three' sacks Streaks 55-49

SANDUSKY—Fremont Ross resorted to a "big three" and a tough zone defense to leap out of the Tuesday night doldrums and sack Sandusky 55-49 in a Buckeye Conference tilt Friday night.

Smarting from their lowest point of the season, a 42-35 losing debacle to Findlay on Tuesday, the Little Giants resorted to what Head Coach Ken Miller calls his "big lineup" to counter the Blue Streaks rebounding.

Midway through the second stanza, Miller inserted 6-5 sophomore Larry Williams into the lineup to team up with 6-6 Dave Fahrbach and 6-2 Denny Smith. The three are the tallest players on the Little Giants' squad.

"We had to make an adjustment," Miller admitted when he teamed his "big three" with guards Pat Belch and Garry Clark. "We had to switch some players around into positions that they were not all that familiar with."

Miller switched Fahrbach out to a forward or a wing spot and put Williams into the center. "David has more experience and could adjust a little better than Larry," Miller explained that move. Smith handled the other wing.

With that lineup working into gear and the "big three" headed for the boards, the Little Giants took control. Fahrbach ended up with 19 rebounds to go with a game high 21 points and Smith grabbed nine rebounds while pouring in a career high 17 points. Williams did not score but pulled off eight rebounds as Ross held a 44-32 advantage.

Clark, hobbled by a sprained ankle, scored 12 points from the outside, all in the first half. His outside shooting helped loosen up the inside for Fahrbach and Smith.

Ross led most of the game, at time by as much as six points, but

28 turnovers refused to let the Little Giants put the game away.

"Don't even mention those turnovers," Miller, who was ill on Wednesday and Friday, shuddered.

Sandusky overcame a 47-41 lead by Ross to take a 49-47 lead with 2:02 to play on a bucket by Paul Biddle. The lead lasted exactly 15 seconds or just long enough to give Fahrbach a layup on the inside. The Ross senior was fouled by Biddle on the play and converted the free throw for a 50-49 lead.

Each team exchanged turnovers but Smith was fouled with 48 seconds to go. Smith calmly hit both ends of the one and one for the insurance the Little Giants needed. A bucket on a pinpoint pass underneath from Clark to Fahrbach and one charity toss by the 6-6 Little Giant cushioned the Ross lead.

"We didn't expect that type of a game from Smith," Sandusky coach Gary Reynolds said quietly while staring into space after the game. "What did he get against Findlay—two points maybe. This had to be his best game."

Another thing that haunted the Blue Streaks' coach was the failure of his pressing defense.

"It (the press) really did not work that well. I thought we could have forced more turnovers."

When told that Ross had been forced into 28 giveaways, Reynolds replied, "Well, I mean we did not score off of many of those turnovers."

Miller was munching on a hamburger when he pointed to varsity assistant coach Don Burgess. "That's the guy who deserves most of the credit for getting the team ready. I haven't been at practice the last two days... all I did was talk to him on the phone to see what was going on."

What Burgess was doing was sending Ross through some shooting drills with the express purpose of improving on the Little Giants' 13 of 62 performance of Tuesdays.

"We really did not want to do anything too strenuous," Burgess pointed out, "so we worked on our shooting and went through what we expected to see from Sandusky."

While the Ross coaches figured out what they expected from Sandusky, it was what Ross did with the zone defenses that bothered Reynolds.

"That zone forced us outside too much and as a result, we tried to win the game from the perimeter."

The Blue Streaks hit only 19 of 69 shots from the floor while Ross improved to 21 of 51.

The win upped Ross's conference mark to 4-8 and 8-8 overall. Sandusky's BC slate slipped to 6-6 and 8-6 overall.

Ross's next game is Friday at Elyria, a team that jumped into a tie with Admiral King for first in the BC race Friday night. The Pioneers downed Marion Harding 67-49 while Findlay was dumping the Admirals 74-54. Both teams are 9-3 in the conference.

In the night's final BC game, Lorain defeated Mansfield 81-69.



Ross can be BC 'spoilers'

Ross can be the "spoilers of the year" in the Buckeye Conference basketball race. On Friday, the Little Giants travel to Elyria and close out the season on Friday, Feb. 21, by hosting Admiral King.

Elyria and Admiral King are tied for the conference top spot with identical 9-3 slates.

The Little Giants, winners of four of the last five games and 8-8 for the season, will take on the Pioneers in its first effort at "spoiling." Elyria tripped Ross 52-47 in the first meeting of the teams.

Whipping the Pioneers on their home floor will be a tall order for Ken Miller's squad. Standing in Ross's way of a possible upset is the conference's leading scorer, 6-9 Richard Montague of the Pioneers.

