CINDER STARS POINTING FOR HARMON FIELD

Contingents From North-
west Territory to Per-
form Here

Both Class A and B Will
Have Opportunities
to Show

Several records will be chal-
lenged here Saturday when the
district Class A and Class B
track meet is held at Harmon
Field.

An array of outstanding cinder
path artists will perform in the
meet. The sprint records will be
battered by Perrotti, of Port Clin-
ton, one of the really outstand-
ing men in the festival. Ziemko,
of Norwalk; and Garrett and Mc-
Murray, of Sandusky.

The hurdle events will be hotly
contested between Stoner, of Wil-
lard; Schilling and Leavel, of San-
dusky; Fatkin of Mansfield; Chris-
ty and Binkley, of Fremont; Ros-

Hutchins, Wright and Gorman,
of Bellevue, will give plenty of
competition in the weight events
and will have a race with Kreuger,
of Sandusky, and Freeth, of Fre-
mont.

Thompson and Pressing, of Nor-
walk, will have the inside track on
the high jump event, with Kreuger
taking laurels probably in the
broad jump. Pole vault records will
be challenged by Don and Jim
Whittaker, of Sandusky; Thraves,
of Fremont; Luita, of Mansfield;
Thompson, of Norwalk; and Mitch-
ell, of Bellevue.

Class A Schools

Altogether, the following Class
A schools have entered the meet:
Mansfield, Sandusky, Norwalk,
Port Clinton, Willard, Bellevue and
Fremont Ross.

The following Class B schools
are entered: Old Fort, Norwalk,
St. Paul, Oak Harbor, Elmore,
Lakeside, Kelley's Island, Huron,
Mellmore, Attica, Milan, Castalia,
Thompson-Fireside, Sycamore,
New London, Clyde, Gibsonburg
and Genoa.

Preliminaries or qualifying ses-
sion will be held at 10 a. m. Satur-
day, with the finals. Co-managers
Bob Oldfather and Gob Laub said
Thursday that the 440, 880, mile
and both relays will be started
from staggered positions to elim-
inate crowding at the curves. The
change was made because of com-
plaints registered at the Buckeye
meet last week.

McDaniels, of Mt. Blanchard,
will again act as official starter at
the meet. Coach Oldfather will be
the clerk of course for the track
events; Jay R. Bone will be judge
for the weight events; and Harold
Althoff will judge the jumps and
pole vault.

Extra Bleachers

H. A. Cochran, business manager
of athletics at the local school, is
having more bleachers erected at
Harmon Field to take care of the
large crowd which is expected to
attend.

Fred Bode will explain all events,
announce the winners and in any
way make the meet interesting for
the fans. The winners will be
placed on the "victory stand" so
that every one can see them. Med-
als and cups will be presented by
track queens—Nora Jane Lytle,
Betsey Gottton, Jean Moore, Do-
lores Marsh, and Marian Zwelly.

There will be preliminaries for
both A and B schools in each of
the following events: 100, 220, 120
high hurdle, 220 low hurdle. There
will be but six to qualify for the
afternoon in each of these events.
There will be no preliminaries in
the 440, 880 mile, 880 relay or mile
relay. If the field is too large in any
of these events, they will be run
in two heats against time.

In the shot, javelin, and discus,
the entries will be eliminated to six
in each division. Each man getting
four throws in the morning, and
the six highest will qualify. They
will get four more throws a piece
in the afternoon. Distances in the
morning will count in the finals.

The high jump and pole vault
will be run in the morning until
only six are left in each division.
In the broad jump in the morning
each entry will get 4 jumps, the
six highest will qualify for the af-
ternoon. They will get four more
jumps in the afternoon and dis-
tance made in the preliminaries
will count in the finals.

HUNDREDS JOIN IN TRACK MEET HERE SATURDAY

District Carnival in Fremont Has Many Entries for Events

Robert (Bob) Oldfather and Howard (Gob) Laub, co-managers for the Northwest Ohio district track and field meet at Harmon Field Saturday morning and afternoon, announced Friday noon the complete entry list in the big carnival.

Qualifying events will be held at 10 a. m. Saturday, when the field will be cut down to six candidates in each event in both Class A and Class B. The finals will be run off in the afternoon at 2 p. m.

The number entered in the various events, with the entries from Fremont, follow:

BLUE STREAKS ARE HEADED TO STATE FINALS

Gallop Away With Major Prizes in Handiest of Fashions

Ross Wins Second Place; Oak Harbor Wins Class B Title

Apparently headed straight for the state championship, Sandusky high school's great track and field team walked away with the Northwest Ohio (eastern division) championship among Class A schools at Harmon Field Saturday.

