Ross, St. Joe teams finish 2nd in meets

Fremont Ross finished in middle of a triangular and St. Joe was second in a five-team high school cross country meet Thursday.

Lakota was charged with just 21 points to finish ahead of Ross (38) and Old Fort (81) in the three-team meet at East Side Park in Fremont. At Bascom, host Hopewell-Loudon had 34 and St. Joe 59. Following St. Joe was New Riegel with 74, St. Wendelin at 87 and Elmwood with 101.

In other meets, Margaretta defeated Oak Harbor 24-31, Perkins speeded past Clyde 17-42, and Genoa got past Delta 18-41.

Veteran Lakota runner Joe McKown won the meet at East Side Park, churning out the 3.1 miles in 16 minutes and 20 seconds. Teammate Brian Smith was second in 17:40.

Brian Doty of Ross was third in 17:43 but Lakota runners took six of the next eight spots to control the meet.

Kevin Sendelbach of Hopewell-Loudon beat St. Joe's Craig

Nieset to the finish line by 11 seconds — 17:28 to 17:39 — as the two made it a virtual two-man run. Larry Steinmetz of Hopewell-Loudon was a distant third in 18:36.

The Bascom course was 3.3 miles, two-tenths of a mile more than the regulation 5K distance.

Jason Hand and Dave Riedy finished first and second, respectively, for Margaretta.

Matt Sutter, Bill Harder and Chris Webb of Oak Harbor finished 3, 4 and 5.

Powerful Perkins ran easily past Clyde. The first four runners to finish were from Perkins.

Scott Smith won the race in 17:12 to pace the Pirates' win. Dave Jackson was the first Clyde runner, finishing fifth in 18:10.

At Delta, Genoa runners finished in the first four positions and seven of the 10 in the convincing victory.

Jason Gladden won in 16:54.

Fremont Ross picked up a pair of boys cross country victories Thursday with a top spot finish in a triangular with Huron and Port Clinton at East Harbor State Park.

Ross had 21 points, Huron 41 and host Port Clinton 78.

In other meets, Bettsville won a quadrangular involving St. Joe, Old Fort and Hopewell-Loudon, Fostoria defeated Oak Harbor, and Genoa ran past Evergreen.

The Ross duo of Eric Middleton and Brian Doty finished 1-2, both in 18 minutes and 16 seconds. Jeff Quayle was third and Marc Chapman fourth for Huron.

Scott Nossaman was fifth,

Aaron Potter sixth, Kevin Brooks seventh and Andy Boedecker ninth for Ross as the Little Giants took seven of the top 10 spots.

Jason Gladden was the individual winner for Genoa, finishing in 18 minutes and 35 seconds, a second ahead of teammate Chris Brossia. Ray Burrey was third and Eric Burrey fourth.

Eric Middleton was third and Brian Doty fourth in 18:08 and 18:26, respectively, for Ross.

The Little Giants are 3-2.

In the girls meet, Ross took eight of the top 10 spots but had to settle for just that. Fostoria started the race with five runners but only four finished and no team scores were recorded.

Tami Stanley finished first for the Little Giants in 23:06. Her Ross teammate, Cathy Mallia, was next in 23:43 before Shelleigh Watson of Fostoria came across the line.

Shelly Hines was fourth for Ross.


Renae Beaudin and Tricia Crawford were 1-2 for Perkins but the Ross depth paid off. Beaudin finished in 19:54.

Genoa came up with a cross country shutout to highlight the high school boys area slate Tuesday.

Genoa runners finished in the first nine spots as the Comets won 15-50 — a perfect score — over Northwood.

Jason Gladden was first in 18:56 with teammates Ray Burrey second in 18:57 and Chris Brossia third in 18:58. One second behind Brossia was Eric Burrey.

In other meets, St. Joe split with Oak Harbor and Port Clinton at Oak Harbor, Ross finished in the middle of a

Larry Sparks was the individual winner for Perkins in the triangular at Osborne Park in Sandusky. He ran the 5K distance in 16:35. That effort

spurred the Pirates to 23 points. Ross had 40 and Huron 63.

Brian Doty and Eric Middleton of Ross were second and third in 17:01 and 17:14, respectively, but Perkins runners finished in fourth through seventh to cement the win.

Jay Yochem of St. Mary's led his team to a 19-39 victory over Clyde. Yochem won in 16:51. Clyde's Dave Jackson was second in 17:24.

Woodmore stopped Gibsonburg 25-30 and Elmwood 17-38. Doug Shuman was first in 17:39 and Tim Hernandez second in 18:11 as Woodmore runners took the top two spots. Steve Mitchell of Gibsonburg was third in 18:15.

The two wins leveled Woodmore at 3-3 for the season.

Ross's Brian Doty was first in the boys race, nosing out Al Adams of Lake by a second. Eric Middleton of the Little Giants was third in 17:25.

Chris Webb led a trio of Oak Harbor runners finishing fifth through seventh. Webb finished in 17:42.

In the girls race, Teri Ann Klorer of Lake won in 21:35, a minute and second ahead of Ross runner-up Tami Stanley. Another Ross runner, Shelly Hines took third in 22:38.

Cathy Mallia of Ross was fifth with Stacy Pasch seventh and Nicole Buehler of the Little Giants 10th.

The first Oak Harbor runner was Tally McManus in eighth with a clocking of 23:12. Lori Goetz was 18th, Angie Reynolds 19th, Jenny Miller 20th and Margie Alexander 21st for the Rockets.

Joe McKown led the Raiders boys with a first-place clocking of 16:02.3. Brian Smith of Lakota was fifth as the Raiders were charged with just 32 points. Roger Geyman was seventh and Frank Contreras ninth for Lakota.

Fostoria was second with 64, Genoa third with 44, Swanton fourth with 88 and Oak Harbor fifth at 139.

Jason Gladden was sixth in 17:25, Ray Burrey 12th and Chris Brossia 13th for Genoa. Chris Webb led Oak Harbor, finishing 11th in 17:49. Bill Harder crossed the finish line 19th.

The Lakota girls captured that title with 32 points, well ahead of

Rich Cutcher finished 46th and Scott Thomas 49th for the Port Clinton. Cutcher had an 18:44 clocking and Thomas, 18:49.4.

In the girls big school race, Ross finished 10th with 227 and Port Clinton took eighth with 206.

Tami Stanley's 21st place finish in 22:09.8 led Ross. Cathy Mallia was next, finishing 40th in 23:00.9 and Nicole Buehler finished 42nd in 23:04.9.

Ann Gaydosh of Port Clinton won the AAA girls race in 19:35.6.

Whitmer won the team with 95, the same as runner-up Northview. The tie was broken by sixth place runners.

The second Port Clinton runner to finish was Amy Gaydosh 47th in 23:15.6.