The high jumping Elyria junior is scoring at 17.8 rate and is also third in the BC in rebounding with a 9.9 average.

Rick Hoskin of Elyria is eighth in scoring with a 13.6 ppg and has been pulling down 9.2 rebounds to give Elyria a potent scoring and rebounding punch.

Add to those two standouts the fact that Elyria is allowing only 49.5 points per game, and it remains to be said that Ross will have to play flawless basketball to pull off what could be the

top upset of the year. Elyria is scoring at a 59.5 pace which is fourth in the BC.

Ross ranks second in defense at 54.2 but is seventh in scoring with a 53.2 effort.

Dave Fahrbach is the top Little Giants threat from in under the boards. The 6-6 senior is averaging 16.3, fourth in the conference, and is second in rebounding with a 10.9 pace. Garry Clark of Ross is 12th in scoring 12.3.

In the other Buckeye Conference games, Admiral King will host Sandusky, Findlay travels to Mansfield, and Lorain travels to Marion Harding.

Pioneers humiliate stone cold Ross

ELYRIA—"What can you say?" shrugged Ken Miller and added, "The best way to put it is we were outclassed, outhustled, or just out-everything!"

Miller could have added quite a few other remarks but it would have been like rubbing salt into his own open wound.

For the first time in his 18-plus years of coaching, Miller sat painfully through a scoreless first quarter. Elyria ran off the first 24 points of the game while humiliating the Little Giants 65-30 in the 13th Buckeye Conference game of the season for both teams.

"I can't remember of ever having not had a team score at least two points in a quarter," Miller said evenly.

For Assistant Coach Don Burgess, the explanation was an echo of Miller. "It's just like Ken said—'You stay around this game long enough and you see everything.'"

Burgess praised the Pioneers by pointing out, "They had a super offense and a super defense . . . there is not team in the Buckeye Conference who could have beaten them tonight—maybe not any team in the state!"

The game was a runaway from the beginning. While the Pioneers throwing a match-up zone defense that took away both the inside and outside shooting game of Ross, Elyria's offensive machine was running roughshod over Ross. Four and one-half minutes into the game, Elyria led 10-0.

With nearly two minutes of the second quarter elapsed, the Pioneers had the 24-0 lead. Dave Fahrbach of Ross forced in a layup from the right side at the 6:24 mark of the second stanza and the sparse Elyria crowd gave the Little Giants a standing ovation.

Elyria Coach Mike Riley did not offer any apologies for the slaughter but did admit that he felt that Ross is a much better team than they showed.

"Our kids were putting the ball in the basket early and they weren't," was Riley's pointed explanation. "We have had some good defensive efforts and this was a great one for us."

Riley, whose team is seeded number one in the sectional basketball tournament, pointed out "We are starting to

peak for the tournament and I think the kids want to show they deserve that top seeding."

Riley added about the early getaway by his team, "When things start to snowball like that, it sometimes is a helpless situation."

The Little Giants hit only 11 of 41 shots from the floor . . . Elyria a blistering 32 of 57. Big Richard Montague, Elyria's 6-9 junior center, tore the middle of the Ross defense to pieces in the first and third quarters as he hit a game high 17 points.

Montague led a quartet of Pioneers who hit double figures. Scrappy guard Mark Haddox dropped in 14 points with Hubert Oliver and Steve Lindquist firing in 10 apiece.

Fahrbach dropped in six of 12 shots from the field and added four charity tosses to lead Ross with 16 points. Denny Smith with six, was next in line.

The closest Ross came to the Pioneers after the 24-0 start was 38-19 with two minutes to play in the third quarter.

After missing all eight shots in the first stanza, Ross ended the game with only one of 11 in the final eight minutes.

Elyria's win kept them knotted for the top spot in the BC race with Admiral King, a 69-55 winner over Sandusky. Both teams are 10-3 in the conference. Ross will close out the regular season by hosting the Admirals next Friday night.

In the junior varsity game, Elyria broke away from a 33-30 deficit at the end of the three quarters to down Ross 51-42. Derrill Daniels led Ross with 15 points. The JV Little Giants are now 6-11.


The Admirals are led by Rennie Harris, John Brown, Mike Cook, and Eddie Smith, all four scored in double figures against Ross in the first game.

Ross's win ends 14-game famine against King

Ross unveiled a strange formula to part off a string of 14 basketball upsets in the school's history. A bad practice equal a great Friday night game.

"This had to be the worst week of practice that we have had," Head Coach Ken Miller said. "But this had to be our best game of the season."

The Little Giants became the "giant killers" and punched a hole in Lorain Admiral King's title bound ship 58-54 in overtime to knock the Admirals out of a title run.