In the Class B field, Oak Harbor's squad of cinder men had little trouble amassing a score which gave them the big trophy and plenty of medals.

Fremont Ross high, which had given Sandusky a real battle in the Buckeye High school league a week previous, was no match for the victorious Sandusky squad Saturday. The Little Giants grabbed quite a few honors and took second place with no trouble, but they couldn't step the record breaking feats of the fall.

The final results of the Class A meet: Sandusky 94 points; Fremont Ross, 56½; Mansfield, 29; Willard 21½; Bellevue, 14; Norwalk 12; Port Clinton, 8; and Tiffin Columbian, 4.

Class B final tabulations showed: Oak Harbor, 43 7-10; Thompson-Freside, 21½; Huron 20½; Lakeside, 20; Clyde, 19½; Milan, 19; Sycamore, 16 1-5; Elmore, 14; Alvin and Geneva tied, 12½; New London, 12 1-8; Margaretta of Canals, 8½; Jackson-Amanus, 6; Kelly's Island, 3; Eden-Memore, 4; Gibsonburg, 2; Old Fort, 1-8; Norwalk Bt. Paul's, 6.

A Record Meeting
The meet was one of the largest ever staged in Fremont. So more than eight Class A teams were entered, and 18 Class B teams competed. Preliminaries were held in the morning, and the finals got away in the afternoon at 2 p. m. Coaches Robert (Bob) Oldfather and Howard (Gob) Lamb were co-managers of the meet.

All the youths who placed either first, second or third (ties included) are eligible to take part in the state meet at Columbus Saturday. Three records were broken as the Class A athletes vied for honors. Three other records were tied in Class A. Harmon Field records were used in the meet. No record fell in the Class B division.

Outstanding, perhaps, was the running of Sandusky's fleet 880-yard relay team. Defeated the week previous by Fremont's four runners, Sandusky's relay team put down a new record of one minute 23 seconds in edging out the Fremonters Saturday. The old record was one minute 23.3 seconds, set by Fremont Ross May 11. Fremont tied the relay until the last 100-yards, when McMurray, the Sandusky speed artist, overhauled little Joe Lewis in the stretch and streaked into the tape for first honors.

A Classy Effort
Paul Garrett, of Sandusky, set a new record of 11.3 seconds in the 40-yard dash for one of the other outstanding performances. The husky Salter broke his own record for Harmon Field, set last week, at 8.1 seconds.

The other record breaking performance was turned in by Presley, of Norwalk. He cleared the bar in the high jump at 5 feet 11 inches, breaking the former mark of 5 feet 10 inches held jointly by Holmes and Pettiford, of Fremont Ross.

Leavel, of Sandusky, tied the record of 14.6 seconds for the high hurdles; Jim and Don Whittaker each tied for first place in the pole vault at 12 feet one fourth inch, equalling the record; and McMurray, of Sandusky, stepped the 220-yard dash in 23.2 seconds, equalling the record.

Fremont turned in its best performance in the 220-yard low hurdles. Carl Hal Binkley and Christy finished one-two in this event to give Ross high nine points. Binkley's time was 21.1 second.

The mile race between Charters of Mansfield and Karlovitz, of Fremont, had the spectators in a frenzy. Charters kept the lead all the way, but was a bare three feet ahead of Karlovitz as he broke the tape. The time was 4 minutes 39 seconds, just short of a record.

Rineholt did some nice work in taking first place in the 880-yard run for Fremont. He turned in a time of 2 minutes 4.6 seconds. Erchenbrecher took third for Ross high. Shade of Mansfield getting the second award.

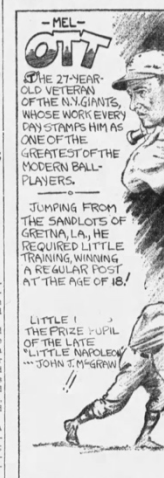
Freeb Takes One
George Freeb won first place in the javelin throw for Fremont, a heave of 180 feet 1 inch being the best recorded. Earl, of Sandusky, was second.

Although the Class B meet was without record breaking performance, the boys from the smaller schools gave many thrills for the big crowd. There were so many entries in the Class B field that most of the dashes had to be run in heats, and against time.

Hot weather prevailed for the big carnival, the sun shining all day with a warmth that brought out the best in the 200-odd athletes. The track was in perfect condition.

Perhaps the biggest crowd to gather at Harmon Field for a track event was on hand to see the races and field events. One large section of bleachers was packed, and two smaller sections were filled. In addition many other fans lined the track and gathered in the middle of the field to see the events.
