## CINDER STARS POINTING FOR HARMON FIELD

Contingents From North-  
west Territory to Per-  
form Here

Both Class A and B Will  
Have Opportunities  
to Show

Several records will be challenged here Saturday when the district Class A and Class B track meet is held at Harmon Field.

An array of outstanding cinder park athletes will perform in the meet. The sprint records will be battered by Perrott, of Port Clinton, one of the really outstanding men in the festival, Ziemke, of Norwalk; and Garrett and McMurray, of Sandusky.

The hurdle events will be hotly contested between Stoner, of Willard; Schilling and Leavel, of Sandusky; Fatkis, of Mansfield; Christy and Binkley, of Fremont; Ross, Hutchins, Wright, and German of Bellevue, giving plenty of competition in the weight events and will have a race with Kreuger, of Sandusky, and Freeh, of Fremont.

Thompson and Pressing, of Norwalk, will have the inside track on the high jump event, with Kreuger taking laurels probably. In the broad jump, Pole vault, records will be challenged by Don and Jim Whitaker, of Sandusky; Thraves, of Fremont; Luta, of Mansfield; Thompson, of Norwalk; and Mitchell, of Bellevue.

### Class A Schools

Altogether, the following Class A schools have entered the meet: Mansfield, Sandusky, Norwalk, Port Clinton, Willard, Bellevue and Fremont Ross.

The following Class B schools are entered: Old Fort, Norwalk St. Paul, Oak Harbor, Elmore, Lakeside, Kelley's Island, Huron, Mellmore, Attica, Milan, Castalia, Thompson-Fireside, Symesmore, New London, Clyde, Gibsonburg and Genoa.

Preliminaries or qualifying sessions will be held at 10 a. m. Saturday with the finale. Co-managers Bob Oldfather and Gob Laub said Thursday that the 440, 880, mile and both relays will be started from staggered positions to eliminate crowding at the curves. The change was made because of complaints registered at the Buckeyes meet last week.

Oldfather of Mt. Blanchard, will again act as official starter at the meet. Coach Oldfather will be the clerk of course for the track events; Jay R. Boni will be judge for the weight events; and Harold Althoff will judge the jumps and pole vault.

### Extra Bleachers

H. A. Clegg, business manager of athletics at the local school, is having more bleachers erected at Harmon Field to take care of the large crowd which is expected to attend.

Fred Bode will explain all events, announce the winners and in any way make the meet interesting for the spectators. The winners will be placed on the "victory stand" so that every one can see them. Medals and cups will be presented by track queens—Nora Jane Lytle, Betsy Gottron, Jean Moore, Dolores Marsh, and Marian Zwelly.

There will be preliminaries for both A and B schools in each of the following events: 100, 220, 120 high hurdle, 220 low hurdle. There will be but six to qualify for the afternoon in each of these events. There will be no preliminaries in the 440, 880 mile, 880 relay or mile relay. If the field is too large in any of these events, they will be run in two heats against time.

In the discus and the shot put, discus entries will be eliminated to six in each division. Each man getting four throws in the morning, and the six highest will qualify. They will get four more throws a piece in the afternoon. Distances in the morning will count in the finals.

The high jump and pole vault will be the same. In the high jump only six are left in each division. In the broad jump in the morning each entry will get 4 jumps, the six highest will qualify for the afternoon. They will get four more jumps in the afternoon, and distance made in the preliminaries will count in the finals.

## District Carnival in Fremont Has Many Entries for Events

Robert (Bob) Oldfather and Howard (Goh) Laub, co-managers for the Northwest Ohio district track and field meet at Harmon Field Saturday morning and afternoon, announced Friday noon the complete entry list in the big carnival.

Qualifying events will be held at 10 a. m. Saturday, when the field will be cut down to six candidates in each event in both Class A and Class B. The finals will be run off in the afternoon at 2 p. m.