Because of Ross, the Elyria Pioneers inherited the title Friday night. Both the Admirals and the Pioneers had been tied for the loop lead with 10-3 marks but the AK loss coupled with Elyria's 66-49 win over Lorain Senior gave the crown to the Pioneers.

It was the first time that Ross had beaten Admiral King since Jan. 3, 1969 (61-60 at Ross) and the first time in 10 games that the Little Giants have beaten a Mitch Gilliam coached Admirals team.

Ross tried to do it many an 8-7, 9-

10, but led by as many as six, 58-52, in what Don Burgess, Ross varsity termed as the "sweetest victory in the four years that Ken (Miller) and I have been here."

The Little Giants had to wait for the first time in the final period 50-48 on Garnet Clark theft and layup with 3:58 to play.

The Admirals' Rennie Harris tied the game with a followup shot at the 2:55 mark but two charity tosses by Dave Fahrbach put Ross back on top 52-50 with 42 to play.

Harris ignited the game again a half minute after Fahrbach's foul shot.

Greg Ballish missed from the side with 1:24 to go to give Ross the ball but Harris came up with a steal of a Ross pass to set up the hectic final minute of regulation play.

Gilliam had his team run the clock down to 16 seconds before calling time. When time was back in, another 11 seconds melted off the clock before Harris cast a shot up that rolled off the rim and into the hands of Fahrbach.

In the overtime, Ross gave the Admirals a pair of chances on turnovers but shots by Ballish, Mike Cook, and John Brown rolled off each time. After three Ross misses, John Kiser, who has hit only 30 per cent of his field goals this season, rolled the ball in from 15 feet out on the right side to give Ross a 54-52 lead with 1:05 to play.

"I turned around and there was no one in front of me," the Ross senior recalled.

"It wasn't the best looking shot but it went in, didn't it."

A timeout by Gilliam and a miss by Cook set up a perfect pass by Pat Beich to Denny Smith with 10 seconds to play to put Ross up 58-52. On the play, Smith admitted that he was about to call timeout.

Clark wrapped up the game with two free throws and Brown hit a jumper from 45 feet with two seconds to play for the Admirals only bucket of the overtime.

For Gilliam, the loss was a bitter disappointment. "We beat all the guys at the top," he muttered, "but lost to everyone on the bottom."

He was referring to the conference standings.

The Admirals beat Elyria in both divisional games of the four losses. Three have come at the hands of Ross, Marion Harding, and Mansfield, all teams in the second division on the BC.

"We were playing sick," Gilliam insisted. "Brown had the flu and we could not get up and down the floor as quick as we wanted to."

"But Ross made us shoot from the perimeter and kept us off the offensive boards," the Admirals' coach said.

"They may have been sick," Miller came back with, "but we were playing up to our level."

Ironically, the team Ross helped win the title, Elyria, could possibly have avoided many chances for Ross before the upset.

"It was hard trying to get the kids

back psychologically after that game at Elyria last week. (Ross lost 65-30 and were outscored 100-50 at the start of the game.) That was the reason that we had been blown off the floor and getting the kids ready this week was a big concern for us," Miller admitted.



Cavs could drop magic number to one

CLEVELAND (AP) — The Cleveland Cavaliers polished off the Houston Rockets five weeks ago in their last meeting here, but guard Mike Newlin wasn't

convinced the Cavs were for real.

After the 107-103 defeat which plunged the Rockets six games behind then-division-leading

Cleveland, Newlin said, "I'm just not a believer in the Cavaliers. I think we'll catch them."

Just like the rest of the doubters throughout the National Basketball Association, though, Newlin may soon have to accept Cleveland as a real contender.

Since that meeting on February 22, the Cavaliers have slipped from 1½ games ahead of Washington in the Central Division to 1½ games behind the Bullets. But they continue to lead the Rockets by six games in the chase for second place and an automatic playoff berth.

The two teams meet here again tonight and a victory by the Cavaliers would lower their "magic number" for their first ever postseason spot to one.

Going into the contest

with the Rockets, any combination of three Cleveland victories or Houston losses totalling three will clinch at least second place in the division.

The Rockets, owners of a 4-1 edge over the Cavaliers this season, come into the contest with a 38-37 overall mark, compared to 43-30 for the Cavaliers.

"This is a real big game for us," said Cleveland forward Bingo Smith. "We need to eliminate Houston first."

The only original Cavalier still with the expansion-born club added, "We've had a good series (with Houston). The games have been close, but I think they've been getting the right play or break at the right time."

"They have a young club like we do and it seems we always have good games," he added.

The Cavaliers, who finished a stretch of seven games in 10 days just last Saturday, now play five games in six days with only Friday an off day this week.

They play at New Orleans Wednesday night and back here against Boston Thursday night.