## BLUE STREAKS ARE HEADED TO STATE FINALS

Gallop Away With Major  
Prizes in Handiest of  
Fashions

Ross Wins Second Place;  
Oak Harbor Wins Class  
B Title

Apparently headed straight for the state championship, Sandusky high school's great track and field team won both with the North Central Ohio (eastern division) championship among Class A schools at Harmon Field Saturday.

In the Class B field, Oak Harbor's squad of cinder boys had little trouble in the race, which gave them the big trophy and plenty of medals.

Franklin, high which had given Sandusky a real battle in the Buckeye High school league a week ago, was beaten by the victorious Sandusky squad Saturday. The Little Giants grabbed just a few more wins and took second place with no trouble, but they couldn't stop the record breaking feats of the leaders.

The results of the Class A meet: A stood: Sandusky 94 points; Fremont Ross, 86½; Mansfield, 29; Wauseon, 26; Huron, 24; Norwalk, 12; Port Clinton, 8; and Tiffin, Columbian, 4.

Class B results tabulations showed: Oak Harbor, 43; Tiffin Thompson-Firsde, 21½; Huron 20½; Lakeside, 18½; Sandusky, 17½; Sycamore, 16 1½; Elmore, 14; Alton and Genoa tied, 13½; New London, 12½; Marion, 11½; Lakeside, 8½; Jackson-Amerson, 6; Kelleys Island, 5; Eden-Melmont, 4; Olentangy, 3½; and Fort, 1½; Norwalk St. Paul's, 0.

A Record Meeting

The most remarkable of the largest ever staged in Fremont. No less than eight Class A teams were entered and 16 Class B teams competed. Preliminary heats were held in the morning, and the finals got away in the afternoon at 1 p. m.

Coach George (Bob) Olds and Howard (Geb) Laub were co-chairs of the meet.

All the men's records placed either first, second or third (ties included) are eligible to take part in the state competition at Satara.

Three records were broken as the Class A athletes vied for honors, and the records set in the morning in Class A. Harmon Field records were used in the meet. No records fell in the Class B.

Outstanding, perhaps, was the running of Sandusky's 400-yard dash last Saturday. In the race the week previous by Fremont's relay runners, Sandusky's relay team put up a record of 53 seconds in one minute 53 seconds in edging the Fremonters Saturday. The old record was one minute 53 seconds, set by Fremont's Ross May 11.

Fremont led the relay until the last leg, when McMurray, the Sandusky runner, passed little Joe Lewis in the stretch and streaked into the tape for first honors.

A Classy Effort

Paul Chertkoff, Sandusky, set a new record of 51½ seconds in the 440-yard dash for one of the outstanding performances. The buckeye Sandusky set a record for Harmon Field, set 2½ seconds.

The record breaking performance was turned in by Prentiss of Norwalk. He cleared the bar at 5 feet 5 inches, breaking the former mark of 5 feet 10 inches held jointly by Johnson and Pettiford, of Fremont Ross.

Leavall of Sandusky, tied the record of 222 yards in the 220-yard dash, but Jim and Doc Whittaker each tied for first place in the pole vault at 6 feet one fourth inch, equaling the record. In the broad jump, Sandusky stepped the 220-yard dash in 222 seconds, equaling the record.

Fremont turned in its best performance in the 220-yard dash Saturday, with Chertkoff and Chetty finished one-two in this event to give Ross high nine points. Elkleg's record.

The mile race between Charters of Mansfield and Karlovitz of Fremont was a dead heat. Charters kept the lead all the way, but was a bare three feet ahead of Karlovitz as he broke the tape. The time was 4 minutes 2 seconds, just short of a record.

Although the Class B meet was without record breaking performances, the boys from the smaller schools put up many performances to the big crowd. There were so many entries in the Class B field that most of them had to be run in heats, and against time.

Ideal weather prevailed for the big carnival. The sun shined all day and the weather was cool enough to keep the heat down.

Perhaps the biggest crowd gathered at Harmon Field for a track and field meet had the most races and field events. One large section of bleachers was packed, and a large number of spectators filled. In addition many other fans lined the track and gathered in the middle of the field to see the events.
